1 AN ACT Relating to establishing the Puget Sound corps while 2 reforming the state's conservation corps programs; amending RCW 43.220.020, 43.220.060, 43.220.070, 43.220.170, 43.220.231, 43.220.250, 3 43.60A.152, and 79A.05.545; reenacting and amending RCW 43.220.040 and 4 77.85.130; adding new sections to chapter 43.220 RCW; adding a new 5 6 section to chapter 43.30 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 77.12 7 RCW; creating new sections; and repealing RCW 43.220.010, 43.220.030, 43.220.080, 43.220.090, 43.220.120, 43.220.130, 43.220.160, 43.220.180, 8 9 43.220.190, and 43.220.210.

10 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. (1) The legislature finds that the 12 Washington conservation corps, the veterans conservation corps, and 13 other state and nonprofit service corps contribute significantly to the 14 priorities of state government to protect natural resources, including 15 Puget Sound, while providing meaningful work experience for the state's 16 youth, veterans, unemployed, and under-employed workforces.

17 (2) The legislature further finds that the long-term health of the 18 economy of Washington depends on the sustainable management of its 19 natural resources and that the livelihoods and revenues produced by

Washington's forests, agricultural lands, estuaries, waterways, and
 watersheds would be enhanced by targeted, streamlined, and prioritized
 investments in clean water and habitat restoration.

4 (3) The legislature further finds that it is important to stretch 5 limited public resources to advance the state's natural resource 6 management priorities. Transformation of natural resource management 7 and service delivery, including the creation of strategic partnerships 8 among agencies, will increase the efficiency and effectiveness of the 9 expenditure of federal, state, and local funds for clean water and 10 habitat restoration projects.

11 (4) The legislature further finds that there are efficiencies to be 12 gained by streamlining how the various conservation corps are 13 administered, managed, funded, and deployed by the natural resources There are further efficiencies to be gained through 14 agencies. coordinating the conservation corps with other state service corps 15 recruitment activities, 16 programs, and through public-private 17 partnerships.

18 (5) The legislature further finds that the state should seek to 19 expand the conservation corps in all areas of the state, deploying the 20 corps to work on projects that advance established priorities 21 including, but not limited to, the cleanup and restoration of the Puget 22 Sound ecosystem, oil spill response and cleanup, salmon recovery, and 23 the reduction of wildfire and forest health hazards statewide.

24 (6) Therefore, it is the intent of the legislature to maintain the conservation corps statewide, to establish the Puget Sound corps, to 25 26 streamline how government administers and the state's manages 27 conservation corps to more efficiently expend the state's resources toward priority outcomes, including the recovery of the Puget Sound 28 29 ecosystem to health by 2020, to increase opportunities for meaningful 30 work experience, and to authorize public-private partnerships as a key element of corps activities. 31

32 **Sec. 2.** RCW 43.220.020 and 1999 c 280 s 1 are each amended to read 33 as follows:

34 (1) The Washington conservation corps is ((hereby)) created((, to 35 be implemented by)). The ((following state departments: The employment 36 security department, the)) department of ecology((, the department of 37 fish and wildlife, the department of natural resources, and the state

parks and recreation commission)) must administer the corps as a partnership with the departments of natural resources and fish and wildlife, the state parks and recreation commission, and when appropriate, other agencies and nonprofit organizations to advance the program goals outlined in section 5 of this act.

6 (2) The Puget Sound corps is created as a distinct program within
 7 the Washington conservation corps focused on the implementation of the
 8 specific program goals outlined in section 5 of this act.

9 NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. It is the intent of this act to centralize 10 the administration of the Washington conservation corps, which was 11 previously administered by the departments of ecology, natural 12 resources, and fish and wildlife and the state parks and recreation commission, into the department of ecology. This act is prospective 13 14 only, and any grant awards or conservation corps crew or individual placements finalized by other agencies or partners prior to the 15 16 effective date of this section remain unaffected by this act.

