SUBSTITUTE SENATE BILL 5239

State of Washington 60th Legislature 2007 Regular Session

1 AN ACT Relating to a segmented mathematics alternative assessment; 2 and amending RCW 28A.655.061 and 28A.655.065.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 Sec. 1. RCW 28A.655.061 and 2006 c 115 s 4 are each amended to 5 read as follows:

(1) The high school assessment system shall include but need not be 6 limited to the Washington assessment of student learning, opportunities 7 8 for a student to retake the content areas of the assessment in which the student was not successful, and if approved by the legislature 9 10 pursuant to subsection (10) of this section, one or more objective alternative assessments for a student to demonstrate achievement of 11 state academic standards. The objective alternative assessments for 12 each content area shall be comparable in rigor to the skills and 13 14 knowledge that the student must demonstrate on the Washington 15 assessment of student learning for each content area.

16 (2) Subject to the conditions in this section, a certificate of 17 academic achievement shall be obtained by most students at about the 18 age of sixteen, and is evidence that the students have successfully met 19 the state standard in the content areas included in the certificate. With the exception of students satisfying the provisions of RCW 2 28A.155.045, acquisition of the certificate is required for graduation 3 from a public high school but is not the only requirement for 4 graduation.

(3) Beginning with the graduating class of 2008, with the exception 5 of students satisfying the provisions of RCW 28A.155.045, a student who 6 7 meets the state standards on the reading, writing, and mathematics content areas of the high school Washington assessment of student 8 learning shall earn a certificate of academic achievement. 9 If a 10 student does not successfully meet the state standards in one or more content areas required for the certificate of academic achievement, 11 then the student may retake the assessment in the content area up to 12 13 four times at no cost to the student. If the student successfully meets the state standards on a retake of the assessment then the 14 student shall earn a certificate of academic achievement. Except as 15 provided in RCW 28A.655.065, once objective alternative assessments are 16 17 authorized pursuant to subsection (10) of this section, a student may use the objective alternative assessments to demonstrate that the 18 student successfully meets the state standards for that content area if 19 the student has retaken the Washington assessment of student learning 20 21 at least once. If the student successfully meets the state standards on the objective alternative assessments then the student shall earn a 22 certificate of academic achievement. 23

(4) Beginning with the graduating class of 2010, a student must meet the state standards in science in addition to the other content areas required under subsection (3) of this section on the Washington assessment of student learning or the objective alternative assessments in order to earn a certificate of academic achievement.

(5) The state board of education may not require the acquisition of the certificate of academic achievement for students in home-based instruction under chapter 28A.200 RCW, for students enrolled in private schools under chapter 28A.195 RCW, or for students satisfying the provisions of RCW 28A.155.045.

34 (6) A student may retain and use the highest result from each35 successfully completed content area of the high school assessment.

36 (7) Beginning in 2006, school districts must make available to 37 students the following options:

1 (a) To retake the Washington assessment of student learning up to 2 four times in the content areas in which the student did not meet the 3 state standards if the student is enrolled in a public school; or

4 (b) To retake the Washington assessment of student learning up to 5 four times in the content areas in which the student did not meet the 6 state standards if the student is enrolled in a high school completion 7 program at a community or technical college. The superintendent of 8 public instruction and the state board for community and technical 9 colleges shall jointly identify means by which students in these 10 programs can be assessed.

(8) Students who achieve the standard in a content area of the high school assessment but who wish to improve their results shall pay for retaking the assessment, using a uniform cost determined by the superintendent of public instruction.

(9) Subject to available funding, the superintendent shall pilot opportunities for retaking the high school assessment beginning in the 2004-05 school year. Beginning no later than September 2006, opportunities to retake the assessment at least twice a year shall be available to each school district.

(10)(a) The office of the superintendent of public instruction 20 21 develop options for implementing objective alternative shall 22 assessments, which may include an appeals process, for students to demonstrate achievement of the state academic standards. The objective 23 24 alternative assessments shall be comparable in rigor to the skills and 25 knowledge that the student must demonstrate on the Washington assessment of student learning and be objective in its determination of 26 27 student achievement of the state standards. Before any objective alternative assessments in addition to those authorized in RCW 28 28A.655.065 or (b) of this subsection are used by a student to 29 demonstrate that the student has met the state standards in a content 30 area required to obtain a certificate, the legislature shall formally 31 32 approve the use of any objective alternative assessments through the omnibus appropriations act or by statute or concurrent resolution. 33

34 (b) A student's score on the mathematics portion of the preliminary 35 scholastic assessment test (PSAT), the scholastic assessment test 36 (SAT), or the American college test (ACT) may be used as an objective 37 alternative assessment under this section for demonstrating that a 38 student has met or exceeded the mathematics standards for the

certificate of academic achievement. The state board of education shall identify the scores students must achieve on the mathematics portion of the PSAT, SAT, or ACT to meet or exceed the state standard for mathematics. The state board of education shall identify the first scores by December 1, 2006, and thereafter may increase but not decrease the scores required for students to meet or exceed the state standard for mathematics.

