ENGROSSED SUBSTITUTE HOUSE BILL 1410

1 AN ACT Relating to fiscal matters; making appropriations and 2 authorizing expenditures for the operations of state agencies for the 3 fiscal biennium beginning July 1, 1995, and ending June 30, 1997; amending RCW 43.08.250, 70.105D.070, 86.26.007, 43.155.050, 74.14C.065, 4 and 43.131.370; reenacting and amending RCW 41.06.150; creating new 5 sections; providing an effective date; providing for submission of 6 7 sections of this act to a vote of the people; and declaring an 8 emergency.

9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

10 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. (1) A budget is hereby adopted and, subject to the provisions set forth in the following sections, the several 11 amounts specified in the following sections, or so much thereof as 12 13 shall be sufficient to accomplish the purposes designated, are hereby 14 appropriated and authorized to be incurred for salaries, wages, and 15 other expenses of the agencies and offices of the state and for other specified purposes for the fiscal biennium beginning July 1, 1995, and 16 17 ending June 30, 1997, except as otherwise provided, out of the several funds of the state hereinafter named. 18

1 (2) Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the definitions 2 in this section apply throughout this act.

3 (a) "Fiscal year 1996" or "FY 1996" means the fiscal year ending 4 June 30, 1996.

5 (b) "Fiscal year 1997" or "FY 1997" means the fiscal year ending 6 June 30, 1997.

7 (c) "FTE" means full time equivalent.

8 (d) "Lapse" or "revert" means the amount shall return to an9 unappropriated status.

(e) "Provided solely" means the specified amount may be spent only for the specified purpose. Unless otherwise specifically authorized in this act, any portion of an amount provided solely for a specified purpose which is unnecessary to fulfill the specified purpose shall lapse.

(1) \$545,000 of the general fund--state appropriation and \$545,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation are provided solely to develop and implement a welfare reform evaluation plan in accordance with the requirements of Engrossed Second Substitute House Bill No. 14 1481. If the bill is not enacted by June 30, 1995, the amount provided in this subsection shall lapse.

16 (2) \$274,000 of the health services account appropriation is 17 provided solely for a study of current health care practices in 18 correctional institutions, including a review of the feasibility and 19 cost effectiveness of contracting out for medical services.

(3) \$75,000 of the medical aid account state appropriation and 20 21 \$75,000 of the accident account state appropriation are provided solely 22 for a study of the workers' compensation program of the department of labor and industries. This study shall include, but not be limited to: 23 (a) A determination of the cost effectiveness of the operation of the 24 25 workers' compensation program through the state industrial insurance 26 fund, compared with programs operated by private insurers or programs state-managed or sponsored in other states and compared with self-27 28 insurance arrangements and retrospective rating programs in this and other states; (b) the effectiveness of the industrial insurance fund in 29 improving workplace safety, injury experience rates, return-to-work 30 31 rates, long term disability duration and litigation rates, and in reducing the incidence of fraud and repeat claims for the same workers, 32 relative to other states and other public and private workers' 33 compensation arrangements, and (c) the solvency of the industrial 34 insurance fund as measured by national association of insurance 35 commissioners standards for liquidity, leverage, and reserve adequacy. 36 The legislative budget committee shall submit an interim report to the 37 appropriate policy and fiscal committees of the legislature no later 38

1 than December 1, 1995, and shall submit a final report to those
2 committees no later than December 1, 1996.

3 (4) The legislative budget committee shall study the impact of the 4 prevailing wage requirements enumerated in chapter 39.12 RCW. The 5 study shall include but not be limited to consideration of the following: (a) The cost to the state, municipal and county governments 6 7 for administration and compliance with prevailing wage laws; (b) 8 whether other states have exempted certain capital projects from 9 prevailing wage laws, and what savings or costs have resulted; (c) what 10 states have repealed prevailing wage requirements and what savings or costs have resulted; (d) the possible impacts of prevailing wage 11 12 requirements on small and minority-owned enterprises; (e) the potential 13 savings that would be realized if construction of: (i) Common schools; (ii) correctional facilities; (iii) highways; (iv) higher education 14 15 facilities; (v) ferries; (vi) projects with estimated costs below 16 selected cost thresholds; and (vii) all public works were exempted from 17 chapter 39.12 RCW; and (f) the extent to which chapter 39.12 RCW is or may be affected by the federal employee requirement income security 18 19 act.

The legislative budget committee shall make a report of its findings and recommendations to the appropriate policy and fiscal committees of the legislature no later than December 1, 1996.

