N O T I C E

The following resolution and regulation was duly and regularly passed and adopted at a special meeting, May 19, 1969, of the State Game Commission for the State of Washington.

RESOLVED: That the Temporary Rule and Regulation hereinafter set forth was duly ordered, adopted and promulgated by vote of the State Game Commission.

RESOLVED FURTHER: That Temporary Regulation No. 276 heretofore established by the State Game Commission is hereby repealed

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That the following designated areas in the State of Washington are hereby established as GAME MANAGEMENT UNIT AREAS and EARLY DEER AREAS as herein described until changed by the State Game Commission:

1-A—That part of Ferry and Okanogan counties within the following described boundary: beginning at Republic; thence southerly along State Highway No. 21 to the north boundary of the Colville Indian Reservation; thence easterly along the north boundary of the Indian Reservation to the Barnaby Creek road; thence northwesterly along the Barnaby Creek road to the Sherman Creek highway and Albion Hill road; thence northerly along the Albion Hill and Taylor Ridge roads to the Togo Mountain road and northerly along the Togo Mountain road to the Togo Mountain lookout; thence northerly along the Boundary Mountain-Manley Creek trail to the Canadian border; thence westerly along the Canadian border to the Kettle River near the Ferry Customs Office; thence southerly along the Kettle River to Toroda and the Toroda Creek road; thence southwesterly along the Toroda Creek-Wauconda road to Wauconda and State Highway No. 30; thence southeasterly along State Highway No. 30 to Republic and point of beginning.

1-B—That part of Ferry county within the following described boundary: beginning on Roosevelt Lake at the mouth of the Kettle River; thence southerly along Roosevelt Lake to the north boundary of the Colville Indian Reservation; thence westerly along the north boundary of the Indian Reservation to the Barnaby Creek road; thence northwesterly along the Barnaby Creek road to the Sherman Creek Highway and Albion Hill road; thence northerly along the Albion Hill and Taylor Ridge road to the Togo Mountain road and northerly along the Togo Mountain road to the Togo Mountain lookout; thence northerly along the Boundary Mountain-Manley Creek trail to the Canadian border; thence easterly along the Canadian border to the Kettle River and down the Kettle River to its mouth and point of beginning.

1-C—That part of Stevens and Spokane counties within the following described boundary: beginning at the Kettle Falls bridge across Roosevelt Lake; thence southeasterly along U. S. Highway No. 395 to Deer Park; thence easterly along the Deer Park-Milan road to U. S. Highway No. 195; thence southerly along U. S. Highway No. 195 to Spokane; thence down the Spokane River to the east boundary of the Spokane Indian Reservation (Chamokane Creek); thence northerly along the east boundary of the Indian Reservation and westerly along the north boundary of the Indian Reservation to Roosevelt Lake; thence northerly along Roosevelt Lake to the Kettle Falls bridge and point of beginning.

1-D—That part of Stevens, Pend Oreille and Spokane counties within the following described boundary: beginning at Colville; thence southerly along U. S. Highway No. 395 to Deer Park; thence easterly along the Deer Park-Milan road to U. S. Highway No. 195; thence northerly along U. S. Highway No. 195 to Newport; thence down the Pend Oreille River to Tiger; thence westerly along State Highway No. 294 to Colville and point of beginning.

1-E—That part of Pend Oreille county within the following described boundary: beginning at Newport; thence northerly along the Pend Oreille River to the Metaline Falls bridge; thence easterly and southerly along the Sullivan Lake road to the Harvey Creek road; thence southeasterly up the Harvey Creek road to Monumental Mountain and down Forest Trail 103 to the Le Clerc Creek road; thence easterly and northerly along the Le Clerc Creek road and the Sema Creek-South Fork Granite Creek road to the Idaho-Washington line; thence southerly along the state line to Newport and point of beginning.

1-F—That part of Spokane and Pend Oreille counties within the following described boundary: beginning at Newport; thence southwesterly along U. S. Highway No. 195 to Spokane; thence easterly along the Spokane River to the Washington-Idaho line; thence northerly along the state line to Newport and point of beginning.

1-GN—That part of Pend Oreille county within the following described boundary: beginning at the point where the Pend Oreille River crosses the Canadian line; thence south up the Pend Oreille River to the Metaline Falls bridge; thence easterly along the Sullivan Lake road to the Sullivan Creek-Pass Creek road; thence easterly and southerly along the Sullivan Creek-Pass Creek road to the place where it crosses the state line near Granite Creek; thence north along the Idaho line and west along the Canadian line to the Pend Oreille River and point of beginning.

