1 AN ACT Relating to amendments concerning the child abuse prevention
2 and treatment act and the adoption and safe families act; amending RCW
3 13.34.020, 13.34.130, 13.34.180, 13.34.190, 74.15.130, and 26.44.100;
4 reenacting and amending RCW 13.34.145, 26.44.020, and 74.13.031; adding
5 a new section to chapter 13.34 RCW; adding a new section to chapter
6 26.44 RCW; and providing an effective date.

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

8 **Sec. 1.** RCW 13.34.020 and 1990 c 284 s 31 are each amended to read
9 as follows:

10 The legislature declares that the family unit is a fundamental
11 resource of American life which should be nurtured. Toward the
12 continuance of this principle, the legislature declares that the family
13 unit should remain intact unless a child's right to conditions of basic
14 nurture, health, or safety is jeopardized. When the rights of basic
15 nurture, physical and mental health, and safety of the child and the
16 legal rights of the parents are in conflict, the rights and safety of
17 the child should prevail. In making reasonable efforts under this
18 chapter, the child's health and safety shall be the paramount concern.
19 The right of a child to basic nurturing includes the right to a safe,

1 stable, and permanent home and a speedy resolution of any proceeding
2 under this chapter.

3 **Sec. 2.** RCW 13.34.130 and 1997 c 280 s 1 are each amended to read
4 as follows:

5 If, after a fact-finding hearing pursuant to RCW 13.34.110, it has
6 been proven by a preponderance of the evidence that the child is
7 dependent within the meaning of RCW 13.34.030; after consideration of
8 the predisposition report prepared pursuant to RCW 13.34.110 and after
9 a disposition hearing has been held pursuant to RCW 13.34.110, the
10 court shall enter an order of disposition pursuant to this section.

11 (1) The court shall order one of the following dispositions of the
12 case:

13 (a) Order a disposition other than removal of the child from his or
14 her home, which shall provide a program designed to alleviate the
15 immediate danger to the child, to mitigate or cure any damage the child
16 has already suffered, and to aid the parents so that the child will not
17 be endangered in the future. In selecting a program, the court should
18 choose those services that least interfere with family autonomy,
19 provided that the services are adequate to protect the child.

20 (b) Order that the child be removed from his or her home and
21 ordered into the custody, control, and care of a relative or the
22 department of social and health services or a licensed child placing
23 agency for placement in a foster family home or group care facility
24 licensed pursuant to chapter 74.15 RCW or in a home not required to be
25 licensed pursuant to chapter 74.15 RCW. Unless there is reasonable
26 cause to believe that the safety or welfare of the child would be
27 jeopardized or that efforts to reunite the parent and child will be
28 hindered, such child shall be placed with a person who is related to
29 the child as defined in RCW 74.15.020(4)(a) and with whom the child has
30 a relationship and is comfortable, and who is willing and available to
31 care for the child. Placement of the child with a relative under this
32 subsection shall be given preference by the court. An order for out-
33 of-home placement may be made only if the court finds that reasonable
34 efforts have been made to prevent or eliminate the need for removal of
35 the child from the child's home and to make it possible for the child
36 to return home, specifying the services that have been provided to the
37 child and the child's parent, guardian, or legal custodian, and that
38 preventive services have been offered or provided and have failed to

1 prevent the need for out-of-home placement, unless the health, safety,
2 and welfare of the child cannot be protected adequately in the home,
3 and that:

4 (i) There is no parent or guardian available to care for such
5 child;

6 (ii) The parent, guardian, or legal custodian is not willing to
7 take custody of the child;

8 (iii) The court finds, by clear, cogent, and convincing evidence,
9 a manifest danger exists that the child will suffer serious abuse or
10 neglect if the child is not removed from the home and an order under
11 RCW 26.44.063 would not protect the child from danger; or

12 (iv) The extent of the child's disability is such that the parent,
13 guardian, or legal custodian is unable to provide the necessary care
14 for the child and the parent, guardian, or legal custodian has
15 determined that the child would benefit from placement outside of the
16 home.

17 (2) If the court has ordered a child removed from his or her home
18 pursuant to subsection (1)(b) of this section, the court may order that
19 a petition seeking termination of the parent and child relationship be
20 filed if the court finds ~~((it))~~: (a) Termination is recommended by the
21 supervising agency ~~((, that it))~~; (b) termination is in the best
22 interests of the child; and (c) that ~~((it is not reasonable to provide
23 further services to reunify the family))~~ because the existence of
24 aggravated circumstances ~~((make it unlikely that services will
25 effectuate the return of the child to the child's parents in the near
26 future))~~, reasonable efforts to unify the family are not required.
27 Notwithstanding the existence of aggravated circumstances, reasonable
28 efforts may be required if the court or department determines it is in
29 the best interest of the child. In determining whether aggravated
30 circumstances exist, the court shall consider one or more of the
31 following:

32 ~~((a))~~ (i) Conviction of the parent of rape of the child in the
33 first, second, or third degree as defined in RCW 9A.44.073, 9A.44.076,
34 and 9A.44.079;