8 (11) By December 15, 2004, the house of representatives and senate 9 education committees shall obtain information and conclusions from 10 recognized, independent, national assessment experts regarding the 11 validity and reliability of the high school Washington assessment of 12 student learning for making individual student high school graduation 13 determinations.

14 (12) To help assure continued progress in academic achievement as 15 a foundation for high school graduation and to assure that students are 16 on track for high school graduation, each school district shall prepare 17 plans for students as provided in this subsection (12).

(a) Student learning plans are required for eighth through twelfth 18 grade students who were not successful on any or all of the content 19 areas of the Washington assessment for student learning during the 20 21 school year. The plan shall include the courses, previous 22 competencies, and other steps needed to be taken by the student to meet state academic standards and stay on track for graduation. 23 This 24 requirement shall be phased in as follows:

(i) Beginning no later than the 2004-05 school year ninth grade
students as described in this subsection (12)(a) shall have a plan.

(ii) Beginning no later than the 2005-06 school year and every year thereafter eighth grade students as described in this subsection (12)(a) shall have a plan.

30 (iii) The parent or guardian shall be notified, preferably through 31 a parent conference, of the student's results on the Washington 32 assessment of student learning, actions the school intends to take to 33 improve the student's skills in any content area in which the student 34 was unsuccessful, strategies to help them improve their student's 35 skills, and the content of the student's plan.

36 (iv) Progress made on the student plan shall be reported to the 37 student's parents or guardian at least annually and adjustments to the 38 plan made as necessary.

1 (b) Beginning with the 2005-06 school year and every year 2 thereafter, all fifth grade students who were not successful in one or 3 more of the content areas of the fourth grade Washington assessment of 4 student learning shall have a student learning plan.

5 (i) The parent or guardian of a student described in this 6 subsection (12)(b) shall be notified, preferably through a parent 7 conference, of the student's results on the Washington assessment of 8 student learning, actions the school intends to take to improve the 9 student's skills in any content area in which the student was 10 unsuccessful, and provide strategies to help them improve their 11 student's skills.

(ii) Progress made on the student plan shall be reported to the student's parents or guardian at least annually and adjustments to the plan made as necessary.

15 **Sec. 2.** RCW 28A.655.065 and 2006 c 115 s 1 are each amended to 16 read as follows:

17 (1) The legislature has made a commitment to rigorous academic standards for receipt of a high school diploma. The primary way that 18 students will demonstrate that they meet the standards in reading, 19 20 writing, mathematics, and science is through the Washington assessment 21 of student learning. Only objective assessments that are comparable in rigor to the state assessment are authorized as an alternative 22 23 assessment. Before seeking an alternative assessment, the legislature 24 expects students to make a genuine effort to meet state standards, 25 through retaking the Washington assessment of student learning except 26 as provided in subsection (7) of this section; regular and consistent 27 attendance at school; and participation in extended learning and other 28 assistance programs.

(2) Under RCW 28A.655.061, beginning in the 2006-07 school year, 29 30 the superintendent of public instruction shall implement objective 31 alternative assessment methods as provided in this section for students to demonstrate achievement of the state standards in content areas in 32 33 which the student has not yet met the standard on the high school Washington assessment of student learning. A student may access an 34 alternative if the student meets applicable eligibility criteria in RCW 35 36 28A.655.061 and other eligibility criteria established by the 37 superintendent of public instruction, including but not limited to

1 attendance criteria and participation in the remediation or 2 supplemental instruction contained in the student learning plan 3 developed under RCW 28A.655.061. A school district may waive 4 attendance and/or remediation criteria for special, unavoidable 5 circumstances.

6 (3) For the purposes of this section, "applicant" means a student 7 seeking to use one of the alternative assessment methods in this 8 section.

9 (4) One alternative assessment method shall be a combination of the 10 applicant's grades in applicable courses and the applicant's highest 11 score on the high school Washington assessment of student learning, as 12 provided in this subsection. The superintendent of public instruction 13 shall determine which high school courses are applicable to the 14 alternative assessment method and shall issue guidelines to school 15 districts.

(a) Using guidelines prepared by the superintendent of public 16 17 instruction, a school district shall identify the group of students in the same school as the applicant who took the same high school courses 18 as the applicant in the applicable content area. From the group of 19 students identified in this manner, the district shall select the 20 21 comparison cohort that shall be those students who met or slightly 22 exceeded the state standard on the Washington assessment of student 23 learning.

(b) The district shall compare the applicant's grades in high school courses in the applicable content area to the grades of students in the comparison cohort for the same high school courses. If the applicant's grades are equal to or above the mean grades of the comparison cohort, the applicant shall be deemed to have met the state standard on the alternative assessment.

30 (c) An applicant may not use the alternative assessment under this 31 subsection (4) if there are fewer than six students in the comparison 32 cohort.

(5) The superintendent of public instruction shall develop an alternative assessment method that shall be an evaluation of a collection of work samples prepared and submitted by the applicant, as provided in this subsection and, for career and technical applicants, the additional requirements of subsection (6) of this section.