1-GS—(Old Sullivan Lake Game Refuge) That part of Pend Oreille county within the following described boundary: beginning at the junction of the Harvey Creek road with the Sullivan Lake road; thence northerly along the Sullivan Lake road on the west side of Sullivan Lake to its junction with the Sullivan Creek-Pass Creek road near the Sullivan Lake Ranger Station; thence easterly and southerly along the Sullivan Creek-Pass Creek road to the Idaho-Washington line; thence south along the state line to the South Fork Granite Creek-Sema Creek road; thence southwesterly along the Granite Creek-Sema Creek road to the Le Clerc Creek road; thence westerly along the Le Clerc Creek road to its junction with Forest Trail 103 in Section 7, Twp. 36 N., R. 45 E.W.M.; thence northerly along Forest Trail 103 to the Harvey Creek road and continuing northwesterly along the Harvey Creek road to its junction with the Sullivan Lake road and point of beginning.

1-H—That part of Stevens and Pend Oreille counties within the following described boundary: beginning at Ione on the Pend Oreille River; thence northerly along the Pend Oreille River to the Canadian border; thence westerly along the Canadian border to the Kettle River near Laurier; thence down the Kettle River to Roosevelt Lake; thence northeasterly along Roosevelt Lake to Northport; thence easterly along the Deep Creek road to the Little Muddy Creek-Smackout Pass road; thence easterly along said road to Ione and point of beginning.

1-J—That part of Stevens and Pend Oreille counties within the following described boundary: beginning at Northport; thence southerly along Roosevelt Lake to the Kettle Falls bridge; thence southeasterly along U. S. Highway No. 395 to Colville; thence easterly along State Highway No. 294 to Tiger and the Pend Oreille River; thence down the Pend Oreille River to Ione; thence northwesterly along the Little Muddy Creek-Smackout Pass road to the Deep Creek road; thence westerly along the Deep Creek road to Northport and point of beginning.

1-K—That part of Spokane and Lincoln counties within the following described boundary: beginning at Spokane; thence southeasterly along the old Palouse Highway through Moran Prairie and Valleyford to State Highway No. 27; thence southeasterly along State Highway No. 27 to the Elder road approximately four miles north of Rockford; thence easterly along the Elder road to the Washington-Idaho line; thence southerly along said State Line to the Spokane-Whitman county line; thence westerly along the north boundary of Whitman and Adams counties to U. S. Highway No. 395; thence northeasterly along U. S. Highway No. 395 to Sprague; thence northerly along State Highway No. 231 to its junction with U. S. Highway No. 2; thence easterly along U. S. Highway No. 2 to Reardan; thence northerly along State Highway No. 231 to the Spokane River; thence up the Spokane River to Spokane and point of beginning.

1-L—That part of Lincoln county within the following described boundary: beginning at the town of Almira; thence northerly along State Highway No. 2 to Coulee Dam; thence easterly along Lake Roosevelt to Lincoln; thence southerly along the Lincoln road to the Creston-Miles cutoff; thence southwesterly along the Creston-Miles cutoff to U. S. Highway No. 2; thence easterly along U. S. Highway No. 2 to its junction with State Highway No. 231 three miles west of Reardan; thence southerly along State Highway No. 231 to Sprague; thence southwesterly along U. S. Highway No. 395 to the Adams county line at Sprague Lake; thence westerly along the Adams-Lincoln county line to the Grant county line; thence northerly along the Grant-Lincoln county line to the point where it is crossed by the Marlin-Almira road; thence northerly along said road to Almira and the point of beginning.

1-N—That part of Whitman county within the following described boundary: beginning at Colfax; thence westerly along U. S. Highway No. 295 to Dusty and continuing westerly along State Highway No. 26 through LaCrosse to the west Whitman county line (Palouse River); thence northerly along the west Whitman county line, easterly along the north Whitman county line and southerly along the east Whitman county line to the Moscow-Pullman highway; thence westerly along the Moscow-Pullman-Colfax highway to Colfax and point of beginning.

