State of Washington 60th Legislature 2008 Regular Session

By Senators McDermott, Brandland, McAuliffe, and Rasmussen; by request of Superintendent of Public Instruction

AN ACT Relating to approving the segmented mathematics assessment as an alternative assessment; and reenacting and amending RCW 28A.655.061.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 Sec. 1. RCW 28A.655.061 and 2007 c 355 s 5 and 2007 c 354 s 2 are 6 each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

7 (1) The high school assessment system shall include but need not be 8 limited to the Washington assessment of student learning, opportunities for a student to retake the content areas of the assessment in which 9 10 the student was not successful, and if approved by the legislature pursuant to subsection (10) of this section, one or more objective 11 alternative assessments for a student to demonstrate achievement of 12 state academic standards. The objective alternative assessments for 13 14 each content area shall be comparable in rigor to the skills and 15 knowledge that the student must demonstrate on the Washington assessment of student learning for each content area. 16

17 (2) Subject to the conditions in this section, a certificate of 18 academic achievement shall be obtained by most students at about the 19 age of sixteen, and is evidence that the students have successfully met the state standard in the content areas included in the certificate.
With the exception of students satisfying the provisions of RCW
28A.155.045 or 28A.655.0611, acquisition of the certificate is required
for graduation from a public high school but is not the only
requirement for graduation.

(3) Beginning with the graduating class of 2008, with the exception 6 7 of students satisfying the provisions of RCW 28A.155.045, a student who meets the state standards on the reading, writing, and mathematics 8 content areas of the high school Washington assessment of student 9 learning shall earn a certificate of academic achievement. 10 If a student does not successfully meet the state standards in one or more 11 content areas required for the certificate of academic achievement, 12 then the student may retake the assessment in the content area up to 13 four times at no cost to the student. If the student successfully 14 meets the state standards on a retake of the assessment then the 15 student shall earn a certificate of academic achievement. 16 Once 17 objective alternative assessments are authorized pursuant to subsection (10) of this section, a student may use the objective alternative 18 assessments to demonstrate that the student successfully meets the 19 state standards for that content area if the student has taken the 20 21 Washington assessment of student learning at least once. If the student successfully meets the state standards on the objective 22 alternative assessments then the student shall earn a certificate of 23 24 academic achievement.

25 (4) Beginning no later than with the graduating class of 2013, a student must meet the state standards in science in addition to the 26 27 other content areas required under subsection (3) of this section on the Washington assessment of student learning or the objective 28 alternative assessments in order to earn a certificate of academic 29 The state board of education may adopt a rule that 30 achievement. implements the requirements of this subsection (4) beginning with a 31 32 graduating class before the graduating class of 2013, if the state board of education adopts the rule by September 1st of the freshman 33 school year of the graduating class to which the requirements of this 34 subsection (4) apply. The state board of education's authority under 35 this subsection (4) does not alter the requirement that any change in 36 37 performance standards for the tenth grade assessment must comply with 38 RCW 28A.305.130.

1 (5) The state board of education may not require the acquisition of 2 the certificate of academic achievement for students in home-based 3 instruction under chapter 28A.200 RCW, for students enrolled in private 4 schools under chapter 28A.195 RCW, or for students satisfying the 5 provisions of RCW 28A.155.045.

6 (6) A student may retain and use the highest result from each 7 successfully completed content area of the high school assessment.

8 (7) School districts must make available to students the following9 options:

10 (a) To retake the Washington assessment of student learning up to 11 four times in the content areas in which the student did not meet the 12 state standards if the student is enrolled in a public school; or

(b) To retake the Washington assessment of student learning up to four times in the content areas in which the student did not meet the state standards if the student is enrolled in a high school completion program at a community or technical college. The superintendent of public instruction and the state board for community and technical colleges shall jointly identify means by which students in these programs can be assessed.

(8) Students who achieve the standard in a content area of the high school assessment but who wish to improve their results shall pay for retaking the assessment, using a uniform cost determined by the superintendent of public instruction.

(9) Opportunities to retake the assessment at least twice a yearshall be available to each school district.

(10)(a) The office of the superintendent of public instruction 26 27 shall develop options for implementing objective alternative assessments, which may include an appeals process for students' scores, 28 students to demonstrate achievement of the state academic 29 for standards. The objective alternative assessments shall be comparable 30 31 in rigor to the skills and knowledge that the student must demonstrate 32 on the Washington assessment of student learning and be objective in its determination of student achievement of the state standards. 33 Before any objective alternative assessments in addition to those 34 authorized in RCW 28A.655.065 or (b) of this subsection are used by a 35 36 student to demonstrate that the student has met the state standards in 37 a content area required to obtain a certificate, the legislature shall

1 formally approve the use of any objective alternative assessments 2 through the omnibus appropriations act or by statute or concurrent 3 resolution.