Sec. 4. RCW 43.220.040 and 1999 c 280 s 3 and 1999 c 151 s 1301 are each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

19 ((Unless the context clearly requires otherwise,)) The definitions 20 in this section apply throughout this chapter <u>unless the context</u> 21 <u>clearly requires otherwise</u>.

(1) "Public lands" means any lands or waters, or interests therein,
owned or administered by any agency or instrumentality of the state,
federal, or local government.

(2) "Corps" means the Washington conservation corps, including the
 Puget Sound corps.

(3) "Corps member" means an individual enrolled in the Washingtonconservation corps.

(4) "Corps member leaders" or "specialists" means members of the corps who serve in leadership or training capacities or who provide specialized services other than or in addition to the types of work and services that are performed by the corps members in general.

33 (5) "Crew supervisor" means temporary, project, or permanent state 34 employees who supervise corps members and coordinate work project 35 design and completion.

- (6) (("Distressed area" has the meaning as defined in RCW
 43.168.020.)) "Department" means the department of ecology.
- 3 (7) "Agency administrative costs" means indirect expenses such as
 4 personnel, payroll, contract administration, fiscal services, and other
 5 overhead costs.
- 6 <u>(8) "Program support costs" include, but are not limited to,</u> 7 program planning, development of reports, job and career training, 8 <u>uniforms and equipment, and standard office space and utilities.</u> 9 Program support costs do not include direct scheduling and supervision
- 10 <u>of corps members.</u>
- 11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 5. A new section is added to chapter 43.220 RCW 12 to read as follows:
- (1) The corps shall be organized and managed to complete projects with fee-for-service work crews that meet goals associated with the protection, promotion, or restoration of the following:
- 16 (a) Public lands;
- 17 (b) State natural resources;
- 18 (c) Water quality;
- 19 (d) Watershed health;
- 20 (e) Fish and wildlife;
- 21 (f) Habitat;
- 22 (g) Outdoor recreation;
- 23 (h) Forest health;
- 24 (i) Wildfire risk reduction; and
- 25 (j) State historic sites.

(2) In addition to the project goals outlined in subsection (1) of
this section, the Puget Sound corps shall seek to deploy corps members
with the specific goal of participating in the restoration of the Puget
Sound ecosystem. The resources of the Puget Sound corps must be
prioritized, when practicable, to focus on the following when located
within the Puget Sound basin:

- 32 (a) Projects identified in, or consistent with, the action agenda
 33 developed by the Puget Sound partnership in chapter 90.71 RCW;
- 34 (b) Projects located on public lands;
- 35 (c) Habitat restoration projects; and
- 36 (d) Education and stewardship projects.

(3) Both the corps and the Puget Sound corps shall give preference 1 2 to projects that satisfy the goals identified in this section and that: 3

(a) Will provide long-term benefits to the public;

4 (b) Will provide productive training and work experiences to the corps members involved; 5

(c) Expands or integrates training programs or career development б 7 opportunities for corps members;

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(d) May result in payments to the state for services performed; and 9 (e) Can be promptly completed.

10 **Sec. 6.** RCW 43.220.060 and 1999 c 280 s 4 are each amended to read 11 as follows:

12 (1) ((Each state department identified in RCW 43.220.020)) The 13 department shall have the following powers and duties ((to carry out 14 its functions relative to)) as necessary to administer the Washington 15 conservation corps:

16 (a) Recruiting and employing staff, corps members, corps member leaders, and specialists consistent with RCW 43.220.070; 17

(b) Serving as the corps' central application recipient for grants 18 from federal service projects and service organizations; 19

20 (c) Executing agreements for furnishing the services of the corps 21 to carry out conservation corps programs to any federal, state, or local public agency, any local organization as specified in this 22 23 chapter ((in concern)) that operates consistent with the overall 24 objectives of the conservation corps;

25 (((-))) (d) Applying for and accepting grants or contributions of 26 funds from ((any private source)) the federal government, other public sources, or private funding sources for conservation corps projects 27 and, when possible, other projects specifically targeted at restoring 28 29 Puget Sound that can be accomplished with fee-for-service labor from the Puget Sound corps; 30