1-P—That part of Whitman county within the following described boundary: beginning at Clarkston; thence down the Snake River to the mouth of the Palouse River; thence up the Palouse River to the Washtucna-LaCrosse highway (State Highway No. 26); thence easterly along said highway through LaCrosse to U. S. Highway No. 295 at Dusty; thence continuing easterly along U. S. Highway No. 295 to Colfax; thence southeasterly along the Colfax-Pullman-Moscow highway to the Washington-Idaho line; thence southerly along said State line to Clarkston and point of beginning.

1-R—That part of Lincoln county within the following described boundary: beginning at Reardan; thence westerly along U. S. Highway No. 2 to the Creston-Miles cutoff, near Creston; thence north-easterly along the Creston-Miles cutoff to the Lincoln road; thence northerly along the Lincoln road to Roosevelt Lake; thence up Roosevelt Lake and the Spokane River to State Highway No. 231; thence southerly along State Highway No. 231 to Reardan and point of beginning.

1-S—That part of Spokane county within the following described boundary: beginning at Spokane; thence southeasterly along the old Palouse Highway through Moran Prairie and Valleyford to State Highway No. 27; thence southeasterly along State Highway No. 27 to the Elder Road, approximately four miles north of Rockford; thence easterly along the Elder Road to the Washington-Idaho line; thence northerly along the state line to the Spokane River; thence westerly along the Spokane River to Spokane and point of beginning.

2-A—That part of Douglas and Grant counties within the following described boundary: beginning at Bridgeport; thence southerly along the Bridgeport-Mansfield-Coulee City highway to the county road along the south line of Section 18, Twp. 26 N., R. 28 E.W.M.; thence east along said county road through Mold to Banks Lake (Equalizing Reservoir); thence northerly along the east shore of Banks Lake (Equalizing Reservoir) to Coulee Dam and down the Columbia River to Bridgeport and point of beginning.

2-C—That part of Grant, Adams and Franklin counties within the following described boundary: beginning at Quincy; thence south along State Highway No. 281 to the town of George and continuing southerly along County Road "Q" SW to the crest of the Frenchman Hills; thence easterly along the crest of said hills to the MarDon County Road; thence northerly along said road to the O'Sullivan Dam Road; thence easterly along the O'Sullivan Dam Road to State Highway No. 17; thence southerly along said highway to Eltopia; thence southerly along U. S. Highway No. 395 to Pasco and the Columbia River; thence up the Columbia River to Crescent Bar; thence along the Crescent Bar-Trinidad Road to Trinidad and the Great Northern Railroad tracks; thence northerly and easterly along the Great Northern Railroad tracks to the town of Quincy and point of beginning: EXCEPT those lands within the Primary Zone of the Atomic Energy Commission.

***3-A**—That part of Walla Walla and Columbia counties within the following described boundary: beginning at the city of Walla Walla; thence northeasterly along U. S. Highway No. 12 to the Jasper Mountain road (near Coppei station); thence southeasterly along the Jasper Mountain road to the Payne Hollow-Lewis Peak road; thence southerly along said road to the end of the Lewis Peak road; thence southeasterly to the Mill Creek Watershed trail; thence southwesterly along the said trail to the Washington-Oregon line; thence westerly along said line to State Highway No. 125; thence northerly along said highway to Walla Walla and point of beginning.

***3-B**—That part of Columbia and Garfield counties within the following described boundary: beginning on the Tucannon River road at the bottom of the Hartsock Grade; thence southerly up the Hartsock Grade road to the Maloney Mountain road and continuing southerly and westerly along the Maloney Mountain road (via Rocky Point) to the Skyline road; thence southerly along the Skyline road to Godman Springs; thence easterly along the Godman-Teepee road to Teepee; thence easterly along the Teepee-Diamond Peak Trail generally following the divide between the Crooked Creek and Tucannon River drainages to Diamond Peak; thence easterly along the Diamond Peak-Mount Misery road to the Mountain road; thence northerly along the Mountain road to the Forest Service boundary; thence northerly and westerly along the elk drift fence to the Tucannon River road; thence northerly along the Tucannon River road to the Hartsock Grade road and point of beginning.

***3-C**—That part of Asotin and Garfield counties within the following described boundary: beginning at the junction of Mountain Road (south of Pomeroy) and the Forest Service boundary; thence southerly along the Mountain road to its junction with the Wenatchee Guard Station and Anatone road; thence easterly along said road to the Forest Service boundary at Big Butte; thence north and west along the boundary fence to the Cloverland-Wenatchee Guard Station road; thence easterly and north on the Cloverland Road to the Campbell Grade Road; thence westerly along the Campbell Grade road to the Asotin Creek road; thence down Asotin Creek road to Charley Creek; thence up Charley Creek to the elk drift fence and follow said fence to its junction with the Mountain road and point of beginning.

