"NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature finds that institutions of higher education are key to the future employment opportunities of Washington citizens and to the economic well-being of the state. The legislature further finds that current student financial aid programs are underfunded and subject to the unpredictability of the state budget. It is the intent of the legislature to direct a portion of lottery account moneys toward stabilizing and increasing existing resources for opportunity grants, get ready for math and science scholarships, passport to college scholarships, college bound scholarships, the state work study program, the state need grant, Washington scholars awards, and the Washington award for vocational excellence.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 28B.76
18 RCW to read as follows:

The Washington opportunity pathways account is created in the state treasury. Expenditures from the account may be used only for programs in chapter 28B.12 RCW (state work-study), chapter 28B.50 RCW (opportunity grant), RCW 28B.76.660 (Washington scholars award), RCW 28B.76.670 (Washington award for vocational excellence), chapter 28B.92 RCW (state need grant program), chapter 28B.105 RCW (GET ready for math and science scholarship), chapter 28B.117 RCW (passport to college promise), and 28B.118 RCW (college bound scholarship).

- 2 Sec. 3. RCW 67.70.240 and 2009 c 500 s 11 and 2009 c 479 s 44
- 3 are each reenacted and amended to read as follows:
- 4 The moneys in the state lottery account shall be used only:
- 5 (1) For the payment of prizes to the holders of winning lottery 6 tickets or shares;
- 7 (2) For purposes of making deposits into the reserve account
- 8 created by RCW 67.70.250 and into the lottery administrative account
- 9 created by RCW 67.70.260;
- 10 (3) For purposes of making deposits into the education
- 11 construction fund created in RCW 43.135.045 and the Washington
- 12 opportunity pathways account. On and after July 1, 2004, all
- 13 deposits not otherwise obligated under this section shall be
- 14 deposited as follows: (a) fifty-four million dollars shall be placed
- 15 in the education construction fund and (b) any remaining moneys
- 16 shall be placed in the Washington opportunity pathways account.
- 17 Moneys in the state lottery account deposited in the education
- 18 construction fund and the Washington opportunity pathways account
- 19 are included in "general state revenues" under RCW 39.42.070;
- 20 (4) For distribution to a county for the purpose of paying the
- 21 principal and interest payments on bonds issued by the county to
- 22 construct a baseball stadium, as defined in RCW 82.14.0485,
- 23 including reasonably necessary preconstruction costs. Three million
- 24 dollars shall be distributed under this subsection during calendar
- 25 year 1996. During subsequent years, such distributions shall equal
- 26 the prior year's distributions increased by four percent.
- 27 Distributions under this subsection shall cease when the bonds
- 28 issued for the construction of the baseball stadium are retired, but
- 29 not more than twenty years after the tax under RCW 82.14.0485 is
- 30 first imposed;
- 31 (5) For distribution to the stadium and exhibition center
- 32 account, created in RCW 43.99N.060. Subject to the conditions of RCW
- 33 19 43.99N.070, six million dollars shall be distributed under this
- 34 subsection during the calendar year 1998. During subsequent years,

- 1 such distribution shall equal the prior year's distributions
- 2 increased by four percent. No distribution may be made under this
- 3 subsection after December 31, 1999, unless the conditions for

- 15 **Sec. 4.** RCW 67.70.340 and 2009 c 576 s 2 and 2009 c 479 s 45 are
- 16 each reenacted and amended to read as follows:
- 17 (1) The legislature recognizes that creating a shared game lottery
- 18 could result in less revenue being raised by the existing state
- 19 lottery ticket sales. The legislature further recognizes that the
- 20 fund most impacted by this potential event is the education
- 21 construction account. Therefore, it is the intent of the legislature
- 22 to use some of the proceeds from the shared game lottery to make up
- 23 the difference that the potential state lottery revenue loss would
- 24 have on the education construction account. The legislature further
- 25 intends to use some of the proceeds from the shared game lottery to
- 26 fund programs and services related to problem and pathological
- 27 gambling.
- 28 (2) The education construction account is expected to receive
- 29 ((one hundred two)) fifty-four million dollars annually and the
- 30 Washington opportunity pathways account is expected to receive forty-
- 31 eight million dollars annually from state lottery games other than the
- 32 shared game lottery. For fiscal year 2003 and thereafter, if the
- 33 amount of lottery revenues earmarked for the education construction
- 34 account is less than ((one hundred two)) fifty-four million dollars

