1 AN ACT Relating to establishing a law enforcement professional 2 development outreach grant program; creating new sections; and 3 providing an expiration date.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. The legislature recognizes that recruiting and retaining law enforcement officers is a significant challenge 6 7 faced by law enforcement agencies across the state. There are many causes, including salary, high attrition, and generational shifts in 8 the workplace. However, community distrust of law enforcement has 9 also made the profession less desirable for new and qualified 10 11 candidates. It is paramount for law enforcement agencies to bridge 12 these gaps with the community to both improve external relations and 13 advance recruitment and retention efforts.

14 Law enforcement agencies should reflect the demographics of the communities they serve. A dynamic, diverse, community-oriented police 15 16 improve external relations and therefore ensure the force will 17 effective delivery of services to the public. Therefore, the 18 legislature hereby establishes a grant for local program law 19 enforcement agencies to engage in innovative outreach efforts 20 designed to promote a diverse police force reflective of local 21 communities.

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. (1) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, the criminal justice training commission shall develop and implement a law enforcement professional development outreach grant program for the purpose of encouraging a broader diversity of candidates from underrepresented groups and communities to seek careers in law enforcement.

(2) Grants must be awarded to local law enforcement agencies 7 based on locally developed proposals. Two or more agencies may submit 8 a joint proposal for a multijurisdictional project. A proposal must 9 include a specific plan for encouraging persons from underrepresented 10 11 groups and communities to seek careers in law enforcement. The 12 commission shall establish policies for applications under this section in addition to criteria for evaluating and selecting grant 13 recipients. To the extent possible, at least one grant recipient 14 agency should be from the east side of the state and one from the 15 16 west side of the state, with the crest of the Cascades being the 17 dividing line. No single grant award may exceed sixty thousand 18 dollars. The commission shall select grant recipients and begin distributing funds no later than December 1, 2021. 19

(3) The commission shall submit a report to the governor and the appropriate committees of the legislature on the grant program no later than December 1, 2022. The report must include a summary of the grant recipients, use of funds, and any potential impact on anticipated recruitment.
