36 competitive, publicly-owned telecommunication network infrastructure.

37 (b) The board may provide financial assistance only for projects
38 located in a rural community as defined by the board, or located in a

1 rural county, that encourage, foster, develop, and improve broadband
2 within the state in order to:

3 (i) Drive job creation, promote innovation, and expand markets
4 for local businesses;

5 (ii) Serve the ongoing and growing needs of local education
6 systems, health care systems, public safety systems, industries and
7 businesses, governmental operations, and citizens; and

8 (iii) Improve accessibility for underserved communities and
9 populations.

10 (c) An application must be approved by the local government and
11 supported by the local associate development organization or local
12 workforce development council or approved by the governing body of
13 the federally recognized Indian tribe.

14 (d) The board may allow de minimis general system improvements to
15 be funded if they are critically linked to the viability of the
16 project.

17 (e) When evaluating and prioritizing projects, the board must
18 give consideration, at a minimum, to the following factors:

19 (i) The project's value to the community, including evidence of
20 support from affected local businesses and government;

21 (ii) The project's feasibility, using standard economic
22 principles;

23 (iii) Commitment of local matching resources and local
24 participation;

25 (iv) The project's inclusion in a capital facilities plan,
26 comprehensive plan, or local economic development plan consistent
27 with applicable state planning requirements; and

28 (v) The project's readiness to proceed.

29 (3) A responsible official of the local government or the
30 federally recognized Indian tribe must be present during community
31 economic revitalization board deliberations and provide information
32 that the board requests.

33 (4) Before any financial assistance application is approved, the
34 local government or the federally recognized Indian tribe seeking the
35 assistance must demonstrate to the community economic revitalization
36 board that no other timely source of funding is available to it at
37 costs reasonably similar to financing available from the board.

38 (5) The appropriations must be used for projects that use a
39 technology-neutral approach in order to expand access at the lowest
40 cost to the most unserved or underserved residents.

30 (2) The department must establish a competitive process to
31 solicit proposals for and prioritize projects whose primary objective
32 is to assist libraries operated by governmental units, as defined in
33 RCW 27.12.010, in acquiring, constructing, repairing, or
34 rehabilitating facilities.

35 (3) The department must establish a committee to develop the
36 grant program criteria and review proposals. The committee must be
37 composed of five members as provided in this subsection. The
38 committee must include: (a) A representative from the department of
39 commerce; (b) a representative from the department of archaeology and

1 historic preservation; (c) the state librarian; (d) a representative
2 from a library district; and (e) a representative from a municipal
3 library.

4 (4) The department must conduct a statewide solicitation of
5 project applications. The department must evaluate and rank
6 applications in consultation with the committee established in
7 subsection (3) of this section, using objective criteria. The ranking
8 of projects must prioritize library district facilities listed on a
9 local, state, or federal register of historic places and those
10 located in distressed or rural counties. The evaluation and ranking
11 process must also include an examination of existing assets that
12 applicants propose to apply to projects. Grant assistance under this
13 section may not exceed 50 percent of the total cost of the project.
14 The nonstate portion of the total project cost may include cash, the
15 value of real property when acquired solely for the purpose of the
16 project, and in-kind contributions.

17 (5) The department must submit a prioritized list of recommended
18 projects to the governor and the legislature by October 1, 2022, for
19 inclusion in the department of commerce's 2023-2025 biennial capital
20 budget request. The list must include a description of each project,
21 the amount of recommended state funding, and documentation of
22 nonstate funds to be used for the project. Individual grants may not
23 exceed \$2,000,000. The total amount of recommended state funding for
24 the projects on a biennial project list may not exceed \$10,000,000.

25 (6) In contracts for grants authorized under this section, the
26 department must include provisions that require that capital
27 improvements be held by the grantee for a specified period of time
28 appropriate to the amount of the grant and that facilities be used
29 for the express purpose of the grant. If the grantee is found to be
30 out of compliance with provisions of the contract, the grantee must
31 repay to the state general fund the principal amount of the grant
32 plus interest calculated at the rate of interest on state of
33 Washington general obligation bonds issued on the date most close in
34 time to the date of authorization of the grant.

13 The appropriations in this section are subject to the following
14 conditions and limitations:

15 (1) The appropriations in this section are provided solely for
16 projects that provide a benefit to the public through development,
17 demonstration, and deployment of clean energy technologies that save
18 energy and reduce energy costs, reduce harmful air emissions, or
19 increase energy independence for the state. Priority must be given to
20 projects that benefit vulnerable populations and overburdened
21 communities, including tribes and communities with high environmental
22 or energy burdens.

23 (2) The 2021 state energy strategy must guide the department in
24 the design of programs under this section, using an equity and
25 environmental justice lens for program structure and participation.
26 To the extent practicable, the department must prioritize projects
27 that build upon Washington's existing strengths in communities,
28 aerospace, maritime, information and communications technology
29 (particularly data center infrastructure, artificial intelligence and
30 machine learning), grid modernization, advanced materials, and
31 decarbonizing the built environment.