- 1 and the amount of lottery revenues earmarked for the Washington
- 2 opportunity pathways account is less than forty-eight million dollars,
- 3 the commission, after making the transfer required under subsection
- 4 (3) of this section, must transfer sufficient moneys from revenues
- 5 derived from the shared game lottery into the education construction
- 6 account to bring the total revenue up to ((one hundred two)) fifty-
- 7 four million dollars and into the Washington opportunity pathways
- 8 account to bring the total revenue up to forty-eight million dollars.
- 9 (3)(a) The commission shall transfer, from revenue derived from
- 10 the shared game lottery, to the problem gambling account created in
- 11 RCW 43.20A.892, an amount equal to the percentage specified in (b) of
- 12 this subsection of net receipts. For purposes of this subsection,
- 13 "net receipts" means the difference between (i) revenue received from
- 14 the sale of lottery tickets or shares and revenue received from the
- 15 sale of shared game lottery tickets or shares; and (ii) the sum of

- 18 problem gambling account is one-tenth of one percent. In fiscal year

- 27 (5) The remaining net revenues, if any, in the shared game lottery

- 32 NEW SECTION. Sec. 5. In consultation with independent experts
- 33 and in collaboration with the higher education coordinating board, the
- 34 state lottery commission shall upon the effective date of this act

1 develop and begin implementation of a strategy and plan for actively 2 marketing the state lottery as an essential contributor to higher 3 education. The commission shall report to the appropriate committees 4 of the legislature on the key messages, components, performance 5 objectives, and anticipated revenue impacts of the strategy by 6 December 1, 2010.

- 8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 6.** The joint legislative audit and review 9 committee shall conduct a review of marketing and vendor expenditures 10 and incentive payment programs at the state lottery commission to 11 identify cost savings and efficiencies to maximize contributions to 12 beneficiaries under this act. This review shall include examination 13 of the following:
- (1) The expenditures at the state lottery commission related to 15 marketing and vendors compared with ticket sales. This review shall 16 include an analysis of: Marketing expenses for fiscal years 2005 to 17 2010 and the impact on ticket sales; the impact to sales of tickets 18 from the change in lottery beneficiaries provided in this act from the 19 education construction fund to the Washington opportunity pathways 20 account; and the competitive bidding process for vendors in In its final report on this subject, due to the 22 legislature by November 2010, the joint legislative audit and review 23 committee shall provide: A description of the competitive contracting 24 processes for marketing services and vendors, and any marketing 25 programs or expenditures funded through the lottery administrative 26 account; an all-state survey of marketing and vendor contractors for 27 other state lotteries; identification of whether there are duplicative 28 or unproductive marketing activities; identification of whether 29 savings may occur from changing vendors; and an analysis of marketing 30 expenses and ticket sales for fiscal year 2000 through the months of 31 fiscal year 2011 for which data are available.
- 32 (2) The incentive payment program for employees at the state 33 lottery commission. This review shall include an analysis of the 34 state's laws, policies, procedures, and practices as they relate to

- 1 incentive payments. In its final report on this subject, due to the
- 2 legislature by November 2010, the joint legislative audit and review
- 3 committee shall provide: A description of how the incentive payment
- 4 program at the state lottery commission operates, and comparison to
- 5 best practices for outcome-based performance payments."

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7 Correct the title.

EFFECT: Strikes all provisions of the underlying bill and replaces them with the following:

- Expresses legislative intent to use a portion of lottery account revenue for stabilizing and increasing funding for higher education student financial aid.
- Creates the Washington Opportunity Pathways account. Funding from the account may only be used for the State Work Study, Opportunity Grant, Washington Scholars, Washington Award for Vocational Excellence, State Need Grant, GET Ready for Math and Science, Passport to College, and College Bound programs.
- Provides that of all net lottery revenue not otherwise obligated for paying lottery administration, lottery prizes, debt service on Safeco Stadium, or Qwest Field and Exhibition Center, and gambling education, \$54 million dollars is to be deposited in the Education Construction Account and \$48 million dollars is to be deposited into the Washington Opportunity Pathways Account.
- Requires that additional net revenues from shared lottery games that were previously directed to the state general fund are now directed to the Washington Opportunity Pathway Account.
- Requires the Lottery Commission, in consultation with independent experts and the Higher Education Coordinating Board, to implement strategies to actively market the state lottery as an essential contributor to Washington higher education programs.
- Requires the Lottery Commission to report to the appropriate committees of the Legislature on key components, performance objectives, and anticipated revenue impacts of the marketing strategies by December 1, 2010.
- Requires the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Committee to complete a performance review of the Lottery Commission's marketing expenditures and incentive pay structure by November 2010.

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
