AN ACT Relating to extended foster care services; amending RCW 74.13.680 and 13.34.267; reenacting and amending RCW 74.13.031; and creating a new section.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. Since 2006, under a program known as "foster care to 21," the Washington state legislature has provided services to б 7 young adults transitioning out of foster care in order for them to enroll in and complete their postsecondary educations. In 2008, the 8 9 United States congress passed the fostering connections to success and 10 increasing adoptions act of 2008, which allows states to receive a 11 federal match for state dollars expended in supporting youth In 2011, the Washington state transitioning out of foster care. 12 13 legislature opted to create the "extended foster care program," in order to receive the federal match for youth completing high school. 14 15 It is the intent of this act to enable the state to receive the federal 16 match to offset costs expended supporting youth on seeking 17 postsecondary education. This act would result in these youth being 18 served under the extended foster care program, for which there is a federal match, instead of the foster care to 21 program, which relies 19

solely on state dollars. It is the intent of the legislature to allow 1 2 all youth currently enrolled in the foster care to 21 program for the 3 purposes of postsecondary education to remain enrolled until they turn 4 twenty-one, are no longer otherwise eligible, or choose to leave the Within three years of the effective date of this act, the 5 program. б "foster care to 21" program will cease to operate, and youth seeking a 7 postsecondary education will be solely served by the extended foster 8 care program.

9 Sec. 2. RCW 74.13.031 and 2011 c 330 s 5 and 2011 c 160 s 2 are 10 each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

(1) The department and supervising agencies shall develop, administer, supervise, and monitor a coordinated and comprehensive plan that establishes, aids, and strengthens services for the protection and care of runaway, dependent, or neglected children.

(2) Within available resources, the department and supervising 15 16 agencies shall recruit an adequate number of prospective adoptive and 17 foster homes, both regular and specialized, i.e. homes for children of ethnic minority, including Indian homes for Indian children, sibling 18 groups, handicapped and emotionally disturbed, teens, pregnant and 19 20 parenting teens, and the department shall annually report to the 21 qovernor and the legislature concerning the department's and 22 supervising agency's success in: (a) Meeting the need for adoptive and 23 foster home placements; (b) reducing the foster parent turnover rate; (c) completing home studies for legally free children; and (d) 24 25 implementing and operating the passport program required by RCW 26 74.13.285. The report shall include a section entitled "Foster Home 27 Turn-Over, Causes and Recommendations."

(3) The department shall investigate complaints of any recent act 28 29 or failure to act on the part of a parent or caretaker that results in serious physical or emotional harm, or sexual abuse 30 death, or 31 exploitation, or that presents an imminent risk of serious harm, and on 32 the basis of the findings of such investigation, offer child welfare services in relation to the problem to such parents, legal custodians, 33 34 or persons serving in loco parentis, and/or bring the situation to the 35 attention of an appropriate court, or another community agency. An 36 investigation is not required of nonaccidental injuries which are 37 clearly not the result of a lack of care or supervision by the child's

parents, legal custodians, or persons serving in loco parentis. If the investigation reveals that a crime against a child may have been committed, the department shall notify the appropriate law enforcement agency.

5 (4) The department or supervising agencies shall offer, on a 6 voluntary basis, family reconciliation services to families who are in 7 conflict.

8 (5) The department or supervising agencies shall monitor placements of children in out-of-home care and in-home dependencies to assure the 9 10 safety, well-being, and quality of care being provided is within the scope of the intent of the legislature as defined in RCW 74.13.010 and 11 12 74.15.010. Under this section children in out-of-home care and in-home 13 dependencies and their caregivers shall receive a private and individual face-to-face visit each month. 14 The department and the supervising agencies shall randomly select no less than ten percent of 15 the caregivers currently providing care to receive one unannounced 16 17 face-to-face visit in the caregiver's home per year. No caregiver will 18 receive an unannounced visit through the random selection process for 19 two consecutive years. If the caseworker makes a good faith effort to conduct the unannounced visit to a caregiver and is unable to do so, 20 21 that month's visit to that caregiver need not be unannounced. The 22 department and supervising agencies are encouraged to group monthly 23 visits to caregivers by geographic area so that in the event an unannounced visit cannot be completed, the caseworker may complete 24 25 other required monthly visits. The department shall use a method of 26 random selection that does not cause a fiscal impact to the department. 27 The department or supervising agencies shall conduct the monthly 28 visits with children and caregivers to whom it is providing child 29 welfare services.

