## SENATE BILL 6360

State of Washington 61st Legislature 2010 Regular Session

By Senators Hargrove, Keiser, Roach, and Marr

Read first time 01/13/10. Referred to Committee on Human Services & Corrections.

AN ACT Relating to establishing a program to verify the address of registered sex offenders and kidnapping offenders; amending RCW 9A.44.130 and 9A.44.135; and adding a new section to chapter 36.28A RCW.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 Sec. 1. RCW 9A.44.130 and 2008 c 230 s 1 are each amended to read 7 as follows:

(1)(a) Any adult or juvenile residing whether or not the person has 8 9 a fixed residence, or who is a student, is employed, or carries on a vocation in this state who has been found to have committed or has been 10 11 convicted of any sex offense or kidnapping offense, or who has been found not guilty by reason of insanity under chapter 10.77 RCW of 12 13 committing any sex offense or kidnapping offense, shall register with 14 the county sheriff for the county of the person's residence, or if the 15 person is not a resident of Washington, the county of the person's 16 school, or place of employment or vocation, or as otherwise specified 17 in this section. Where a person required to register under this 18 section is in custody of the state department of corrections, the state 19 department of social and health services, a local division of youth

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services, or a local jail or juvenile detention facility as a result of a sex offense or kidnapping offense, the person shall also register at the time of release from custody with an official designated by the agency that has jurisdiction over the person.

5 (b) Any adult or juvenile who is required to register under (a) of 6 this subsection:

7 (i) Who is attending, or planning to attend, a public or private 8 school regulated under Title 28A RCW or chapter 72.40 RCW shall, within 9 ten days of enrolling or prior to arriving at the school to attend 10 classes, whichever is earlier, notify the sheriff for the county of the 11 person's residence of the person's intent to attend the school, and the 12 sheriff shall promptly notify the principal of the school;

(ii) Who is admitted to a public or private institution of higher education shall, within ten days of enrolling or by the first business day after arriving at the institution, whichever is earlier, notify the sheriff for the county of the person's residence of the person's intent to attend the institution;

(iii) Who gains employment at a public or private institution of higher education shall, within ten days of accepting employment or by the first business day after commencing work at the institution, whichever is earlier, notify the sheriff for the county of the person's residence of the person's employment by the institution; or

(iv) Whose enrollment or employment at a public or private institution of higher education is terminated shall, within ten days of such termination, notify the sheriff for the county of the person's residence of the person's termination of enrollment or employment at the institution.

(c) Persons required to register under this section who are enrolled in a public or private institution of higher education on June 11, 1998, or a public or private school regulated under Title 28A RCW or chapter 72.40 RCW on September 1, 2006, must notify the county sheriff immediately.

notify 33 (d) The sheriff shall the school's principal or institution's department of public safety and shall provide that 34 35 department with the same information provided to a county sheriff under 36 subsection (3) of this section.

37 (e)(i) A principal receiving notice under this subsection must

1 disclose the information received from the sheriff under (b) of this
2 subsection as follows:

3 (A) If the student who is required to register as a sex offender is 4 classified as a risk level II or III, the principal shall provide the 5 information received to every teacher of any student required to 6 register under (a) of this subsection and to any other personnel who, 7 in the judgment of the principal, supervises the student or for 8 security purposes should be aware of the student's record;

9 (B) If the student who is required to register as a sex offender is 10 classified as a risk level I, the principal shall provide the 11 information received only to personnel who, in the judgment of the 12 principal, for security purposes should be aware of the student's 13 record.

(ii) Any information received by a principal or school personnel under this subsection is confidential and may not be further disseminated except as provided in RCW 28A.225.330, other statutes or case law, and the family and educational and privacy rights act of 1994, 20 U.S.C. Sec. 1232g et seq.

(2) This section may not be construed to confer any powers pursuant
 to RCW 4.24.550 upon the public safety department of any public or
 private school or institution of higher education.