35 ~~((b))~~ (ii) Conviction of the parent of criminal mistreatment of
36 the child in the first or second degree as defined in RCW 9A.42.020 and
37 9A.42.030;

38 ~~((c))~~ (iii) Conviction of the parent of one of the following
39 assault crimes, when the child is the victim: Assault in the first or

1 second degree as defined in RCW 9A.36.011 and 9A.36.021 or assault of
2 a child in the first or second degree as defined in RCW 9A.36.120 or
3 9A.36.130;

4 ~~((d))~~ (iv) Conviction of the parent of murder, manslaughter, or
5 homicide by abuse of the child's other parent, sibling, or another
6 child;

7 ~~((e))~~ (v) Conviction of the parent of attempting, soliciting, or
8 conspiracy to commit a crime listed in (c)(i), (ii), (iii), or (iv) of
9 this subsection;

10 (vi) A finding by a court that a parent is a sexually violent
11 predator as defined in RCW 71.09.020;

12 ~~((f))~~ (vii) Failure of the parent to complete available treatment
13 ordered under this chapter or the equivalent laws of another state,
14 where such failure has resulted in a prior termination of parental
15 rights to another child and the parent has failed to effect significant
16 change in the interim.

17 (3) If reasonable efforts are not ordered under this subsection (3)
18 a permanency plan hearing shall be held within thirty days. Reasonable
19 efforts shall be made to place the child in a timely manner in
20 accordance with the permanency plan, and to complete whatever steps are
21 necessary to finalize the permanent placement of the child;

22 (4) Whenever a child is ordered removed from the child's home, the
23 agency charged with his or her care shall provide the court with:

24 (a) A permanency plan of care that shall identify one of the
25 following outcomes as a primary goal and may identify additional
26 outcomes as alternative goals: Return of the child to the home of the
27 child's parent, guardian, or legal custodian; adoption; guardianship;
28 or long-term relative or foster care, until the child is age eighteen,
29 with a written agreement between the parties and the care provider; and
30 independent living, if appropriate and if the child is age sixteen or
31 older. Whenever a permanency plan identifies independent living as a
32 goal, the plan shall also specifically identify the services that will
33 be provided to assist the child to make a successful transition from
34 foster care to independent living. Before the court approves
35 independent living as a permanency plan of care, the court shall make
36 a finding that the provision of services to assist the child in making
37 a transition from foster care to independent living will allow the
38 child to manage his or her financial affairs and to manage his or her
39 personal, social, educational, and nonfinancial affairs. The

1 department shall not discharge a child to an independent living
2 situation before the child is eighteen years of age unless the child
3 becomes emancipated pursuant to chapter 13.64 RCW.

4 (b) Unless the court has ordered, pursuant to subsection (2) of
5 this section, that a termination petition be filed, a specific plan as
6 to where the child will be placed, what steps will be taken to return
7 the child home, and what actions the agency will take to maintain
8 parent-child ties. All aspects of the plan shall include the goal of
9 achieving permanence for the child.

10 (i) The agency plan shall specify what services the parents will be
11 offered in order to enable them to resume custody, what requirements
12 the parents must meet in order to resume custody, and a time limit for
13 each service plan and parental requirement.

14 (ii) The agency shall be required to encourage the maximum parent-
15 child contact possible, including regular visitation and participation
16 by the parents in the care of the child while the child is in
17 placement. Visitation may be limited or denied only if the court
18 determines that such limitation or denial is necessary to protect the
19 child's health, safety, or welfare.

20 (iii) A child shall be placed as close to the child's home as
21 possible, preferably in the child's own neighborhood, unless the court
22 finds that placement at a greater distance is necessary to promote the
23 child's or parents' well-being.

24 (iv) The agency charged with supervising a child in placement shall
25 provide all reasonable services that are available within the agency,
26 or within the community, or those services which the department of
27 social and health services has existing contracts to purchase. It
28 shall report to the court if it is unable to provide such services.

29 (c) If the court has ordered, pursuant to subsection (2) of this
30 section, that a termination petition be filed, a specific plan as to
31 where the child will be placed, what steps will be taken to achieve
32 permanency for the child, services to be offered or provided to the
33 child, and, if visitation would be in the best interests of the child,
34 a recommendation to the court regarding visitation between parent and
35 child pending a fact-finding hearing on the termination petition. The
36 agency shall not be required to develop a plan of services for the
37 parents or provide services to the parents.

38 ~~((4))~~ (5) If the court determines that the continuation of
39 reasonable efforts to prevent or eliminate the need to remove the child

1 from his or her home or to safely return the child home is inconsistent
2 with the permanency plan of care for the child, reasonable efforts
3 shall be made to place the child in a timely manner in accordance with
4 the permanency plan of care and to complete whatever steps are
5 necessary to finalize the permanent placement of the child.

