AN ACT Relating to standardizing definitions of homelessness to improve access to services; and amending RCW 43.216.505, 13.34.030, 26.44.020, 13.34.065, and 13.34.138.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 **Sec. 1.** RCW 43.216.505 and 2019 c 408 s 2 are each amended to 6 read as follows:

7 Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the definitions in 8 this section apply throughout RCW 43.216.500 through 43.216.559, 9 43.216.900, and 43.216.901.

10 (1) "Advisory committee" means the advisory committee under RCW 11 43.216.520.

12 (2) "Approved programs" means those state-supported education and 13 special assistance programs which are recognized by the department as 14 meeting the minimum program rules adopted by the department to 15 qualify under RCW 43.216.500 through 43.216.550, 43.216.900, and 16 43.216.901 and are designated as eligible for funding by the 17 department under RCW 43.216.530 and 43.216.540.

18 (3) "Comprehensive" means an assistance program that focuses on 19 the needs of the child and includes education, health, and family 20 support services. 1 (4) "Eligible child" means a three to five-year old child who is 2 not age-eligible for kindergarten, is not a participant in a federal 3 or state program providing comprehensive services, and who:

4 (a) Has a family income at or below one hundred ten percent of
5 the federal poverty level, as published annually by the federal
6 department of health and human services;

7 (b) Is eligible for special education due to disability under RCW8 28A.155.020; or

9 (c) Meets criteria under rules adopted by the department if the 10 number of such children equals not more than ten percent of the total 11 enrollment in the early childhood program. Preference for enrollment 12 in this group shall be given to children from families with the 13 lowest income, children in foster care, or to eligible children from 14 families with multiple needs.

15 (5) "Family support services" means providing opportunities for 16 parents to:

17 (a) Actively participate in their child's early childhood 18 program;

19 (b) Increase their knowledge of child development and parenting 20 skills;

21 (c) Further their education and training;

22 (d) Increase their ability to use needed services in the 23 community;

24 (e) Increase their self-reliance.

25 (6) "Homeless" means a child without a fixed, regular, and 26 adequate nighttime residence as described in the federal McKinney-27 Vento homeless assistance act (Title 42 U.S.C., chapter 119, 28 subchapter VI, part B) as it existed on January 1, 2021.

29 Sec. 2. RCW 13.34.030 and 2020 c 312 s 114 are each amended to 30 read as follows:

31 The definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter 32 unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

(1) "Abandoned" means when the child's parent, guardian, or other custodian has expressed, either by statement or conduct, an intent to forego, for an extended period, parental rights or responsibilities despite an ability to exercise such rights and responsibilities. If the court finds that the petitioner has exercised due diligence in attempting to locate the parent, no contact between the child and the child's parent, guardian, or other custodian for a period of three

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1 months creates a rebuttable presumption of abandonment, even if there
2 is no expressed intent to abandon.

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- (2) "Child," "juvenile," and "youth" mean:
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(a) Any individual under the age of eighteen years; or

5 (b) Any individual age eighteen to twenty-one years who is 6 eligible to receive and who elects to receive the extended foster 7 care services authorized under RCW 74.13.031. A youth who remains 8 dependent and who receives extended foster care services under RCW 9 74.13.031 shall not be considered a "child" under any other statute 10 or for any other purpose.

(3) "Current placement episode" means the period of time that begins with the most recent date that the child was removed from the home of the parent, guardian, or legal custodian for purposes of placement in out-of-home care and continues until: (a) The child returns home; (b) an adoption decree, a permanent custody order, or guardianship order is entered; or (c) the dependency is dismissed, whichever occurs first.

18 (4) "Department" means the department of children, youth, and 19 families.

20 (5) "Dependency guardian" means the person, nonprofit 21 corporation, or Indian tribe appointed by the court pursuant to this 22 chapter for the limited purpose of assisting the court in the 23 supervision of the dependency.

24 (6) "Dependent child" means any child who:

25 (a) Has been abandoned;

(b) Is abused or neglected as defined in chapter 26.44 RCW by aperson legally responsible for the care of the child;

(c) Has no parent, guardian, or custodian capable of adequately caring for the child, such that the child is in circumstances which constitute a danger of substantial damage to the child's psychological or physical development; or

32 (d) Is receiving extended foster care services, as authorized by33 RCW 74.13.031.