(3)(a) The person shall provide the following information when registering: (i) Name; (ii) complete residential address; (iii) date and place of birth; (iv) place of employment; (v) crime for which convicted; (vi) date and place of conviction; (vii) aliases used; (viii) social security number; (ix) photograph; and (x) fingerprints.

(b) Any person who lacks a fixed residence shall provide the following information when registering: (i) Name; (ii) date and place of birth; (iii) place of employment; (iv) crime for which convicted; (v) date and place of conviction; (vi) aliases used; (vii) social security number; (viii) photograph; (ix) fingerprints; and (x) where he or she plans to stay.

33 (4)(a) Offenders shall register with the county sheriff within the 34 following deadlines. For purposes of this section the term 35 "conviction" refers to adult convictions and juvenile adjudications for 36 sex offenses or kidnapping offenses:

37 (i) OFFENDERS IN CUSTODY. (A) Sex offenders who committed a sex
 38 offense on, before, or after February 28, 1990, and who, on or after

July 28, 1991, are in custody, as a result of that offense, of the 1 2 state department of corrections, the state department of social and health services, a local division of youth services, or a local jail or 3 4 juvenile detention facility, and (B) kidnapping offenders who on or after July 27, 1997, are in custody of the state department of 5 corrections, the state department of social and health services, a 6 7 local division of youth services, or a local jail or juvenile detention 8 facility, must register at the time of release from custody with an 9 official designated by the agency that has jurisdiction over the 10 offender. The agency shall within three days forward the registration information to the county sheriff for the county of the offender's 11 12 anticipated residence. The offender must also register within twenty-13 four hours from the time of release with the county sheriff for the county of the person's residence, or if the person is not a resident of 14 Washington, the county of the person's school, or place of employment 15 or vocation. The agency that has jurisdiction over the offender shall 16 17 provide notice to the offender of the duty to register. Failure to 18 register at the time of release and within twenty-four hours of release 19 constitutes a violation of this section and is punishable as provided in subsection  $\left(\left(\frac{11}{11}\right)\right)$  (10) of this section. 20

21 When the agency with jurisdiction intends to release an offender 22 with a duty to register under this section, and the agency has 23 knowledge that the offender is eligible for developmental disability 24 services from the department of social and health services, the agency shall notify the division of developmental disabilities of the release. 25 26 Notice shall occur not more than thirty days before the offender is to 27 be released. The agency and the division shall assist the offender in meeting the initial registration requirement under this section. 28 29 Failure to provide such assistance shall not constitute a defense for 30 any violation of this section.

OFFENDERS CUSTODY BUT UNDER 31 (ii) NOT IN STATE OR LOCAL JURISDICTION. Sex offenders who, on July 28, 1991, are not in custody 32 but are under the jurisdiction of the indeterminate sentence review 33 board or under the department of corrections' active supervision, as 34 35 defined by the department of corrections, the state department of 36 social and health services, or a local division of youth services, for 37 sex offenses committed before, on, or after February 28, 1990, must register within ten days of July 28, 1991. Kidnapping offenders who, 38

on July 27, 1997, are not in custody but are under the jurisdiction of 1 2 the indeterminate sentence review board or under the department of corrections' active supervision, as defined by the department of 3 corrections, the state department of social and health services, or a 4 local division of youth services, for kidnapping offenses committed 5 before, on, or after July 27, 1997, must register within ten days of 6 7 July 27, 1997. A change in supervision status of a sex offender who 8 was required to register under this subsection (4)(a)(ii) as of July 28, 1991, or a kidnapping offender required to register as of July 27, 9 1997, shall not relieve the offender of the duty to register or to 10 11 reregister following a change in residence. The obligation to register 12 shall only cease pursuant to RCW 9A.44.140.

