SUBSTITUTE SENATE BILL 5581

AN ACT Relating to mathematics and science education; reenacting and amending RCW 43.79A.040; adding a new section to chapter 28A.655 RCW; adding a new chapter to Title 28B RCW; and creating a new section.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature finds that the 2005 legislature created Washington learns to conduct a comprehensive review 6 7 of the state's entire education system and to issue recommendations. 8 The legislature further finds that Washington learns determined that 9 Washington students are falling behind international standards in 10 mathematics and science and that when high school students are not well-prepared in mathematics and science, they are unlikely to pursue 11 12 the careers or college degrees that require those skills. The 13 legislature further finds that the Washington learns report includes a 14 strategy to increase the level of achievement of the state's students 15 by increasing high school graduation requirements; and a strategy to expand incentives and opportunities for students seeking high-demand 16 17 mathematics- and science-related certificates and degrees. The legislature further finds that the intent of this act is to implement 18 19 both of these strategies.

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 28A.655
 RCW to read as follows:

3 (1) To qualify for a mathematics/science high school scholar
4 scholarship, students must complete the following requirements:

5 (a) Successfully earn the following high school credits:

6 (i) Four mathematics credits, including calculus;

7 (ii) At least three science credits, including chemistry and 8 physics; and

9 (iii) At least three credits of world language other than English; 10 (b) Receive advanced placement scores of three or higher on at 11 least two advance placement tests or graduate from an international 12 baccalaureate program; and

13 (c) Earn a high school grade point average of 3.5 or above.

14 (2) As used in this section, "high school credits" means a full 15 school year of study or one hundred fifty hours of planned 16 instructional activities, whichever is greater, or an equivalent as 17 defined by the state board of education.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. (1) Beginning with the 2008-09 academic year, the higher education coordinating board shall award full tuition scholarships to students graduating from public and approved private high schools under chapter 28A.195 RCW who meet the requirements of section 2 of this act, if the student pursues an undergraduate degree in a mathematics or science-related field and who qualify for a scholarship under the ranking system developed by the board.

(2) The scholarships may only be used for undergraduate coursework beginning in the student's second year at accredited institutions of higher education in the state of Washington, except that the scholarships may be used for undergraduate coursework at Oregon institutions of higher education that are located in counties bordering Washington state.

(3) The higher education coordinating board shall develop a ranking system to determine priority of the award of the mathematics/science scholarship. The ranking system shall consider the following factors: (a) The first year of course selection at institutions of higher education by the applicant. Applications shall be ranked higher based on the number of mathematics and science classes that the applicant enrolled and completed;

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1 (b) The grade point average of the applicant in the first year at 2 an institution of higher education; and

3 (c) Other criteria that the higher education coordinating board4 deems appropriate.

5 (4) The higher education coordinating board shall award 6 scholarships to as many eligible students as possible using the ranking 7 system.

8 (5) The scholarships may not be awarded to any student who is 9 pursuing a degree in theology.

10 (6) The higher education coordinating board may establish 11 satisfactory progress standards for the continued receipt of the 12 scholarship.

13 (7) The higher education coordinating board shall establish the 14 time frame within which the student must use the scholarship.

15 (8) The higher education coordinating board may adopt rules to 16 implement this section.

17 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. (1) The mathematics/science high school 18 scholar scholarship account is created in the custody of the state 19 treasurer. The account shall be a nontreasury account retaining its 20 interest earnings in accordance with RCW 43.79A.040.

(2) The higher education coordinating board shall deposit in the account all money received for the program. The account shall be selfsustaining and consist of funds appropriated by the legislature for the mathematics/science high school scholar scholarship program, private contributions to the program, and refunds of scholarships under this chapter.

(3) Expenditures from the account shall be used for scholarships toeligible students.

(4) With the exception of the operating costs associated with the management of the account by the treasurer's office as authorized in chapter 43.79A RCW, the account shall be credited with all investment income earned by the account.

33 (5) Disbursements from the account are exempt from appropriations34 and the allotment provisions of chapter 43.88 RCW.

35 (6) Disbursements from the account shall be made only on the36 authorization of the higher education coordinating board.

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Sec. 5. RCW 43.79A.040 and 2006 c 311 s 21 and 2006 c 120 s 2 are each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

3 (1) Money in the treasurer's trust fund may be deposited, invested,
4 and reinvested by the state treasurer in accordance with RCW 43.84.080
5 in the same manner and to the same extent as if the money were in the
6 state treasury.

7 (2) All income received from investment of the treasurer's trust
8 fund shall be set aside in an account in the treasury trust fund to be
9 known as the investment income account.

10 (3) The investment income account may be utilized for the payment of purchased banking services on behalf of treasurer's trust funds 11 including, but not limited to, depository, safekeeping, 12 and 13 disbursement functions for the state treasurer or affected state agencies. The investment income account is subject in all respects to 14 chapter 43.88 RCW, but no appropriation is required for payments to 15 financial institutions. Payments shall occur prior to distribution of 16 17 earnings set forth in subsection (4) of this section.

(4)(a) Monthly, the state treasurer shall distribute the earnings
credited to the investment income account to the state general fund
except under (b) and (c) of this subsection.

21 The following accounts and funds shall receive their (b) 22 proportionate share of earnings based upon each account's or fund's average daily balance for the period: 23 The Washington promise 24 scholarship account, the college savings program account, the 25 Washington advanced college tuition payment program account, the agricultural local fund, the American Indian scholarship endowment 26 27 fund, the foster care scholarship endowment fund, the foster care endowed scholarship trust fund, the students with dependents grant 28 account, the basic health plan self-insurance reserve account, the 29 contract harvesting revolving account, the Washington state combined 30 31 fund drive account, the commemorative works account, the Washington 32 international exchange scholarship endowment fund, the developmental disabilities endowment trust fund, the energy account, the fair fund, 33 the fruit and vegetable inspection account, the future teachers 34 conditional scholarship account, the game farm alternative account, the 35 grain inspection revolving fund, the juvenile accountability incentive 36 37 account, the law enforcement officers' and fire fighters' plan 2 38 expense fund, the local tourism promotion account, <u>the</u>

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mathematics/science high school scholar scholarship account, the 1 2 produce railcar pool account, the regional transportation investment district account, the rural rehabilitation account, the stadium and 3 exhibition center account, the youth athletic facility account, the 4 self-insurance revolving fund, the sulfur dioxide abatement account, 5 the children's trust fund, the Washington horse racing commission б 7 Washington bred owners' bonus fund account, the Washington horse racing commission class C purse fund account, the individual development 8 account program account, the Washington horse racing commission 9 10 operating account (earnings from the Washington horse racing commission operating account must be credited to the Washington horse racing 11 commission class C purse fund account), the life sciences discovery 12 13 fund, and the reading achievement account. However, the earnings to be 14 distributed shall first be reduced by the allocation to the state treasurer's service fund pursuant to RCW 43.08.190. 15

(c) The following accounts and funds shall receive eighty percent 16 17 of their proportionate share of earnings based upon each account's or fund's average daily balance for the period: The advanced right of way 18 revolving fund, the advanced environmental mitigation revolving 19 account, the city and county advance right-of-way revolving fund, the 20 21 federal narcotics asset forfeitures account, the high occupancy vehicle 22 account, the local rail service assistance account, and the miscellaneous transportation programs account. 23

(5) In conformance with Article II, section 37 of the state
Constitution, no trust accounts or funds shall be allocated earnings
without the specific affirmative directive of this section.

27 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 6. Sections 3 and 4 of this act constitute a 28 new chapter in Title 28B RCW.

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
