## THIRD SUBSTITUTE HOUSE BILL 1741

State of Washington 60th Legislature 2008 Regular Session

**By** House Appropriations Subcommittee on General Government & Audit Review (originally sponsored by Representatives Hunt, Skinner, and Conway)

READ FIRST TIME 02/07/08.

AN ACT Relating to the oral history program; amending RCW 43.07.220, 43.07.230, 43.07.240, 43.07.365, 43.07.370, 43.07.380, and 42.52.802; adding a new section to chapter 42.52 RCW; adding new sections to chapter 44.04 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 43.07 RCW; creating new sections; and recodifying RCW 43.07.220, 43.07.230, and 43.07.240.

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. 8 Washington has developed an impressive oral history program of recording and documenting the recollections of 9 10 public officials and citizens who have contributed to the rich 11 political history surrounding the legislature. Schools, museums, 12 historians, state agencies, and interested citizens have benefited from the availability of these educational materials. 13 The purpose of this 14 act is to enhance this resource by reinforcing the decision-making role 15 of the legislature.

16 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 42.52 RCW 17 to read as follows:

18 This chapter does not prohibit the secretary of the senate, the

chief clerk of the house of representatives, or their designee from
 soliciting and accepting contributions to the legislative oral history
 account created in section 8 of this act.

4 **Sec. 3.** RCW 43.07.220 and 1991 c 237 s 1 are each amended to read 5 as follows:

6 (1) The secretary of ((state)) the senate and the chief clerk of 7 the house of representatives, at the direction of the legislative oral history ((advisory)) committee, shall administer and conduct a program 8 9 to record and document oral histories of current and former members and staff of the Washington state legislature, ((current and former state 10 11 government officials and personnel,)) and other citizens who have 12 participated in the political history of the Washington state legislature. The secretary of ((state shall)) the senate and the chief 13 clerk of the house of representatives may contract with independent 14 oral historians ((and through)) or the history departments of the state 15 16 universities to interview and record oral histories. The ((tapes and tape transcripts)) manuscripts and publications shall be ((indexed 17 and)) made available for research and reference through the state 18 19 archives. The ((transcripts)) manuscripts, together with current and 20 historical photographs, may be published for distribution to libraries 21 and ((for sale to)) the general public, and posted on the legislative 22 oral history web site.

(2) The oral history of a person who occupied positions, or was staff to a person who occupied positions, in more than one branch of government, shall be conducted by the entity authorized to conduct oral histories of persons in the position last held by the person who is the subject of the oral history. However, the person being interviewed may select the entity he or she wishes to prepare his or her oral history.

29 **Sec. 4.** RCW 43.07.230 and 1991 c 237 s 2 are each amended to read 30 as follows:

31 ((An)) (1) A legislative oral history ((advisory)) committee is 32 created, which shall consist of the following individuals:

33 (((1))) (a) Four members of the house of representatives, two from 34 each of the two largest caucuses of the house, appointed by the speaker 35 of the house of representatives;

8	(2) Ex officio members may be appointed by a majority vote of the

11	Sec. 5. RCW 43.07.240 and 1991 c 237 s 3 are each amended to read
12	as follows:
13	The <u>legislative</u> oral history (( <del>advisory</del> )) committee shall have the
14	following responsibilities:
15	(1) To select appropriate oral history interview candidates and
16	subjects;
17	(2) To select transcripts or portions of transcripts, and related
18	historical material, for publication;
19	(3) To advise the secretary of (( <del>state</del> )) <u>the senate and the chief</u>
20	clerk of the house of representatives on the format and length of
21	individual interview series and on appropriate issues and subjects for
22	related series of interviews;
23	(4) To advise the secretary of (( <del>state</del> )) <u>the senate and the chief</u>
24	clerk of the house of representatives on the appropriate subjects,
25	format, and length of interviews and on the process for conducting oral
26	history interviews ((with subjects currently serving in the Washington
27	<pre>state legislature));</pre>
28	(5) To advise the secretary of (( <del>state</del> )) <u>the senate and the chief</u>
29	clerk of the house of representatives on joint programs and activities
30	with state universities, colleges, museums, and other groups conducting
31	oral histories; and
32	(6) To advise the secretary of (( <del>state</del> )) <u>the senate and the chief</u>
33	clerk of the house of representatives on other aspects of the
34	administration of the oral history program and on the conduct of
35	individual interview projects.