(7) "Developmental disability" means a disability attributable to intellectual disability, cerebral palsy, epilepsy, autism, or another neurological or other condition of an individual found by the secretary of the department of social and health services to be closely related to an intellectual disability or to require treatment similar to that required for individuals with intellectual disabilities, which disability originates before the individual 1 attains age eighteen, which has continued or can be expected to 2 continue indefinitely, and which constitutes a substantial limitation 3 to the individual.

4 (8) "Educational liaison" means a person who has been appointed
5 by the court to fulfill responsibilities outlined in RCW 13.34.046.

6 (9) "Extended foster care services" means residential and other 7 support services the department is authorized to provide under RCW 8 74.13.031. These services may include placement in licensed, 9 relative, or otherwise approved care, or supervised independent 10 living settings; assistance in meeting basic needs; independent 11 living services; medical assistance; and counseling or treatment.

(10) "Guardian" means the person or agency that: (a) Has been appointed as the guardian of a child in a legal proceeding, including a guardian appointed pursuant to chapter 13.36 RCW; and (b) has the legal right to custody of the child pursuant to such appointment. The term "guardian" does not include a "dependency guardian" appointed pursuant to a proceeding under this chapter.

(11) "Guardian ad litem" means a person, appointed by the court 18 to represent the best interests of a child in a proceeding under this 19 chapter, or in any matter which may be consolidated with a proceeding 20 21 under this chapter. A "court-appointed special advocate" appointed by the court to be the guardian ad litem for the child, or to perform 22 23 substantially the same duties and functions as a guardian ad litem, shall be deemed to be guardian ad litem for all purposes and uses of 24 25 this chapter.

(12) "Guardian ad litem program" means a court-authorized volunteer program, which is or may be established by the superior court of the county in which such proceeding is filed, to manage all aspects of volunteer guardian ad litem representation for children alleged or found to be dependent. Such management shall include but is not limited to: Recruitment, screening, training, supervision, assignment, and discharge of volunteers.

33 (13) "Guardianship" means a guardianship pursuant to chapter 34 13.36 RCW or a limited guardianship of a minor pursuant to RCW 35 11.130.215 or equivalent laws of another state or a federally 36 recognized Indian tribe.

37 (14) "Housing assistance" means appropriate referrals by the 38 department or other agencies to federal, state, local, or private 39 agencies or organizations, assistance with forms, applications, or 40 financial subsidies or other monetary assistance for housing. For

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1 purposes of this chapter, "housing assistance" is not a remedial 2 service or family reunification service as described in RCW 3 13.34.025(2).

4 (15) "Indigent" means a person who, at any stage of a court 5 proceeding, is:

6 (a) Receiving one of the following types of public assistance: 7 Temporary assistance for needy families, aged, blind, or disabled 8 assistance benefits, medical care services under RCW 74.09.035, 9 pregnant women assistance benefits, poverty-related veterans' 10 benefits, food stamps or food stamp benefits transferred 11 electronically, refugee resettlement benefits, medicaid, or 12 supplemental security income; or

13 (b) Involuntarily committed to a public mental health facility; 14 or

15 (c) Receiving an annual income, after taxes, of one hundred 16 twenty-five percent or less of the federally established poverty 17 level; or

(d) Unable to pay the anticipated cost of counsel for the matter
before the court because his or her available funds are insufficient
to pay any amount for the retention of counsel.

(16) "Nonminor dependent" means any individual age eighteen to twenty-one years who is participating in extended foster care services authorized under RCW 74.13.031.

(17) "Out-of-home care" means placement in a foster family home or group care facility licensed pursuant to chapter 74.15 RCW or placement in a home, other than that of the child's parent, guardian, or legal custodian, not required to be licensed pursuant to chapter 74.15 RCW.

(18) "Parent" means the biological or adoptive parents of a child, or an individual who has established a parent-child relationship under RCW 26.26A.100, unless the legal rights of that person have been terminated by a judicial proceeding pursuant to this chapter, chapter 26.33 RCW, or the equivalent laws of another state or a federally recognized Indian tribe.