*3-D—That part of Columbia and Walla Walla counties within the following described boundary: beginning at Dayton; thence easterly along the main Patit Creek road to its junction with Hartsock-Maloney Mountain road; thence southerly and westerly along the Maloney Mountain road (via Rocky Point) to the Skyline Road; thence southerly along the Skyline Road to the northeast corner of the Mill Creek Watershed trail; thence westerly along said trail to the Lewis Peak trail; thence north to Lewis Peak and the end of the Lewis Peak road; thence northerly along the Lewis Peak-Payne Hollow road to its junction with the Jasper Mountain road; thence northwesterly along the Jasper Mountain road to U. S. Highway 12 at Coppei station; thence northerly and easterly along Highway 12 to the town of Dayton and point of beginning.

*3-E—That part of Asotin and Garfield counties within the following described boundary: beginning at the town of Asotin; thence up Asotin Creek to Charley Creek; thence up Charley Creek to the elk drift fence; thence easterly and northerly along said drift fence across the Mountain road to the Tucannon River road; thence northerly down the Tucannon River road to the Blind Grade road; thence northeast on the Blind Grade to the Linville Gulch road and north to Zumwalt Station on Highway 12; thence due east on Highway 12 to Clarkston and south to the town of Asotin and point of beginning.

*3-F—That part of Asotin and Garfield counties within the following described boundary: beginning at Anatone; thence westerly along the main Big Butte and Mount Misery road to its junction with the Mountain road; thence southerly along the Mountain road to the South Boundary road, N-715; thence westerly along the South Boundary road, N-715 to the 3 Forks trail; thence westerly down the 3 Forks trail to Crooked Fork; thence southerly down the Crooked Fork to the Oregon-Washington boundary; thence easterly along the Oregon-Washington boundary to State Highway No. 129; thence northerly along Highway 129 to Anatone and point of beginning.

3-G—That part of Garfield and Asotin counties within the following described boundary: beginning at Clarkston; thence westerly along U. S. Highway No. 12 to its junction with U. S. Highway No. 295 (Central Ferry highway); thence northerly along U. S. Highway No. 295 to Snake River; thence easterly up the Snake River to Clarkston and the point of beginning.

3-H—That part of Columbia, Garfield, and Asotin counties within the following described boundary: beginning on the Skyline road at the Washington-Oregon line; thence northerly along the Skyline road to Godman Springs; thence easterly along the Godman-Teepee road to Teepee; thence easterly along the Teepee-Diamond Peak trail generally following the divide between the Crooked Creek and Tucannon River drainages to the Mountain road; thence southerly along the Mountain road to the South Boundary road, N-715; thence westerly along the South Boundary road, N-715 to the 3 Forks trail; thence southerly down said trail to the Crooked Creek and the Oregon-Washington boundary; thence west along the State line to the Skyline road and point of beginning.

*3-J (Joseph Creek Area)—That part of Asotin county within the following described boundary: beginning at the mouth of the Grande Ronde River; thence southwestwardly up the Grande Ronde River to State Highway No. 129; thence southerly up said highway to the Oregon-Washington line; thence east along the Oregon-Washington line to the Snake River; thence down the Snake River to the mouth of the Grande Ronde River and point of beginning.

*3-K—That part of Asotin county within the following described boundary: beginning at Asotin; thence southerly along the Snake River to the Grande Ronde River; thence westerly up the Grande Ronde River to State Highway No. 129; thence northeasterly along said highway to Anatone; thence westerly and southerly along the main Big Butte road to the National Forest boundary; thence north and east along said boundary fence to the Cloverland-Wenatchee Guard Station road; thence easterly and north on the Cloverland Road to the Campbell Grade road; thence westerly down said road to Asotin Creek and down Asotin Creek to the town of Asotin and point of beginning.

*3-L—That part of Columbia and Garfield counties within the following described boundary: beginning at Dayton; thence easterly along the main Patit Creek road to its junction with the Hartsock-Maloney Mountain road; thence northerly along the Hartsock Grade road to the Tucannon River road; thence southerly along said road to the Blind Grade road; thence easterly up the Blind Grade road to the Linville Gulch road; thence northerly down the Linville Gulch road to U. S. Highway No. 12; thence westerly and southerly along said highway to Dayton and point of beginning.