(5)(a) The legislative budget committee shall evaluate the fiscal notes used by the legislature to inform it of the costs and savings estimated to result from proposed legislation. The evaluation shall identify: (i) Whether the process for developing fiscal notes has adequate controls to ensure that the data and methodologies used are current and reliable, and (ii) how the accuracy, reliability and timeliness of fiscal notes can be improved.

30 (b) The study shall include: (i) A review of fiscal notes on 31 legislation pertaining to a variety of state programs; (ii) a survey of fiscal note requirements, systems, and agencies in other states; (iii) 32 33 an analysis of methods used in the public and private sectors that 34 could be used to improve the reliability and accuracy and timeliness of 35 fiscal notes; (iv) identification of statutes, policies, and rules that should be changed to improve the reliability and accuracy of fiscal 36 37 notes; (v) recommendations on when fiscal notes should be required; (vi) recommendations on the appropriate assignment of responsibility 38 39 for the development of fiscal notes; and (vii) recommendations on how

the process for developing fiscal notes can be changed to reduce the
 time it takes to produce a reliable and accurate fiscal note.

3 (c) The legislative budget committee shall make a report of its 4 findings and recommendations to the house of representatives 5 appropriations committee and the senate ways and means committee no 6 later than November 1, 1995.

1 (3) \$4,000,000 from the state investment board expense account 2 appropriation is provided solely for attorney general costs and related 3 expenses in aggressively pursuing litigation related to real estate 4 investments on behalf of the state investment board. To the maximum 5 extent possible, attorney general staff shall be used in pursuing this 6 litigation.

7 (4) The attorney general shall distribute \$2,848,000 of the legal 8 services revolving account appropriation and \$152,000 of the general 9 fund--state appropriation for salaries and related benefits in a way 10 that will maintain or increase the quality and experience of staff. Market value, specialization, retention, and merit (including billable 11 hours) shall be the factors in determining the distribution of these 12 funds. The salary increases granted under this subsection shall be in 13 addition to those granted under section 714, and shall have the same 14 15 effective date.

(5) \$880,000 of the general fund--state appropriation is provided solely for the monitoring of sellers of travel as directed by House Bill No. 1704 (eliminating registration requirements for sellers of travel). 1 (3) A copy of each feasibility study and project management plan 2 shall be provided to the department of information services, the office 3 of financial management, and legislative fiscal committees. Authority 4 to expend any funds for individual information systems projects is 5 conditioned on approval of the relevant feasibility study and project 6 management plan by the department of information services and the 7 office of financial management.

8 (4) A project status report shall be submitted to the department of 9 information services, the office of financial management, and 10 legislative fiscal committees for each project prior to reaching key decision points identified in the project management plan. 11 Project 12 status reports shall examine and evaluate project management, accomplishments, budget, action to address variances, risk management, 13 costs and benefits analysis, and other aspects critical to completion 14 15 of a project.

Work shall not commence on any task in a subsequent phase of a project until the status report for the preceding key decision point has been approved by the department of information services and the office of financial management.

20 (5) If a project review is requested in accordance with department of information services policies, the reviews shall examine and 21 22 evaluate: System requirements specifications; scope; system 23 architecture; change controls; documentation; user involvement; 24 training; availability and capability of resources; programming 25 languages and techniques; system inputs and outputs; plans for testing, 26 conversion, implementation, and postimplementation; and other aspects 27 critical to successful construction, integration, and implementation of automated systems. Copies of project review written reports shall be 28 29 forwarded to the office of financial management and appropriate 30 legislative committees by the agency.

(6) A written postimplementation review report shall be prepared by 31 the agency for each information systems project in accordance with 32 33 published department of information services instructions. In addition 34 to the information requested pursuant to the department of information 35 services instructions, the postimplementation report shall evaluate the degree to which a project accomplished its major objectives including, 36 37 but not limited to, a comparison of original cost and benefit estimates costs and benefits achieved. 38 to actual Copies of the 39 postimplementation review report shall be provided to the department of

information services, the office of financial management, and
 appropriate legislative committees.

