AN ACT Relating to state ferries; amending RCW 47.06.140, 47.60.290, and 47.60.330; adding new sections to chapter 47.60 RCW; repealing RCW 47.60.150 and 47.60.326; and providing an expiration date.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 Sec. 1. RCW 47.06.140 and 1998 c 171 s 7 are each amended to read 7 as follows:

8 (1) The legislature declares the following transportation facilities and services to be of statewide significance: 9 The 10 interstate highway system, interregional state principal arterials including ferry connections that serve statewide travel, 11 intercity 12 passenger rail services, intercity high-speed ground transportation, 13 major passenger intermodal terminals excluding all airport facilities and services, the freight railroad system, the Columbia/Snake navigable 14 15 river system, marine port facilities and services that are related solely to marine activities affecting international and interstate 16 17 trade, and high-capacity transportation systems serving regions as defined in RCW 81.104.015. The department, in cooperation with 18 19 regional transportation planning organizations, counties, cities,

transit agencies, public ports, private railroad operators, and private transportation providers, as appropriate, shall plan for improvements to transportation facilities and services of statewide significance in the statewide multimodal plan. Improvements to facilities and services of statewide significance identified in the statewide multimodal plan are essential state public facilities under RCW 36.70A.200.

7 (2) The department of transportation, in consultation with local governments, shall set level of service standards for state highways 8 and state ferry routes of statewide significance. 9 Although the 10 department shall consult with local governments when setting level of service standards, the department retains authority to make final 11 12 decisions regarding level of service standards for state highways and state ferry routes of statewide significance. In establishing level of 13 14 service standards for state highways and state ferry routes of statewide significance, the department shall consider the necessary 15 balance between providing for the free interjurisdictional movement of 16 17 people and goods and the needs of local communities using these facilities. When setting the vehicle level of service standards under 18 this section for state ferry routes, the department may allow for a 19 standard that is adjustable for seasonality. 20

21 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 47.60 RCW 22 to read as follows:

The definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

(1) "Capital plan" means the state ferry system plan as describedin RCW 47.06.050(2) and adopted by the commission.

(2) "Capital project" has the same meaning as in the office offinancial management's capital budget instructions.

(3) "Commission" means the transportation commission created in RCW47.01.051.

(4) "Improvement project" has the same meaning as a program project in the office of financial management's capital budget instructions. If a project meets both the improvement project and preservation project definitions in this section it must be defined as an improvement project. All improvement work scheduled for a specific terminal constitutes one project. New vessel acquisitions must be defined as improvement projects.

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(5) "Life-cycle cost model" means a capital asset inventory system
 that estimates future preservation cost needs.

3 (6) "Maintenance cost" has the same meaning as in the office of
4 financial management's capital budget instructions.

5 (7) "Preservation project" has the same meaning as in the office of 6 financial management's capital budget instructions.

7 (8) "Route" means all ferry sailings from one location to another,
8 such as the Seattle to Bainbridge route or the Port Townsend to
9 Keystone route.

10 (9) "Sailing" means an individual ferry sailing for a specific 11 route, such as the 5:00 p.m. sailing from Seattle to Bremerton.

(10) "Travel market" means one or more ferry routes that encompassa market with distinct characteristics as determined by the department.

14 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 47.60 RCW 15 to read as follows:

16 (1) The commission shall, with the involvement of the department, 17 conduct a market survey to gather information on ferry users to help 18 inform level of service, operational, pricing, planning, and investment 19 decisions. The survey must include, but is not limited to:

20 (a) Current and forecasted recreational use;

21 (b) Current and forecasted vehicle customer use;

22 (c) Current and forecasted freight and goods movement demand; and

(d) Reactions to potential operational and pricing strategies
 described under section 4 of this act and RCW 47.60.290.

25 (2) The market survey must be updated at least annually.

26 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 4.** A new section is added to chapter 47.60 RCW 27 to read as follows:

(1) The department shall develop, and the commission shall review, operational strategies to ensure existing assets are fully utilized and to guide future investment decisions. These operational strategies must, at a minimum:

32 (a) Recognize that each travel market is unique and should be33 evaluated separately;

34 (b) Use data from the current market survey conducted under section35 3 of this act;

36 (c) Be consistent with vehicle level of service standards; and

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1 (d) Use a life-cycle cost analysis that considers capital and 2 operating costs and the most efficient balance between these costs.

3 (2) In developing operational strategies, the following, at a 4 minimum, must be considered:

5 (a) The feasibility of using reservation systems to manage peak6 demand;

7 (b) Methods of shifting vehicular traffic to other modes of 8 transportation;

9 (c) Methods of improving on-dock operations to maximize efficiency 10 and minimize operating and capital costs;

11 (d) A cost-benefit analysis of remote holding versus over-water 12 holding;

(e) Methods of reorganizing holding areas and minimizing on-dock
 employee parking to maximize dock size available for vehicles;

15 (f) Schedule modifications;

16 (g) Efficiencies in exit queuing and metering; and

17 (h) Interoperability with other transportation services.