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(a) The superintendent of public instruction shall develop 1 2 guidelines for the types and number of work samples in each content area that may be submitted as a collection of evidence that the 3 applicant has met the state standard in that content area. 4 Work samples may be collected from academic, career and technical, or 5 remedial courses and may include performance tasks as well as written 6 7 products. The superintendent shall submit the quidelines for approval by the state board of education. 8

9 (b) The superintendent shall develop protocols for submission of 10 the collection of work samples that include affidavits from the 11 applicant's teachers and school district that the samples are the work 12 of the applicant and a requirement that a portion of the samples be 13 prepared under the direct supervision of a classroom teacher. The 14 superintendent shall submit the protocols for approval by the state 15 board of education.

(c) The superintendent shall develop uniform scoring criteria for 16 evaluating the collection of work samples and submit the scoring 17 criteria for approval by the state board of education. Collections 18 shall be scored at the state level or regionally by a panel of 19 educators selected and trained by the superintendent to ensure 20 21 objectivity, reliability, and rigor in the evaluation. An educator may 22 not score work samples submitted by applicants from the educator's school district. If the panel awards an applicant's collection of work 23 24 samples the minimum required score, the applicant shall be deemed to 25 have met the state standard on the alternative assessment.

(d) Using an open and public process that includes consultation 26 27 with district superintendents, school principals, and other educators, the state board of education shall consider the guidelines, protocols, 28 scoring criteria, and other information regarding the collection of 29 work samples submitted by the superintendent of public instruction. 30 The collection of work samples may be implemented as an alternative 31 assessment after the state board of education has approved the 32 guidelines, protocols, and scoring criteria and determined that the 33 collection of work samples: (i) Will meet professionally accepted 34 35 standards for a valid and reliable measure of the grade level expectations and the essential academic learning requirements; and (ii) 36 37 is comparable to or exceeds the rigor of the skills and knowledge that 38 a student must demonstrate on the Washington assessment of student

learning in the applicable content area. The state board shall make an approval decision and determination no later than December 1, 2006, and thereafter may increase the required rigor of the collection of work samples.

(e) By September of 2006, the superintendent of public instruction 5 shall develop informational materials for parents, teachers, and 6 7 students regarding the collection of work samples and the status of its development as an alternative assessment method. The materials shall 8 provide specific guidance regarding the type and number of work samples 9 10 likely to be required, include examples of work that meets the state learning standards, and describe the scoring criteria and process for 11 12 the collection. The materials shall also encourage students in the 13 graduating class of 2008 to begin creating a collection if they believe 14 they may seek to use the collection once it is implemented as an alternative assessment. 15

16 (6)(a) For students enrolled in a career and technical education 17 program approved under RCW 28C.04.110, the superintendent of public 18 instruction shall develop additional guidelines for a collection of 19 work samples that evidences that the collection:

20 (i) Is relevant to the student's particular career and technical 21 program;

(ii) Focuses on the application of academic knowledge and skillswithin the program;

24 (iii) Includes completed activities or projects where demonstration 25 of academic knowledge is inferred; and

(iv) Is related to the essential academic learning requirements and state standards that students must meet to earn a certificate of academic achievement or certificate of individual achievement, but also represents the knowledge and skills that successful individuals in the career and technical field of the approved program are expected to possess.

32 (b) To meet the state standard on the alternative assessment under 33 this subsection (6), an applicant must also attain the state or 34 nationally recognized certificate or credential associated with the 35 approved career and technical program.

(c) The superintendent shall consult with community and technical
 colleges, employers, the work force training and education coordinating
 board, apprenticeship programs, and other regional and national experts

in career and technical education to create an appropriate collection
 of work samples and other evidence of a career and technical student's
 knowledge and skills on the state academic standards.

(7) The superintendent of public instruction shall implement an 4 alternative assessment option for mathematics that: Presents the 5 mathematics essential academic learnings in segments for assessment; is 6 comparable in content and rigor to the tenth grade mathematics 7 assessment when all segments are considered together; is reliable and 8 valid; and can be used to determine a student's academic performance 9 level. Students may access this segmented math assessment without 10 retaking the Washington assessment of student learning. The office of 11 the superintendent of public instruction shall create a cadre of 12 13 teachers who are trained to score the segmented math alternative assessments or use electronic means to enable the school to receive the 14 15 scores within three weeks.

16 (8) The superintendent of public instruction shall study the 17 feasibility of using existing mathematics assessments in languages 18 other than English as an additional alternative assessment option. The 19 study shall include an estimation of the cost of translating the tenth 20 grade mathematics assessment into other languages and scoring the 21 assessments should they be implemented.

22 (((+8))) (9) The superintendent of public instruction shall 23 implement:

(a) By June 1, 2006, a process for students to appeal the scorethey received on the high school assessments; and

26 (b) By January 1, 2007, guidelines and appeal processes for waiving 27 specific requirements in RCW 28A.655.061 pertaining to the certificate academic achievement and to the certificate of 28 of individual achievement for students who: (i) Transfer to a Washington public 29 school in their junior or senior year with the intent of obtaining a 30 31 public high school diploma, or (ii) have special, unavoidable 32 circumstances.

33 (((-9))) (10) The superintendent of public instruction may adopt 34 rules to implement this section.

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