3 NEW SECTION. Sec. 903. VIDEO TELECOMMUNICATIONS. The department of information services shall act as lead agency in coordinating video 4 5 telecommunications services for state agencies. As lead agency, the department shall develop standards and common specifications for leased 6 7 and purchased telecommunications equipment and assist state agencies in 8 developing a video telecommunications expenditure plan. 36 (9) Hours of work;

(10) Layoffs when necessary and subsequent reemployment, both
 according to seniority;

3 (11) Determination of appropriate bargaining units within any 4 agency: PROVIDED, That in making such determination the board shall 5 consider the duties, skills, and working conditions of the employees, 6 the history of collective bargaining by the employees and their 7 bargaining representatives, the extent of organization among the 8 employees, and the desires of the employees;

9 (12) Certification and decertification of exclusive bargaining representatives: PROVIDED, That after certification of an exclusive 10 bargaining representative and upon the representative's request, the 11 director shall hold an election among employees in a bargaining unit to 12 determine by a majority whether to require as a condition of employment 13 membership in the certified exclusive bargaining representative on or 14 15 after the thirtieth day following the beginning of employment or the date of such election, whichever is the later, and the failure of an 16 employee to comply with such a condition of employment constitutes 17 cause for dismissal: PROVIDED FURTHER, That no more often than once in 18 19 each twelve-month period after expiration of twelve months following the date of the original election in a bargaining unit and upon 20 petition of thirty percent of the members of a bargaining unit the 21 director shall hold an election to determine whether a majority wish to 22 rescind such condition of employment: PROVIDED FURTHER, That for 23 24 purposes of this clause, membership in the certified exclusive 25 bargaining representative is satisfied by the payment of monthly or 26 other periodic dues and does not require payment of initiation, reinstatement, or any other fees or fines and includes full and 27 28 complete membership rights: AND PROVIDED FURTHER, That in order to 29 safeguard the right of nonassociation of public employees, based on 30 bona fide religious tenets or teachings of a church or religious body 31 of which such public employee is a member, such public employee shall pay to the union, for purposes within the program of the union as 32 designated by such employee that would be in harmony with his or her 33 34 individual conscience, an amount of money equivalent to regular union 35 dues minus any included monthly premiums for union-sponsored insurance programs, and such employee shall not be a member of the union but is 36 37 entitled to all the representation rights of a union member;

(13) Agreements between agencies and certified exclusive bargainingrepresentatives providing for grievance procedures and collective

1 negotiations on all personnel matters over which the appointing 2 authority of the appropriate bargaining unit of such agency may 3 lawfully exercise discretion;

4 (14) Written agreements may contain provisions for payroll 5 deductions of employee organization dues upon authorization by the 6 employee member and for the cancellation of such payroll deduction by 7 the filing of a proper prior notice by the employee with the appointing 8 authority and the employee organization: PROVIDED, That nothing 9 contained herein permits or grants to any employee the right to strike 10 or refuse to perform his or her official duties;

(15) Adoption and revision of a comprehensive classification plan 11 12 for all positions in the classified service, based on investigation and 13 analysis of the duties and responsibilities of each such position. 14 ((However, beginning July 1, 1993, through June 30, 1995,)) The board 15 shall not adopt job classification revisions or class studies unless 16 implementation of the proposed revision or study will result in net cost savings, increased efficiencies, or improved management of 17 personnel or services, and the proposed revision or study has been 18 19 approved by the director of financial management in accordance with 20 chapter 43.88 RCW;

21 (16) Allocation and reallocation of positions within the 22 classification plan;

23 (17) Adoption and revision of a state salary schedule to reflect 24 the prevailing rates in Washington state private industries and other 25 governmental units but the rates in the salary schedules or plans shall 26 be increased if necessary to attain comparable worth under an implementation plan under RCW 41.06.155 and that, for institutions of 27 28 higher education and related boards, shall be competitive for positions 29 of a similar nature in the state or the locality in which an 30 institution of higher education or related board is located, such 31 adoption and revision subject to approval by the director of financial management in accordance with the provisions of chapter 43.88 RCW; 32

(18) Increment increases within the series of steps for each pay grade based on length of service for all employees whose standards of performance are such as to permit them to retain job status in the classified service. ((However, beginning July 1, 1993, through June 30, 1995, increment increases shall not be provided to any classified or exempt employees under the jurisdiction of the board whose monthly

1 salary on or after July 1, 1993, exceeds three thousand seven hundred

2 fifty dollars;))

3 (19) Providing for veteran's preference as required by existing 4 statutes, with recognition of preference in regard to layoffs and 5 subsequent reemployment for veterans and their surviving spouses by giving such eligible veterans and their surviving spouses additional 6 7 credit in computing their seniority by adding to their unbroken state 8 service, as defined by the board, the veteran's service in the military 9 not to exceed five years. For the purposes of this section, "veteran" 10 means any person who has one or more years of active military service in any branch of the armed forces of the United States or who has less 11 than one year's service and is discharged with a disability incurred in 12 13 the line of duty or is discharged at the convenience of the government and who, upon termination of such service has received an honorable 14 15 discharge, a discharge for physical reasons with an honorable record, or a release from active military service with evidence of service 16 17 other than that for which an undesirable, bad conduct, or dishonorable discharge shall be given: PROVIDED, HOWEVER, That the surviving spouse 18 19 of a veteran is entitled to the benefits of this section regardless of 20 the veteran's length of active military service: PROVIDED FURTHER, That for the purposes of this section "veteran" does not include any 21 22 person who has voluntarily retired with twenty or more years of active 23 military service and whose military retirement pay is in excess of five 24 hundred dollars per month;