6 (6) If there is insufficient information at the time of the
7 disposition hearing upon which to base a determination regarding the
8 suitability of a proposed placement with a relative, the child shall
9 remain in foster care and the court shall direct the supervising agency
10 to conduct necessary background investigations as provided in chapter
11 74.15 RCW and report the results of such investigation to the court
12 within thirty days. However, if such relative appears otherwise
13 suitable and competent to provide care and treatment, the criminal
14 history background check need not be completed before placement, but as
15 soon as possible after placement. Any placements with relatives,
16 pursuant to this section, shall be contingent upon cooperation by the
17 relative with the agency case plan and compliance with court orders
18 related to the care and supervision of the child including, but not
19 limited to, court orders regarding parent-child contacts and any other
20 conditions imposed by the court. Noncompliance with the case plan or
21 court order shall be grounds for removal of the child from the
22 relative's home, subject to review by the court.

23 ((+5+)) (7) Except for children whose cases are reviewed by a
24 citizen review board under chapter 13.70 RCW, the status of all
25 children found to be dependent shall be reviewed by the court at least
26 every six months from the beginning date of the placement episode or
27 the date dependency is established, whichever is first, at a hearing in
28 which it shall be determined whether court supervision should continue.
29 The review shall include findings regarding the agency and parental
30 completion of disposition plan requirements, and if necessary, revised
31 permanency time limits. The supervising agency shall provide a foster
32 parent, preadoptive parent, or relative with notice of and of their
33 right to an opportunity to be heard in a review hearing pertaining to
34 the child, but only if that person is currently providing care to that
35 child at the time of the hearing. This section shall not be construed
36 to grant party status to any person who has been provided an
37 opportunity to be heard.

38 (a) A child shall not be returned home at the review hearing unless
39 the court finds that a reason for removal as set forth in this section

1 no longer exists. The parents, guardian, or legal custodian shall
2 report to the court the efforts they have made to correct the
3 conditions which led to removal. If a child is returned, casework
4 supervision shall continue for a period of six months, at which time
5 there shall be a hearing on the need for continued intervention.

6 (b) If the child is not returned home, the court shall establish in
7 writing:

8 (i) Whether reasonable services have been provided to or offered to
9 the parties to facilitate reunion, specifying the services provided or
10 offered;

11 (ii) Whether the child has been placed in the least-restrictive
12 setting appropriate to the child's needs, including whether
13 consideration and preference has been given to placement with the
14 child's relatives;

15 (iii) Whether there is a continuing need for placement and whether
16 the placement is appropriate;

17 (iv) Whether there has been compliance with the case plan by the
18 child, the child's parents, and the agency supervising the placement;

19 (v) Whether progress has been made toward correcting the problems
20 that necessitated the child's placement in out-of-home care;

21 (vi) Whether the parents have visited the child and any reasons why
22 visitation has not occurred or has been infrequent;

23 (vii) Whether additional services are needed to facilitate the
24 return of the child to the child's parents; if so, the court shall
25 order that reasonable services be offered specifying such services; and

26 (viii) The projected date by which the child will be returned home
27 or other permanent plan of care will be implemented.

28 (c) The court at the review hearing may order that a petition
29 seeking termination of the parent and child relationship be filed.

30 **Sec. 3.** RCW 13.34.145 and 1995 c 311 s 20 and 1995 c 53 s 2 are
31 each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

32 (1) A permanency plan shall be developed no later than sixty days
33 from the time the supervising agency assumes responsibility for
34 providing services, including placing the child, or at the time of a
35 hearing under RCW 13.34.130, whichever occurs first. The permanency
36 planning process continues until a permanency planning goal is achieved
37 or dependency is dismissed. The planning process shall include
38 reasonable efforts to return the child to the parent's home.

1 (a) Whenever a child is placed in out-of-home care pursuant to RCW
2 13.34.130, the agency that has custody of the child shall provide the
3 court with a written permanency plan of care directed towards securing
4 a safe, stable, and permanent home for the child as soon as possible.
5 The plan shall identify one of the following outcomes as the primary
6 goal and may also identify additional outcomes as alternative goals:
7 Return of the child to the home of the child's parent, guardian, or
8 legal custodian; adoption; guardianship; or long-term relative or
9 foster care, until the child is age eighteen, with a written agreement
10 between the parties and the care provider; and independent living, if
11 appropriate and if the child is age sixteen or older and the provisions
12 of subsection (2) of this section are met.

13 (b) The identified outcomes and goals of the permanency plan may
14 change over time based upon the circumstances of the particular case.

15 (c) Permanency planning goals should be achieved at the earliest
16 possible date, preferably before the child has been in out-of-home care
17 for fifteen months. In cases where parental rights have been
18 terminated, the child is legally free for adoption, and adoption has
19 been identified as the primary permanency planning goal, it shall be a
20 goal to complete the adoption within six months following entry of the
21 termination order.

22 (2) Whenever a permanency plan identifies independent living as a
23 goal, the plan shall also specifically identify the services that will
24 be provided to assist the child to make a successful transition from
25 foster care to independent living. Before the court approves
26 independent living as a permanency plan of care, the court shall make
27 a finding that the provision of services to assist the child in making
28 a transition from foster care to independent living will allow the
29 child to manage his or her financial affairs and to manage his or her
30 personal, social, educational, and nonfinancial affairs. The
31 department shall not discharge a child to an independent living
32 situation before the child is eighteen years of age unless the child
33 becomes emancipated pursuant to chapter 13.64 RCW.

