3 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature finds that the state institutions of higher education are providing a high quality education 4 to the citizens of the state. The legislature further finds that to 5 6 meet goals of the strategic master plan for higher education the state needs a higher education system that is capable of delivering many more 7 8 The legislature also finds that expansion of the system degrees. 9 should be based on the proven demands of the citizens and the 10 marketplace, a concept called "expand on demand." The legislature 11 further finds that the higher education coordinating board, in 12 collaboration with the state board for community and technical 13 colleges, the two-year and four-year institutions of higher education, and other stakeholders developed a system design plan that contains 14 15 seven guiding principles for system expansion, focuses near-term 16 enrollment growth at university branch campuses, comprehensive 17 universities, and university centers where existing capacity is available without new state capital investment, establishes a process 18 19 for evaluating major new capital expansion, and creates a fund for 20 innovation to foster change and innovation in higher education The legislature finds that the strategies in the plan 21 delivery. support the concept of expand on demand and would increase degree 22 23 production by first reinvesting in higher education to use existing 24 capacity while also providing long-term strategies to guide decisions 25 on when and where to build new campuses, significantly expand existing 26 sites, and change missions of existing institutions.

The legislature endorses the system design plan, approved by the higher education coordinating board in November 2009, and adopts the recommendations and strategies in the plan. 1 Sec. 2. RCW 28B.50.020 and 2009 c 64 s 2 are each amended to read
2 as follows:

3 The purpose of this chapter is to provide for the dramatically 4 increasing number of students requiring high standards of education 5 either as a part of the continuing higher education program or for 6 occupational education and training, or for adult basic skills and 7 literacy education, by creating a new, independent system of community 8 and technical colleges which will:

9 (1) Offer an open door to every citizen, regardless of his or her 10 academic background or experience, at a cost normally within his or her 11 economic means;

(2) Ensure that each college district shall offer thoroughly 12 13 comprehensive educational, training, and service programs to meet the needs of both the communities and students served by combining high 14 standards of excellence in academic transfer courses; realistic and 15 practical courses in occupational education, both graded and ungraded; 16 community services of an educational, cultural, and recreational 17 nature; and adult education, including basic skills and general, 18 family, and workforce literacy programs and services; 19

(3) Provide for basic skills and literacy education, and
 occupational education and technical training at technical colleges in
 order to prepare students for careers in a competitive workforce;

(4) Provide or coordinate related and supplemental instruction for
 apprentices at community and technical colleges;

(5) Provide administration by state and local boards which will avoid unnecessary duplication of facilities or programs; and which will encourage efficiency in operation and creativity and imagination in education, training, and service to meet the needs of the community and students;

(6) Allow for the growth, improvement, flexibility and modification
 of the community colleges and their education, training, and service
 programs as future needs occur; and

(7) Establish firmly that((, except on a pilot basis)) as provided under RCW 28B.50.810, community colleges are, for purposes of academic training, two year institutions, and are an independent, unique, and vital section of our state's higher education system, separate from both the common school system and other institutions of higher 1 learning((, and never to be considered for conversion into four-year

2 liberal arts colleges)).

3 Sec. 3. RCW 28B.50.810 and 2008 c 166 s 2 are each amended to read 4 as follows:

5 (1) ((By April 2006,)) The college board ((shall)) may select ((four)) community or technical colleges to develop and offer programs б 7 of study leading to ((an)) applied baccalaureate degrees. ((At least one of the four pilot programs chosen must lead to a baccalaureate of 8 9 applied science degree which builds on an associate of applied science 10 degree. The college board shall convene a task force that includes 11 representatives of both the community and technical colleges to develop 12 objective selection criteria.

13 (2) By February 2008, the college board shall select up to three 14 colleges to develop and offer programs of study leading to an applied 15 baccalaureate degree. At least one of the colleges selected must be a 16 technical college. The college board shall use the objective selection 17 criteria developed under subsections (1) and (3) of this section to 18 make the selection.

