Background: When a state officer leaves office before the completion of that person's term, another person is appointed to fill that office until the next general election. Statewide general elections in odd-numbered years may only fill the remainder of unexpired terms of specific state offices. The offices are as follows:

- member of the Senate;
- member of the House of Representatives;
- Lieutenant Governor;
- Secretary of State;
- State Treasurer;
- Attorney General;
- Superintendent of Public Instruction; and
- Commissioner of Public Lands.

Summary of Bill: A person may be elected to fill the remainder of an unexpired term for the office of Governor at a general election held in an odd-numbered year.