(b)(i) A student's score on the mathematics, reading or English, or 4 5 writing portion of the scholastic assessment test (SAT) or the American college test (ACT) may be used as an objective alternative assessment 6 7 under this section for demonstrating that a student has met or exceeded the state standards for the certificate of academic achievement. 8 The state board of education shall identify the scores students must 9 10 achieve on the relevant portion of the SAT or ACT to meet or exceed the state standard in the relevant content area on the Washington 11 12 assessment of student learning. The state board of education shall identify the first scores by December 1, 2007. After the first scores 13 14 are established, the state board may increase but not decrease the scores required for students to meet or exceed the state standards. 15

(ii) Until August 31, 2008, a student's score on the mathematics 16 17 portion of the preliminary scholastic assessment test (PSAT) may be used as an objective alternative assessment under this section for 18 demonstrating that a student has met or exceeded the state standard for 19 the certificate of academic achievement. The state board of education 20 21 shall identify the score students must achieve on the mathematics 22 portion of the PSAT to meet or exceed the state standard in that content area on the Washington assessment of student learning. 23

24 (iii) A student who scores at least a three on the grading scale of 25 one to five for selected ((advance placement)) AP examinations may use the score as an objective alternative assessment under this section for 26 27 demonstrating that a student has met or exceeded state standards for the certificate of academic achievement. A score of three on the 28 ((advance placement)) AP examinations in calculus or statistics may be 29 used as an alternative assessment for the mathematics portion of the 30 Washington assessment of student learning. A score of three on the 31 32 ((advance placement)) AP examinations in English language and composition may be used as an alternative assessment for the writing 33 portion of the Washington assessment of student learning. A score of 34 three on the ((advance placement)) <u>AP</u> examinations in English 35 36 literature and composition, macroeconomics, microeconomics, psychology, 37 United States history, world history, United States government and

1 politics, or comparative government and politics may be used as an 2 alternative assessment for the reading portion of the Washington 3 assessment of student learning.

(iv) Beginning in the 2007-08 school year, a student may use an 4 objective alternative assessment option for mathematics developed by 5 the superintendent of public instruction that: Presents the б mathematics essential academic learning requirements in segments; is 7 comparable in content and rigor to the high school mathematics 8 assessment when all segments are considered together; is reliable and 9 valid; is administered in conjunction with a segmented mathematics 10 course; and can be used to determine whether a student has met the high 11 12 school mathematics standard.

(11) By December 15, 2004, the house of representatives and senate education committees shall obtain information and conclusions from recognized, independent, national assessment experts regarding the validity and reliability of the high school Washington assessment of student learning for making individual student high school graduation determinations.

19 (12) To help assure continued progress in academic achievement as 20 a foundation for high school graduation and to assure that students are 21 on track for high school graduation, each school district shall prepare 22 plans for students as provided in this subsection (12).

(a) Student learning plans are required for eighth through twelfth 23 24 grade students who were not successful on any or all of the content areas of the Washington assessment for student learning during the 25 previous school year. The plan shall include the courses, 26 27 competencies, and other steps needed to be taken by the student to meet state academic standards and stay on track for graduation. 28 Ιf applicable, the plan shall also include the high school completion 29 pilot program created under RCW 28B.50.534. 30

(i) The parent or guardian shall be notified, preferably through a parent conference, of the student's results on the Washington assessment of student learning, actions the school intends to take to improve the student's skills in any content area in which the student was unsuccessful, strategies to help them improve their student's skills, and the content of the student's plan.

37 (ii) Progress made on the student plan shall be reported to the

student's parents or guardian at least annually and adjustments to the plan made as necessary.

3 (b) All fifth grade students who were not successful in one or more 4 of the content areas of the fourth grade Washington assessment of 5 student learning shall have a student learning plan.

6 (i) The parent or guardian of the student shall be notified, 7 preferably through a parent conference, of the student's results on the 8 Washington assessment of student learning, actions the school intends 9 to take to improve the student's skills in any content area in which 10 the student was unsuccessful, and provide strategies to help them 11 improve their student's skills.

(ii) Progress made on the student plan shall be reported to the student's parents or guardian at least annually and adjustments to the plan made as necessary.