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<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 6. A new section is added to chapter 44.04 RCW
 to read as follows:

The secretary of the senate and the chief clerk of the house of 3 representatives may fund oral history activities through donations as 4 5 provided in section 7 of this act and through funds in the legislative gift center account created in RCW 44.73.020. The activities may 6 7 include, but not be limited to, conducting interviews, preparing and indexing transcripts, publishing manuscripts and photographs, and 8 9 presenting displays and programs. Donations that do not meet the criteria of the legislative oral history program may not be accepted. 10 The secretary of the senate and the chief clerk of the house of 11 representatives shall adopt joint rules necessary to implement this 12 13 section.

14 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 7. A new section is added to chapter 44.04 RCW 15 to read as follows:

(1) The secretary of the senate and the chief clerk of the house of representatives may solicit and accept gifts, grants, conveyances, bequests, and devises of real or personal property, or both, in trust or otherwise, and sell, lease, exchange, invest, or expend these donations or the proceeds, rents, profits, and income from the donations except as limited by the donor's terms.

(2) Moneys received under this section may be used only forconducting oral histories.

(3) Moneys received under this section must be deposited in the
legislative oral history account established in section 8 of this act.
(4) The secretary of the senate and the chief clerk of the house of
representatives shall adopt joint rules to govern and protect the

28 receipt and expenditure of the proceeds.

29 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 8. A new section is added to chapter 44.04 RCW 30 to read as follows:

The legislative oral history account is created in the custody of the state treasurer. All moneys received under section 7 of this act and from the legislative gift center account created in RCW 44.73.020 must be deposited in the account. Expenditures from the account may be made only for the purposes of the legislative oral history program under RCW 43.07.220 (as recodified by this act). Only the secretary of

the senate or the chief clerk of the house of representatives or their designee may authorize expenditures from the account. An appropriation is not required for expenditures, but the account is subject to allotment procedures under chapter 43.88 RCW.

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 9. (1) All powers, duties, and functions of the 5 secretary of state pertaining to the legislative oral history program 6 7 are transferred to the secretary of the senate and the chief clerk of 8 the house of representatives. All references to the secretary of state or the office of the secretary of state in the Revised Code of 9 Washington shall be construed to mean the secretary of the senate and 10 11 the chief clerk of the house of representatives when referring to the functions transferred in this section. 12

(2)(a) All reports, documents, surveys, books, records, files, 13 papers, or written material in the possession of the secretary of state 14 pertaining to the powers, functions, and duties transferred shall be 15 16 delivered to the custody of the secretary of the senate and the chief 17 clerk of the house of representatives. All funds, credits, or other 18 assets held in connection with the powers, functions, and duties 19 transferred shall be assigned to the secretary of the senate and the chief clerk of the house of representatives. 20

(b) Any appropriations made to the secretary of state for carrying out the powers, functions, and duties transferred shall, on the effective date of this section, be transferred and credited to the secretary of the senate and the chief clerk of the house of representatives.

(c) Whenever any question arises as to the transfer of any personnel, funds, books, documents, records, papers, files, equipment, or other tangible property used or held in the exercise of the powers and the performance of the duties and functions transferred, the director of financial management shall make a determination as to the proper allocation and certify the same to the state agencies concerned.

32 (3) All employee positions of the secretary of state assigned to 33 performing the powers, functions, and duties transferred are 34 transferred to the jurisdiction of the secretary of the senate and the 35 chief clerk of the house of representatives. All employees classified 36 under chapter 41.06 RCW, the state civil service law, are assigned to 37 the secretary of the senate and the chief clerk of the house of 1 representatives to perform their usual duties upon the same terms as 2 formerly, without any loss of rights, subject to any action that may be 3 appropriate thereafter in accordance with the laws and rules governing 4 state civil service.

5 (4) All rules and all pending business before the secretary of 6 state pertaining to the powers, functions, and duties transferred shall 7 be continued and acted upon by the secretary of the senate and the 8 chief clerk of the house of representatives. All existing contracts 9 and obligations shall remain in full force and shall be performed by 10 the secretary of the senate and the chief clerk of the house of 11 representatives.

12 (5) The transfer of the powers, duties, functions, and personnel of 13 the secretary of state shall not affect the validity of any act 14 performed before the effective date of this section.

15 (6) If apportionments of budgeted funds are required because of the 16 transfers directed by this section, the director of financial 17 management shall certify the apportionments to the agencies affected, 18 the state auditor, and the state treasurer. Each of these shall make 19 the appropriate transfer and adjustments in funds and appropriation 20 accounts and equipment records in accordance with the certification.

(7) Nothing contained in this section may be construed to alter any existing collective bargaining unit or the provisions of any existing collective bargaining agreement until the agreement has expired or until the bargaining unit has been modified by action of the public employment relations commission as provided by law.

(8) The secretary of the senate and the chief clerk of the house of
 representatives will determine location and staff reporting for the
 program.