(3) Operational strategies must be reevaluated periodically, at aminimum, before developing a new capital plan.

20 Sec. 5. RCW 47.60.290 and 1983 c 3 s 136 are each amended to read 21 as follows:

((Subject to the provisions of RCW 47.60.326,)) (1) The department ((is hereby authorized and directed to)) shall annually review ((tariffs and charges as)) fares and pricing strategies applicable to the operation of the Washington state ferries ((for the purpose of establishing a more fair and equitable tariff to be charged passengers, vehicles, and commodities on the routes of the Washington state ferries)).

29 (2) Fares and pricing strategies must be adopted by rule, under 30 chapter 34.05 RCW, by the commission, according to the following 31 schedule:

32 (a) Each year the department shall provide the commission a report 33 of its review of fares and pricing strategies, with recommendations for 34 the revision of fares for the ensuing year;

35 (b) By October 1st of each year, beginning in 2007, the commission
 36 shall adopt as a rule, a schedule of fares for the ensuing year. The

1	schedule may initially be adopted as an emergency rule if necessary to
2	take effect on, or as near as possible to, October 1st.
3	(3) Beginning in 2008, the fares and pricing strategies developed
4	by the department must:
5	(a) Recognize that each travel market is unique and should be
6	evaluated separately;
7	(b) Use data from the current market survey conducted under section
8	<u>3 of this act;</u>
9	(c) Be developed with input from affected ferry users by public
10	hearing, by review with the affected ferry advisory committees, or by
11	some other method of gathering input in addition to the data gathered
12	from the market survey conducted in section 3 of this act;
13	<u>(d) Keep fare schedules as simple as possible;</u>
14	(e) Develop options for using pricing to level vehicle peak demand;
15	and
16	(f) Develop options for using pricing to increase off-peak
17	ridership.
18	(4) The commission may increase ferry tolls included in the
19	schedule of charges adopted under this section by a percentage that
20	exceeds the fiscal growth factor.
21	(5) Using sound business judgment, the chief executive officer of
22	the ferry system may authorize the use of promotional, discounted, and
23	special event fares to the general public and commercial enterprises
24	for the purpose of maximizing capacity use and the revenues collected
25	by the ferry system. The department shall report to the commission a
26	summary of the promotional, discounted, and special event fares offered
27	during each fiscal year and the financial results from these
28	activities.
29	(6) Fare revenues and other revenues deposited in the Puget Sound
30	ferry operations account created in RCW 47.60.530 may not be used to
31	support the Puget Sound capital construction account created in RCW
32	47.60.505, unless the support for capital is separately identified in
33	the fare.
34	sec. 6. RCW 47.60.330 and 2003 c 374 s 5 are each amended to read
35	as follows:
36	(1) <u>Before a substantial change to the service levels provided to</u>

1 ferry users, the department shall consult with affected ferry users by 2 public hearing, by review with the affected ferry advisory committees, 3 or by some other method.

4 (2) Before ((a substantial expansion or curtailment in the level of service provided to ferry users, or a revision in the schedule of ferry 5 б tolls or charges)) adding or eliminating a ferry route, the department ((of transportation)) shall consult with affected ferry users and 7 receive legislative approval. ((The consultation shall be: (a) By 8 public hearing in affected local communities; (b) by review with the 9 affected ferry advisory committees pursuant to RCW 47.60.310; (c) by 10 11 conducting a survey of affected ferry users; or (d) by any combination 12 of (a) through (c).

Promotional, discount, and special event fares that are not part of the published schedule of ferry charges or tolls are exempt. The department shall report an accounting of all exempt revenues to the transportation commission each fiscal year.

17 (2) There is created a ferry system productivity council consisting 18 of a representative of each ferry advisory committee empanelled under 19 RCW 47.60.310, elected by the members thereof, and two representatives 20 of employees of the ferry system appointed by mutual agreement of all 21 of the unions representing ferry employees, which shall meet from time 22 to time with ferry system management to discuss means of improving 23 ferry system productivity.

24 (3) Before increasing ferry tolls the department of transportation 25 shall consider all possible cost reductions with full public 26 participation as provided in subsection (1) of this section and, 27 consistent with public policy, shall consider adapting service levels equitably on a route-by-route basis to reflect trends in and forecasts 28 of traffic usage. Forecasts of traffic levels shall be developed by 29 the bond covenant traffic engineering firm appointed under the 30 provisions of RCW 47.60.450. Provisions of this section shall not 31 alter obligations under RCW 47.60.450. Before including any toll 32 increase in a budget proposal by the commission, the department of 33 transportation shall consult with affected ferry users in the manner 34 35 prescribed in (1)(b) of this section plus the procedure of either 36 (1)(a) or (c) of this section.))