3-M—That part of Walla Walla county within the following described boundary: beginning at the Washington-Oregon State line on the Columbia River (near Wallula Junction); thence northerly up the Columbia River to the Snake River; thence northeasterly up the Snake River to Ayer Junction; thence southerly along the Ayer Junction-Clyde-Harshaw road to State Highway No. 124 and the Touchet River; thence easterly up the Touchet River to Waitsburg and U. S. Highway No. 12; thence southerly and westerly along U. S. Highway No. 12 to Walla Walla and State Highway No. 125; thence southerly along State Highway No. 125 to the Washington-Oregon State line; thence westerly along the State line to the Columbia River and point of beginning.

3-N—That part of Walla Walla, Columbia and Garfield counties within the following described boundary: beginning at Central Ferry; thence southerly along U. S. Highway No. 295 to Dodge junction; thence westerly and southerly along U. S. Highway No. 12 to the town of Waitsburg and the Touchet River; thence westerly along the Touchet River to the Harshaw road and State Highway No. 124; thence northerly along the Harshaw-Clyde-Ayer Junction road to the Snake River; thence easterly up the Snake River to Central Ferry and the point of beginning.

4-A—That part of Kittitas county within the following described boundary: beginning at the summit (Swauk Pass) of U. S. Highway No. 97; thence northwesterly along the divide (Kittitas-Chelan county line) to Stuart Pass (Sec. 22, Twp. 23 N., R. 15 E.W.M.); thence southerly and easterly along the divide between the Teanaway and Cle Elum River drainages to the Greenhouse Road north of Cle Elum; thence southerly along the Greenhouse Road to old U. S. Highway No. 10; thence easterly along old U. S. Highway No. 10 to State Highway No. 131 (Dry Creek road); thence northerly along State Highway No. 131 to the Green Canyon Road; thence north along the Green Canyon Road to the point where it is crossed by First Creek (Sec. 30, Twp. 20 N., R. 18 E.W.M.); thence westerly down First Creek to U. S. Highway No. 97 (Blewett Pass Highway); thence northerly along U. S. Highway No. 97 to the summit and point of beginning.

4-B—That part of Yakima county within the following described boundary: beginning at the junction of U. S. Highway No. 410 and the White Pass Highway; thence westerly along the White Pass Highway to the wooden bridge crossing the Tieton River opposite the Oak Creek Game Range headquarters; thence due south to top of cliff and crest between the Tieton River and Weddle Canyon drainages, thence westerly along said crest to the Jump-off road; thence northerly along the Jump-off road to the White Pass Highway; thence westerly along the White Pass Highway to the Tieton Ranger Station; thence northerly along the Cash Prairie road over Bethel Ridge and down the Rattlesnake Creek road to the Nile cutoff road; thence southerly along the Nile cutoff road to Eagle Rock and junction with U. S. Highway No. 410; thence southeasterly along U. S. Highway No. 410 at the Tieton junction and point of beginning.

4-C—That part of Yakima county within the following described boundary: beginning at the mouth of the Tieton River; thence up the Tieton River to the wooden bridge opposite the Oak Creek Game Range headquarters; thence due south to top of cliff and crest between the Tieton River and Weddle Canyon drainages; thence westerly along said crest to the Jump-off road and southerly and westerly along the Jump-off road to north fork Cowiche Creek Ridge road in Sec. 5, T. 13 N., R. 15 E.W.M.; (approximately ½ mile west of the power line crossing); thence easterly along the north fork ridge road to the middle fork Cowiche Creek cutoff road in Sec. 10, T. 13 N., R. 15 E.W.M.; thence southerly along said cutoff road to the middle fork Cowiche Canyon road in Sec. 15, T. 13 N., R. 15 E.W.M.; thence easterly along the middle fork Cowiche Canyon road to the junction of the south fork Cowiche Canyon road in Sec. 14, T. 13 N., R. 15 E.W.M.; thence southerly and westerly along the south fork Cowiche road to the Nasty Creek cutoff road in Sec. 28, T. 13 N., R. 15 E.W.M.; thence along the Nasty Creek cutoff road to the Nasty Creek road in Sec. 33, T. 13 N., R. 15 E.W.M.; thence easterly and southerly along the Nasty Creek road to the north fork Ahtanum Creek road in Sec. 35, T. 13 N., R. 15 E.W.M.; thence southerly and easterly along the north fork Ahtanum Creek road to Tampico; thence down Ahtanum Creek to the Yakima River; thence up the Yakima River to Yakima; thence westerly along U. S. Highway No. 410 to the mouth of the Tieton River and point of beginning.