34 (3)~~((a) For children ten and under,~~) A permanency planning
35 hearing shall be held in all cases where the child has remained in out-
36 of-home care for at least nine months and an adoption decree or
37 guardianship order has not previously been entered. The hearing shall
38 take place no later than twelve months following commencement of the
39 current placement episode.

1 (~~(b) For children over ten, a permanency planning hearing shall be~~
2 ~~held in all cases where the child has remained in out-of-home care for~~
3 ~~at least fifteen months and an adoption decree or guardianship order~~
4 ~~has not previously been entered. The hearing shall take place no later~~
5 ~~than eighteen months following commencement of the current placement~~
6 ~~episode.))~~)

7 (4) Whenever a child is removed from the home of a dependency
8 guardian or long-term relative or foster care provider, and the child
9 is not returned to the home of the parent, guardian, or legal custodian
10 but is placed in out-of-home care, a permanency planning hearing shall
11 take place no later than twelve (~~(or eighteen)~~) months, as provided in
12 subsection (3) of this section, following the date of removal unless,
13 prior to the hearing, the child returns to the home of the dependency
14 guardian or long-term care provider, the child is placed in the home of
15 the parent, guardian, or legal custodian, an adoption decree or
16 guardianship order is entered, or the dependency is dismissed.

17 (5) No later than ten working days prior to the permanency planning
18 hearing, the agency having custody of the child shall submit a written
19 permanency plan to the court and shall mail a copy of the plan to all
20 parties and their legal counsel, if any.

21 (6) At the permanency planning hearing, the court shall enter
22 findings as required by RCW 13.34.130(~~(+5)~~) (7) and shall review the
23 permanency plan prepared by the agency. If the child has resided in
24 the home of a foster parent or relative for more than six months prior
25 to the permanency planning hearing, the court shall also enter a
26 finding regarding whether the foster parent or relative was informed of
27 the hearing as required in RCW (~~(74.13.280)~~) 13.34.130(7). If a goal
28 of long-term foster or relative care has been achieved prior to the
29 permanency planning hearing, the court shall review the child's status
30 to determine whether the placement and the plan for the child's care
31 remain appropriate. In cases where the primary permanency planning
32 goal has not yet been achieved, the court shall inquire regarding the
33 reasons why the primary goal has not been achieved and determine what
34 needs to be done to make it possible to achieve the primary goal. In
35 all cases, the court shall:

36 (a)(i) Order the permanency plan prepared by the agency to be
37 implemented; or

38 (ii) Modify the permanency plan, and order implementation of the
39 modified plan; and

1 (b)(i) Order the child returned home only if the court finds that
2 a reason for removal as set forth in RCW 13.34.130 no longer exists; or

3 (ii) Order the child to remain in out-of-home care for a limited
4 specified time period while efforts are made to implement the
5 permanency plan.

6 (7) If the court orders the child returned home, casework
7 supervision shall continue for at least six months, at which time a
8 review hearing shall be held pursuant to RCW 13.34.130(~~(+5)~~) (7), and
9 the court shall determine the need for continued intervention.

10 (8) Following the first permanency planning hearing, the court
11 shall hold a further permanency planning hearing in accordance with
12 this section at least once every twelve months until a permanency
13 planning goal is achieved or the dependency is dismissed, whichever
14 occurs first.

15 (9) Except as otherwise provided in RCW 13.34.235, the status of
16 all dependent children shall continue to be reviewed by the court at
17 least once every six months, in accordance with RCW 13.34.130(~~(+5)~~)
18 (7), until the dependency is dismissed. Prior to the second permanency
19 planning hearing, the agency that has custody of the child shall
20 consider whether to file a petition for termination of parental rights.

21 (10) Nothing in this chapter may be construed to limit the ability
22 of the agency that has custody of the child to file a petition for
23 termination of parental rights or a guardianship petition at any time
24 following the establishment of dependency. Upon the filing of such a
25 petition, a fact-finding hearing shall be scheduled and held in
26 accordance with this chapter unless the agency requests dismissal of
27 the petition prior to the hearing or unless the parties enter an agreed
28 order terminating parental rights, establishing guardianship, or
29 otherwise resolving the matter.

30 (11) The approval of a permanency plan that does not contemplate
31 return of the child to the parent does not relieve the supervising
32 agency of its obligation to provide reasonable services, under this
33 chapter, intended to effectuate the return of the child to the parent,
34 including but not limited to, visitation rights.

35 (12) Nothing in this chapter may be construed to limit the
36 procedural due process rights of any party in a termination or
37 guardianship proceeding filed under this chapter.