19 (3)) Colleges may submit ((an)) applications to ((become a pilot 20 college under this section)) the college board. The college board and 21 the higher education coordinating board shall review the applications 22 and select the ((pilot)) colleges using objective criteria, including, 23 but not limited to:

(a) The college demonstrates the capacity to make a long-termcommitment of resources to build and sustain a high quality program;

(b) The college has or can readily engage faculty appropriately qualified to develop and deliver a high quality curriculum at the baccalaureate level;

(c) The college can demonstrate demand for the proposed program from a sufficient number of students within its service area to make the program cost-effective and feasible to operate;

32 (d) The college can demonstrate that employers demand the level of 33 technical training proposed within the program, making it cost-34 effective for students to seek the degree; and

35 (e) The proposed program fills a gap in options available for 36 students because it is not offered by a public four-year institution of 37 higher education in the college's geographic area.

(((4))) (2) A college selected ((as a pilot college)) under this 1 2 section may develop the curriculum for and design and deliver courses leading to an applied baccalaureate degree. However, degree programs 3 4 developed under this section are subject to approval by the college board under RCW 28B.50.090 and by the higher education coordinating 5 6 board under RCW 28B.76.230 before a ((pilot)) college may enroll students in upper division courses. ((A pilot college approved under 7 8 subsection (1) of this section may not enroll students in upper division courses before the fall academic quarter of 2006. A pilot 9 college approved under subsection (2) of this section may not enroll 10 11 students in upper division courses before the fall academic quarter of 12 $\frac{2009.}{}))$

13 Sec. 4. RCW 28B.76.020 and 1985 c 370 s 2 are each amended to read 14 as follows:

15 ((For the purposes of this chapter:)) The definitions in this 16 section apply throughout this chapter unless the context clearly 17 requires otherwise.

(1) "Board" means the higher education coordinating board((; and)).
 (2) "Four-year institutions" means the University of Washington,
 Washington State University, Central Washington University, Eastern
 Washington University, Western Washington University, and The Evergreen
 State College.

23 (3) "Major expansion" means expansion of the higher education 24 system that requires significant new capital investment, including 25 building new institutions, campuses, branches, or centers or conversion 26 of existing campuses, branches, or centers that would result in a 27 mission change.

(4) "Mission change" means a change in the level of degree awarded
 or institutional type not currently authorized in statute.

30 **Sec. 5.** RCW 28B.76.230 and 2005 c 258 s 11 are each amended to 31 read as follows:

(1) The board shall develop a comprehensive and ongoing assessment
 process to analyze the need for additional degrees and programs,
 additional off-campus centers and locations for degree programs, and
 consolidation or elimination of programs by the four-year institutions.
 <u>Board recommendations regarding proposed major expansion shall be</u>

limited to determinations of whether the major expansion is within the scope indicated in the most recent strategic master plan for higher education or most recent system design plan. Recommendations regarding existing capital prioritization processes are not within the scope of the evaluation of major expansion. Major expansion and proposed mission changes may be proposed by the board, any public institution of higher education, or by a state or local government.

8 (2) As part of the needs assessment process, the board shall 9 examine:

10 (a) Projections of student, employer, and community demand for 11 education and degrees, including liberal arts degrees, on a regional 12 and statewide basis;

(b) Current and projected degree programs and enrollment at public and private institutions of higher education, by location and mode of service delivery; ((and))

16 (c) Data from the workforce training and education coordinating 17 board and the state board for community and technical colleges on the 18 supply and demand for workforce education and certificates and 19 associate degrees <u>; and</u>

(d) Recommendations from the technology transformation task force 20 created in chapter 407, Laws of 2009, and institutions of higher 21 22 education relative to the strategic and operational use of technology in higher education. These and other reports, reviews, and audits 23 24 shall allow for: The development of enterprise-wide digital information technology across educational sectors, systems, and 25 26 delivery methods; the integration and streamlining of administrative 27 tools including but not limited to student information management, financial management, payroll, human resources, data collection, 28 reporting, and analysis; and a determination of the costs of multiple 29 30 technology platforms, systems, and models.

