1 AN ACT Relating to higher education admissions; amending RCW
2 49.60.400; creating a new section; and providing for submission of this
3 act to a vote of the people.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** The legislature continues to recognize the
6 need to ensure that all members of our community are protected from
7 discriminatory treatment on the basis of race, color, ethnicity, or
8 national origin. The legislature also acknowledges that there is a
9 large body of academic studies that demonstrates a substantial
10 educational benefit in maintaining a diverse student population in our
11 universities and colleges. The presence of a diverse learning
12 environment helps students acquire the skills needed to live and work
13 successfully in our increasingly diverse society. The United States
14 supreme court and the Washington supreme court have recognized the
15 benefits of such educational diversity in a student body as a
16 compelling state interest as long as the means employed to promote
17 diversity are within narrowly tailored guidelines that ensure that
18 individuals are not unduly impacted. In light of this recognition, it
19 is the intent of the legislature to give universities and colleges

1 limited flexibility in considering race, color, ethnicity, or national
2 origin as positive factors in their admission and transfer policies.
3 To ensure the highest quality of education is provided at our
4 universities and colleges, they must have the ability to engage in a
5 holistic review of each applicant that includes all the positive
6 qualities and experiences that an applicant possesses. It is not the
7 intent of the legislature to allow any form of quota or set aside
8 system to be implemented by a university or college to insulate an
9 applicant from comparison with all other candidates solely because of
10 his or her racial status.

11 **Sec. 2.** RCW 49.60.400 and 1999 c 3 s 1 are each amended to read as
12 follows:

13 (1) The state shall not discriminate against, or grant preferential
14 treatment to, any individual or group on the basis of race, sex, color,
15 ethnicity, or national origin in the operation of public employment,
16 public education, or public contracting.

17 (2) This section applies only to action taken after December 3,
18 1998.

19 (3) This section does not affect any law or governmental action
20 that does not discriminate against, or grant preferential treatment to,
21 any individual or group on the basis of race, sex, color, ethnicity, or
22 national origin.

23 (4) This section does not affect any otherwise lawful
24 classification that:

25 (a) Is based on sex and is necessary for sexual privacy or medical
26 or psychological treatment; or

27 (b) Is necessary for undercover law enforcement or for film, video,
28 audio, or theatrical casting; or

29 (c) Provides for separate athletic teams for each sex.

30 (5) This section does not invalidate any court order or consent
31 decree that is in force as of December 3, 1998.

32 (6) This section does not prohibit action that must be taken to
33 establish or maintain eligibility for any federal program, if
34 ineligibility would result in a loss of federal funds to the state.

35 (7) This section does not prohibit a public college, university, or
36 community college from considering race, color, ethnicity, or national

1 origin in its admission or transfer policies for the purpose of
2 promoting diversity at the campus if the policy meets the following
3 minimum requirements:

4 (a) No admission slots may be set aside on the basis of race,
5 color, ethnicity, or national origin nor may any person be given
6 separate consideration or preference based solely on race, color,
7 ethnicity, or national origin;

8 (b) All qualified applicants shall be given individual
9 consideration in which all qualities and experiences that may be
10 valuable contributions to student body diversity are considered;

11 (c) Race, color, ethnicity, or national origin shall not be given
12 a predetermined numerical value or weight in the admissions process;

13 (d) The policy shall establish criteria for evaluating whether the
14 consideration of race, color, ethnicity, or national origin is still
15 necessary to promote diversity and shall include provisions for
16 periodic reviews; and

17 (e) There must be a process established for periodically exploring
18 workable race-neutral alternatives to considering race, color,
19 ethnicity, or national origin to achieve the diversity the college or
20 university is seeking, without compromising academic quality.

21 (8) For the purposes of this section, "state" includes, but is not
22 necessarily limited to, the state itself, any city, county, public
23 college or university, community college, school district, special
24 district, or other political subdivision or governmental
25 instrumentality of or within the state.

26 ~~((+8))~~ (9) The remedies available for violations of this section
27 shall be the same, regardless of the injured party's race, sex, color,
28 ethnicity, or national origin, as are otherwise available for
29 violations of Washington antidiscrimination law.

30 ~~((+9))~~ (10) This section shall be self-executing. If any part or
31 parts of this section are found to be in conflict with federal law, the
32 United States Constitution, or the Washington state Constitution, the
33 section shall be implemented to the maximum extent that federal law,
34 the United States Constitution, and the Washington state Constitution
35 permit. Any provision held invalid shall be severable from the
36 remaining portions of this section.

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 3.** The secretary of state shall submit this act
2 to the people for their adoption and ratification, or rejection, at the
3 next general election to be held in this state, in accordance with
4 Article II, section 1 of the state Constitution and the laws adopted to
5 facilitate its operation.

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