1 **Sec. 4.** RCW 13.34.180 and 1997 c 280 s 2 are each amended to read
2 as follows:

3 A petition seeking termination of a parent and child relationship
4 may be filed in juvenile court by any party to the dependency
5 proceedings concerning that child. Such petition shall conform to the
6 requirements of RCW 13.34.040, shall be served upon the parties as
7 provided in RCW 13.34.070(8), and shall allege:

8 (1) That the child has been found to be a dependent child under RCW
9 13.34.030(4); and

10 (2) That the court has entered a dispositional order pursuant to
11 RCW 13.34.130; and

12 (3) That the child has been removed or will, at the time of the
13 hearing, have been removed from the custody of the parent for a period
14 of at least six months pursuant to a finding of dependency under RCW
15 13.34.030(4); and

16 (4) That the services ordered under RCW 13.34.130 have been offered
17 or provided and all necessary services, reasonably available, capable
18 of correcting the parental deficiencies within the foreseeable future
19 have been offered or provided; and

20 (5) That there is little likelihood that conditions will be
21 remedied so that the child can be returned to the parent in the near
22 future. A parent's failure to substantially improve parental
23 deficiencies within twelve months following entry of the dispositional
24 order shall give rise to a rebuttable presumption that there is little
25 likelihood that conditions will be remedied so that the child can be
26 returned to the parent in the near future. The presumption shall not
27 arise unless the petitioner makes a showing that all necessary services
28 reasonably capable of correcting the parental deficiencies within the
29 foreseeable future have been offered or provided. In determining
30 whether the conditions will be remedied the court may consider, but is
31 not limited to, the following factors:

32 (a) Use of intoxicating or controlled substances so as to render
33 the parent incapable of providing proper care for the child for
34 extended periods of time and documented unwillingness of the parent to
35 receive and complete treatment or documented multiple failed treatment
36 attempts; or

37 (b) Psychological incapacity or mental deficiency of the parent
38 that is so severe and chronic as to render the parent incapable of
39 providing proper care for the child for extended periods of time, and

1 documented unwillingness of the parent to receive and complete
2 treatment or documentation that there is no treatment that can render
3 the parent capable of providing proper care for the child in the near
4 future; and

5 (6) That continuation of the parent and child relationship clearly
6 diminishes the child's prospects for early integration into a stable
7 and permanent home; or

8 (7) In lieu of the allegations in subsections (1) through (6) of
9 this section, the petition may allege that the child was found under
10 such circumstances that the whereabouts of the child's parent are
11 unknown and no person has acknowledged paternity or maternity and
12 requested custody of the child within two months after the child was
13 found; or

14 (8) In lieu of the allegations in subsections (2) through (6) of
15 this section, the petition may allege that the parent has been found by
16 a court of competent jurisdiction:

17 (a) To have committed, against another child of such parent, murder
18 in the first degree, murder in the second degree, or homicide by abuse
19 as defined in chapter 9A.32 RCW;

20 (b) To have committed, against another child of such parent,
21 manslaughter in the first degree or manslaughter in the second degree,
22 as defined in chapter 9A.32 RCW;

23 (c) To have attempted, conspired, or solicited to commit one or
24 more of the crimes listed in (a) or (b) of this subsection; or

25 (d) To have committed assault in the first or second degree, as
26 defined in chapter 9A.36 RCW, against the surviving child or another
27 child of the parent.

28 ~~((A parent's failure to substantially improve parental deficiencies~~
29 ~~within twelve months following entry of the dispositional order shall~~
30 ~~give rise to a rebuttable presumption that there is little likelihood~~
31 ~~that conditions will be remedied so that the child can be returned to~~
32 ~~the parent in the near future. The presumption shall not arise unless~~
33 ~~the petitioner makes a showing that all necessary services reasonably~~
34 ~~capable of correcting the parental deficiencies within the foreseeable~~
35 ~~future have been offered or provided.))~~

36 Notice of rights shall be served upon the parent, guardian, or
37 legal custodian with the petition and shall be in substantially the
38 following form:

"NOTICE

A petition for termination of parental rights has been filed against you. You have important legal rights and you must take steps to protect your interests. This petition could result in permanent loss of your parental rights.

1. You have the right to a fact-finding hearing before a judge.

2. You have the right to have a lawyer represent you at the hearing. A lawyer can look at the files in your case, talk to the department of social and health services and other agencies, tell you about the law, help you understand your rights, and help you at hearings. If you cannot afford a lawyer, the court will appoint one to represent you. To get a court-appointed lawyer you must contact: (explain local procedure) .

3. At the hearing, you have the right to speak on your own behalf, to introduce evidence, to examine witnesses, and to receive a decision based solely on the evidence presented to the judge.

You should be present at this hearing.

You may call (insert agency) for more information about your child. The agency's name and telephone number are (insert name and telephone number) ."

NEW SECTION. **Sec. 5.** A new section is added to chapter 13.34 RCW to read as follows:

The department shall file a petition for the termination of a parent and child relationship when the court determines that an infant has been abandoned as defined in RCW 13.34.030(4)(a). The department shall, concurrently with proceeding with the petition, identify, recruit, process, and approve a qualified family for an adoption unless: (1) At the option of the department, the infant is being cared for by a relative; (2) the department has documented in the case plan a compelling reason for determining that the filing of such petition would not be in the best interest of the infant; or (3) the department has not provided the family such services as the department deems necessary for the safe return of the infant to the infant's home, if reasonable efforts are required to be made.