31 (((d) Determining a preference for those projects which will 32 provide long-term benefits to the public, will provide productive training and work experiences to the members involved, will be labor-33 34 intensive, may result in payments to the state for services performed, 35 and can be promptly completed; and

36 (e) Entering into agreements with community colleges within the 37 state's community and technical college system and other educational

institutions or independent nonprofit agencies to provide special 1 2 education in basic skills, including reading, writing, and mathematics for those conservation corps members who may benefit by participation 3 4 in such classes. Classes shall be scheduled after corps working hours. 5 Participation by members is not mandatory but shall be strongly 6 encouraged. The participation shall be a primary factor in determining 7 whether the opportunity for corps membership beyond one year shall be offered. Instruction related to the specific role of the department in 8 9 resource conservation shall also be offered, either in a classroom setting or as is otherwise appropriate)) (e) Establishing consistent 10 work standards and placement and evaluation procedures of corps 11 12 programs; and

13 (f) Selecting, reviewing, approving, and evaluating the success of 14 corps projects.

15 (2) The department may partner with any other state agencies, local 16 institutions, nonprofit organizations, or nonprofit service corps 17 organizations in the administration of the corps. Other state agencies 18 may maintain a conservation corps coordinator for the purposes of 19 partnering with the department and the corps.

20 (3) If deemed practicable, the department shall develop the 21 conservation corps program with optional tracks for participants. The tracks could include a technical track for students and veterans 22 interested in technical training, a science track for students and 23 24 veterans interested in natural sciences training, or an emergency response track for participants providing wildland firefighting, flood 25 fighting, oil spill response, or other natural or man-made disaster 26 27 response statewide.

(4) The assignment of corps members shall not result in the 28 displacement of currently employed workers, including 29 partial displacement such as reduction in hours of nonovertime work, wages, or 30 other employment benefits. ((Supervising)) Agencies that participate 31 in the program may not terminate, lay-off, or reduce the working hours 32 33 of any employee for the purpose of using a corps member with available funds. In circumstances where substantial efficiencies or a public 34 35 purpose may result, ((supervising)) participating agencies may use 36 corps members to carry out essential agency work or contractual 37 functions without displacing current employees.

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1 (((3))) (5) Facilities, supplies, motor vehicles, instruments, and 2 tools of ((the supervising agency)) participating agencies shall be 3 made available for use by the conservation corps to the extent that 4 such use does not conflict with the normal duties of the agency. The 5 agency may purchase, rent, or otherwise acquire other necessary tools, 6 facilities, supplies, and instruments.

7 Sec. 7. RCW 43.220.070 and 1999 c 280 s 5 are each amended to read 8 as follows:

(1) Conservation corps members shall be unemployed residents of the 9 10 state between eighteen and twenty-five years of age at the time of 11 enrollment who are citizens or lawful permanent residents of the United 12 The age requirements may be waived for corps leaders and States. specialists with special leadership or occupational skills((; such 13 14 members shall be given special responsibility for providing leadership, character development, and sense of community responsibility to the 15 corps members, groups, and work crews to which they are assigned)). 16 The upper age requirement may be waived for residents who have a 17 18 sensory or mental handicap. Special effort shall be made to recruit minority and disadvantaged youth who meet selection criteria of the 19 20 conservation corps. Preference shall be given to youths residing in 21 areas, both urban and rural, in which there exists substantial 22 unemployment exceeding the state average unemployment rate.

(2) The legislature finds that people with developmental disabilities would benefit from experiencing a meaningful work experience, and learning the value of labor and of membership in a productive society.

27 ((The legislature urges state agencies that are participating in 28 the Washington conservation corps program to consider for enrollment in 29 the program people who have developmental disabilities, as defined in 30 RCW 71A.10.020.