(19) "Prevention and family services and programs" means specific mental health prevention and treatment services, substance abuse prevention and treatment services, and in-home parent skill-based programs that qualify for federal funding under the federal family first prevention services act, P.L. 115-123. For purposes of this chapter, prevention and family services and programs are not remedial

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1 services or family reunification services as described in RCW
2 13.34.025(2).

3 (20) "Prevention services" means preservation services, as 4 defined in chapter 74.14C RCW, and other reasonably available 5 services, including housing assistance, capable of preventing the 6 need for out-of-home placement while protecting the child. Prevention 7 services include, but are not limited to, prevention and family 8 services and programs as defined in this section.

9 (21) "Qualified residential treatment program" means a program 10 licensed as a group care facility under chapter 74.15 RCW that also 11 qualifies for funding under the federal family first prevention 12 services act under 42 U.S.C. Sec. 672(k) and meets the requirements 13 provided in RCW 13.34.420.

14 (22) "Relative" includes persons related to a child in the 15 following ways:

16 (a) Any blood relative, including those of half-blood, and 17 including first cousins, second cousins, nephews or nieces, and 18 persons of preceding generations as denoted by prefixes of grand, 19 great, or great-great;

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(b) Stepfather, stepmother, stepbrother, and stepsister;

(c) A person who legally adopts a child or the child's parent as well as the natural and other legally adopted children of such persons, and other relatives of the adoptive parents in accordance with state law;

25 (d) Spouses of any persons named in (a), (b), or (c) of this 26 subsection, even after the marriage is terminated;

(e) Relatives, as named in (a), (b), (c), or (d) of thissubsection, of any half sibling of the child; or

(f) Extended family members, as defined by the law or custom of the Indian child's tribe or, in the absence of such law or custom, a person who has reached the age of eighteen and who is the Indian child's grandparent, aunt or uncle, brother or sister, brother-in-law or sister-in-law, niece or nephew, first or second cousin, or stepparent who provides care in the family abode on a twenty-four hour basis to an Indian child as defined in 25 U.S.C. Sec. 1903(4).

36 (23) "Shelter care" means temporary physical care in a facility 37 licensed pursuant to RCW 74.15.030 or in a home not required to be 38 licensed pursuant to RCW 74.15.030.

39 (24) "Sibling" means a child's birth brother, birth sister,40 adoptive brother, adoptive sister, half-brother, or half-sister, or

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as defined by the law or custom of the Indian child's tribe for an
 Indian child as defined in RCW 13.38.040.

3 (25) "Social study" means a written evaluation of matters 4 relevant to the disposition of the case that contains the information 5 required by RCW 13.34.430.

6 (26) "Supervised independent living" includes, but is not limited 7 to, apartment living, room and board arrangements, college or 8 university dormitories, and shared roommate settings. Supervised 9 independent living settings must be approved by the department or the 10 court.

11 (27) "Voluntary placement agreement" means, for the purposes of 12 extended foster care services, a written voluntary agreement between 13 a nonminor dependent who agrees to submit to the care and authority 14 of the department for the purposes of participating in the extended 15 foster care program.

16 <u>(28) "Experiencing homelessness" means lacking a fixed, regular,</u> 17 and adequate nighttime residence, including circumstances such as 18 sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic 19 hardship, fleeing domestic violence, or a similar reason as described 20 in the federal McKinney-Vento homeless assistance act (Title 42 21 U.S.C., chapter 119, subchapter I) as it existed on January 1, 2021.

22 Sec. 3. RCW 26.44.020 and 2019 c 172 s 5 are each amended to 23 read as follows:

The definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

(1) "Abuse or neglect" means sexual abuse, sexual exploitation, or injury of a child by any person under circumstances which cause harm to the child's health, welfare, or safety, excluding conduct permitted under RCW 9A.16.100; or the negligent treatment or maltreatment of a child by a person responsible for or providing care to the child. An abused child is a child who has been subjected to child abuse or neglect as defined in this section.

33 (2) "Child" or "children" means any person under the age of 34 eighteen years of age.