1 **Sec. 6.** RCW 13.34.190 and 1993 c 412 s 3 are each amended to read
2 as follows:

3 After hearings pursuant to RCW 13.34.110, the court may enter an
4 order terminating all parental rights to a child if the court finds
5 that:

21 as follows:

22 (1) An agency may be denied a license, or any license issued
23 pursuant to chapter 74.15 RCW and RCW 74.13.031 may be suspended,
24 revoked, modified, or not renewed by the secretary upon proof (a) that
25 the agency has failed or refused to comply with the provisions of
26 chapter 74.15 RCW and RCW 74.13.031 or the requirements promulgated
27 pursuant to the provisions of chapter 74.15 RCW and RCW 74.13.031; or
28 (b) that the conditions required for the issuance of a license under
29 chapter 74.15 RCW and RCW 74.13.031 have ceased to exist with respect

11 chapter, other than a foster family home license, the department's
12 decision shall be upheld if it is supported by a preponderance of the
13 evidence.

14 (4) The department may assess civil monetary penalties upon proof
15 that an agency has failed or refused to comply with the rules adopted
16 under the provisions of this chapter and RCW 74.13.031 or that an
17 agency subject to licensing under this chapter and RCW 74.13.031 is
18 operating without a license except that civil monetary penalties shall
19 not be levied against a licensed foster home. Monetary penalties
20 levied against unlicensed agencies that submit an application for
21 licensure within thirty days of notification and subsequently become
22 licensed will be forgiven. These penalties may be assessed in addition
23 to or in lieu of other disciplinary actions. Civil monetary penalties,

34 a license for failure to pay a civil monetary penalty it has assessed
35 pursuant to this chapter within ten days after such assessment becomes
36 final. Chapter 43.20A RCW governs notice of a civil monetary penalty
37 and provides the right of an adjudicative proceeding. The
38 preponderance of evidence standard shall apply in adjudicative
39 proceedings related to assessment of civil monetary penalties.

3 follows:

4 For the purpose of and as used in this chapter:

5 (1) "Court" means the superior court of the state of Washington,
6 juvenile department.

7 (2) "Law enforcement agency" means the police department, the
8 prosecuting attorney, the state patrol, the director of public safety,
9 or the office of the sheriff.

10 (3) "Practitioner of the healing arts" or "practitioner" means a
11 person licensed by this state to practice podiatric medicine and
12 surgery, optometry, chiropractic, nursing, dentistry, osteopathic
13 medicine and surgery, or medicine and surgery or to provide other
14 health services. The term "practitioner" shall include a duly
15 accredited Christian Science practitioner: PROVIDED, HOWEVER, That a

19 (4) "Institution" means a private or public hospital or any other

26 limited to, teachers, counselors, administrators, child care facility

28 (8) "Social service counselor" shall mean anyone engaged in a
29 professional capacity during the regular course of employment in
30 encouraging or promoting the health, welfare, support or education of
31 children, or providing social services to adults or families, including
32 mental health, drug and alcohol treatment, and domestic violence
33 programs, whether in an individual capacity, or as an employee or agent
34 of any public or private organization or institution.

35 (9) "Psychologist" shall mean any person licensed to practice
36 psychology under chapter 18.83 RCW, whether acting in an individual
37 capacity or as an employee or agent of any public or private
38 organization or institution.

1 (10) "Pharmacist" shall mean any registered pharmacist under the
2 provisions of chapter 18.64 RCW, whether acting in an individual
3 capacity or as an employee or agent of any public or private
4 organization or institution.

5 (11) "Clergy" shall mean any regularly licensed or ordained
6 minister, priest or rabbi of any church or religious denomination,
7 whether acting in an individual capacity or as an employee or agent of
8 any public or private organization or institution.

9 (12) "Abuse or neglect" shall mean the injury, sexual abuse, sexual
10 exploitation, negligent treatment, or maltreatment of a child, adult
11 dependent, or developmentally disabled person by any person under
12 circumstances which indicate that the child's or adult's health,
13 welfare, and safety is harmed, excluding conduct permitted under RCW
14 9A.16.100. An abused child is a child who has been subjected to child
15 abuse or neglect as defined herein.

16 (13) "Child protective services section" shall mean the child
17 protective services section of the department.

18 (14) "Adult dependent persons" shall be defined as those persons
19 over the age of eighteen years who have been found to be legally
20 incompetent or disabled pursuant to chapter 11.88 RCW.

21 (15) "Sexual exploitation" includes: (a) Allowing, permitting, or
22 encouraging a child to engage in prostitution by any person; or (b)
23 allowing, permitting, encouraging, or engaging in the obscene or
24 pornographic photographing, filming, or depicting of a child by any
25 person.