13 (iii) OFFENDERS UNDER FEDERAL JURISDICTION. Sex offenders who, on or after July 23, 1995, and kidnapping offenders who, on or after July 14 15 27, 1997, as a result of that offense are in the custody of the United States bureau of prisons or other federal or military correctional 16 agency for sex offenses committed before, on, or after February 28, 17 18 1990, or kidnapping offenses committed on, before, or after July 27, 19 1997, must register within twenty-four hours from the time of release with the county sheriff for the county of the person's residence, or if 20 21 the person is not a resident of Washington, the county of the person's 22 school, or place of employment or vocation. Sex offenders who, on July 23 23, 1995, are not in custody but are under the jurisdiction of the United States bureau of prisons, United States courts, United States 24 parole commission, or military parole board for sex offenses committed 25 26 before, on, or after February 28, 1990, must register within ten days 27 of July 23, 1995. Kidnapping offenders who, on July 27, 1997, are not in custody but are under the jurisdiction of the United States bureau 28 29 of prisons, United States courts, United States parole commission, or 30 military parole board for kidnapping offenses committed before, on, or after July 27, 1997, must register within ten days of July 27, 1997. 31 32 A change in supervision status of a sex offender who was required to 33 register under this subsection (4)(a)(iii) as of July 23, 1995, or a kidnapping offender required to register as of July 27, 1997 shall not 34 35 relieve the offender of the duty to register or to reregister following 36 a change in residence, or if the person is not a resident of 37 Washington, the county of the person's school, or place of employment

or vocation. The obligation to register shall only cease pursuant to
 RCW 9A.44.140.

(iv) OFFENDERS WHO ARE CONVICTED BUT NOT CONFINED. Sex offenders 3 4 who are convicted of a sex offense on or after July 28, 1991, for a sex offense that was committed on or after February 28, 1990, and 5 kidnapping offenders who are convicted on or after July 27, 1997, for б 7 a kidnapping offense that was committed on or after July 27, 1997, but 8 who are not sentenced to serve a term of confinement immediately upon 9 sentencing, shall report to the county sheriff to register immediately 10 upon completion of being sentenced.

11 (v) OFFENDERS WHO ARE NEW RESIDENTS OR RETURNING WASHINGTON 12 RESIDENTS. Sex offenders and kidnapping offenders who move to 13 Washington state from another state or a foreign country that are not under the jurisdiction of the state department of corrections, the 14 15 indeterminate sentence review board, or the state department of social and health services at the time of moving to Washington, must register 16 17 within three business days of establishing residence or reestablishing 18 residence if the person is a former Washington resident. The duty to 19 register under this subsection applies to sex offenders convicted under the laws of another state or a foreign country, federal or military 20 21 statutes for offenses committed before, on, or after February 28, 1990, 22 or Washington state for offenses committed before, on, or after 23 February 28, 1990, and to kidnapping offenders convicted under the laws 24 of another state or a foreign country, federal or military statutes, or 25 Washington state for offenses committed before, on, or after July 27, 26 1997. Sex offenders and kidnapping offenders from other states or a 27 foreign country who, when they move to Washington, are under the jurisdiction of the department of corrections, the indeterminate 28 29 sentence review board, or the department of social and health services 30 must register within twenty-four hours of moving to Washington. The agency that has jurisdiction over the offender shall notify the 31 32 offender of the registration requirements before the offender moves to 33 Washington.

(vi) OFFENDERS FOUND NOT GUILTY BY REASON OF INSANITY. Any adult
or juvenile who has been found not guilty by reason of insanity under
chapter 10.77 RCW of (A) committing a sex offense on, before, or after
February 28, 1990, and who, on or after July 23, 1995, is in custody,
as a result of that finding, of the state department of social and