30 (6) The department and supervising agencies shall have authority to accept custody of children from parents and to accept custody of 31 32 children from juvenile courts, where authorized to do so under law, to provide child welfare services including placement for adoption, to 33 provide for the routine and necessary medical, dental, and mental 34 35 health care, or necessary emergency care of the children, and to 36 provide for the physical care of such children and make payment of 37 maintenance costs if needed. Except where required by Public Law 95-608 (25 U.S.C. Sec. 1915), no private adoption agency which receives 38

children for adoption from the department shall discriminate on the
 basis of race, creed, or color when considering applications in their
 placement for adoption.

4 (7) The department and supervising agency shall have authority to 5 provide temporary shelter to children who have run away from home and 6 who are admitted to crisis residential centers.

7 (8) The department and supervising agency shall have authority to8 purchase care for children.

9 (9) The department shall establish a children's services advisory 10 committee with sufficient members representing supervising agencies 11 which shall assist the secretary in the development of a partnership 12 plan for utilizing resources of the public and private sectors, and 13 advise on all matters pertaining to child welfare, licensing of child 14 care agencies, adoption, and services related thereto. At least one 15 member shall represent the adoption community.

16 (10) The department and supervising agencies shall have authority 17 to provide continued extended foster care services to youth ages 18 eighteen to twenty-one years to participate in or complete a secondary 19 education program or a secondary education equivalency program, or a 20 postsecondary or vocational education program.

(11) The department((, has)) shall have authority to provide adoption support benefits, or relative guardianship subsidies on behalf of youth ages eighteen to twenty-one years who achieved permanency through adoption or a relative guardianship at age sixteen or older and who meet the criteria described in subsection (10) of this section.

26 (12) The department shall refer cases to the division of child 27 support whenever state or federal funds are expended for the care and maintenance of a child, including a child with a developmental 28 29 disability who is placed as a result of an action under chapter 13.34 30 RCW, unless the department finds that there is good cause not to pursue collection of child support against the parent or parents of the child. 31 32 Cases involving individuals age eighteen through twenty shall not be 33 referred to the division of child support unless required by federal 34 law.

35 (13) The department and supervising agencies shall have authority 36 within funds appropriated for foster care services to purchase care for 37 Indian children who are in the custody of a federally recognized Indian 38 tribe or tribally licensed child-placing agency pursuant to parental

1 consent, tribal court order, or state juvenile court order; and the 2 purchase of such care shall be subject to the same eligibility 3 standards and rates of support applicable to other children for whom 4 the department purchases care.

5 Notwithstanding any other provision of RCW 13.32A.170 through 6 13.32A.200 and 74.13.032 through 74.13.036, or of this section all 7 services to be provided by the department under subsections (4), (6), 8 and (7) of this section, subject to the limitations of these 9 subsections, may be provided by any program offering such services 10 funded pursuant to Titles II and III of the federal juvenile justice 11 and delinquency prevention act of 1974.

12 (14) Within amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, the 13 supervising agency or department shall provide preventive services to 14 families with children that prevent or shorten the duration of an out-15 of-home placement.

16 (15) The department and supervising agencies shall have authority 17 to provide independent living services to youths, including individuals 18 who have attained eighteen years of age, and have not attained twenty-19 one years of age who are or have been in foster care.

20 (16) The department and supervising agencies shall consult at least 21 quarterly with foster parents, including members of the foster parent 22 association of Washington state, for the purpose of receiving 23 information and comment regarding how the department and supervising 24 agencies are performing the duties and meeting the obligations specified in this section and RCW 74.13.250 and 74.13.320 regarding the 25 26 recruitment of foster homes, reducing foster parent turnover rates, 27 providing effective training for foster parents, and administering a 28 coordinated and comprehensive plan that strengthens services for the 29 protection of children. Consultation shall occur at the regional and 30 statewide levels.