4-D—That part of Yakima and Kittitas counties within the following described boundary: beginning at Yakima; thence northerly along U. S. Highway No. 97 to Ellensburg; thence westerly and southerly along the Shushuskin Canyon road to the divide between the Menastash and Umptanum Creek drainages (easterly extension of Menastash Ridge); thence westerly along said divide and divide between the Naches and Yakima River drainages to the summit of the Cascades; thence southerly along the Cascade summit to U. S. Highway No. 410 (Chinook Pass); thence easterly along U. S. Highway No. 410 to Yakima and point of beginning.

4-E—That part of Kittitas and Chelan counties within the following described boundary: beginning at the mouth of First Creek approximately ½ mile above Lauderdale on U. S. North Cascades Primitive Area—All of the North Cascades Primitive Area in Okanogan County and in Whatcom County east of Ross Lake. (The new Pasayten Wilderness Area is still unmarked.)

New Highway Segment—All lands east of the Ross Lake Recreation Area between the Primitive area and the national park and west of the range line between Ranges 17 and 18 E.W.M., including parts of Whatcom, Skagit, Okanogan and Chelan Counties, AND IN ADDITION, Sections 7, 17, 18 and 19 of Twp. 37 N., R. 18 E.W.M. in Okanogan County.

***Early Deer Area 2**—Those lands within the following described boundaries:

Skagit County Area—That part of Skagit County east of the range line between Ranges 12 and 13 E.W.M. that is outside of the North Cascades National Park.

Snohomish County Area—That part of the Whitechuck and north fork of the Sauk River watersheds above (east of) the end of road along the Whitechuck River and above (east of) the Sloan Creek Camp Ground on the North Fork of the Sauk; AND ALSO, the Suittie River watershed east of the range line between Ranges 12 and 13 E.W.M.

***Early Deer Area 3**—Those lands within the following described boundaries:

Chelan County Area—The Icicle River watershed above (west of) the mouth of Black Pine Creek, including the Black Pine Creek watershed, and above the mouth of Grindstone Creek, including the Grindstone Creek watershed.

Kittitas County Area—Those lands between the Cle Elum and Waptus Rivers that are west of (above) the Trail Creek trail; those lands between the Cooper and Waptus Rivers that are west (above) the Polallie Ridge and Quick Creek trails; those lands between Cooper River and Mineral Creek that are north of (above) the Cooper Lake-Cooper Pass trail and east of Rampart Ridge; and those lands east of the Cle Elum River that are north of Scatter Creek.

N O T I C E1969 Hunting and Trapping Seasons and Bag Limits for the
State of Washington

The following resolution and regulation was duly and regularly passed and adopted at a special meeting, May 19, 1969, of the State Game Commission for the State of Washington.

RESOLVED: That it shall be unlawful to hunt upland game birds, game animals and/or fur-bearing animals in the State of Washington at any time except during the following open seasons, with bag limits as prescribed for each species, PROVIDED, HOWEVER, that it shall be unlawful to hunt upland game birds, game animals and/or fur-bearing animals on lands set aside as state game reserves where the hunting of such upland game birds, game animals and/or fur-bearing animals is prohibited, PROVIDED, FURTHER, that all other game birds, game animals and/or fur-bearing animals not specifically mentioned in the following open seasons, are protected by closed seasons, and it shall be unlawful to hunt, or possess the same at any time.

BLUE GROUSE, RUFFED GROUSE, SPRUCE (Franklin) GROUSE:General Open Seasons:

September 6 to November 16, both dates inclusive, in all counties of the state.

Bag and Possession Limit: Three (3) grouse per day or a total of nine (9) in possession at any one time, straight or mixed bag.

EARLY CHUKAR, REDLEG AND HUNGARIAN PARTRIDGE SEASON:

September 13 to October 10, both dates inclusive, in Asotin and Garfield counties; in that part of Whitman County south of the Washtucna-Colfax-Pullman-Moscow highway; in that part of Columbia County that is north and east of the Tucannon River.

Bag and Possession Limits: Five (5) partridge (chukar, redleg or Hungarian) per day, or a total of fifteen (15) partridge in possession at any one time, straight or mixed bag.

