- 1 AN ACT Relating to personal property exempt from enforcement of

- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 4 Sec. 1. RCW 6.15.010 and 1988 c 231 s 5 are each amended to read
- 5 as follows:
- 6 Except as provided in RCW 6.15.050, the following personal property
- 7 shall be exempt from execution, attachment, and garnishment:
- 8 (1) All wearing apparel of every individual and family, but not to
- 9 exceed ((seven hundred fifty)) one thousand dollars in value in furs,
- 10 jewelry, and personal ornaments for any individual.
- 11 (2) All private libraries of every individual, but not to exceed
- 12 ((one thousand)) fifteen hundred dollars in value, and all family
- 13 pictures and keepsakes.

- 1 (3) To each individual or, as to community property of spouses
- 2 maintaining a single household as against a creditor of the community,
- 3 to the community:
- 4 (a) The individual's or community's household goods, appliances,
- 5 furniture, and home and yard equipment, not to exceed ((one)) two
- 6 thousand ((five)) seven hundred dollars in value((+
- 7 (b)), said amount to include provisions and fuel for the
- 8 comfortable maintenance of the individual or community ((for three
- 9 months));
- 10 (((c))) (b) Other personal property, except personal earnings as
- 11 provided under RCW 6.15.050(1), not to exceed ((five hundred)) one
- 12 thousand dollars in value, of which not more than one hundred dollars
- 13 in value may consist of cash, and of which not more than one hundred
- 14 <u>dollars in value may consist of</u> bank accounts, savings and loan
- 15 accounts, stocks, bonds, or other securities; and
- 16 (((d) One)) <u>(c) Two motor vehicles</u> ((which is)) used for personal
- 17 transportation, not to exceed ((one)) two thousand ((two)) five hundred
- 18 dollars in aggregate value.
- 19 (4) To each qualified individual, one of the following exemptions:
- 20 (a) To a farmer, farm trucks, farm stock, farm tools, farm
- 21 equipment, supplies and seed, not to exceed ((three)) five thousand
- 22 dollars in value;
- 23 (b) To a physician, surgeon, attorney, clergyman, or other
- 24 professional person, the individual's library, office furniture, office
- 25 equipment and supplies, not to exceed ((three)) five thousand dollars
- 26 in value;
- 27 (c) To any other individual, the tools and instruments and
- 28 materials used to carry on his or her trade for the support of himself
- 29 or herself or family, not to exceed ((three)) five thousand dollars in
- 30 value.

- 1 For purposes of this section, "value" means the reasonable market
- 2 value of the debtor's interest in an article or item at the time it is
- 3 selected for exemption, exclusive of all liens and encumbrances
- 4 thereon.