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health services, or (B) committing a kidnapping offense on, before, or 1 2 after July 27, 1997, and who on or after July 27, 1997, is in custody, 3 as a result of that finding, of the state department of social and health services, must register within twenty-four hours from the time 4 of release with the county sheriff for the county of the person's 5 residence. The state department of social and health services shall 6 7 provide notice to the adult or juvenile in its custody of the duty to 8 Any adult or juvenile who has been found not guilty by register. reason of insanity of committing a sex offense on, before, or after 9 10 February 28, 1990, but who was released before July 23, 1995, or any adult or juvenile who has been found not guilty by reason of insanity 11 12 of committing a kidnapping offense but who was released before July 27, 13 1997, shall be required to register within twenty-four hours of receiving notice of this registration requirement. 14 The state department of social and health services shall make reasonable attempts 15 within available resources to notify sex offenders who were released 16 17 before July 23, 1995, and kidnapping offenders who were released before 18 July 27, 1997. Failure to register within twenty-four hours of 19 release, or of receiving notice, constitutes a violation of this section and is punishable as provided in subsection (((1))) (10) of 20 21 this section.

(vii) OFFENDERS WHO LACK A FIXED RESIDENCE. Any person who lacks a fixed residence and leaves the county in which he or she is registered and enters and remains within a new county for twenty-four hours is required to register with the county sheriff not more than twenty-four hours after entering the county and provide the information required in subsection (3)(b) of this section.

(viii) OFFENDERS WHO LACK A FIXED RESIDENCE AND WHO ARE UNDER SUPERVISION. Offenders who lack a fixed residence and who are under the supervision of the department shall register in the county of their supervision.

(ix) OFFENDERS WHO MOVE TO, WORK, CARRY ON A VOCATION, OR ATTEND SCHOOL IN ANOTHER STATE. Offenders required to register in Washington, who move to another state, or who work, carry on a vocation, or attend school in another state shall register a new address, fingerprints, and photograph with the new state within ten days after establishing residence, or after beginning to work, carry on a vocation, or attend school in the new state. The person must also send written notice

within ten days of moving to the new state or to a foreign country to the county sheriff with whom the person last registered in Washington state. The county sheriff shall promptly forward this information to the Washington state patrol.

5 (b) Failure to register within the time required under this section 6 constitutes a per se violation of this section and is punishable as 7 provided in subsection ((<del>(11)</del>)) <u>(10)</u> of this section. The county 8 sheriff shall not be required to determine whether the person is living 9 within the county.

10 (c) An arrest on charges of failure to register, service of an information, or a complaint for a violation of this section, 11 or 12 arraignment on charges for a violation of this section, constitutes 13 actual notice of the duty to register. Any person charged with the crime of failure to register under this section who asserts as a 14 defense the lack of notice of the duty to register shall register 15 immediately following actual notice of the duty through arrest, 16 17 service, or arraignment. Failure to register as required under this 18 subsection (4)(c) constitutes grounds for filing another charge of 19 failing to register. Registering following arrest, service, or arraignment on charges shall not relieve the offender from criminal 20 21 liability for failure to register prior to the filing of the original 22 charge.

(d) The deadlines for the duty to register under this section do not relieve any sex offender of the duty to register under this section as it existed prior to July 28, 1991.

26 (5)(a) If any person required to register pursuant to this section 27 changes his or her residence address within the same county, the person 28 must send signed written notice of the change of address, by certified mail, with return receipt requested, to the county sheriff within 29 30 seventy-two hours of moving. If any person required to register pursuant to this section moves to a new county, the person must send 31 32 signed written notice of the change of address, by certified mail, with return receipt requested, at least fourteen days before moving to the 33 county sheriff in the new county of residence and must register with 34 35 that county sheriff within twenty-four hours of moving. The person 36 must also send signed written notice within ten days of the change of 37 address in the new county, by certified mail, with return receipt requested, to the county sheriff with whom the person last registered. 38

1 The county sheriff with whom the person last registered shall promptly 2 forward the information concerning the change of address to the county 3 sheriff for the county of the person's new residence. Upon receipt of 4 notice of change of address to a new state, the county sheriff shall 5 promptly forward the information regarding the change of address to the 6 agency designated by the new state as the state's offender registration 7 agency.