(3) Every two years the board shall produce, jointly with the state 31 32 board for community and technical colleges and the workforce training and education coordinating board, an assessment of the number and type 33 of higher education and training credentials required to match employer 34 35 demand for a skilled and educated workforce. The assessment shall 36 include the number of forecasted net job openings at each level of 37 higher education and training and the number of credentials needed to match the forecast of net job openings. 38

1 (4) The board shall determine whether certain major lines of study 2 or types of degrees, including applied degrees or research-oriented 3 degrees, shall be assigned uniquely to some institutions or 4 institutional sectors in order to create centers of excellence that 5 focus resources and expertise.

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(5) The following activities are subject to approval by the board:

(a) New degree programs by a four-year institution;

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(b) Creation of any off-campus program by a four-year institution;

9 (c) Purchase or lease of major off-campus facilities by a four-year 10 institution or a community or technical college;

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(d) Creation of higher education centers and consortia;

12 (e) New degree programs and creation of off-campus programs by an 13 independent college or university in collaboration with a community or 14 technical college; and

15 (f) Applied baccalaureate degree programs developed by colleges 16 under RCW 28B.50.810.

17 (6) Institutions seeking board approval under this section must 18 demonstrate that the proposal is justified by the needs assessment 19 developed under this section. Institutions must also demonstrate how 20 the proposals align with or implement the statewide strategic master 21 plan for higher education under RCW 28B.76.200.

(7) The board shall develop clear guidelines and objective decision-making criteria regarding approval of proposals under this section, which must include review and consultation with the institution and other interested agencies and individuals.

(8) The board shall periodically recommend consolidation or
 elimination of programs at the four-year institutions, based on the
 needs assessment analysis.

(9) In the case of a proposed major expansion or mission change, 29 the needs assessment process under subsection (2) of this section 30 constitutes a threshold inquiry. If the board determines that the need 31 for the proposed major expansion or mission change has not been 32 justified, the inquiry is concluded. If the board determines that the 33 need for the proposed major expansion or mission change has been 34 sufficiently established, the board, in consultation with any directly 35 36 involved institutions and other interested agencies and individuals, shall proceed to examine the viability of the proposal using criteria 37 including, but not limited to: 38

1	(a) The specific scope of the project including the capital
2	investment requirements, the number of full-time equivalent students
3	anticipated, and the number of academic programs planned;
4	(b) The existence of an efficient and sustainable financial plan;
5	(c) The extent to which existing resources can be leveraged;
6	<u>(d) The current and five-year projected student population,</u>
7	faculty, and staff to support the proposed programs, institution, or
8	innovation;
9	<u>(e) The plans to accommodate expected growth over a twenty-year</u>
10	time frame;
11	(f) The extent to which new or existing partnerships and
12	collaborations are a part of the proposal; and
13	<u>(g) The feasibility of any proposed innovations to accelerate</u>
14	degree production.
15	(10) After the board completes its evaluation of the proposed major
16	expansion or mission change using the needs assessment under subsection
17	(2) of this section and viability determination under subsection (9) of
18	this section, the board shall make a recommendation to either proceed,
19	modify, or not proceed with the proposed major expansion or mission
20	change. The board's recommendation shall be presented to the governor
21	and the legislature.