NEW SECTION. Sec. 7. A new section is added to chapter 47.60 RCW 1 2 to read as follows:

(1) Appropriations made for the Washington state ferries capital 3 program may not be used for maintenance costs. 4

5 (2) Systemwide and administrative capital program costs shall be allocated to specific capital projects using a cost allocation plan 6 7 developed by the department. Systemwide and administrative capital program costs shall be identifiable. 8

9 NEW SECTION. Sec. 8. A new section is added to chapter 47.60 RCW to read as follows: 10

11 (1) The department shall maintain a life-cycle cost model on 12 capital assets such that:

(a) Available industry standards are used for estimated life; 13

(b) Standard estimated life is adjusted for asset condition when 14 15 inspections are made; and

16 (c) Systems and structures that do not have standard life cycles 17 are not included.

(2) The life-cycle cost model shall be used in estimating future 18 19 system preservation costs.

20 (3) Preservation funding requests shall only be for items in the 21 life-cycle cost model.

22 (4) Appropriations made for preservation projects shall be spent 23 only on preservation projects when warranted by the asset condition.

24 NEW SECTION. Sec. 9. A new section is added to chapter 47.60 RCW to read as follows: 25

The department shall develop terminal design standards that adhere 26 to the following: 27

(1) Vehicle level of service standards as described in RCW 28 47.06.140; 29

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(2) Operational strategies as described in section 4 of this act;

(3) Pricing strategies as described in RCW 47.60.290; 31

32 (4) Life-cycle costs are considered for both capital and operating costs and the most efficient balance between the two is chosen; 33

34 (5) A recognition that each travel market is unique and should be 35 evaluated separately; and

(6) Ongoing maintenance, operations, and preservation costs are 1 2 minimized to the greatest extent possible.

3 NEW SECTION. Sec. 10. A new section is added to chapter 47.60 RCW 4 to read as follows:

The capital plan must be approved by the commission and adhere to 5 6 the following:

(1) A current ridership demand forecast;

8 (2) Vehicle level of service standards as described in RCW 47.06.140; 9

(3) Operational strategies as described in section 4 of this act; 10

(4) Pricing strategies as described in RCW 47.60.290; and 11

(5) Terminal design standards as described in section 9 of this 12 13 act.

14 NEW SECTION. Sec. 11. A new section is added to chapter 47.60 RCW 15 to read as follows:

(1) Terminal improvement project funding requests must be based on 16 17 the capital plan.

(2) Terminal improvement funding requests must be submitted with a 18 predesign study that includes all elements required in the office of 19 20 financial management's predesign manual.

(3) The predesign study must also: 21

22 (a) Separately identify basic terminal and vessel elements 23 essential to operate the ferry system and their costs;

(b) Separately identify additional elements to provide ancillary 24 25 revenue and customer comfort and their costs;

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(d) Identify additional elements requested by locals and the cost 27 and proposed funding source of those elements; 28

29 (e) Identify multimodal elements and the cost and proposed funding source of those elements; 30

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- (f) Identify all contingency amounts;
- (g) Adhere to the commission-adopted capital plan; and 32

(c) Include phasing with ridership options;

(h) Be developed using value engineering. 33

34 NEW SECTION. Sec. 12. A new section is added to chapter 47.60 RCW 35 to read as follows:

(1) The joint legislative audit and review committee shall assess
 and report as follows:

3 (a) Audit the implementation of the cost allocation methodology 4 evaluated under chapter . . (House Bill No. 1094), Laws of 2007, as 5 it exists on the effective date of this section, assessing whether 6 actual costs are allocated consistently with the methodology, whether 7 there are sufficient internal controls to ensure proper allocation, and 8 the adequacy of staff training; and

9 (b) Review the assignment of preservation costs and improvement 10 costs for fiscal year 2009 to determine whether:

11 (i) The costs are capital costs;

12 (ii) The costs meet the statutory requirements for preservation13 activities and for improvement activities; and

14 (iii) Improvement costs are within the scope of legislative 15 appropriations.

16 (2) The report on the evaluations in this section is due by January17 31, 2010.

18 (3) This section expires December 31, 2010.

19 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 13. The following acts or parts of acts are 20 each repealed:

(1) RCW 47.60.150 (Fixing of charges--Deposit of revenues) and 2003
 c 374 s 3, 1999 c 94 s 26, & 1990 c 42 s 405; and

(2) RCW 47.60.326 (Schedule of charges for state ferries--Review by
department, factors considered--Rule making by commission) and 2005 c
270 s 1, 2003 c 374 s 4, 2001 1st sp.s. c 1 s 1, 1999 c 94 s 27, 1990
c 42 s 406, 1983 c 15 s 25, & 1981 c 344 s 5.

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