26 (16) "Negligent treatment or maltreatment" means an act or omission
27 which evidences a serious disregard of consequences of such magnitude
28 as to constitute a clear and present danger to the child's health,
29 welfare, and safety. The fact that siblings share a bedroom is not, in
30 and of itself, "negligent treatment or maltreatment."

31 (17) "Developmentally disabled person" means a person who has a
32 disability defined in RCW 71A.10.020.

33 (18) "Child protective services" means those services provided by
34 the department designed to protect children from child abuse and
35 neglect and safeguard such children from future abuse and neglect, and
36 conduct investigations of child abuse and neglect reports.
37 Investigations may be conducted regardless of the location of the
38 alleged abuse or neglect. Child protective services includes referral
39 to services to ameliorate conditions which endanger the welfare of

1 children, the coordination of necessary programs and services relevant
2 to the prevention, intervention, and treatment of child abuse and
3 neglect, and services to children to ensure that each child has a
4 permanent home. In determining whether protective services should be
5 provided, the department shall not decline to provide such services
6 solely because of the child's unwillingness or developmental inability
7 to describe the nature and severity of the abuse or neglect.

8 (19) "Malice" or "maliciously" means an evil intent, wish, or
9 design to vex, annoy, or injure another person. Such malice may be
10 inferred from an act done in wilful disregard of the rights of another,
11 or an act wrongfully done without just cause or excuse, or an act or
12 omission of duty betraying a wilful disregard of social duty.

13 (20) "Sexually aggressive youth" means a child who is defined in
14 RCW 74.13.075(1)(b) as being a "sexually aggressive youth."

15 (21) "Unfounded" means available ((evidence)) information indicates
16 that, more likely than not, child abuse or neglect did not occur.

17 **Sec. 9.** RCW 26.44.100 and 1997 c 282 s 2 are each amended to read
18 as follows:

19 (1) The legislature finds parents and children often are not aware
20 of their due process rights when agencies are investigating allegations
21 of child abuse and neglect. The legislature reaffirms that all
22 citizens, including parents, shall be afforded due process, that
23 protection of children remains the priority of the legislature, and
24 that this protection includes protecting the family unit from
25 unnecessary disruption. To facilitate this goal, the legislature
26 wishes to ensure that parents and children be advised in writing and
27 orally, if feasible, of their basic rights and other specific
28 information as set forth in this chapter, provided that nothing
29 contained in this chapter shall cause any delay in protective custody
30 action.

31 (2) The department shall notify the alleged perpetrator of the
32 allegations of child abuse and neglect at the earliest possible point
33 in the investigation that will not jeopardize the safety and protection
34 of the child or the investigation process.

35 Whenever the department completes an investigation of a child abuse
36 or neglect report under chapter 26.44 RCW, the department shall notify
37 the alleged perpetrator of the report and the department's

1 investigative findings. The notice shall also advise the alleged
2 perpetrator that:

3 (a) A written response to the report may be provided to the
4 department and that such response will be filed in the record following
5 receipt by the department;

6 (b) Information in the department's record may be considered in
7 subsequent investigations or proceedings related to child protection or

17 ~~in the record.~~) An alleged perpetrator named in a founded report of
18 child abuse or neglect has the right to seek review of the finding as
19 provided in this chapter.

20 (3) The notification required by this section shall be made by
21 (~~regular~~) certified mail, return receipt requested, to the person's
22 last known address.

23 (4) The duty of notification created by this section is subject to
24 the ability of the department to ascertain the location of the person
25 to be notified. The department shall exercise reasonable, good-faith
26 efforts to ascertain the location of persons entitled to notification
27 under this section.

28 NEW SECTION. Sec. 10. A new section is added to chapter 26.44 RCW
29 to read as follows:

30 (1) A person who is named as an alleged perpetrator after October
31 1, 1998, in a founded report of child abuse or neglect has the right to
32 seek review and amendment of the finding as provided in this section.

33 (2) Within twenty calendar days after receiving written notice from
34 the department under RCW 26.44.100 that a person is named as an alleged
35 perpetrator in a founded report of child abuse or neglect, he or she
36 may request that the department review the finding. The request must
37 be made in writing. If a request for review is not made as provided in
38 this subsection, the alleged perpetrator may not further challenge the

1 finding and shall have no right to agency review or to an adjudicative
2 hearing or judicial review of the finding.

3 (3) Upon receipt of a written request for review, the department
4 shall review and, if appropriate, may amend the finding. Management
5 level staff within the children's administration designated by the
6 secretary shall be responsible for the review. The review must be

9 alleged perpetrator in writing of the agency's determination. The
10 notification must be sent by certified mail, return receipt requested,
11 to the person's last known address.

12 (4) If, following agency review, the report remains founded, the
13 person named as the alleged perpetrator in the report may request an
14 adjudicative hearing to contest the finding. The adjudicative
15 proceeding is governed by chapter 34.05 RCW and this section. The
16 request for an adjudicative proceeding must be filed within thirty
17 calendar days after receiving notice of the agency review
18 determination. If a request for an adjudicative proceeding is not made
19 as provided in this subsection, the alleged perpetrator may not further
20 challenge the finding and shall have no right to agency review or to an
21 adjudicative hearing or judicial review of the finding.