22 **Sec. 6.** RCW 28B.120.005 and 1999 c 169 s 2 are each amended to 23 read as follows:

The legislature finds that encouraging collaboration among the 24 25 various educational sectors to meet statewide productivity and 26 educational attainment needs as described in the system design plan developed by the higher education coordinating board will strengthen 27 28 the entire educational system, kindergarten through twelfth grade and 29 higher education. The legislature also recognizes that the most effective way to develop innovative and collaborative programs is to 30 31 encourage institutions to develop them voluntarily, in line with 32 established state goals. Through a system of competitive grants, the 33 legislature shall encourage the development of innovative and collaborative and cost-effective solutions to issues of critical 34 35 statewide need, including:

36 (1) <u>Raising educational attainment and planning and piloting</u> 37 <u>innovative initiatives to reach new locations and populations;</u> (2) Recognizing needs of special populations of students, including
 access and completion efforts targeting underrepresented populations;

3 (((2))) (3) Furthering the development of learner-centered, 4 technology-assisted course delivery, including expansion of online and 5 hybrid coursework, open courseware, and other uses of technology in 6 order to effectively and efficiently share costs, improve the quality 7 of instruction and student, faculty, and administrative services, 8 increase undergraduate and graduate student access, retention, and 9 graduation, and to enhance transfer capability;

10 (((3))) (4) Furthering the development of competency-based 11 measurements of student achievement to be used as the basis for 12 awarding degrees and certificates; ((and

13 (4))) (5) Increasing the collaboration among both public and 14 private sector institutions of higher education; and

15 (6) Improving productivity through innovations such as accelerated 16 programs and alternative scheduling.

17 Sec. 7. RCW 28B.120.010 and 1999 c 169 s 5 are each amended to 18 read as follows:

The Washington fund for innovation and quality in higher education 19 20 program is established. The higher education coordinating board shall 21 administer the program ((for the purpose of awarding grants in which a 22 four-year institution of higher education is named as the lead 23 institution. The state board for community and technical colleges 24 shall administer the program for the purpose of awarding grants in 25 which a community or technical college is named as the lead 26 institution)) and shall work in close collaboration with the state board for community and technical colleges and other local and regional 27 Through this program the <u>higher education coordinating</u> 28 entities. 29 board((s)) may award on a competitive basis incentive grants to state public or private nonprofit institutions of higher education or 30 31 consortia of institutions to encourage ((cooperative)) programs 32 designed to address specific system problems. ((Grants shall not exceed a two-year period.)) Each institution or consortia of 33 34 institutions receiving the award shall contribute some financial 35 support, either by covering part of the costs for the program during 36 its implementation, or by assuming continuing support at the end of the 37 grant period. Strong priority will be given to proposals that involve

1 more than one sector of education((, and to proposals that show 2 substantive institutional commitment)). Institutions are encouraged to 3 solicit nonstate funds to support these cooperative programs.

4 Sec. 8. RCW 28B.120.020 and 1999 c 169 s 3 are each amended to 5 read as follows:

6 The higher education coordinating board shall have the following 7 powers and duties in administering the program for those proposals in 8 which a four-year institution of higher education is named as the lead 9 institution and fiscal agent:

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(1) To adopt rules necessary to carry out the program;

11 (2) ((To establish one or more review committees to assist in the 12 evaluation of proposals for funding. The review committee shall 13 include individuals with significant experience in higher education in 14 areas relevant to one or more of the funding period priorities and 15 shall include representatives from both the four-year and two-year 16 sectors of higher education;

17 (3)) To award grants no later than September 1st in those years
18 when funding is available by June 30th;

(((++))) (3) To establish each biennium specific guidelines for 19 20 submitting grant proposals consistent with RCW 28B.120.005 and 21 consistent with the strategic master plan for higher education, the 22 system design plan, the overall goals of the program and ((consistent 23 with)) the guidelines established by the state board for community and 24 technical colleges under RCW 28B.120.025. ((During the 1999-01) 25 biennium the guidelines shall be consistent with the following desired 26 outcomes of:

27 (a) Minority and diversity initiatives that encourage the 28 participation of minorities in higher education, including students 29 with disabilities;

30 (b) K-12 teacher preparation models that encourage collaboration 31 between higher education and K-12 to improve the preparedness of 32 teachers, including provisions for higher education faculty involved 33 with teacher preparation to spend time teaching in K-12 schools;

34 (c) Collaborative instructional programs involving K-12, community 35 and technical colleges, and four-year institutions of higher education 36 to develop a three-year degree program, or reduce the time to degree; 1 (d) Contracts with public or private institutions or businesses to
2 provide services or the development of collaborative programs;

3 (e) Articulation and transfer activities to smooth the transfer of 4 students from K-12 to higher education, or from the community colleges 5 and technical colleges to four-year institutions;

6 (f) Projects that further the development of learner-centered, 7 technology-assisted course delivery; and

8 (g) Projects that further the development of competency-based 9 measurements of student achievement to be used as the basis for 10 awarding degrees and certificates.))