8 (b) It is an affirmative defense to a charge that the person failed to send a notice at least fourteen days in advance of moving as 9 10 required under (a) of this subsection that the person did not know the 11 location of his or her new residence at least fourteen days before 12 moving. The defendant must establish the defense by a preponderance of 13 the evidence and, to prevail on the defense, must also prove by a preponderance that the defendant sent the required notice within 14 15 twenty-four hours of determining the new address.

(6)(a) Any person required to register under this section who lacks 16 a fixed residence shall provide signed written notice to the sheriff of 17 18 the county where he or she last registered within forty-eight hours 19 excluding weekends and holidays after ceasing to have a fixed residence. The notice shall include the information required by 20 21 subsection (3)(b) of this section, except the photograph and fingerprints. The county sheriff may, for reasonable cause, require 22 23 the offender to provide a photograph and fingerprints. The sheriff 24 shall forward this information to the sheriff of the county in which the person intends to reside, if the person intends to reside in 25 26 another county.

27 (b) A person who lacks a fixed residence must report weekly, in person, to the sheriff of the county where he or she is registered. 28 29 The weekly report shall be on a day specified by the county sheriff's 30 office, and shall occur during normal business hours. The county sheriff's office may require the person to list the locations where the 31 person has stayed during the last seven days. The lack of a fixed 32 residence is a factor that may be considered in determining an 33 offender's risk level and shall make the offender subject to disclosure 34 35 of information to the public at large pursuant to RCW 4.24.550.

36 (c) If any person required to register pursuant to this section 37 does not have a fixed residence, it is an affirmative defense to the 38 charge of failure to register, that he or she provided written notice

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to the sheriff of the county where he or she last registered within forty-eight hours excluding weekends and holidays after ceasing to have a fixed residence and has subsequently complied with the requirements of subsections (4)(a)(vii) or (viii) and (6) of this section. To prevail, the person must prove the defense by a preponderance of the evidence.

7 (7) ((All offenders who are required to register pursuant to this 8 section who have a fixed residence and who are designated as a risk level II or III must report, in person, every ninety days to the 9 10 sheriff of the county where he or she is registered. Reporting shall 11 be on a day specified by the county sheriff's office, and shall occur during normal business hours. An offender who complies with the 12 13 ninety-day reporting requirement with no violations for a period of at 14 least five years in the community may petition the superior court to be 15 relieved of the duty to report every ninety days. The petition shall be made to the superior court in the county where the offender resides 16 17 or reports under this section. The prosecuting attorney of the county 18 shall be named and served as respondent in any such petition. The 19 court shall relieve the petitioner of the duty to report if the 20 petitioner shows, by a preponderance of the evidence, that the 21 petitioner has complied with the reporting requirement for a period of 22 at least five years and that the offender has not been convicted of a 23 criminal violation of this section for a period of at least five years, 24 and the court determines that the reporting no longer serves a public 25 safety purpose. Failure to report, as specified, constitutes a 26 violation of this section and is punishable as provided in subsection 27 (11) of this section.

(8))) A sex offender subject to registration requirements under 28 29 this section who applies to change his or her name under RCW 4.24.130 30 or any other law shall submit a copy of the application to the county sheriff of the county of the person's residence and to the state patrol 31 32 not fewer than five days before the entry of an order granting the name change. No sex offender under the requirement to register under this 33 section at the time of application shall be granted an order changing 34 35 his or her name if the court finds that doing so will interfere with 36 legitimate law enforcement interests, except that no order shall be 37 denied when the name change is requested for religious or legitimate cultural reasons or in recognition of marriage or dissolution of 38

1 marriage. A sex offender under the requirement to register under this 2 section who receives an order changing his or her name shall submit a 3 copy of the order to the county sheriff of the county of the person's 4 residence and to the state patrol within five days of the entry of the 5 order.

6 (((9))) (8) The county sheriff shall obtain a photograph of the
7 individual and shall obtain a copy of the individual's fingerprints.
8 A photograph may be taken at any time to update an individual's file.