31 If an agency chooses to enroll people with developmental 32 disabilities in its Washington conservation corps program, the agency 33 may apply to))

34 (3) The recruitment of conservation corps members is the primary 35 responsibility of the department. However, to the degree practicable, 36 recruitment activities must be coordinated with the following entities: 37 (a) The department of natural resources; 1 (b) The department of fish and wildlife; 2 (c) The state parks and recreation commission; (d) The department of veterans affairs; 3 (e) The employment security department; and 4 (f) Any interested postsecondary educational institutions. 5 б (4) Recruitment efforts must be targeted to, but not limited to, 7 unemployed or underemployed residents of the state who are: (a) Between the ages of eighteen and twenty-five years; 8 9 (b) Fully matriculated students at a technical school, college, or

10 <u>university; or</u>

11 (c) Military veterans.

12 (5) If people with developmental disabilities are enrolled in the 13 conservation corps program, an application may be made to the United 14 States department of labor, employment standards administration for a 15 special subminimum wage certificate in order to be allowed to pay 16 enrollees with developmental disabilities according to their individual 17 levels of productivity.

18 (((3))) (6) Corps members shall not be considered state employees.
19 Other provisions of law relating to civil service, hours of work, rate
20 of compensation, sick leave, unemployment compensation, state
21 retirement plans, and vacation leave do not apply to the Washington
22 conservation corps except for the crew supervisors, who shall be
23 project employees, and the administrative and supervisory personnel.

24 (((4) Enrollment shall be for a period of six months which may be 25 extended for additional six month periods by mutual agreement of the 26 corps and the corps member, not to exceed two years. Corps members 27 shall be reimbursed at the minimum wage rate established by state or federal law, whichever is higher, which may be increased by up to five 28 29 percent for each additional six month period worked: PROVIDED, That if 30 agencies elect to run a residential program, the appropriate costs for room and board shall be deducted from the corps member's paycheck as 31 provided in chapter 43.220 RCW. 32

33 (5)) (7) Except as otherwise provided in this section, 34 participation as a corps member is for an initial period of three 35 months. The enrollment period may be extended for additional three-36 month periods by mutual agreement of the department and the corps 37 member, not to exceed two years.

1 (8)(a) Corps members are to be available at all times for emergency 2 response services coordinated through the department ((of community, 3 trade, and economic development)) or other public agency. Duties may 4 include sandbagging and flood cleanup, <u>oil spill response, wildfire</u> 5 <u>suppression</u>, search and rescue, and other functions in response to 6 emergencies.

(b) Corps members may be assigned to longer-term specialized crews
 not subject to the temporal limitations of service otherwise imposed by
 this section when longer-term commitments satisfy the specialized needs
 of the department, an agency partner, or other service contractee.

11 **Sec. 8.** RCW 43.220.170 and 1983 1st ex.s. c 40 s 17 are each 12 amended to read as follows:

The services of corps members ((placed with agencies listed in RCW 43.220.020)) are exempt from unemployment compensation coverage under RCW 50.44.040(((5))) (4) and the enrollees shall be so advised by the department.

17 **Sec. 9.** RCW 43.220.231 and 1999 c 280 s 7 are each amended to read 18 as follows:

(1) An amount not to exceed five percent of the funds available for the Washington conservation corps may be expended on agency administrative costs. ((Agency administrative costs are indirect expenses such as personnel, payroll, contract administration, fiscal services, and other overhead costs.))

24 (2) An amount not to exceed twenty percent of the funds available for the Washington conservation corps may be expended for costs 25 26 included in subsection (1) of this section and program support costs. ((Program support costs include, but are not limited to, program 27 28 planning, development of reports, job and career training, uniforms and 29 equipment, and standard office space and utilities. Program support 30 costs do not include direct scheduling and supervision of corps 31 members.))

32 (3) A minimum of eighty percent of the funds available for the
 33 Washington conservation corps shall be expended for corps member
 34 salaries and benefits and for direct supervision of corps members.

1 Sec. 10. RCW 43.220.250 and 1985 c 230 s 5 are each amended to
2 read as follows:

A nonprofit corporation which contracts with ((an agency listed in RCW 43.220.020)) the department to provide a specific service, appropriate for the administration of this chapter which the ((agency)) department cannot otherwise provide, may be reimbursed at the discretion of the ((agency)) department for the reasonable costs the ((agency)) department would absorb for providing those services.