11 After June 30, 2001, and each biennium thereafter, the board shall 12 determine funding priorities for ((collaborative)) proposals for the 13 biennium in consultation with the governor, the legislature, the office 14 of the superintendent of public instruction, the state board for community and technical colleges, the workforce training and education 15 board, higher education institutions, 16 coordinating educational associations, and business and community groups consistent with 17 statewide needs; 18

19 (((5))) <u>(4)</u> To solicit grant proposals and provide information to 20 the institutions of higher education about the program; and

21 (((-6))) (5) To establish reporting, evaluation, accountability, 22 monitoring, and dissemination requirements for the recipients of the 23 grants awarded by the higher education coordinating board.

24 **Sec. 9.** RCW 43.88D.010 and 2008 c 205 s 2 are each amended to read 25 as follows:

26 (1) By October ((15th)) 1st of each even-numbered year, the office of financial management shall complete an objective analysis and 27 scoring of all capital budget projects proposed by the public four-year 28 29 institutions of higher education and submit the results of the scoring process to the legislative fiscal committees, the higher education 30 31 coordinating board, and the four-year institutions((, except that, for 2008, the office of financial management shall complete the objective 32 analysis and scoring by November 1st)). Each project must be reviewed 33 34 and scored within one of the following categories, according to the 35 project's principal purpose. Each project may be scored in only one category. The categories are: 36

(a) Access-related projects to accommodate enrollment growth at 1 2 main and branch campuses, at existing or new university centers, or through distance learning. Growth projects should provide significant 3 4 additional student capacity. Proposed projects must demonstrate that solid enrollment demand projections, 5 they are based on more 6 cost-effectively provide enrollment access than alternatives such as university centers and distance learning, and make cost-effective use 7 8 of existing and proposed new space;

9 (b) Projects that replace failing permanent buildings ((or renovate 10 facilities to restore building life and upgrade space to meet current program requirements)). Facilities that cannot be economically 11 12 renovated are considered replacement projects. ((Renovation projects should represent a complete renovation of a total facility or an 13 isolated wing of a facility. A reasonable renovation project should 14 cost between sixty to eighty percent of current replacement value and 15 restore the renovated area to at least twenty-five years of useful 16 17 life.)) New space may be programmed for the same or a different use than the space being replaced ((or renovated)) and may include 18 19 additions to improve access and enhance the relationship of program or support space; 20

21 (c) Projects that renovate facilities to restore building life and upgrade space to meet current program requirements. Renovation 22 projects should represent a complete renovation of a total facility or 23 24 an isolated wing of a facility. A reasonable renovation project should cost between sixty to eighty percent of current replacement value and 25 26 restore the renovated area to at least twenty-five years of useful 27 life. New space may be programmed for the same or a different use than the space being renovated and may include additions to improve access 28 and enhance the relationship of program or support space; 29

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<u>(d)</u> Major stand-alone campus infrastructure projects;

31 (((d))) <u>(e)</u> Projects that promote economic growth and innovation 32 through expanded research activity. The acquisition and installation 33 of specialized equipment is authorized under this category; and

34 (((e))) <u>(f)</u> Other project categories as determined by the office of 35 financial management in consultation with the legislative fiscal 36 committees.

