Background:

The state government operates on a fiscal biennium that begins July 1 of each odd-numbered year. The 2009-11 biennial operating budget, as amended by ESHB 2921 (Chapter 3, Laws of 2010), appropriated \$31.3 billion from the State General Fund and two other accounts, referred to as Near General Fund-State. The total budgeted amount, which includes state and federal funds, is \$58.7 billion.

This analysis was prepared by non-partisan legislative staff for the use of legislative members in their deliberations. This analysis is not a part of the legislation nor does it constitute a statement of legislative intent.

Summary of Substitute Bill:

Appropriations are modified for the 2009-11 biennium. Near General Fund-State appropriations are reduced by \$318.7 million. Total budgeted funds are increased by \$1481.3 million.

Substitute Bill Compared to Original Bill:

Makes numerous changes to appropriations and other budget provisions.