9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 11. A new section is added to chapter 43.220 10 RCW to read as follows:

(1) The director of the department of ecology and the commissioner of public lands shall jointly host an annual meeting with other corps program participants to serve as a forum for the partner agencies to provide guidance and feedback concerning the management and function of the corps.

16 (2) At a minimum, representatives of the following must be invited 17 to participate at the annual meeting: The department of fish and wildlife; the state parks and recreation commission; the Puget Sound 18 partnership; the department of veterans affairs; the employment 19 20 security department; the Washington commission for national and 21 community service; conservation districts; the state conservation 22 commission; the salmon recovery funding board; the recreation and conservation office; the department of commerce; the department of 23 24 health; or any similar successor organizations and any appropriate 25 nonprofit organizations, including those engaged in service corps 26 projects.

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(3) Annual meeting participants shall, at a minimum:

(a) Review the conservation corps projects completed in the

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NEW SECTION. Sec. 12. A new section is added to chapter 43.30 RCW

1 under the subchapter heading "Part 5 Powers and Duties--General" to 2 read as follows:

3 The department shall cooperate, when appropriate, as a partner in 4 the Washington conservation corps established in chapter 43.220 RCW.

5 **Sec. 13.** RCW 43.60A.152 and 2007 c 451 s 5 are each amended to 6 read as follows:

7 The department shall collaborate with the ((+1))((state agencies)) department of ecology and the department of natural 8 resources and any of its partnering agencies in implementing the 9 10 Washington conservation corps, created in chapter 43.220 RCW, to 11 maximize the utilization of both conservation corps programs. These 12 agencies shall work together to identify stewardship and maintenance projects on ((agency-managed)) public lands that are suitable for work 13 14 by veterans conservation corps enrollees. The department may expend funds appropriated to the veterans conservation corps program to defray 15 16 the costs of education, training, and certification associated with the 17 enrollees participating in such projects.

18 ((2) By September 30, 2007, the department, in conjunction with 19 the state agencies identified in subsection (1) of this section, shall 20 provide to the office of financial management and to the appropriate 21 committees of the senate and house of representatives a report that:

22 (a) Identifies projects on state agency-managed lands that are 23 currently planned for veterans conservation corps enrollee 24 participation;

25 (b) Identifies additional projects on state agency-managed lands 26 that are suitable for veterans conservation corps enrollee 27 participation and for which funding is currently in place for such 28 participation; and

(c) Identifies additional projects on state agency managed lands for which project implementation has been funded or is included in the agency's multiblennial stewardship plans, and that are suitable for veterans conservation corps enrollee participation in the event that additional funding is provided to the department for associated training, education, and certification.))

1 The commission shall cooperate ((in implementing and operating 2 the)), when appropriate, as a partner in the Washington conservation 3 corps ((as required by)) established in chapter 43.220 RCW.

4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 15.** A new section is added to chapter 77.12 RCW 5 to read as follows:

6 The department shall cooperate, when appropriate, as a partner in 7 the Washington conservation corps established in chapter 43.220 RCW.

8 Sec. 16. RCW 77.85.130 and 2007 c 341 s 36 and 2007 c 257 s 1 are 9 each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

(1) The salmon recovery funding board shall develop procedures and 10 11 criteria for allocation of funds for salmon habitat projects and salmon 12 recovery activities on a statewide basis to address the highest priorities for salmon habitat protection and restoration. 13 To the extent practicable the board shall adopt an annual allocation of 14 15 funding. The allocation should address both protection and restoration of habitat, and should recognize the varying needs in each area of the 16 state on an equitable basis. The board has the discretion to partially 17 fund, or to fund in phases, salmon habitat projects. The board may 18 19 annually establish a maximum amount of funding available for any 20 individual project, subject to available funding. No projects required solely as a mitigation or a condition of permitting are eligible for 21 22 funding.