37 (2) The office of financial management, in consultation with the
 38 legislative fiscal committees ((and the joint legislative audit and

1 review committee)), shall establish a scoring system and process for 2 each four-year project category that is based on the framework used in 3 the community and technical college system of prioritization. Staff 4 from the state board for community and technical colleges, the higher 5 education coordinating board, and the four-year institutions shall 6 provide technical assistance on the development of a scoring system and 7 process.

8 (3) The office of financial management shall consult with the 9 legislative fiscal committees in the scoring of four-year institution 10 project proposals, and may also solicit participation by ((the joint 11 legislative audit and review committee and)) independent experts.

12 (a) For each four-year project category, the scoring system must, 13 а minimum, include an evaluation of enrollment at trends, reasonableness of cost, the ability of the project to enhance specific 14 strategic master plan goals, age and condition of the facility if 15 applicable, and impact on space utilization. 16

(b) Each four-year project category may include projects at thepredesign, design, or construction funding phase.

(c) To the extent possible, the objective analysis and scoring system of all capital budget projects shall occur within the context of any and all performance agreements between the office of financial management and the governing board of a public, four-year institution of higher education that aligns goals, priorities, desired outcomes, flexibility, institutional mission, accountability, and levels of resources.

26 (4) In evaluating and scoring four-year institution projects, the 27 office of financial management shall take into consideration project 28 schedules that result in realistic, balanced, and predictable 29 expenditure patterns over the ensuing three biennia.

30 (5) The office of financial management shall distribute common definitions, the scoring system, and other information required for the 31 32 project proposal and scoring process as part of its biennial budget instructions((, except that, for the 2009-2011 budget development 33 cycle, this information must be distributed by July 1, 2008)). 34 The 35 office of financial management, in consultation with the legislative 36 fiscal committees ((and the joint legislative audit and review 37 committee)), shall develop common definitions that four-year

institutions must use in developing their project proposals and lists
 under this section.

3 (6) In developing any scoring system for capital projects proposed4 by the four-year institutions, the office of financial management:

5 (a) Shall be provided with all required information by the four-6 year institutions as deemed necessary by the office of financial 7 management;

8 (b) May utilize independent services to verify, sample, or evaluate 9 information provided to the office of financial management by the four-10 year institutions; and

(c) Shall have full access to all data maintained by the higher education coordinating board and the joint legislative audit and review committee concerning the condition of higher education facilities.

(7) By August ((15th)) 1st of each even-numbered year((, beginning 14 in 2008,)) each public four-year higher education institution shall 15 prepare and submit prioritized lists of the individual projects 16 proposed by the institution for the ensuing six-year period in each 17 18 category. ((On a pilot basis, the office of financial management shall 19 require one research university to prepare two separate prioritized lists for each category, one for the main campus, and one covering all 20 21 of the institution's branch campuses. The office of financial management shall report to the legislative fiscal committees by 22 December 1, 2009, on the effect of this pilot project on capital 23 24 project financing for all branch campuses.)) The lists must be submitted to the office of financial management and the legislative 25 26 fiscal committees. The four-year institutions may aggregate minor 27 works project proposals by primary purpose for ranking purposes. Proposed minor works projects must be prioritized within the aggregated 28 proposal, and supporting documentation, including project descriptions 29 30 and cost estimates, must be provided to the office of financial 31 management and the legislative fiscal committees.

32 **Sec. 10.** RCW 28B.76.210 and 2008 c 205 s 4 are each amended to 33 read as follows:

(1) The board shall collaborate with the four-year institutions
 including the council of presidents, the community and technical
 college system, and when appropriate the workforce training and
 education coordinating board, the superintendent of public instruction,

and the independent higher educational institutions to identify budget priorities and levels of funding for higher education, including the two and four-year institutions of higher education and state financial aid programs. It is the intent of the legislature that recommendations from the board reflect not merely the sum of budget requests from multiple institutions, but prioritized funding needs for the overall system of higher education.

8 (2) By December of each odd-numbered year, the board shall 9 distribute guidelines which outline the board's fiscal priorities to 10 the institutions and the state board for community and technical 11 colleges.

