## SUBSTITUTE SENATE BILL 6726

State of Washington 60th Legislature 2008 Regular Session

**By** Senate Early Learning & K-12 Education (originally sponsored by Senators Tom, McAuliffe, and Rasmussen)

1 AN ACT Relating to the professional educator standards board 2 establishing a professional-level certification assessment; and 3 amending RCW 28A.410.210 and 28A.410.220.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 Sec. 1. RCW 28A.410.210 and 2005 c 497 s 201 are each amended to 6 read as follows:

7 The purpose of the professional educator standards board is to 8 establish policies and requirements for the preparation and certification of educators that provide standards for competency in 9 10 professional knowledge and practice in the areas of certification; a foundation of skills, knowledge, and attitudes necessary to help 11 students with diverse needs, abilities, cultural experiences, and 12 13 learning styles meet or exceed the learning goals outlined in RCW 28A.150.210; knowledge of research-based practice; and professional 14 15 development throughout a career. The Washington professional educator 16 standards board shall:

(1) Establish policies and practices for the approval of programsof courses, requirements, and other activities leading to educator

1 certification including teacher, school administrator, and educational
2 staff associate certification;

3 (2) Establish policies and practices for the approval of the 4 character of work required to be performed as a condition of entrance 5 to and graduation from any educator preparation program including 6 teacher, school administrator, and educational staff associate 7 preparation program as provided in subsection (1) of this section;

(3) Establish a list of accredited institutions of higher education of this and other states whose graduates may be awarded educator

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9 of this and other states whose graduates may be awarded educator 10 certificates as teacher, school administrator, and educational staff 11 associate and establish criteria and enter into agreements with other 12 states to acquire reciprocal approval of educator preparation programs 13 and certification, including teacher certification from the national 14 board for professional teaching standards;

15 (4) Establish policies for approval of nontraditional educator 16 preparation programs;

(5) Conduct a review of educator program approval standards at least every five years, beginning in 2006, to reflect research findings and assure continued improvement of preparation programs for teachers, administrators, and school specialized personnel;

(6) Specify the types and kinds of educator certificates to be issued and conditions for certification in accordance with subsection (1) of this section and RCW 28A.410.010;

(7) Hear and determine educator certification appeals as providedby RCW 28A.410.100;

26 (8) Apply for and receive federal or other funds on behalf of the27 state for purposes related to the duties of the board;

(9) Adopt rules under chapter 34.05 RCW that are necessary for the
 effective and efficient implementation of this chapter;

30 (10) Maintain data concerning educator preparation programs and 31 their quality, educator certification, educator employment trends and 32 needs, and other data deemed relevant by the board;

(11) Serve as an advisory body to the superintendent of public instruction on issues related to educator recruitment, hiring, mentoring and support, professional growth, retention, educator evaluation including but not limited to peer evaluation, and revocation and suspension of licensure;

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1 (12) Submit, by October 15th of each even-numbered year, a joint 2 report with the state board of education to the legislative education 3 committees, the governor, and the superintendent of public instruction. 4 The report shall address the progress the boards have made and the 5 obstacles they have encountered, individually and collectively, in the 6 work of achieving the goals set out in RCW 28A.150.210;

(13) Establish the prospective teacher assessment system for basic
skills and subject knowledge that shall be required to obtain residency
certification pursuant to RCW 28A.410.220 through 28A.410.240; ((and))

10 (14) By January 2010, set performance standards and develop, pilot, 11 and implement a uniform and externally administered professional-level 12 certification assessment based on demonstrated teaching skill. In the 13 development of this assessment, consideration shall be given to changes 14 in professional certification program components such as the 15 culminating seminar; and

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16 (15) Conduct meetings under the provisions of chapter 42.30 RCW.