35 (3) "Child forensic interview" means a developmentally sensitive 36 and legally sound method of gathering factual information regarding 37 allegations of child abuse, child neglect, or exposure to violence. 38 This interview is conducted by a competently trained, neutral

1 professional utilizing techniques informed by research and best 2 practice as part of a larger investigative process.

(4) "Child protective services" means those services provided by 3 the department designed to protect children from child abuse and 4 neglect and safeguard such children from future abuse and neglect, 5 6 and conduct investigations of child abuse and neglect reports. Investigations may be conducted regardless of the location of the 7 alleged abuse or neglect. Child protective services includes referral 8 to services to ameliorate conditions that endanger the welfare of 9 children, the coordination of necessary programs and services 10 relevant to the prevention, intervention, and treatment of child 11 12 abuse and neglect, and services to children to ensure that each child has a permanent home. In determining whether protective services 13 should be provided, the department shall not decline to provide such 14 services solely because of the child's unwillingness or developmental 15 16 inability to describe the nature and severity of the abuse or 17 neglect.

18 (5) "Child protective services section" means the child 19 protective services section of the department.

(6) "Child who is a candidate for foster care" means a child who 20 the department identifies as being at imminent risk of entering 21 foster care but who can remain safely in the child's home or in a 22 23 kinship placement as long as services or programs that are necessary to prevent entry of the child into foster care are provided, and 24 25 includes but is not limited to a child whose adoption or guardianship arrangement is at risk of a disruption or dissolution that would 26 27 result in a foster care placement. The term includes a child for whom there is reasonable cause to believe that any of the following 28 29 circumstances exist:

30 (a) The child has been abandoned by the parent as defined in RCW
31 13.34.030 and the child's health, safety, and welfare is seriously
32 endangered as a result;

(b) The child has been abused or neglected as defined in <u>this</u> chapter ((26.44 RCW)) and the child's health, safety, and welfare is seriously endangered as a result;

36 (c) There is no parent capable of meeting the child's needs such 37 that the child is in circumstances that constitute a serious danger 38 to the child's development;

39 (d) The child is otherwise at imminent risk of harm.

1 (7) "Children's advocacy center" means a child-focused facility in good standing with the state chapter for children's advocacy 2 centers and that coordinates a multidisciplinary process for the 3 investigation, prosecution, and treatment of sexual and other types 4 of child abuse. Children's advocacy centers provide a location for 5 6 forensic interviews and coordinate access to services such as, but not limited to, medical evaluations, advocacy, therapy, and case 7 review by multidisciplinary teams within the context of county 8 protocols as defined in RCW 26.44.180 and 26.44.185. 9

10 (8) "Clergy" means any regularly licensed or ordained minister, 11 priest, or rabbi of any church or religious denomination, whether 12 acting in an individual capacity or as an employee or agent of any 13 public or private organization or institution.

14 (9) "Court" means the superior court of the state of Washington, 15 juvenile department.

16 (10) "Department" means the department of children, youth, and 17 families.

(11) "Family assessment" means a comprehensive assessment of child safety, risk of subsequent child abuse or neglect, and family strengths and needs that is applied to a child abuse or neglect report. Family assessment does not include a determination as to whether child abuse or neglect occurred, but does determine the need for services to address the safety of the child and the risk of subsequent maltreatment.

25 (12) "Family assessment response" means a way of responding to 26 certain reports of child abuse or neglect made under this chapter using a differential response approach to child protective services. 27 28 The family assessment response shall focus on the safety of the child, the integrity and preservation of the family, and shall assess 29 the status of the child and the family in terms of risk of abuse and 30 31 neglect including the parent's or guardian's or other caretaker's 32 capacity and willingness to protect the child and, if necessary, plan and arrange the provision of services to reduce the risk and 33 otherwise support the family. No one is named as a perpetrator, and 34 no investigative finding is entered in the record as a result of a 35 36 family assessment.

37 (13) "Founded" means the determination following an investigation 38 by the department that, based on available information, it is more 39 likely than not that child abuse or neglect did occur.

1 (14) "Inconclusive" means the determination following an 2 investigation by the department of social and health services, prior 3 to October 1, 2008, that based on available information a decision 4 cannot be made that more likely than not, child abuse or neglect did 5 or did not occur.

