SENATE BILL 5032

State of Washington 60th Legislature 2007 Regular Session

1 AN ACT Relating to the Vancouver national historic reserve; adding 2 new sections to chapter 27.34 RCW; and creating a new section.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The three hundred sixty-six acre Vancouver 4 5 national historic reserve was created by Congress through Public Law 104-333: The "Omnibus Parks and Public Lands Management Act of 1996" 6 in recognition of the significant cultural, historic, and natural 7 8 resources of the area. The historic reserve includes Fort Vancouver national historic site, Pearson airfield, Pearson air museum, officers 9 row, Vancouver barracks, and a section of the Columbia river 10 waterfront. The four legislatively designated partners in the reserve 11 12 are the national park service, the United States army, the state of Washington, and the city of Vancouver. 13

The Vancouver national historic reserve trust, a 501(c)(3), was created in 1998 as the official nonprofit for the reserve. P.L. 104-333 required that the reserve be administered under a general management plan to be developed no later than three years after the enactment of the law. The management plan was adopted in February 2000 with the state of Washington as one of the signatories.

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The legislature finds that the state of Washington, as one of four 1 2 federally designated partners in the Vancouver national historic reserve, should be actively engaged in the protection, preservation, 3 interpretation, and rehabilitation of the historic reserve for the use 4 5 and benefit of the people of the state. Southwest Washington is a traditionally underserved area of the state with regard to cultural and 6 7 recreational opportunities. The Vancouver national historic reserve is a unique historic site that offers a variety of historic, cultural, 8 9 natural, and recreational opportunities and currently serves almost one million visitors per year. From the Hudson's Bay company fort, the 10 story of the early settlers and fur traders to Vancouver barracks, over 11 one hundred fifty years of military history, to the story of pioneering 12 aviation and the golden age of flight at Pearson field, the historic 13 reserve is unique because of the layers of history visitors can 14 experience in one location. In addition, the historic reserve offers 15 acres of green space and waterfront in the midst of the large 16 17 Portland/Vancouver metropolitan area.

The legislature has declared through RCW 27.34.220 that it is the 18 public policy and in the public interest of the state to designate, 19 20 preserve, protect, enhance, and perpetuate those structures, sites, districts, buildings, and objects that reflect outstanding elements of 21 22 the state's historic, archaeological, architectural, or cultural heritage, for the inspiration and enrichment of the people of the 23 state. The Vancouver national historic reserve is on both the state 24 25 and federal registers as a historic district and encompasses some of the richest historic, archaeological, architectural, and cultural 26 27 resources in the state.

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It is the purpose of this act to:

(1) Confirm the role of the state of Washington in the developmentand management of the Vancouver national historic reserve;

31 (2) Identify the role of state agencies in the Vancouver national32 historic reserve; and

(3) Establish an account in the state treasury through the
Washington state historical society for funds designated specifically
for the Vancouver national historic reserve.

36 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. The legislature affirms that the state of 37 Washington is partner in the Vancouver national historic reserve as

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1 mandated under Public Law 104-333: The Omnibus Parks and Public Lands 2 Management Act of 1996. As such, the state will take an active role in 3 supporting the protection, preservation, interpretation, and 4 rehabilitation of the Vancouver national historic reserve.

5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. The legislature affirms that the Washington 6 state historic society is the state's designated partner representative 7 for the Vancouver national historic reserve. Accordingly, the 8 Washington state historic society shall:

9 (1) Participate in the regularly scheduled coordination meetings of 10 the Vancouver national historic reserve partners;

(2) Participate in the development of management, education, and interpretive plans and policies associated with the Vancouver national historic reserve;

(3) Partner with Washington State University and other agencies for
purposes of managing the center for Columbia river history,
headquartered on the Vancouver national historic reserve, and with the
department for preservation and rehabilitation of the site; and

18 (4) Develop and submit to the office of financial management and 19 the legislature operating and capital budget requests concurrent with 20 the biennial cycle and oversee the management of all funds appropriated 21 by the state for the Vancouver national historic reserve.

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. The Vancouver national historic reserve 22 23 account is created in the state treasury. All receipts from appropriations and gifts directed to the account must be deposited into 24 25 the account. Moneys in the account may be spent only after Expenditures from the account may be used only to 26 appropriation. finance the development and operation of the Vancouver national 27 28 historic reserve.

29 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 5.** Sections 2 through 4 of this act are each 30 added to chapter 27.34 RCW.

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
