(2) \$100,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal 1 2 year 2008 is provided solely for the joint legislative audit and review committee to conduct a review of the method used to determine lease 3 4 rates for state-owned aquatic lands. The review shall include classification of current lease base and lease rates by category of use 5 such as marinas; a review of previous studies of formulas for 6 state-owned aquatic land leases; and identification of pros and cons of 7 8 alternative approaches to calculating aquatic lands lease rates. The department of community, trade, and economic development, the housing finance commission, housing authorities, 22 23 community action agencies, and local governments shall provide the 24 joint legislative audit and review committee with information necessary for the study. The joint legislative audit and review committee shall 25 26 solicit input regarding the study from interested parties, including representatives from the affordable housing advisory board, the 27 department of community, trade, and economic development, the housing 28 29 finance commission, representatives from the private rental housing 30 industry, housing authorities, community action agencies, county and city governments, and nonprofit and for-profit housing developers. 31 The 32 joint legislative audit and review committee shall present the results 33 of the study to the legislature by December 31, 2008.

(4) \$100,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2008 is provided solely for a cost analysis of the programs and activities administered by the department of fish and wildlife. In conducting the study, the committee shall specifically identify the total costs that support both hunting and fishing programs as well as

nongame programs, including appropriate shares of the agency's administrative and indirect costs. The committee shall compare the cost analysis to revenues that currently support the programs, including the level of support received from game licenses and fees. The committee shall base its analysis on available management information and shall provide the results of its analysis to the legislature by January 2008.

(13) The joint legislative audit and review committee shall develop 20 21 a framework for future efforts to quantify and analyze health care 22 spending across all sectors of the state. This effort would focus on 23 identifying the relevant types of spending in the public and private 24 sectors, the availability of information on each of those types of 25 spending, and the extent to which that available information could be 26 tracked over time. In conducting this work, the committee shall work 27 with the legislative evaluation and accountability program committee 28 and the University of Washington's institute for health metrics and 29 evaluation, as appropriate. The committee shall provide a report by 30 January 2009.

(3)(a) \$1,640,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2008, \$1,641,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2009, \$6,612,000 of the public safety and education account--state appropriation for fiscal year 2008, and \$6,612,000 of the public safety and education account--state appropriation for fiscal year 2009 are provided solely for distribution to county juvenile court administrators to fund the costs of processing truancy, children in need of services, and at-risk youth petitions. The administrator for the courts, in conjunction with the juvenile court administrators, shall develop an equitable funding distribution formula. (5) \$325,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2008 is provided solely for the completion of the juror pay pilot and research project.

(6) \$830,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2008 and \$1,170,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal year 2009 are provided solely for improving interpreter services at the trial court level.

(a) Of these amounts, \$170,000 for fiscal year 2008 and \$170,000 30 for fiscal year 2009 are provided solely to assist trial courts in 31 32 developing and implementing language assistance plans. The administrator of the courts, in consultation with the interpreter 33 34 commission, shall adopt language assistance plan standards consistent 35 with chapters 2.42 and 2.43 RCW. At the end of the fiscal year, 13 14 recipients shall report to the administrator of the court the amount the trial court spent on interpreter services. 15

(c) \$50,000 for fiscal year 2008 and \$50,000 for fiscal year 2009 16 17 are provided solely to the administrator of the courts for 18 administration of this subsection. 5 (c) The legislature respectfully requests the judicial information 6 systems committee invite representatives from the state agencies 7 dependent on successful data exchange to their regular meetings for 8 consultation as nonvoting members.

15 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 915. This act is necessary for the immediate 16 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the 17 state government and its existing public institutions, and takes effect 18 immediately.
