AN ACT Relating to intensive behavior support services for children with developmental disabilities; adding a new chapter to Title 71A RCW; and making an appropriation.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. The legislature finds that a developmental 6 disability is a natural part of human life, and the presence of a 7 developmental disability in the life of a person does not diminish the 8 person's rights or opportunity to participate fully in the life of the 9 local community.

10 The legislature recognizes that the number of children who have a 11 developmental disability along with intense behaviors is increasing and 12 more families are seeking out-of-home placement for their children. 13 The legislature intends that services be created to develop skills and 14 supports designed for the child, family members, and others involved in 15 the child's life to avoid disruption to the family and reduce the need 16 for out-of-home placement.

Within available funds, the legislature directs the department to submit a federal waiver application through which services can be provided to allow a child with a developmental disability who has

intense behaviors to have a permanent and stable familial relationship. 1 2 The legislature intends for these services to be locally based and offered as early as possible to avoid family disruption and out-of-home 3 placement. 4

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. (1) Upon receipt of a federal home and 5 6 community-based care waiver and to the extent funding is appropriated 7 for this purpose, intensive behavior support services may be provided 8 by the department, directly or by contract, to children with developmental disabilities who have intense behaviors and their 9 families. 10

11 (2) The department shall be the lead administrative agency for 12 children's intensive behavior support services and shall:

(a) Collaborate with appropriate stakeholders to develop and 13 implement the intensive behavior support services program within the 14 15 division of developmental disabilities;

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(b) Utilize best practices and evidence-based practices;

17 (c) Provide coordination and planning for the implementation and expansion of intensive in-home services; 18

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(d) Contract for the provision of intensive in-home services;

20 (e) Monitor and evaluate services to determine whether the program 21 meets standards identified in the service contract;

(f) Collect data regarding the number of families served, and cost 22 23 and outcomes of the program;

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(g) Adopt appropriate rules to implement the program;

(h) License out-of-home respite placements on a timely basis; 25

26 (i) Maintain an appropriate staff-to-client ratio;

27 (j) Assess the child for placement in a waiver program if a child has more complex needs and the family is unable to care for the child 28 29 at home.

30 (3) A child may receive services when the department has determined 31 that:

(a) The child is under the age of twenty-one; 32

The child has a developmental disability and has been 33 (b) determined eligible for these services; 34

(c) The child/family score is substantially high enough on the 35 36 behavior sections of the assessment conducted by the division of 1 developmental disabilities within the department to indicate the 2 child's behavior puts the child or family at significant risk and/or is 3 very likely to require an out-of-home placement;

4 (d) The child meets eligibility for the home and community-based 5 care waiver or waivers;

6 (e) The child resides in his or her family home or is temporarily 7 in an out-of-home placement with a plan to return home;

8 (f) The family demonstrates the ability and willingness to learn 9 the skills necessary to participate in the care outlined in the 10 completed individual support plan; and

11 (g) The family is not subject to a pending child protective 12 services referral.

13 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. (1) Intensive behavior support services 14 under the program authorized in section 2 of this act shall be provided 15 through a core team of highly trained individuals either directly or by 16 contract.

17 (2) The intensive behavior support services shall be designed to 18 enhance the child's and parent's skills to manage behaviors, increase 19 family and personal self-sufficiency, improve functioning of the 20 family, reduce stress on children and families, and assist the family 21 to locate and use other community services.

22 (3) The core team shall have the following characteristics and 23 responsibilities:

(a) Expertise in behavior management, therapies, and children's
 crisis intervention, or have access to such specialized expertise;

(b) Ability to coordinate the array of services and supports neededto stabilize the family;

(c) Ability to conduct transition planning as an individual and the individual's family leave the program; and

30 (d) Ability to authorize or coordinate the services in the family's31 home and other environments, such as schools and neighborhoods.

32 (4) The following types of services would constitute intensive33 behavior support services:

- 34 (a) Behavior consultation;
- 35 (b) Minor home adaptations;
- 36 (c) Motor vehicle adaptations;
- 37 (d) Goods, services, and supplies;

- 1 (e) In-home daily care;
- 2 (f) Therapies;
- 3 (g) In-home respite and planned out-of-home respite;

(h) Intensive behavior management training of families and other
individuals and partners working with the child in all domains,
including the school and individualized education plan team; and
(i) Coordination and planning.

8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. Sections 1 through 3 of this act constitute 9 a new chapter in Title 71A RCW.

10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 5. The sum of two million eight hundred 11 thousand dollars, or as much thereof as may be necessary, is 12 appropriated for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2009, from the general 13 fund to the department of social and health services to serve up to one 14 hundred children under this act.

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