6 (15) "Institution" means a private or public hospital or any 7 other facility providing medical diagnosis, treatment, or care.

8 (16) "Law enforcement agency" means the police department, the 9 prosecuting attorney, the state patrol, the director of public 10 safety, or the office of the sheriff.

11 (17) "Malice" or "maliciously" means an intent, wish, or design 12 to intimidate, annoy, or injure another person. Such malice may be 13 inferred from an act done in willful disregard of the rights of 14 another, or an act wrongfully done without just cause or excuse, or 15 an act or omission of duty betraying a willful disregard of social 16 duty.

17 (18) "Negligent treatment or maltreatment" means an act or a failure to act, or the cumulative effects of a pattern of conduct, 18 behavior, or inaction, that evidences a serious disregard of 19 consequences of such magnitude as to constitute a clear and present 20 21 danger to a child's health, welfare, or safety, including but not limited to conduct prohibited under RCW 9A.42.100. When considering 22 whether a clear and present danger exists, evidence of a parent's 23 substance abuse as a contributing factor to negligent treatment or 24 25 maltreatment shall be given great weight. The fact that siblings share a bedroom is not, in and of itself, negligent treatment or 26 maltreatment. Poverty, <u>experiencing</u> homelessness, or exposure to 27 28 domestic violence as defined in RCW 26.50.010 that is perpetrated against someone other than the child does not constitute negligent 29 treatment or maltreatment in and of itself. 30

(19) "Pharmacist" means any registered pharmacist under chapter
 18.64 RCW, whether acting in an individual capacity or as an employee
 or agent of any public or private organization or institution.

34 (20) "Practitioner of the healing arts" or "practitioner" means a 35 person licensed by this state to practice podiatric medicine and 36 surgery, optometry, chiropractic, nursing, dentistry, osteopathic 37 medicine and surgery, or medicine and surgery or to provide other 38 health services. The term "practitioner" includes a duly accredited 39 Christian Science practitioner. A person who is being furnished 40 Christian Science treatment by a duly accredited Christian Science

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practitioner will not be considered, for that reason alone, a
 neglected person for the purposes of this chapter.

(21) "Prevention and family services and programs" means specific 3 mental health prevention and treatment services, substance abuse 4 prevention and treatment services, and in-home parent skill-based 5 6 programs that qualify for federal funding under the federal family first prevention services act, P.L. 115-123. For purposes of this 7 chapter, prevention and family services and programs are not remedial 8 services or family reunification services as described in RCW 9 13.34.025(2). 10

11 (22) "Professional school personnel" include, but are not limited 12 to, teachers, counselors, administrators, child care facility 13 personnel, and school nurses.

14 (23) "Psychologist" means any person licensed to practice 15 psychology under chapter 18.83 RCW, whether acting in an individual 16 capacity or as an employee or agent of any public or private 17 organization or institution.

18 (24) "Screened-out report" means a report of alleged child abuse 19 or neglect that the department has determined does not rise to the 20 level of a credible report of abuse or neglect and is not referred 21 for investigation.

(25) "Sexual exploitation" includes: (a) Allowing, permitting, or encouraging a child to engage in prostitution by any person; or (b) allowing, permitting, encouraging, or engaging in the obscene or pornographic photographing, filming, or depicting of a child by any person.

(26) "Sexually aggressive youth" means a child who is defined in
 RCW 74.13.075(1)(b) as being a sexually aggressive youth.

"Social service counselor" means anyone engaged in a 29 (27)professional capacity during the regular course of employment in 30 31 encouraging or promoting the health, welfare, support, or education of children, or providing social services to adults or families, 32 including mental health, drug and alcohol treatment, and domestic 33 violence programs, whether in an individual capacity, or 34 as an 35 employee or agent of any public or private organization or 36 institution.

37 (28) "Unfounded" means the determination following an 38 investigation by the department that available information indicates 39 that, more likely than not, child abuse or neglect did not occur, or

1 that there is insufficient evidence for the department to determine
2 whether the alleged child abuse did or did not occur.