CHINESE PHEASANT, QUAIL, CHUKAR, REDLEG AND HUNGARIAN PARTRIDGE, SHARPTAILED GROUSE AND SAGE HEN:

Open Season starts 12:00 o'clock Noon, Daylight Saving Time, on October 11th.

TURKEY:

Open Season starts on October 11th (See official hunting hours table).

SPECIAL SHOTGUN AND BOW HUNTING AREAS: Only shotguns firing slugs or buckshot, and bow and arrow may be used for deer hunting on Bainbridge, Vashon, Maury, Guemes, Marrowstone, Fox, Ketrion, Shaw, Indian and Hartstene Islands; Puget Island (Wahkiakum County); those lands between U.S. Highway No. 830 and the Columbia River between Cathlamet and Skamokawa; that part of Game Management Unit 8-J in Thurston County; that part of Game Management Unit 8-J in Mason County that is South of Hammersley Inlet; and Deer Area No. 1 in Spokane County.

GENERAL BUCK DEER SEASONS:

Bag Limit: One (1) buck deer with visible antlers (buck fawns not legal), and a visible antler is hereby defined as a horn-like growth with velvet shed that is visible above the hair.

October 11 to November 2, both dates inclusive, in all counties in western Washington and in Asotin, Benton, Columbia, Garfield, Kittitas, Walla Walla and Yakima Counties in eastern Washington.

October 11 to November 9, both dates inclusive, in Adams, Chelan, Douglas, Ferry, Franklin, Grant, Lincoln, Okanogan, and Whitman Counties; in that part of Spokane County south of the Spokane River; and in Game Management Units 9-D, 9-E, 9-F and 9-P; EXCEPT closed in Game Management Unit 1-GS in Pend Oreille County.

October 11 to November 9 and November 22 to 30, all dates inclusive, in Pend Oreille, and Stevens Counties, and in that part of Spokane County north of the Spokane River; EXCEPT closed in Game Management Unit 1-GS in Pend Oreille County.

EARLY BUCK DEER SEASON:

Bag Limit: One (1) buck deer with visible antlers (buck fawns not legal).

September 6 to 21, both dates inclusive, in Early Buck Area No. 1; Early Buck Area No. 2, Early Buck Area No. 3, and Game Management Units 1-GN and 1-GS.

EITHER SEX DEER SEASONS:

Bag Limit: One (1) deer of either sex.

Little Pend Oreille Wildlife-Recreation Area shall be closed to all hunting EXCEPT from October 11 to November 30, inclusive.

Game Management Unit 1-GS, Pend Oreille County, shall be closed to all hunting from October 11 to November 30, inclusive.

CONTROLLED DEER HUNTING SEASONS:

It shall be lawful for any person who is the holder of a controlled hunt permit, issued under the provisions of this regulation, to hunt deer of either sex in the controlled hunt area for which the permit has been issued, PROVIDED, that all permittees must have in possession a 1969 hunting license and a 1969 deer tag.

Anyone wishing to apply for a controlled deer hunt must apply on the application card provided on the deer tag and fill in the following information:

- (1) Name and address of applicant.
- (2) Designate unit number or area and county in which the applicant desires to hunt.
- (3) Number of applicant's 1969 hunting license.

Controlled hunt applications may only be used by the person to whom the corresponding hunting permit was issued.

Only one person may make application for a controlled deer hunt on an application form.

Any person whose name is entered on more than one application for any controlled deer hunt will be eliminated entirely from all deer drawings.

Bag Limit: One (1) deer of either sex per controlled hunt permittee.

Applications for controlled deer hunts must be received not later than 4:30 p.m., Daylight Saving Time, on September 4, 1969, at the Department of Game Office, 600 North Capitol Way, Olympia, Washington, or any Department of Game Regional Office.

HUNTING RESTRICTION: During any open season for elk, it shall be unlawful to hunt any wild animals or wild birds with a rifle or shotgun with slugs therein, in those areas where elk may reasonably be expected, EXCEPT this regulation shall not be effective on November 1 and November 2, 1969, when deer and elk seasons overlap; PROVIDED that this regulation shall not apply to those persons who have in their possession a valid supplemental elk tag and other permits required by law to hunt elk.

