1 Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the 2 following:

3 "<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. A new section is added to chapter 36.24 4 RCW to read as follows:

Within 12 months of being elected or appointed to the office, a 5 coroner or medical examiner must have a certificate of completion of 6 7 medicolegal forensic investigation training that complies with the standards adopted for the medicolegal training academy adopted by the 8 9 criminal justice training commission in conjunction with the Washington association of coroners and medical examiners and a 10 practicing physician selected by the commission pursuant to section 3 11 12 of this act. This requirement does not apply to an elected prosecutor 13 acting as the ex officio coroner in a county. All medicolegal 14 investigative personnel employed by any coroner's medical or examiner's office must complete medicolegal forensic investigation 15 training as required under section 3 of this act. A county in which 16 17 the coroner or county medical examiner has not obtained such certification within 12 months of assuming office is ineligible to 18 receive reimbursement from the death investigations account under RCW 19 68.50.104. 20

21 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 36.24 22 RCW to read as follows:

23 Except those run by a county prosecutor, all county coroner's 24 offices and medical examiner's offices must be accredited by either 25 the international association of coroners and medical examiners or 26 the national association of medical examiners no later than July 1, 27 2025, and maintain continued accreditation thereafter. A county that contracts for its coroner or medical examiner services with an 28 accredited coroner or medical examiner's office in another county 29 does not need to maintain accreditation. 30

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 43.101
 RCW to read as follows:

(1) (a) All elected coroners, appointed coroners, persons serving 3 as coroners, medical examiners, and all other full-time medicolegal 4 investigative personnel employed by a county coroner's or medical 5 6 examiner's office must successfully complete medicolegal forensic investigation training through the medicolegal training academy 7 program within 12 months of being elected, appointed, or employed 8 unless otherwise exempted by the commission. This section does not 9 apply to elected prosecutors who are coroners in their counties. 10

(b) All part-time medicolegal investigative personnel employed by a county coroner's or medical examiner's office must successfully complete medicolegal forensic investigation training through the medicolegal training academy program within 18 months of being employed unless otherwise exempted by the commission.

16 (2)The commission, in conjunction with the Washington 17 association of coroners and medical examiners and a practicing physician selected by the commission, shall develop the medicolegal 18 forensic investigation training curriculum and adopt the standards 19 for the medicolegal training academy and any exemption from the 20 requirement to complete the medicolegal forensic investigation 21 training. The commission shall exempt from this requirement any 22 23 coroner, medical examiner, or medicolegal investigative personnel who obtained training comparable to the 24 has medicolegal forensic investigation training by virtue of educational or professional 25 26 training or experience.

(3) The commission must certify successful completion of the medicolegal forensic investigation training or exemption from the medicolegal training requirement within 60 days from the receipt of proof of completion or request for exemption.

31 (4) The medicolegal forensic investigation training required 32 under this section must:

33 (a) Meet the recommendations of the national commission on34 forensic science for certification and accreditation; and

35 (b) Satisfy the requirements for training on the subject of 36 sudden, unexplained child death including, but not limited to, sudden 37 infant death syndrome developed pursuant to RCW 43.103.100 and 38 missing persons protocols pursuant to RCW 43.103.110.

39 (5) Certification under this section is a condition of continued40 employment in a coroner's or medical examiner's office.

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(6) A coroner's or medical examiner's office in which a coroner, 1 person serving as coroner, medical examiner, or other medicolegal 2 investigative employee, who has not otherwise been exempted by the 3 commission, is not certified within 12 months of being elected, 4 appointed, or employed as required by this section, is not eligible 5 6 for reimbursement from the death investigations account under RCW 68.50.104 until the office is in compliance with all requirements 7 under this section. 8

9 Sec. 4. RCW 36.16.030 and 2015 c 53 s 61 are each amended to 10 read as follows:

11 Except as provided elsewhere in this section, in every county there shall be elected from among the qualified voters of the county 12 a county assessor, a county auditor, a county clerk, a county 13 coroner, three county commissioners, a county prosecuting attorney, a 14 15 county sheriff, and a county treasurer, except that in each county with a population of less than forty thousand the county legislative 16 authority may determine that no coroner shall be elected and ((the 17 prosecuting attorney shall be ex officio coroner. Whenever the 18 population of a county increases to forty thousand or more, the 19 prosecuting attorney shall continue as ex officio coroner until a 20 coroner is elected, at the next general election at which the office 21 22 of prosecuting attorney normally would be elected, and assumes office as provided in RCW 29A.60.280. In any county where the population has 23 24 once attained forty thousand people and a current coroner is in office and a subsequent census indicates less than forty thousand 25 people, the county legislative authority may maintain the office of 26 coroner by resolution or ordinance. In a county 33 with a population of two hundred fifty thousand or more, the county 34 legislative authority may replace the office of coroner with a 35 medical examiner system and appoint a medical examiner as specified 36 in RCW 36.24.190. Any county may enter into an interlocal agreement 37 38 under chapter 39.34 RCW with an adjoining county for the provision of coroner or medical examiner services. 3 Sec. 5. RCW 36.16.030 and 2015 c 53 s 61 are each amended to 4 read as follows:

5 Except as provided elsewhere in this section, in every county there shall be elected from among the qualified voters of the county 6 a county assessor, a county auditor, a county clerk, a county 7 coroner, three county commissioners, a county prosecuting attorney, a 8 county sheriff, and a county treasurer, except that in each county 9 10 with a population of less than forty thousand no coroner shall be elected and the prosecuting attorney shall be ex officio coroner. 11 Whenever the population of a county increases to forty thousand or 12 more, the prosecuting attorney shall continue as ex officio coroner 13 until a coroner is elected, at the next general election at which the 14 15 office of prosecuting attorney normally would be elected, and assumes 16 office as provided in RCW 29A.60.280. 37 The county legislative authority of each county or a county 38 commissioner or councilmember salary commission which conforms with Code Rev/RB:eab
4 H-1015.4/21 4th draft 1 RCW 36.17.024 is authorized to establish the salaries of the elected 2 officials of the county. The state and county shall contribute to the 3 costs of the salary of the elected prosecuting attorney as set forth 4 in subsection (11) of this section. 25 (9) In each county with a population of from five thousand to 26 less than eight thousand: Auditor, nine thousand one hundred dollars; clerk, nine thousand one hundred dollars; treasurer, nine thousand 27 28 one hundred dollars; assessor, nine thousand one hundred dollars; 29 sheriff, ten thousand five hundred dollars; ((and)) members of the county legislative authority, six thousand five hundred dollars; and 30 31 coroner, \$6,500 or on a per case basis as determined by the county 32 legislative authority;

(10) In each other county: Auditor, nine thousand one hundred dollars; clerk, nine thousand one hundred dollars; treasurer, nine thousand one hundred dollars; sheriff, ten thousand five hundred dollars; assessor, nine thousand one hundred dollars; ((and)) members of the county legislative authority, six thousand five hundred dollars; and coroner, \$6,500 or on a per case basis as determined by the county legislative authority;

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1 (11) The state of Washington shall contribute an amount equal to 2 one-half the salary of a superior court judge towards the salary of 3 the elected prosecuting attorney. Upon receipt of the state 4 contribution, a county shall continue to contribute towards the 5 salary of the elected prosecuting attorney in an amount that equals 6 or exceeds that contributed by the county in 2008.

7 Sec. 7. RCW 68.50.010 and 1963 c 178 s 1 are each amended to 8 read as follows:

The jurisdiction of bodies of all deceased persons who come to 9 10 their death suddenly when in apparent good health without medical attendance within the thirty-six hours preceding death; or where the 11 circumstances of death indicate death was caused by unnatural or 12 unlawful means; or where death occurs under suspicious circumstances; 13 or where a coroner's autopsy or postmortem or coroner's inquest is to 14 15 be held; or where death results from unknown or obscure causes, or where death occurs within one year following an accident; or where 16 17 the death is caused by any violence whatsoever, or where death results from a known or suspected abortion; whether self-induced or 18 otherwise; where death apparently results from drowning, hanging, 19 20 burns, electrocution, gunshot wounds, stabs or cuts, lightning, starvation, radiation, exposure, alcoholism, narcotics or other 21 addictions, tetanus, strangulations, suffocation or smothering; or 22 where death is due to premature birth or still birth; or where death 23 24 is due to a violent contagious disease or suspected contagious disease which may be a public health hazard; or where death results 25 from alleged rape, carnal knowledge or sodomy, where death occurs in 26 27 a jail or prison; where a body is found dead or is not claimed by relatives or friends, is hereby vested in the county coroner or 28 medical examiner, which bodies may be removed and placed in the 29 30 morque under such rules as are adopted by the coroner or medical examiner with the approval of the county commissioners, having 31 jurisdiction, providing therein how the bodies shall be brought to 32 and cared for at the morgue and held for the proper identification 33 34 where necessary.

35 Sec. 8. RCW 68.50.104 and 2019 c 317 s 4 are each amended to 36 read as follows:

37 (1) The cost of autopsy shall be borne by the county in which the
 38 autopsy is performed, except when requested by the department of
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1 labor and industries, in which case, the department shall bear the 2 cost of such autopsy.

3 (2)(a) Except as provided in (b) of this subsection, when the 4 county bears the cost of an autopsy, it shall be reimbursed from the 5 death investigations account, established by RCW 43.79.445, as 6 follows:

7 (i) Up to forty percent of the cost of contracting for the 8 services of a pathologist to perform an autopsy;

9 (ii) Up to ((twenty-five)) <u>30</u> percent of the salary of 10 pathologists who are primarily engaged in performing autopsies and 11 are (A) county coroners or county medical examiners, or (B) employees 12 of a county coroner or county medical examiner; and

13 (iii) One hundred percent of the cost of autopsies conducted 14 under RCW 70.54.450.

(b) When the county bears the cost of an autopsy of a child under the age of three whose death was sudden and unexplained, the county shall be reimbursed for the expenses of the autopsy when the death scene investigation and the autopsy have been conducted under RCW 43.103.100 (4) and (5), and the autopsy has been done at a facility designed for the performance of autopsies.

(3) Payments from the account shall be made pursuant to biennial
 appropriation: PROVIDED, That no county may reduce funds appropriated
 for this purpose below 1983 budgeted levels.

24 <u>(4) Where the county coroner's office or county medical</u> 25 examiner's office is not accredited pursuant to section 2 of this 26 act, or a coroner, medical examiner, or other medicolegal 27 investigative employee is not certified as required by sections 1 and 28 3 of this act, the state treasurer's office shall withhold autopsy 29 reimbursement funds until accreditation under section 2 of this act 30 or compliance with sections 1 and 3 of this act is achieved.

31 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 9. Sections 4 and 6 of this act take effect 32 January 1, 2025.

33 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 10. Section 5 of this act expires January 1, 34 2025."

35 Correct the title.

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EFFECT: (1) Allows a county legislative authority in a county with fewer than 40,000 people to decide to appoint a coroner, instead of electing one, once the elected prosecutor ceases acting as exofficio coroner in such a county on January 1, 2025.

(2) Allows a county to enter into an interlocal agreement with an adjoining county for the provision of coroner or medical examiner services.

(3) Provides minimum salaries for elected coroners in counties with under 40,000 people, and allows a county legislative authority to alternatively set the salary on a per case basis in such counties, as of January 1, 2025.

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