31 (((18))) (17)(a) The department shall, within current funding 32 levels, place on its public web site a document listing the duties and 33 responsibilities the department has to a child subject to a dependency 34 petition including, but not limited to, the following:

(i) Reasonable efforts, including the provision of services, towardreunification of the child with his or her family;

37 (ii) Sibling visits subject to the restrictions in RCW 38 13.34.136(2)(b)(ii);

- (iii) Parent-child visits;

2 (iv) Statutory preference for placement with a relative or other 3 suitable person, if appropriate; and

4 (v) Statutory preference for an out-of-home placement that allows
5 the child to remain in the same school or school district, if practical
6 and in the child's best interests.

7 (b) The document must be prepared in conjunction with a community-8 based organization and must be updated as needed.

9 **Sec. 3.** RCW 74.13.680 and 2011 c 330 s 8 are each amended to read 10 as follows:

(1) Within amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, the department shall have authority to provide continued foster care or group care to youth ages eighteen to twenty-one years, which was created in 2006 as the foster care to 21 program, who are enrolled in the program prior to the effective date of this section:

16 (a) Enrolled in a secondary education program or a secondary 17 education equivalency program;

(b) Enrolled and participating in a postsecondary or vocationaleducational program;

20 (c) Participating in a program or activity designed to promote or 21 remove barriers to employment;

22 (d) Engaged in employment for eighty hours or more per month; or

(e) Incapable of engaging in any of the activities described in (a)
through (d) of this subsection due to a medical condition that is
supported by regularly updated information.

26 (2) A youth who remains eligible for placement services or benefits 27 under this section pursuant to department rules may, within amounts 28 appropriated for this specific purpose, continue to receive placement 29 services and benefits until the youth reaches his or her twenty-first 30 birthday.

31 (3) The foster care to 21 program shall cease to operate within 32 three years of the effective date of this section.

33 **Sec. 4.** RCW 13.34.267 and 2011 c 330 s 7 are each amended to read 34 as follows:

35 (1) In order to facilitate the delivery of extended foster care 36 services, the court shall postpone for six months the dismissal of a 1 dependency proceeding for any child who is a dependent child in foster 2 care at the age of eighteen years and who, at the time of his or her 3 eighteenth birthday((τ)):

4 (a) Is enrolled in a secondary education program or a secondary
5 education equivalency program, or is enrolled in a postsecondary or
6 vocational education program; or

(b) Can demonstrate within six months after turning eighteen that 7 he or she applied to a postsecondary or vocational education program 8 that he or she appears to be eligible to attend. 9 The six-month postponement under this subsection is intended to allow a reasonable 10 11 window of opportunity for an eligible youth who reaches the age of 12 eighteen to request extended foster care services from the department 13 or supervising agency. At the end of the six-month period, the court shall dismiss the dependency if the youth has not requested extended 14 foster care services from the department. Until the youth requests to 15 participate in the extended foster care program, the department is 16 17 relieved of supervisory responsibility for the youth.

18 (2) A youth receiving extended foster care services is a party to 19 the dependency proceeding. The youth's parent or guardian shall be 20 dismissed from the dependency proceeding when the youth reaches the age 21 of eighteen years.

(3) The court shall order a youth participating in extended foster care services to be under the placement and care authority of the department, subject to the youth's continuing agreement to participate in extended foster care services.

(4) The court shall appoint counsel to represent a youth, as
 defined in RCW 13.34.030(2)(b), in dependency proceedings under this
 section.

(5) The case plan for and delivery of services to a youth receiving extended foster care services is subject to the review requirements set forth in RCW 13.34.138 and 13.34.145, and should be applied in a developmentally appropriate manner, as they relate to youth age eighteen to twenty-one years. Additionally, the court shall consider:

34 (a) Whether the youth is safe in his or her placement;

35 (b) Whether the youth continues to be eligible for extended foster 36 care services;

37 (c) Whether the current placement is developmentally appropriate 38 for the youth;

1 (d) The youth's development of independent living skills; and

(e) The youth's overall progress toward transitioning to full
independence and the projected date for achieving such transition.

4 (6) Prior to the hearing, the youth's attorney shall indicate
5 whether there are any contested issues and may provide additional
6 information necessary for the court's review.

7 (7) Upon the request of the youth, or when the youth is no longer
8 eligible to receive extended foster care services according to rules
9 adopted by the department, the court shall dismiss the dependency.
