The report shall be submitted to the office of financial management and the fiscal committees of the senate and house of representatives no later than ninety days after the end of each fiscal year.

(1) The department shall reduce its charge for personnel servicesto the lowest rate possible.

(2) ((600,000)) <u>430,000</u> of the department of personnel service 28 fund appropriation is provided solely for extended insurance benefits 29 for permanent state employees separated through reduction-in-force. An 30 31 eligible employee may receive a state subsidy of \$100 per month toward his or her insurance benefits purchased under the federal consolidated 32 omnibus budget reconciliation act (COBRA) for a period not to exceed 33 six months from the date of separation.
