EMERGENCY ORDER NO. 965

EFFECTIVE MARCH 18, 1965

RULES FOR MOVEMENT OF FRUITS AND VEGETABLES FROM
AREA OF PRODUCTION BY STATE PERMIT AND RELEASE

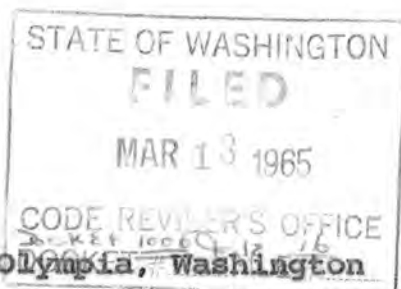
The adoption of this Emergency Order No. 965 establishing rules for the movement of fruits and vegetables from the areas of production by permit or release is necessary for the immediate preservation of public health, safety and general welfare. It is necessary that this order become effective immediately in order that the Director provide adequate rules controlling the movement of fruits and vegetables from the areas of production.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Cameron S. Adams, Acting Director of Agriculture of the State of Washington, by virtue of the authority vested in me under Chapter 15.17 RCW after due notice and public hearing held in Olympia, Washington on March 15, 1965, pursuant to Chapters 42.32 and 34.04 RCW do hereby adopt the following rules:


No person shall ship or transport or accept for shipment or transportation from the area of production without an inspection and the issuance of a certificate and/or a permit, allowing such shipment or movement by the Division of Horticulture of the Department of Agriculture, any of the following agriculture products:

- (1) Apples - in closed or open containers, or bulk for fresh shipment or for processing.
- (2) Apricots - in closed or open containers for fresh shipment.
- (3) Italian Prunes - in closed or open containers for fresh shipment.
- (4) Peaches - in closed or open containers for fresh shipment.
- (5) Cantaloupes - in closed or open containers, or bulk for fresh shipment.
- (6) Pears (Summer, Fall and Winter) - in closed or open containers for fresh shipment or for processing.
- (7) Potatoes - in closed or open containers, or bulk, for fresh shipment, processing or livestock feed.
- (8) Tomatoes - for fresh shipment, in closed containers only.
- (9) Cherries - provided, that no permit shall be issued when such cherries exceed a tolerance allowed for cherry fruit fly larva, averaging in excess of five percent for any lot, for fresh shipment.
