## SENATE JOINT MEMORIAL 8005

State of Washington 63rd Legislature 2013 Regular Session

1 TO THE HONORABLE PAULA HAMMOND, SECRETARY OF TRANSPORTATION, AND TO 2 THE WASHINGTON STATE TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION, AND TO THE WASHINGTON 3 STATE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION:

We, your Memorialists, the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Washington, in legislative session assembled, respectfully represent and petition as follows:

7 WHEREAS, American soldiers and sailors were taken as prisoners of 8 war during the American Revolutionary War with the majority of 9 prisoners kept aboard British prison hulks near New York City. In 10 1873, a general exchange of prisoners occurred after the cessation of 11 hostilities and recognition of American independence; and

12 WHEREAS, During the War of 1812, battlefield exchanges occurred 13 under a general British/American cartel for exchanging prisoners. The 14 British continued to use prison hulks and the American POW's were 15 treated humanely until their repatriation following the Treaty of Ghent 16 in 1814; and

WHEREAS, During the Mexican-American War, the Mexican forces released some American prisoners in "head for head" exchanges that occasionally took place during the war, but most American prisoners of war remained incarcerated until the ratification of the Treaty of
Guadalupe Hidalgo; and

3 WHEREAS, During the Civil War, both Union and Confederate forces 4 were unprepared to detain the enormous number of POW's. 211,400 Union 5 prisoners were held in the South and 220,000 Confederate prisoners were 6 held in the North. Starting in 1865, the federal government began 7 returning large numbers of prisoners to the Confederacy. After the 8 surrender at Appomattox, the Union prisons were closed quickly; and

9 WHEREAS, The United States entered World War I in April 1917. Of 10 the 4,120 American POW's during World War I, 147 died in captivity with 11 most deaths resulting from wounds received in combat. Prisoner 12 exchanges followed the signing of the armistice; and

WHEREAS, During World War II, 260,000 American POW's were held by 13 14 Germans in Europe. Over 1,121 American POW's died in European prison In the Far East, the Japanese held 124,079 American POW's. 15 camps. 16 10,650 American POW's died in Japanese prison camps. In addition, 17 there were 30,314 MIA's and 78,776 unaccounted for in the Far East; and WHEREAS, During the Korean War, more than 12,000 American POW's 18 were held by North Korea and China. Additionally, over 8,000 were 19 classified as MIA and unaccounted for. After a truce was signed at 20 21 Panmonjum, over 4,000 American POW's were returned in August 1953; and

22 WHEREAS, During the Vietnam War, 1,750 Americans were listed as MIA 23 or unaccounted for in Vietnam and an additional 600 were MIA in 24 neighboring Laos and Cambodia. To date, Vietnam has not accounted for 25 all American POW's;

NOW, THEREFORE, Your Memorialists respectfully pray that the Washington State Transportation Commission commence proceedings to designate state route number 117 in Clallam county between the junction of state route number 101 and Marine Drive in the city of Port Angeles as the POW/MIA Memorial Highway to honor the service and sacrifice of all prisoners of war, missing in action, and those unaccounted for who served in the United States of America.

33 BE IT RESOLVED, That copies of this Memorial be immediately 34 transmitted to the Honorable Paula Hammond, Secretary of 35 Transportation, the Washington State Transportation Commission, and the 36 Washington State Department of Transportation.

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