3 (29) "Experiencing homelessness" means lacking a fixed, regular, 4 and adequate nighttime residence, including circumstances such as 5 sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic 6 hardship, fleeing domestic violence, or a similar reason as described 7 in the federal McKinney-Vento homeless assistance act (Title 42 8 U.S.C., chapter 119, subchapter I) as it existed on January 1, 2021.

9 Sec. 4. RCW 13.34.065 and 2019 c 172 s 11 are each amended to 10 read as follows:

(1) (a) When a child is taken into custody, the court shall hold a shelter care hearing within seventy-two hours, excluding Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays. The primary purpose of the shelter care hearing is to determine whether the child can be immediately and safely returned home while the adjudication of the dependency is pending.

(b) Any parent, guardian, or legal custodian who for good cause 17 is unable to attend the shelter care hearing may request that a 18 subsequent shelter care hearing be scheduled. The request shall be 19 20 made to the clerk of the court where the petition is filed prior to 21 the initial shelter care hearing. Upon the request of the parent, the court shall schedule the hearing within seventy-two hours of the 22 request, excluding Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays. The clerk shall 23 24 notify all other parties of the hearing by any reasonable means.

(2) (a) If it is likely that the child will remain in shelter care longer than seventy-two hours, the department shall submit a recommendation to the court as to the further need for shelter care in all cases in which the child will remain in shelter care longer than the seventy-two hour period. In all other cases, the recommendation shall be submitted by the juvenile court probation counselor.

32 (b) All parties have the right to present testimony to the court 33 regarding the need or lack of need for shelter care.

34 (c) Hearsay evidence before the court regarding the need or lack 35 of need for shelter care must be supported by sworn testimony, 36 affidavit, or declaration of the person offering such evidence.

37 (3) (a) At the commencement of the hearing, the court shall notify38 the parent, guardian, or custodian of the following:

(i) The parent, guardian, or custodian has the right to a shelter
 care hearing;

3 (ii) The nature of the shelter care hearing, the rights of the 4 parents, and the proceedings that will follow; and

5 (iii) If the parent, guardian, or custodian is not represented by 6 counsel, the right to be represented. If the parent, guardian, or 7 custodian is indigent, the court shall appoint counsel as provided in 8 RCW 13.34.090; and

(b) If a parent, guardian, or legal custodian desires to waive 9 the shelter care hearing, the court shall determine, on the record 10 11 and with the parties present, whether such waiver is knowing and 12 voluntary. A parent may not waive his or her right to the shelter care hearing unless he or she appears in court and the court 13 determines that the waiver is knowing and voluntary. Regardless of 14 whether the court accepts the parental waiver of the shelter care 15 16 hearing, the court must provide notice to the parents of their rights 17 required under (a) of this subsection and make the finding required under subsection (4) of this section. 18

(4) At the shelter care hearing the court shall examine the need for shelter care and inquire into the status of the case. The paramount consideration for the court shall be the health, welfare, and safety of the child. At a minimum, the court shall inquire into the following:

(a) Whether the notice required under RCW 13.34.062 was given to 24 25 all known parents, guardians, or legal custodians of the child. The 26 court shall make an express finding as to whether the notice required under RCW 13.34.062 was given to the parent, guardian, or legal 27 28 custodian. If actual notice was not given to the parent, guardian, or legal custodian and the whereabouts of such person is known or can be 29 ascertained, the court shall order the department to make reasonable 30 31 efforts to advise the parent, guardian, or legal custodian of the 32 status of the case, including the date and time of any subsequent 33 hearings, and their rights under RCW 13.34.090;

34 (b) Whether the child can be safely returned home while the 35 adjudication of the dependency is pending;

36 (c) What efforts have been made to place the child with a 37 relative. The court shall ask the parents whether the department 38 discussed with them the placement of the child with a relative or 39 other suitable person described in RCW 13.34.130(1)(b) and shall 40 determine what efforts have been made toward such a placement;

1 (d) What services were provided to the family to prevent or eliminate the need for removal of the child from the child's home. If 2 the dependency petition or other information before the court alleges 3 that <u>experiencing</u> homelessness or the lack of suitable housing was a 4 significant factor contributing to the removal of the child, the 5 6 court shall inquire as to whether housing assistance was provided to 7 the family to prevent or eliminate the need for removal of the child or children; 8