(2)(a) In evaluating, ranking, and awarding funds for projects and
 activities the board shall give preference to projects that:

(ii) Provide a greater benefit to salmon recovery based upon the stock status information contained in the department of fish and wildlife salmonid stock inventory (SASSI), the salmon and steelhead habitat inventory and assessment project (SSHIAP), and any comparable science-based assessment when available;

32 33 (iii) Will benefit listed species and other fish species;

(iv) Will preserve high quality salmonid habitat;

34 (v) Are included in a regional or watershed-based salmon recovery 35 plan that accords the project, action, or area a high priority for 36 funding; (vi) Are, except as provided in RCW 77.85.240, sponsored by an
 entity that is a Puget Sound partner, as defined in RCW 90.71.010; and
 (vii) Are projects referenced in the action agenda developed by the

4 Puget Sound partnership under RCW 90.71.310.

(i) Are the most cost-effective;

5 (b) In evaluating, ranking, and awarding funds for projects and 6 activities the board shall also give consideration to projects that:

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(ii) Have the greatest matched or in-kind funding;

9 (iii) Will be implemented by a sponsor with a successful record of 10 project implementation;

(iv) Involve members of the <u>Washington conservation corps</u> <u>established in chapter 43.220 RCW or the</u> veterans conservation corps established in RCW 43.60A.150; and

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(v) Are part of a regionwide list developed by lead entities.

15 (3) The board may reject, but not add, projects from a habitat 16 project list submitted by a lead entity for funding.

17 (4) The board shall establish criteria for determining when block grants may be made to a lead entity. The board may provide block 18 19 grants to the lead entity to implement habitat project lists developed under RCW 77.85.050, subject to available funding. The board shall 20 21 determine an equitable minimum amount of project funds for each 22 recovery region, and shall distribute the remainder of funds on a 23 competitive basis. The board may also provide block grants to the lead 24 entity or regional recovery organization to assist in carrying out 25 functions described under this chapter. Block grants must be expended 26 consistent with the priorities established for the board in subsection 27 (2) of this section. Lead entities or regional recovery organizations 28 receiving block grants under this subsection shall provide an annual 29 report to the board summarizing how funds were expended for activities 30 consistent with this chapter, including the types of projects funded, project outcomes, monitoring results, and administrative costs. 31

(5) The board may waive or modify portions of the allocation procedures and standards adopted under this section in the award of grants or loans to conform to legislative appropriations directing an alternative award procedure or when the funds to be awarded are from federal or other sources requiring other allocation procedures or standards as a condition of the board's receipt of the funds. The board shall develop an integrated process to manage the allocation of 1 funding from federal and state sources to minimize delays in the award 2 of funding while recognizing the differences in state and legislative 3 appropriation timing.

4 (6) The board may award a grant or loan for a salmon recovery 5 project on private or public land when the landowner has a legal 6 obligation under local, state, or federal law to perform the project, 7 when expedited action provides a clear benefit to salmon recovery, and 8 there will be harm to salmon recovery if the project is delayed. For 9 purposes of this subsection, a legal obligation does not include a 10 project required solely as a mitigation or a condition of permitting.

11 (7) Property acquired or improved by a project sponsor may be 12 conveyed to a federal agency if: (a) The agency agrees to comply with 13 all terms of the grant or loan to which the project sponsor was 14 obligated; or (b) the board approves: (i) Changes in the terms of the 15 grant or loan, and the revision or removal of binding deed of right instruments; and (ii) a memorandum of understanding or similar document 16 17 ensuring that the facility or property will retain, to the extent 18 feasible, adequate habitat protections; and (c) the appropriate 19 legislative authority of the county or city with jurisdiction over the 20 project area approves the transfer and provides notification to the 21 board.

(8) Any project sponsor receiving funding from the salmon recovery funding board that is not subject to disclosure under chapter 42.56 RCW must, as a mandatory contractual prerequisite to receiving the funding, agree to disclose any information in regards to the expenditure of that funding as if the project sponsor was subject to the requirements of chapter 42.56 RCW.

(9) After January 1, 2010, any project designed to address the restoration of Puget Sound may be funded under this chapter only if the project is not in conflict with the action agenda developed by the Puget Sound partnership under RCW 90.71.310.
