1 AN ACT Relating to the caring for Washington individuals with 2 autism task force; and amending 2005 c 259 ss 1 and 2 (uncodified).

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 Sec. 1. 2005 c 259 s 1 (uncodified) is amended to read as follows:
5 The legislature finds that:

6 (1) Autism is a complex developmental disability that typically
7 appears during the first three years of life;

8 (2) As many as one million five hundred thousand Americans are 9 believed to have some form of autism;

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(3) The number of children with autism is increasing;

(4) Autistic behaviors not only make life difficult for people with autism but also make life hard for their families, health care providers, and teachers;

14 (5) Families coping with this devastating illness are searching for15 answers about its causes, diagnosis, prevention, and treatment;

(6) Presently, there is no effective means to prevent, fully treat,or cure the disorder;

18 (7) Early intervention is critical for affected children to gain19 maximum benefit from current therapies;

(8) Strategies about how to best prevent, identify, treat, and
 accommodate the needs of individuals with autism and their families are
 urgently needed; and
 (9) It is very difficult to find and access resources and services
 for adults with autism and Aspergers Syndrome.
 Sec. 2. 2005 c 259 s 2 (uncodified) is amended to read as follows:

7 (1) The caring for Washington individuals with autism task force is8 created to:

9 <u>(a) S</u>tudy and make recommendations to the legislature regarding the 10 growing incidence of autism<u>;</u>

11 (b) Assist in implementing the recommendations; and

12 <u>(c) Evaluate</u> ways to improve the delivery and coordination of 13 autism services in the state.

14 (2) The task force shall consist of fourteen members: Four members 15 of the legislature, including two members of the senate appointed by 16 the president of the senate, one of the majority party and one of the 17 minority party, and two members of the house of representatives 18 appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives, including one 19 of the majority party and one of the minority party; and ten additional 20 members appointed by the governor, who shall include at least:

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(a) Two parents of children with autism;

(b) <u>A parent of an adult individual with autism;</u>

23 (c) A representative of the autism center at the University of 24 Washington;

25 ((<del>(c)</del>)) <u>(d)</u> A representative of the department of health;

26 ((<del>(d)</del>)) <u>(e)</u> A representative of the department of social and health 27 services;

28 (((+))) (f) A representative of the office of the superintendent of 29 public instruction;

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(((<del>(f)</del>))) (<u>(</u>) A representative of a local school district;

31 ((<del>(g)</del>)) <u>(h)</u> A representative of an educational service district; 32 and

33 ((<del>(h)</del>)) <u>(i)</u> An expert in the field of early intervention services.

34 (3) The task force shall:

35 (a) Review the ((available literature and consult with experts to 36 gain an understanding of the causes of the disorder and its incidence 37 in Washington; 1 (b) Assess the availability of services currently provided for
2 early screening, diagnosis, and treatment of the disorder;

3 (c) Assess the availability of services to assist families of 4 individuals with autism;

- 6 (d) Review the effectiveness of programs and services provided to
   6 individuals with autism and their families;
- 7 (e) Review other issues and concerns that the task force believes
  8 would be helpful in arriving at sound policy recommendations; and
- 9 (f) Complete its review and submit its)) recommendations <u>submitted</u> 10 <u>by the task force</u> to the appropriate policy and fiscal committees of 11 the legislature and the governor ((<del>by</del>)) <u>in</u> December ((<del>1,</del>)) 2006 <u>and</u>, 12 <u>within available funding</u>, <u>assist in their implementation</u>;
- 13 (b) Review and continue to refine criteria for regional autism 14 centers throughout Washington state based on community needs in each 15 area;
- 16 (c) Consult with experts, as needed, to ensure that implemented 17 services are of high quality and meet the intended purpose of the task 18 force recommendations;
- 19 (d) Compile information for and create the "Washington service 20 guidelines for individuals with autism spectrum disorders - birth 21 through the lifespan" book as described in the 2006 task force 22 recommendations;
- 23 (e) Monitor the federal combating autism act and its funding 24 availability and make recommendations on applying for grants as 25 available to assist in implementation of the 2006 task force 26 recommendations;
- 27 (f) Review other issues and concerns that the task force believes
   28 would be helpful in implementing the current recommendations; and
- 29 (g) Provide a report to the appropriate policy and fiscal 30 committees of the legislature and the governor by December 1, 2008, on 31 the status of implementation of the 2006 task force recommendations.
- 32 (4) The department of health shall be the lead agency in providing 33 staff needed for the performance of the work of the task force. The 34 department may seek additional staff assistance from the office of the 35 superintendent of public instruction and the committee staff of the 36 legislature.
- 37 (5) Legislative members of the task force shall be reimbursed for38 travel expenses in accordance with RCW 44.04.120. Nonlegislative

1 members, except those representing an employer or organization, are 2 entitled to be reimbursed for travel expenses in accordance with RCW 3 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.

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