12 (a) The institutions and the state board for community and 13 technical colleges shall submit an outline of their proposed operating budgets to the board no later than July 1st of each even-numbered year. 14 Pursuant to guidelines developed by the board, operating budget 15 outlines submitted by the institutions and the state board for 16 community and technical colleges after January 1, 2007, shall include 17 18 all policy changes and enhancements that will be requested by the 19 institutions and the state board for community and technical colleges in their respective biennial budget requests. Operating budget 20 21 outlines shall include a description of each policy enhancement, the 22 dollar amount requested, and the fund source being requested.

(b) Capital budget outlines for the two-year institutions shall be submitted by August 15th of each even-numbered year, and shall include the prioritized ranking of the capital projects being requested, a description of each capital project, and the amount and fund source being requested.

(c) Capital budget outlines for the four-year institutions must be submitted by August 15th of each even-numbered year, and must include: The institutions' priority ranking of the project; the capital budget category within which the project will be submitted to the office of financial management in accordance with RCW 43.88D.010; a description of each capital project; and the amount and fund source being requested.

35 (d) The office of financial management shall reference these36 reporting requirements in its budget instructions.

37 (3) The board shall review and evaluate the operating and capital38 budget requests from four-year institutions and the community and

technical college system based on how the requests align with the board's budget priorities, the missions of the institutions, and the statewide strategic master plan for higher education under RCW 28B.76.200.

5 (4) The board shall submit recommendations on the proposed 6 operating budget and priorities to the office of financial management 7 by October 1st of each even-numbered year, and to the legislature by 8 January 1st of each odd-numbered year.

9 (5) The board's capital budget recommendations for the community and technical college system and the four-year institutions must be 10 11 submitted to the office of financial management ((by November 15th of 12 each even-numbered year)) and to the legislature by ((January 1st of each odd-numbered)) November 15th of each even-numbered year. 13 The board's recommendations for the four-year institutions must include 14 15 ((the relative share of the higher education capital budget that the board recommends be assigned to each project category, as defined in 16 RCW 43.88D.010, and to minor works program and preservation)) a single, 17 prioritized list of the major projects that the board recommends be 18 19 funded with state bond and building account appropriations during the 20 forthcoming fiscal biennium. In developing this single prioritized 21 list, the board shall:

(a) Seek to identify the combination of projects that will most cost-effectively achieve the state's goals. These goals include increasing baccalaureate and graduate degree production, particularly in high-demand fields; promoting economic development through research and innovation; providing quality, affordable educational environments; preserving existing assets; and maximizing the efficient utilization of instructional space;

29 (b) Be guided by the objective analysis and scoring of capital 30 budget projects completed by the office of financial management 31 pursuant to chapter 43.88D RCW;

32 (c) Anticipate (i) that state bond and building account 33 appropriations continue at the same level during each of the two 34 subsequent fiscal biennia as has actually been appropriated for the 35 baccalaureate institutions during the current one; (ii) that major 36 projects funded for design during a biennium are funded for 37 construction during the subsequent one before state appropriations are 38 provided for new major projects; and (iii) that minor health, safety, 1 code, and preservation projects are funded at the same average level as 2 in recent biennia before state appropriations are provided for new 3 major projects.

4 (((5))) (6) Institutions and the state board for community and 5 technical colleges shall submit any supplemental budget requests and 6 revisions to the board at the same time they are submitted to the 7 office of financial management. The board shall submit recommendations 8 on the proposed supplemental budget requests to the office of financial 9 management by November 1st and to the legislature by January 1st.

10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 11. A new section is added to chapter 28B.20
11 RCW to read as follows:

12 (1) This section provides an alternative process for awarding 13 contracts for construction, building, renovation, remodeling, 14 alteration, repair, or improvement of university buildings and facilities in which critical patient care or highly specialized medical 15 16 research is located. These provisions may be used, in lieu of other procedures to award contracts for such work, when the estimated cost of 17 the work is equal to or less than five million dollars and the project 18 involves construction, renovation, remodeling, or alteration of 19 20 improvements within a building that is used directly for critical 21 patient care or highly specialized medical research.