29 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 10.** A new section is added to chapter 43.07 RCW 30 to read as follows:

31 (1) The secretary of state shall administer and conduct a program to record and document oral histories of current and former members and 32 staff of the Washington state executive and judicial branches, the 33 state's congressional delegation, and other citizens 34 who have participated in the political history of Washington state. The program 35 36 shall be called the Washington state legacy project. The secretary of 37 state may contract with independent oral historians or history

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departments of the state universities to interview and record oral histories. The manuscripts and publications shall be made available for research and reference through the state archives. The transcripts, together with current and historical photographs, may be published for distribution to libraries and the general public, and be posted on the secretary of state's web site.

7 (2) The Washington state legacy project may act as a principal
8 repository for oral histories related to community, family, and other
9 various projects.

10 (3) The oral history of a person who occupied positions, or was staff to a person who occupied positions, in more than one branch of 11 12 government shall be conducted by the entity authorized to conduct oral 13 histories of persons in the position last held by the person who is the 14 subject of the oral history. However, the person being interviewed may select the entity he or she wishes to prepare his or her oral history. 15 16 (4) The secretary of state may create a Washington state legacy 17 project advisory council to provide advice and guidance on matters pertaining to operating the legacy project. The secretary of state may 18 not compensate members of the legacy project advisory council but may 19 provide reimbursement to members for expenses that are incurred in the 20 conduct of their official duties. 21

22 **Sec. 11.** RCW 43.07.365 and 2002 c 358 s 3 are each amended to read 23 as follows:

24 The secretary of state may fund ((oral history)) Washington state legacy project activities through donations as provided in RCW 25 26 43.07.037. The activities may include, but not be limited to, conducting interviews, preparing and indexing transcripts, publishing 27 transcripts and photographs, and presenting displays and programs. 28 Donations that do not meet the criteria of the ((oral history program)) 29 30 <u>Washington state legacy project</u> may not be accepted. The secretary of 31 state shall adopt rules necessary to implement this section.

32 **Sec. 12.** RCW 43.07.370 and 2007 c 523 s 3 are each amended to read 33 as follows:

(1) The secretary of state may solicit and accept gifts, grants,
 conveyances, bequests, and devises of real or personal property, or

both, in trust or otherwise, and sell, lease, exchange, invest, or expend these donations or the proceeds, rents, profits, and income from the donations except as limited by the donor's terms.

4 (2) Moneys received under this section may be used only for the 5 following purposes:

6 (a) Conducting ((oral histories)) the Washington state legacy 7 project;

8 (b) Archival activities;

9 (c) Washington state library activities; and

10 (d) Development, construction, and operation of the Washington 11 state heritage center.

12 (3)(a) Moneys received under subsection (2)(a) through (c) of this 13 section must be deposited in the ((oral history)) <u>Washington state</u> 14 <u>legacy project</u>, state library, and archives account established in RCW 15 43.07.380.

(b) Moneys received under subsection (2)(d) of this section must be deposited in the Washington state heritage center account created in RCW 43.07.129.

(4) The secretary of state shall adopt rules to govern and protectthe receipt and expenditure of the proceeds.

21 **Sec. 13.** RCW 43.07.380 and 2003 c 164 s 2 are each amended to read 22 as follows:

23 The ((<del>oral history</del>)) <u>Washington state legacy project</u>, state 24 library, and archives account is created in the custody of the state treasurer. All moneys received under RCW 43.07.370 must be deposited 25 26 in the account. Expenditures from the account may be made only for the purposes of the ((oral history program under RCW 43.07.220)) Washington 27 state legacy project under section 10 of this act, archives program 28 29 under RCW 40.14.020, and the state library program under chapter 27.04 30 RCW. Only the secretary of state or the secretary of state's designee 31 may authorize expenditures from the account. An appropriation is not required for expenditures, but the account is subject to allotment 32 procedures under chapter 43.88 RCW. 33

34 **Sec. 14.** RCW 42.52.802 and 2003 c 164 s 4 are each amended to read 35 as follows:

36 This chapter does not prohibit the secretary of state or a designee

1 from soliciting and accepting contributions to the ((oral history))
2 <u>Washington state legacy project</u>, state library, and archives account
3 created in RCW 43.07.380.

4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 15. The following are each recodified as 5 sections in chapter 44.04 RCW:

- 7 RCW 43.07.230
- 8 RCW 43.07.240

9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 16. If specific funding for the purposes of 10 this act, referencing this act by bill or chapter number, is not 11 provided by June 30, 2008, in the omnibus appropriations act, this act 12 is null and void.

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