12 (f) Whether it is in the best interest of the child to remain 13 enrolled in the school, developmental program, or child care the 14 child was in prior to placement and what efforts have been made to 15 maintain the child in the school, program, or child care if it would 16 be in the best interest of the child to remain in the same school, 17 program, or child care;

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(g) Appointment of a guardian ad litem or attorney;

(h) Whether the child is or may be an Indian child as defined in RCW 13.38.040, whether the provisions of the federal Indian child welfare act or chapter 13.38 RCW apply, and whether there is compliance with the federal Indian child welfare act and chapter 13.38 RCW, including notice to the child's tribe;

(i) Whether, as provided in RCW 26.44.063, restraining orders, or
orders expelling an allegedly abusive household member from the home
of a nonabusive parent, guardian, or legal custodian, will allow the
child to safely remain in the home;

(j) Whether any orders for examinations, evaluations, or immediate services are needed. The court may not order a parent to undergo examinations, evaluation, or services at the shelter care hearing unless the parent agrees to the examination, evaluation, or service;

33 (k) The terms and conditions for parental, sibling, and family 34 visitation.

(5) (a) The court shall release a child alleged to be dependent to the care, custody, and control of the child's parent, guardian, or legal custodian unless the court finds there is reasonable cause to believe that:

39 (i) After consideration of the specific services that have been40 provided, reasonable efforts have been made to prevent or eliminate

1 the need for removal of the child from the child's home and to make 2 it possible for the child to return home; and

3 (ii)(A) The child has no parent, guardian, or legal custodian to 4 provide supervision and care for such child; or

5 (B) The release of such child would present a serious threat of 6 substantial harm to such child, notwithstanding an order entered 7 pursuant to RCW 26.44.063; or

8 (C) The parent, guardian, or custodian to whom the child could be 9 released has been charged with violating RCW 9A.40.060 or 9A.40.070.

(b) If the court does not release the child to his or her parent, 10 11 guardian, or legal custodian, the court shall order placement with a 12 relative or other suitable person as described in RCW 13.34.130(1)(b), unless there is reasonable cause to believe the 13 health, safety, or welfare of the child would be jeopardized or that 14 the efforts to reunite the parent and child will be hindered. If such 15 relative or other suitable person appears otherwise suitable and 16 17 competent to provide care and treatment, the fingerprint-based background check need not be completed before placement, but as soon 18 as possible after placement. The court must also determine whether 19 placement with the relative or other suitable person is in the 20 21 child's best interests. (f) If the child is placed in a qualified residential treatment program as defined in this chapter, the court shall, within sixty days of placement, hold a hearing to:

(i) Consider the assessment required under RCW 13.34.420 and submitted as part of the department's social study, and any related documentation;

18 (ii) Determine whether placement in foster care can meet the 19 child's needs or if placement in another available placement setting 20 best meets the child's needs in the least restrictive environment; 21 and

(iii) Approve or disapprove the child's placement in the qualified residential treatment program.

(g) Uncertainty by a parent, guardian, legal custodian, relative, or other suitable person that the alleged abuser has in fact abused the child shall not, alone, be the basis upon which a child is removed from the care of a parent, guardian, or legal custodian under (a) of this subsection, nor shall it be a basis, alone, to preclude placement with a relative or other suitable person under (b) of this subsection.

(6) (a) A shelter care order issued pursuant to this section shall include the requirement for a case conference as provided in RCW 13.34.067. However, if the parent is not present at the shelter care hearing, or does not agree to the case conference, the court shall not include the requirement for the case conference in the shelter care order.

(ii) The court shall consider whether nonconformance with any conditions resulted from circumstances beyond the control of the parent, guardian, or legal custodian and give weight to that fact before ordering return of the child to shelter care.

(8) (a) If a child is returned home from shelter care a second time in the case, or if the supervisor of the caseworker deems it necessary, the multidisciplinary team may be reconvened.

(b) If a child is returned home from shelter care a second time in the case a law enforcement officer must be present and file a report to the department.