9 ((<del>(10)</del>)) <u>(9)</u> For the purpose of RCW 9A.44.130, 10.01.200, 10 43.43.540, 70.48.470, and 72.09.330:

11 (a) "Sex offense" means:

12 (i) Any offense defined as a sex offense by RCW 9.94A.030;

13 (ii) Any violation under RCW 9A.44.096 (sexual misconduct with a 14 minor in the second degree);

15 (iii) Any violation under RCW 9.68A.090 (communication with a minor 16 for immoral purposes);

(iv) Any federal or out-of-state conviction for an offense that under the laws of this state would be classified as a sex offense under this subsection; and

20 (v) Any gross misdemeanor that is, under chapter 9A.28 RCW, a 21 criminal attempt, criminal solicitation, or criminal conspiracy to 22 commit an offense that is classified as a sex offense under RCW 23 9.94A.030 or this subsection.

24 (b) "Kidnapping offense" means: (i) The crimes of kidnapping in the first degree, kidnapping in the second degree, and unlawful 25 26 imprisonment, as defined in chapter 9A.40 RCW, where the victim is a 27 minor and the offender is not the minor's parent; (ii) any offense that is, under chapter 9A.28 RCW, a criminal attempt, criminal solicitation, 28 29 or criminal conspiracy to commit an offense that is classified as a 30 kidnapping offense under this subsection (((10))) (9)(b); and (iii) any federal or out-of-state conviction for an offense that under the laws 31 32 of this state would be classified as a kidnapping offense under this subsection  $\left(\left(\frac{10}{10}\right)\right)$  (9)(b). 33

34 (c) "Employed" or "carries on a vocation" means employment that is 35 full-time or part-time for a period of time exceeding fourteen days, or 36 for an aggregate period of time exceeding thirty days during any 37 calendar year. A person is employed or carries on a vocation whether the person's employment is financially compensated, volunteered, or for the purpose of government or educational benefit.

3 (d) "Student" means a person who is enrolled, on a full-time or 4 part-time basis, in any public or private educational institution. An 5 educational institution includes any secondary school, trade or 6 professional institution, or institution of higher education.

7 (((11))) (10)(a) A person who knowingly fails to comply with any of 8 the requirements of this section is guilty of a class B felony if the 9 crime for which the individual was convicted was a felony sex offense 10 as defined in subsection (((10))) (9)(a) of this section or a federal 11 or out-of-state conviction for an offense that under the laws of this 12 state would be a felony sex offense as defined in subsection (((10)))13 (9)(a) of this section.

(b) If the crime for which the individual was convicted was other than a felony or a federal or out-of-state conviction for an offense that under the laws of this state would be other than a felony, violation of this section is a gross misdemeanor.

18 (((12))) (11)(a) A person who knowingly fails to comply with any of 19 the requirements of this section is guilty of a class C felony if the 20 crime for which the individual was convicted was a felony kidnapping 21 offense as defined in subsection (((10))) (9)(b) of this section or a 22 federal or out-of-state conviction for an offense that under the laws 23 of this state would be a felony kidnapping offense as defined in 24 subsection (((10))) (9)(b) of this section.

(b) If the crime for which the individual was convicted was other than a felony or a federal or out-of-state conviction for an offense that under the laws of this state would be other than a felony, violation of this section is a gross misdemeanor.

29 ((<del>(13)</del>)) <u>(12)</u> Except as may otherwise be provided by law, nothing 30 in this section shall impose any liability upon a peace officer, 31 including a county sheriff, or law enforcement agency, for failing to 32 release information authorized under this section.