CONTROLLED ELK HUNTING SEASONS:

It shall be lawful for any person who is the holder of a controlled hunt permit, issued under the provisions of this regulation, to hunt elk of either sex in the controlled hunt area for which the permit has been issued, PROVIDED: That all permittees must have in possession a 1969 hunting license and a 1969 elk tag.

Anyone wishing to apply for a controlled elk hunt must apply on the application card provided on the elk tag and fill in the following information:

- (1) Name and address of applicant.
- (2) Designate unit number or area and county in which the applicant desires to hunt.
- (3) Number of applicant's 1969 hunting license.
- (4) Signed certification that applicant was not drawn for an elk permit in 1968 or 1969.

Controlled hunt applications may only be used by the person to whom the corresponding hunting permit was issued.

Only one person may make application for a controlled elk hunt on each application form.

Any person whose name is entered on more than one application for any controlled elk hunt will be eliminated entirely from all elk drawings.

Bag Limit: One (1) elk of either sex per controlled hunt permittee.

Applications received by the Department of Game which do not comply with the aforesaid requirements and those which are received after the closing date for these drawings will not be eligible to be drawn.

Persons whose names are drawn will receive special hunting permits by mail from the Department of Game.

Permits are not transferable.

The Director of Game shall designate two resident citizens of each county in which the drawings are held, who shall draw applications equal to the number of permits specified to be issued for each area shown in this regulation.

The applications drawn for each area will entitle the holders to a special hunting permit. Immediately after the drawings, the above persons shall sign an affidavit in duplicate before a notary public giving the number of cards they verified by count, also including the numbers of the cards they drew. One copy of the affidavit shall be filed with the auditor of each county where drawings are made, and the State of Washington Department of Game shall be furnished with a copy together with all cards used in the drawing.

USE OF DOGS PROHIBITED: It shall be unlawful for any person to hunt or pursue any wild animal with the aid of a dog in any area of the state during the time when deer or elk are being lawfully hunted in such area.

BIG GAME BAG LIMITS: One deer and one elk is the legal limit per hunter during the 1969 hunting seasons.

TRANSPORTATION: Big game with head; the head of each deer and elk killed shall remain with the carcass thereof while in transportation.

COUGAR (Mountain Lion) SEASON:

RIFLE RESTRICTIONS: Only muzzle loading rifles meeting the following specifications may be used:

Any firearm with a matchlock, flintlock, percussion cap or similar type ignition system, having a minimum barrel length of at least 20 inches, with the propellant charge black powder and loaded with one single ball or bullet. Minimum caliber to be .40, such measurement to be taken from land to land in the barrel.

S. Highway No. 2 bridge near Chiwaukum Creek; thence northerly along U. S. Highway No. 2 to Coles Corner and point of beginning.

Bow Area No. 4 - Husum Area (Klickitat County): That part of Klickitat County within the following described boundary: Beginning at the bridge across the upper end of Northwestern Lake on the White Salmon River; thence westerly up Buck Creek road to Nestor Peak road; thence up Nestor Peak road to Nestor Peak; thence in a direct line northeasterly to Baldy Peak; thence north-easterly down the Baldy Peak-B.Z. Open Seasons:

September 6 to December 14, both dates inclusive, in Bow Area No. 1, Nason Creek Bow and Arrow Hunting Area, Chelan County.

September 13 to September 30, both dates inclusive, in Game Management Unit 3-B, Columbia-Garfield Counties.

October 11 to November 16, both dates inclusive, in Bow Area No. 2, Long Island, Pacific County.

Bag Limit. One (1) bear.

Grouse and Rabbits: (Bow and Arrow Hunting)

Open Season:

September 6 to December 14, both dates inclusive, in Bow Area No. 1, Nason Creek Bow and Arrow Hunting Area, Chelan County.

Bag Limits:

Grouse: Three (3) grouse per day or a total of nine (9) in possession at any one time.

Rabbits: Five (5) rabbits per day.

BOW HUNTING LEGAL IN GENERAL SEASONS.

It is legal to hunt with a bow and arrow during any open season in any area that is open to hunting with firearms. The license requirements and bag and possession limits are the same as those which apply to firearm hunters.

HUNTING HOURS: Lawful hunting hours for deer, elk, blue, ruffed and spruce grouse, turkey, for the early season on chukar, Hungarian and Red-legged partridge shall be as shown in the following table. These hours also apply for the portions of the bear and cougar seasons falling within this period and also rabbit hunting, except during the pheasant seasons, when rabbits may be hunted only during the hours established for pheasant hunting.
