AN ACT Relating to providing sexual health education in schools that is consistent with the 2005 guidelines for sexual health information and disease prevention; adding a new section to chapter 28A.230 RCW; and creating new sections.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 **Sec. 1.** (1) The legislature finds that young people NEW SECTION. 7 should have the knowledge and skills necessary to build healthy 8 relationships, and to protect themselves from unintended pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases, including HIV infection. 9 The primary 10 responsibility for sexual health education is with parents and However, this responsibility also extends to schools, 11 quardians. religious organizations, and other community groups. 12 It is in the public's best interest to ensure that young people are equipped with 13 medically and scientifically accurate, age-appropriate information that 14 will help them avoid unintended pregnancies, remain free of sexually 15 transmitted diseases, and make informed, responsible decisions 16 throughout their lives. 17

(2) The legislature intends to support and advance the standardsestablished in the January 2005 guidelines for sexual health

information and disease prevention developed by the office of the superintendent of public instruction and the department of health. These guidelines are a fundamental tool to help school districts, teachers, guest speakers, health and counseling providers, community groups, parents, and guardians choose, develop, and evaluate sexual health curricula to better meet the health and safety needs of adolescents and young adults in their communities.

8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 28A.230 9 RCW to read as follows:

10 (1) By September 1, 2008, every public school that offers sexual 11 health education must assure that sexual health education is medically 12 and scientifically accurate, age-appropriate, appropriate for students regardless of gender, race, disability status, or sexual orientation, 13 includes information about abstinence and other methods of 14 and preventing unintended pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases. All 15 16 sexual health information, instruction, and materials must be medically 17 and scientifically accurate. Abstinence may not be taught to the exclusion of other materials and instruction on contraceptives and 18 disease prevention. Sexual health education must be consistent with 19 20 the January 2005 guidelines for sexual health information and disease 21 prevention developed by the department of health and the office of the superintendent of public instruction. 22

23 (2) As used in this act, "medically and scientifically accurate" 24 means information that is verified or supported by research in compliance with scientific methods, is published in peer-review 25 26 journals, where appropriate, and is recognized as accurate and objective by professional organizations and agencies with expertise in 27 the field of sexual health including but not limited to the American 28 college of obstetricians and gynecologists, the Washington state 29 department of health, and the federal centers for disease control and 30 31 prevention.

32 (3) The superintendent of public instruction and the department of 33 health shall make the January 2005 guidelines for sexual health 34 information and disease prevention available to school districts, 35 teachers, and guest speakers on their web sites. Within available 36 resources, the superintendent of public instruction and the department

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of health shall make any related information, model policies,
curricula, or other resources available as well.

(4) The superintendent of public instruction, in consultation with 3 the department of health, shall develop a list of sexual health 4 education curricula that are consistent with the 2005 guidelines for 5 sexual health information and disease prevention. This list shall be 6 7 intended to serve as a resource for schools, teachers, or any other organization or community group, and shall be updated no less 8 frequently than annually and made available on the web sites of the 9 10 office of the superintendent of public instruction and the department of health. 11

12 (5) Public schools that offer sexual health education are 13 encouraged to review their sexual health curricula and choose a 14 curriculum from the list developed under subsection (4) of this 15 section. Any public school that offers sexual health education may 16 identify, choose, or develop any other curriculum, if the curriculum 17 chosen or developed complies with the requirements of this section.

(6) Any parent or legal guardian who wishes to have his or her 18 child excused from any planned instruction in sexual health education 19 may do so upon filing a written request with the school district board 20 21 of directors or its designee. In addition, any parent or legal 22 quardian may review the sexual health education curriculum offered in his or her child's school by filing a written request with the school 23 24 district board of directors, the principal of the school his or her 25 child attends, or the principal's designee.

(7) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall, through its Washington state school health profiles survey or other existing reporting mechanism, ask public schools to identify any curricula used to provide sexual health education, and shall report the results of this inquiry to the legislature on a biennial basis, beginning with the 2008-09 school year.

32 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. This act may be known and cited as the 33 healthy youth act.

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