33 Sec. 2. RCW 9A.44.135 and 2000 c 91 s 1 are each amended to read 34 as follows:

(1) When an offender registers with the county sheriff pursuant toRCW 9A.44.130, the county sheriff shall notify the police chief or town

1 marshal of the jurisdiction in which the offender has registered to
2 live. ((If the offender registers to live in an unincorporated area of
3 the county,))

4 (2) The sheriff shall make reasonable attempts to verify that the 5 offender is residing at the registered address. ((If the offender 6 registers to live in an incorporated city or town, the police chief or 7 town marshal shall make reasonable attempts to verify that the offender 8 is residing at the registered address. Reasonable attempts at 9 verifying an address shall include at a minimum:

(a) For offenders who have not been previously designated sexually 10 11 violent predators under chapter 71.09 RCW or an equivalent procedure in another jurisdiction, each year the chief law enforcement officer of 12 13 the jurisdiction where the offender is registered to live shall send)) Reasonable attempts include verifying an offender's address pursuant to 14 the grant program established under section 3 of this act, but shall, 15 at a minimum, include a yearly mailing by the county sheriff by 16 certified mail, with return receipt requested, a nonforwardable 17 verification form to the offender at the offender's last registered 18 (((<del>b)</del>)) For offenders who have been previously designated 19 address. 20 sexually violent predators under chapter 71.09 RCW or the equivalent 21 procedure in another jurisdiction, even if the designation has subsequently been removed, every ninety days the county sheriff shall 22 23 send by certified mail, with return receipt requested, a nonforwardable 24 verification form to the offender at the offender's last registered 25 address.

31 (((2) The chief law enforcement officer of the jurisdiction where 32 the offender has registered to live)) (3) The county sheriff shall make 33 reasonable attempts to locate any sex offender who fails to return the 34 verification form or who cannot be located at the registered address.

35 ((If the offender fails to return the verification form or the 36 offender is not at the last registered address, the chief law 37 enforcement officer of the jurisdiction where the offender has

registered to live shall promptly forward this information to the 1 2 county sheriff and to the Washington state patrol for inclusion in the 3 central registry of sex offenders.

4 (3) (4) When an offender notifies the county sheriff of a change to his or her residence address pursuant to RCW 9A.44.130, and the new 5 address is in a different law enforcement jurisdiction, the county б 7 sheriff shall notify the police chief or town marshal of the 8 jurisdiction from which the offender has moved.

(5) Whenever the county sheriff determines an offender is not at 9 the last registered address, the county sheriff of the jurisdiction 10 where the offender has registered to live shall promptly forward this 11 12 information to the Washington state patrol for inclusion in the central 13 registry of sex offenders.

14 (6) A county sheriff may enter into an agreement with one or more police chiefs or town marshals for the purposes of delegating the 15 authority and obligation to fulfill the requirements of this section. 16

17 NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 36.28A RCW to read as follows: 18

(1) When funded, the Washington association of sheriffs and police 19 20 chiefs shall administer a grant program to county sheriffs for the 21 purpose of verifying the address and residency of sex offenders and 22 kidnapping offenders registered under RCW 9A.44.130 who reside within 23 the county sheriff's jurisdiction. The Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs shall: 24

25 (a) Enter into performance-based agreements with county sheriffs to 26 ensure that registered offender address and residency are verified:

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(i) For level I offenders, every twelve months;

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(ii) For level II offenders, every six months; and

29 (iii) For level III offenders, every three months;

(b) Collect performance data from all participating jurisdictions 30 31 sufficient to evaluate the efficiency and effectiveness of the address 32 and residency verification program; and

(c) Submit a report on the effectiveness of the address and 33 34 residency verification program to the governor and the appropriate 35 committees of the house of representatives and senate by December 31st 36 each year.

1 (2) The Washington association of sheriffs and police chiefs may 2 retain up to three percent of the amount provided in this section for 3 the cost of administration. Any funds not disbursed for address and 4 residency verification or retained for administration may be allocated 5 to local prosecutors for the prosecution costs associated with failing 6 to register offenses.

7 (3) For the purposes of this section, unclassified offenders and 8 kidnapping offenders shall be considered at risk level I unless in the 9 opinion of the local jurisdiction a higher classification is in the 10 interest of public safety.

(4) A county sheriff may enter into an agreement with one or more police chiefs or town marshals for the purposes of delegating the authority and obligation to fulfill the requirements of this section.

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