22 (2) The university may create a single critical patient care or 23 specialized medical research facilities roster or may create multiple 24 critical patient care or specialized medical research facilities 25 rosters for different trade specialties or categories of anticipated 26 work. At least once a year, the university shall publish in a newspaper of general circulation a notice of the existence of the 27 roster or rosters and solicit a statement of qualifications from 28 29 contractors who wish to be on the roster or rosters of prime contractors. In addition, qualified contractors shall be added to the 30 31 roster or rosters at any time they submit a written request, necessary records, and meet the qualifications established by the university. 32 The university may require eligible contractors desiring to be placed 33 34 on a roster to keep current records of any applicable licenses, 35 certifications, registrations, bonding, insurance, or other appropriate 36 matters on file with the university as a condition of being placed on

1 a roster or rosters. Placement on a roster shall be on the basis of 2 qualifications.

3 (3) The public solicitation of qualifications shall include but not 4 be limited to:

(a) A description of the types of projects to be completed and 5 where possible may include programmatic, performance, and technical б 7 requirements and specifications;

8 (b) The reasons for using the critical patient care and specialized medical research roster process; 9

10 (c) A description of the qualifications to be required of a contractor, including submission of an accident prevention program; 11

12 (d) A description of the process the university will use to 13 evaluate qualifications, including evaluation factors and the relative 14 weight of factors;

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(e) The form of the contract to be awarded;

(f) A description of the administrative process by which the 16 17 required qualifications, evaluation process, and project types may be appealed; and 18

(g) A description of the administrative process by which decisions 19 20 of the university may be appealed.

21 (4) The university shall establish a committee to evaluate the contractors submitting qualifications. Evaluation criteria for 22 23 selection of the contractor or contractors to be included on a roster 24 shall include, but not be limited to:

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(a) Ability of a contractor's professional personnel;

26 (b) A contractor's past performance on similar projects, including but not limited to medical facilities, and involving either negotiated 27 28 work or other public works contracts;

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(c) The contractor's ability to meet time and budget requirements;

30 (d) The contractor's ability to provide preconstruction services, 31 as appropriate;

32 (e) The contractor's capacity to successfully complete the project;

(f) The contractor's approach to executing projects; 33

34 (g) The contractor's approach to safety and the contractor's safety 35 history; and

36 (h) The contractor's record of performance, integrity, judgment, 37 and skills.

(5) Contractors meeting the evaluation committee's criteria for
 selection must be placed on the applicable roster or rosters.

(6) When a project is selected for delivery through this roster 3 4 process, the university must establish a procedure for securing written quotations from all contractors on a roster to assure that a 5 competitive price is established. Invitations for quotations shall б include an estimate of the scope and nature of the work to be performed 7 8 as well as materials and equipment to be furnished. Plans and specifications must be included in the invitation but may not be 9 detailed. Award of a project must be made to the responsible bidder 10 11 submitting the lowest responsive bid.

(7) The university shall make an effort to solicit proposals from
 certified minority or certified woman-owned contractors to the extent
 permitted by the Washington state civil rights act, RCW 49.60.400.

15 (8) Beginning in September 2010 and every other year thereafter, 16 the university shall provide a report to the capital projects advisory 17 review board which must, at a minimum, include a list of rosters used, 18 contracts awarded, and a description of outreach to and participation 19 by women and minority-owned businesses.

20 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 12. A new section is added to chapter 43.131 21 RCW to read as follows:

The alternative process for awarding contracts established in section 11 of this act terminates June 30, 2015, as provided in section 13 of this act.

25 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 13. A new section is added to chapter 43.131
26 RCW to read as follows:

27 Section 11 of this act, as now existing or hereafter amended, is 28 repealed, effective June 30, 2016."