17 **Sec. 2.** RCW 28A.410.220 and 2002 c 92 s 2 are each amended to read 18 as follows:

19 (1)(a) Beginning not later than September 1, 2001, the Washington 20 professional educator standards board shall make available and pilot a 21 means of assessing an applicant's knowledge in the basic skills. For the purposes of this section, "basic skills" means the subjects of at 22 23 least reading, writing, and mathematics. Beginning September 1, 2002, 24 except as provided in (c) of this subsection and subsection  $\left(\left(\frac{(3)}{(3)}\right)\right)$  (4) of this section, passing this assessment shall be required for 25 26 admission to approved teacher preparation programs and for persons from 27 out-of-state applying for a Washington state residency teaching certificate. 28

(b) On an individual student basis, approved teacher preparation programs may admit into their programs a candidate who has not achieved the minimum basic skills assessment score established by the Washington professional educator standards board. Individuals so admitted may not receive residency certification without passing the basic skills assessment under this section.

35 (c) The Washington professional educator standards board may 36 establish criteria to ensure that persons from out-of-state who are 37 applying for residency certification and persons applying to master's degree level teacher preparation programs can demonstrate to the board's satisfaction that they have the requisite basic skills based upon having completed another basic skills assessment acceptable to the Washington professional educator standards board or by some other alternative approved by the Washington professional educator standards board.

7 (2) <u>The professional educator standards board shall set performance</u>
8 <u>standards and develop</u>, pilot, and implement a uniform and externally
9 <u>administered professional-level certification assessment based on</u>
10 <u>demonstrated teaching skill</u>. In the development of this assessment,
11 <u>consideration shall be given to changes in professional certification</u>
12 <u>program components such as the culminating seminar</u>.

13 (3) Beginning not later than September 1, 2002, the Washington professional educator standards board shall provide for the initial 14 piloting and implementation of a means of assessing an applicant's 15 knowledge in the subjects for which the applicant has applied for an 16 17 endorsement to his or her residency or professional teaching certificate. The assessment of subject knowledge shall not include 18 instructional methodology. Beginning September 1, 2005, passing this 19 20 assessment shall be required to receive an endorsement for 21 certification purposes.

22 (((3))) (4) The Washington professional educator standards board 23 may permit exceptions from the assessment requirements under 24 subsections (1) ((and)), (2), and (3) of this section on a case-by-case 25 basis.

30 (((5))) (6) With the exception of applicants exempt from the 31 requirements of subsections (1)  $((and))_{,}$  (2), and (3) of this section, 32 an applicant must achieve a minimum assessment score or scores 33 established by the Washington professional educator standards board on 34 each of the assessments under subsections (1)  $((and))_{,}$  (2), and (3) of 35 this section.

36 (((-6))) (7) The Washington professional educator standards board 37 and superintendent of public instruction, as determined by the

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Washington professional educator standards board, may contract with one 1 2 or more third parties for:

The development, purchase, administration, scoring, 3 (a) and reporting of scores of the assessments established by the Washington 4 professional educator standards board under subsections (1) ((and)), 5 (2), and (3) of this section; 6

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(b) Related clerical and administrative activities; or

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(c) Any combination of the purposes in this subsection.

(((7))) <u>(8)</u> Applicants for admission to a Washington teacher 9 preparation program and applicants for residency and professional 10 certificates who are required to successfully complete one or more of 11 12 the assessments under subsections (1) ((and)), (2), and (3) of this 13 section, and who are charged a fee for the assessment by a third party 14 contracted with under subsection (((-6))) (7) of this section, shall pay the fee charged by the contractor directly to the contractor. 15 Such 16 fees shall be reasonably related to the actual costs of the contractor 17 in providing the assessment.

(((+8))) (9) The superintendent of public instruction is responsible 18 for supervision and providing support services to administer this 19 section. 20

21 (((9))) (10) The Washington professional educator standards board 22 shall collaboratively select or develop and implement the assessments and minimum assessment scores required under this section with the 23 24 superintendent of public instruction and shall provide opportunities 25 for representatives of other interested educational organizations to participate in the selection or development and implementation of such 26 27 assessments in a manner deemed appropriate by the Washington professional educator standards board. 28

(((10))) (11) The Washington professional educator standards board 29 shall adopt rules under chapter 34.05 RCW that are reasonably necessary 30 for the effective and efficient implementation of this section. 31

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
