36	(a) Develop policies and make recommendations to the board for								
37	technical standards for state wireless radio communications systems,								

1 including emergency communications systems. The standards must 2 address, among other things, the interoperability of systems, taking 3 into account both existing and future systems and technologies;

4 (b) Coordinate and manage on behalf of the board the licensing and 5 use of state-designated and state-licensed radio frequencies, including 6 the spectrum used for public safety and emergency communications, and 7 serve as the point of contact with the federal communications 8 commission on matters relating to allocation, use, and licensing of 9 radio spectrum;

10 (c) Coordinate the purchasing of all state wireless radio 11 communications system equipment to ensure that:

12 (i) After the transition from a radio over internet protocol13 network, any new trunked system shall be, at a minimum, project-25;

14 (ii) Any new system that requires advanced digital features shall15 be, at a minimum, project-25; and

16 (iii) Any new system or equipment purchases shall be, at a minimum, 17 upgradeable to project-25;

18 (d) Seek support, including possible federal or other funding, for 19 state-sponsored wireless communications systems;

(e) Develop recommendations for legislation that may be required to
promote interoperability of state wireless communications systems;

(f) Foster cooperation and coordination among public safety and emergency response organizations;

(g) Work with wireless communications groups and associations to ensure interoperability among all public safety and emergency response wireless communications systems; and

(h) Perform such other duties as may be assigned by the board topromote interoperability of wireless communications systems.

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