22 (5) Reviews and hearings conducted under this section are
23 confidential and shall not be open to the public. Information about
24 reports, reviews, and hearings may be disclosed only in accordance with
25 federal and state laws pertaining to child welfare records and child
26 protective services reports.

27 (6) The department may adopt rules to implement this section.

28 **Sec. 11.** RCW 74.13.031 and 1997 c 386 s 32 and 1997 c 272 s 1 are
29 each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

30 The department shall have the duty to provide child welfare
31 services and shall:

32 (1) Develop, administer, supervise, and monitor a coordinated and
33 comprehensive plan that establishes, aids, and strengthens services for
34 the protection and care of homeless, runaway, dependent, or neglected
35 children.

36 (2) Within available resources, recruit an adequate number of
37 prospective adoptive and foster homes, both regular and specialized,
38 i.e. homes for children of ethnic minority, including Indian homes for

1 Indian children, sibling groups, handicapped and emotionally disturbed,
2 teens, pregnant and parenting teens, and annually report to the
3 governor and the legislature concerning the department's success in:
4 (a) Meeting the need for adoptive and foster home placements; (b)
5 reducing the foster parent turnover rate; (c) completing home studies
6 for legally free children; and (d) implementing and operating the
7 passport program required by RCW 74.13.285. The report shall include
8 a section entitled "Foster Home Turn-Over, Causes and Recommendations."

9 (3) Investigate complaints of (~~alleged neglect, abuse, or~~
10 ~~abandonment of children~~) any recent act or failure to act on the part
11 of a parent or caretaker that results in death, serious physical or
12 emotional harm, or sexual abuse or exploitation, or that presents an
13 imminent risk of serious harm, and on the basis of the findings of such
14 investigation, offer child welfare services in relation to the problem
15 to such parents, legal custodians, or persons serving in loco parentis,
16 and/or bring the situation to the attention of an appropriate court, or
17 another community agency: PROVIDED, That an investigation is not
18 required of nonaccidental injuries which are clearly not the result of
19 a lack of care or supervision by the child's parents, legal custodians,
20 or persons serving in loco parentis. If the investigation reveals that
21 a crime against a child may have been committed, the department shall
22 notify the appropriate law enforcement agency.

23 (4) Offer, on a voluntary basis, family reconciliation services to
24 families who are in conflict.

25 (5) Monitor out-of-home placements, on a timely and routine basis,
26 to assure the safety, well-being, and quality of care being provided is
27 within the scope of the intent of the legislature as defined in RCW
28 74.13.010 and 74.15.010, and annually submit a report measuring the
29 extent to which the department achieved the specified goals to the
30 governor and the legislature.

31 (6) Have authority to accept custody of children from parents and
32 to accept custody of children from juvenile courts, where authorized to
33 do so under law, to provide child welfare services including placement
34 for adoption, and to provide for the physical care of such children and
35 make payment of maintenance costs if needed. Except where required by
36 Public Law 95-608 (25 U.S.C. Sec. 1915), no private adoption agency
37 which receives children for adoption from the department shall
38 discriminate on the basis of race, creed, or color when considering
39 applications in their placement for adoption.

1 (7) Have authority to provide temporary shelter to children who
2 have run away from home and who are admitted to crisis residential
3 centers.

4 (8) Have authority to purchase care for children; and shall follow
5 in general the policy of using properly approved private agency
6 services for the actual care and supervision of such children insofar
7 as they are available, paying for care of such children as are accepted
8 by the department as eligible for support at reasonable rates
9 established by the department.

10 (9) Establish a children's services advisory committee which shall
11 assist the secretary in the development of a partnership plan for
12 utilizing resources of the public and private sectors, and advise on
13 all matters pertaining to child welfare, licensing of child care
14 agencies, adoption, and services related thereto. At least one member
15 shall represent the adoption community.

16 (10) Have authority to provide continued foster care or group care
17 for individuals from eighteen through twenty years of age to enable
18 them to complete their high school or vocational school program.

19 (11) Have authority within funds appropriated for foster care
20 services to purchase care for Indian children who are in the custody of
21 a federally recognized Indian tribe or tribally licensed child-placing
22 agency pursuant to parental consent, tribal court order, or state
23 juvenile court order; and the purchase of such care shall be subject to
24 the same eligibility standards and rates of support applicable to other
25 children for whom the department purchases care.

26 Notwithstanding any other provision of RCW 13.32A.170 through
27 13.32A.200 and 74.13.032 through 74.13.036, or of this section all
28 services to be provided by the department of social and health services
29 under subsections (4), (6), and (7) of this section, subject to the
30 limitations of these subsections, may be provided by any program
31 offering such services funded pursuant to Titles II and III of the
32 federal juvenile justice and delinquency prevention act of 1974.

33 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 12.** Section 10 of this act takes effect October