32 (3) Subject to the availability of funds, the department must
33 reconvene an advisory committee to support involvement of a broad
34 range of stakeholders in the design and implementation of programs
35 implemented under this section to encourage collaboration, leverage
36 partners, and engage communities and organizations in improving the
37 equitable distribution of benefits from the program.

1 (4) In soliciting and evaluating proposals, awarding contracts,
2 and monitoring projects under this section, the department must:

3 (a) Ensure that competitive processes, rather than sole source
4 contracting processes, are used to select all projects, except as
5 otherwise noted in this section; and

6 (b) Conduct due diligence activities associated with the use of
7 public funds including, but not limited to, oversight of the project
8 selection process, project monitoring, and ensuring that all
9 applications and contracts fully comply with all applicable laws
10 including disclosure and conflict of interest statutes.

11 (5) During project solicitation periods for grants funded with
12 this appropriation, the department must maintain a list of applicants
13 by grant program that scored competitively but did not receive a
14 grant award due to lack of available funding. These applicants must
15 be considered for funding during future grant award cycles. If the
16 department submits a 2022 supplemental budget request for this
17 program, the request must include a list of prioritized projects by
18 grant type.

19 (6) (a) Pursuant to chapter 42.52 RCW, the ethics in public
20 service act, the department must require a project applicant to
21 identify in application materials any state of Washington employees
22 or former state employees employed by the firm or on the firm's
23 governing board during the past 24 months. Application materials must
24 identify the individual by name, the agency previously or currently
25 employing the individual, job title or position held, and separation
26 date. If it is determined by the department that a conflict of
27 interest exists, the applicant may be disqualified from further
28 consideration for award of funding.

29 (b) If the department finds, after due notice and examination,
30 that there is a violation of chapter 42.52 RCW, or any similar
31 statute involving a grantee who received funding under this section,
32 either in procuring or performing under the grant, the department in
33 its sole discretion may terminate the funding grant by written
34 notice. If the grant is terminated, the department must reserve its
35 right to pursue all available remedies under law to address the
36 violation.

37 (7) The requirements in subsections (4) and (6) of this section
38 must be specified in funding agreements issued by the department.

39 (8) \$17,594,000 of the state building construction account—state
40 appropriation is provided solely for grid modernization grants.

1 (a) (i) \$11,000,000 is provided solely for projects that: Advance
2 community resilience, clean and renewable energy technologies and
3 transmission and distribution control systems; support integration of
4 renewable energy sources, deployment of distributed energy resources
5 and sustainable microgrids; and support state decarbonization goals
6 pursuant to the clean energy transformation act, including
7 requirements placed upon retail electric utilities.

8 (ii) Projects must be implemented by community organizations,
9 local governments, federally recognized tribal governments, or by
10 public and private electrical utilities that serve retail customers
11 in the state (retail electric utilities). Projects submitted by
12 applicants other than retail electric utilities must demonstrate
13 partnership with their load serving entity to apply. Priority must be
14 given to:

15 (A) Projects that benefit vulnerable populations, including
16 tribes and communities with high environmental or energy burden; and

17 (B) Projects that demonstrate partnerships between eligible
18 applicants in applying for funding, including utilities, public and
19 private sector research organizations, businesses, tribes, and
20 nonprofit organizations.

21 (iii) The department shall develop a grant application process to
22 competitively select projects for grant awards, to include scoring
23 conducted by a group of qualified experts with application of
24 criteria specified by the department. In development of the
25 application criteria, the department shall, to the extent possible,
26 develop program guidelines that encourage smaller utilities or
27 consortia of small utilities to apply for funding. Where suitable,
28 this may include funding for projects consisting solely of planning,
29 predesign and/or predevelopment activities.

30 (iv) Applications for grants must disclose all sources of public
31 funds invested in a project.

32 (b) \$3,550,000 of the appropriation in this section is provided

16 by the department in Thurston county.

17 During the 2019-2021 and 2021-2023 fiscal biennia, the Thurston
18 county capital facilities account may be appropriated for costs
19 associated with staffing to support capital budget and project
20 activities and lease and facility oversight activities. During the
21 2021-2023 fiscal biennium, the Thurston county capital facilities
22 account may be appropriated for activities related to Capitol Lake
23 long-term management planning, as provided in section 1057 of this
24 act.

25 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7012.** The state board for community and
26 technical colleges was tasked by the legislature in section 7038,
27 chapter 332, Laws of 2021 to report on alternative methods of
28 prioritizing and presenting the list of requested capital projects
29 for community and technical colleges in the 2023-2025 fiscal
30 biennium. The state board for community and technical colleges shall
31 implement for the 2023-2025 fiscal biennium the report's option of a
32 single prioritized request with minor projects above major projects
33 and with all of the funding needed for design and construction
34 included in a single biennium. However, in recognition of the
35 transition to this new prioritized request method, projects that
36 received funding for design only in the 2019-2021 or 2021-2023 fiscal
37 biennia must receive priority over new major project requests in the
38 2023-2025 fiscal biennium request.

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7013.** If any provision of this act or its
2 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the
3 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other
4 persons or circumstances is not affected.

5 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7014.** This act is necessary for the immediate
6 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of
7 the state government and its existing public institutions, and takes
8 effect immediately."