(1) The status of all children found to be dependent shall be reviewed by the court at least every six months from the beginning date of the placement episode or the date dependency is established, whichever is first. The purpose of the hearing shall be to review the progress of the parties and determine whether court supervision should continue.

35 (a) The initial review hearing shall be an in-court review and 36 shall be set six months from the beginning date of the placement 37 episode or no more than ninety days from the entry of the disposition 38 order, whichever comes first. The requirements for the initial review

hearing, including the in-court review requirement, shall be
 accomplished within existing resources.

3 (b) The initial review hearing may be a permanency planning 4 hearing when necessary to meet the time frames set forth in RCW 5 13.34.145(1)(a) or 13.34.134.

6 (2) (a) A child shall not be returned home at the review hearing unless the court finds that a reason for removal as set forth in RCW 7 13.34.130 no longer exists. The parents, guardian, or legal custodian 8 shall report to the court the efforts they have made to correct the 9 conditions which led to removal. (iii) Notify the parent with whom the child is being placed that 30 31 he or she has an ongoing duty to notify the department of all persons 32 who reside in the home or who may act as a caregiver for the child both prior to the placement of the child in the home and subsequent 33 to the placement of the child in the home as long as the court 34 retains jurisdiction of the dependency proceeding or the department 35 is providing or monitoring either remedial services to the parent or 36 services to ensure the safety of the child to any caregivers. 37

38 Caregivers may be required to engage in services under this 39 subsection solely for the purpose of ensuring the present and future 40 safety of a child who is a ward of the court. This subsection does

 be met through placement in a foster family home;

(B) Whether the child's placement provides the most effective andappropriate level of care in the least restrictive environment;

34 (C) Whether the placement is consistent with the child's 35 permanency plan;

36 (D) What specific treatment or service needs will be met in the 37 placement, and how long the child is expected to need the treatment 38 or services; and

39 (E) What efforts the department has made to prepare the child to 40 return home or be placed with a fit and willing relative as defined in RCW 13.34.030, a Title 13 RCW legal guardian, an adoptive parent,
 or in a foster family home.

3 (vii) Whether a parent's <u>experiencing</u> homelessness or lack of 4 suitable housing is a significant factor delaying permanency for the 5 child by preventing the return of the child to the home of the 6 child's parent and whether housing assistance should be provided by 7 the department;

8 (viii) Whether the child is in an appropriate placement which 9 adequately meets all physical, emotional, and educational needs;

10 (ix) Whether preference has been given to placement with the 11 child's relatives if such placement is in the child's best interests;

12 (x) Whether both in-state and, where appropriate, out-of-state 13 placements have been considered;

14 (xi) Whether the parents have visited the child and any reasons 15 why visitation has not occurred or has been infrequent;

16 (xii) Whether terms of visitation need to be modified;

17 (xiii) Whether the court-approved long-term permanent plan for 18 the child remains the best plan for the child;

19 (xiv) Whether any additional court orders need to be made to move 20 the case toward permanency; and

21 (xv) The projected date by which the child will be returned home 22 or other permanent plan of care will be implemented.

23 (d) The court at the review hearing may order that a petition 24 seeking termination of the parent and child relationship be filed.

(3) (a) In any case in which the court orders that a dependent child may be returned to or remain in the child's home, the in-home placement shall be contingent upon the following:

(i) The compliance of the parents with court orders related to
 the care and supervision of the child, including compliance with the
 department's case plan; and

(ii) The continued participation of the parents, if applicable, in available substance abuse or mental health treatment if substance abuse or mental illness was a contributing factor to the removal of the child.

The best interests of the child shall be 13 the court's primary consideration in the review hearing.

(4) The court's authority to order housing assistance under this 14 chapter is: (a) Limited to cases in which a parent's experiencing 15 16 homelessness or lack of suitable housing is a significant factor 17 delaying permanency for the child and housing assistance would aid 18 the parent in providing an appropriate home for the child; and (b) 19 subject to the availability of funds appropriated for this specific purpose. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to create an 20 21 entitlement to housing assistance nor to create judicial authority to 22 order the provision of such assistance to any person or family if the 23 assistance or funding are unavailable or the child or family are not eligible for such assistance. 24