(x) A public participation program, including regional citizenadvisory committees;

23 (xi) Public funding to assist potentially liable persons to pay for 24 the costs of remedial action in compliance with cleanup standards under 25 RCW 70.105D.030(2)(d) but only when the amount and terms of such 26 funding are established under a settlement agreement under RCW 70.105D.040(4) and when the director has found that the funding will 27 achieve both (A) a substantially more expeditious or enhanced cleanup 28 than would otherwise occur, and (B) the prevention or mitigation of 29 30 unfair economic hardship; and

31 (xii) Development and demonstration of alternative management 32 technologies designed to carry out the top two hazardous waste 33 management priorities of RCW 70.105.150.

(3) The following moneys shall be deposited into the local toxics
control account: Those revenues which are raised by the tax imposed
under RCW 82.21.030 and which are attributable to that portion of the
rate equal to thirty-seven one-hundredths of one percent.

(a) Moneys deposited in the local toxics control account shall beused by the department for grants or loans to local governments for the

1 following purposes in descending order of priority: (i) Remedial 2 actions; (ii) hazardous waste plans and programs under chapter 70.105 3 RCW; and (iii) solid waste plans and programs under chapters 70.95, 4 70.95C, 70.95I, and 70.105 RCW. Funds for plans and programs shall be 5 allocated consistent with the priorities and matching requirements 6 established in chapters 70.105, 70.95C, 70.95I, and 70.95 RCW.

 31 control account may be used for solid waste incinerator feasibility
 32 studies, construction, maintenance, or operation.

(7) The department shall adopt rules for grant or loan issuance andperformance.

35 **Sec. 913.** RCW 86.26.007 and 1993 sp.s. c 24 s 928 are each amended 36 to read as follows:

The flood control assistance account is hereby established in the state treasury. At the beginning of the $((\frac{1995-97}{)})$ <u>1997-99</u> fiscal

biennium and each biennium thereafter the state treasurer shall 1 transfer from the general fund to the flood control assistance account 2 an amount of money which, when combined with money remaining in the 3 4 account from the previous biennium, will equal four million dollars. 5 Moneys in the flood control assistance account may be spent only after appropriation for purposes specified under this chapter. A physician may terminate and a health care provider may assist a physician in terminating a pregnancy as permitted by this section.

6 Sec. 923. RCW 9.02.160 and 1992 c 1 s 7 are each amended to read 7 as follows:

8 If the state provides, directly or by contract, maternity care 9 benefits, services, or information to women through any program administered or funded in whole or in part by the state, the state 10 11 shall also provide women otherwise eligible for any such program with 12 substantially equivalent benefits, services, or information to permit them to voluntarily terminate their pregnancies. Except as permitted 13 14 by section 924 of this act, during the 1995-1997 biennium the state 15 shall not directly or indirectly provide any benefits or services for a termination of pregnancy, unless the termination of pregnancy is 16 necessary to prevent the death of the woman. (e) In adopting rules under this section the board may consult with
state agencies, including but not limited to the department of social

(i) "Board" means the board of public assistance trusteesestablished under subsection (3) of this section.

(ii) "Eligible person" means a person who is not eligible for federal or state public assistance or benefits after July 1, 1995, but who was or would have been eligible for federal or state public assistance or benefits under laws in existence prior to July 1, 1995. (iii) "Qualified organization" means a nonprofit corporation organized under Title 24 RCW and registered with the secretary of state as a charitable organization under chapter 19.09 RCW.

36 (iv) "Fund" means the public assistance trust fund established 37 under subsection (2) of this section.

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 925. Unless reauthorized by the legislature,
 sections 921 through 924 of this act shall expire June 30, 1997.

Sections 921 through 925 of this act shall 4 be submitted to the people for their adoption and ratification, or 5 rejection, at the next succeeding general election to be held in this 6 state, in accordance with Article II, section 1 of the state 7 Constitution, as amended, and the laws adopted to facilitate the 8 operation thereof.

9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 927. If any provision of this act or its 10 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the 11 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other 12 persons or circumstances is not affected.

13 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 928. This act is necessary for the immediate 14 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the 15 state government and its existing public institutions, and shall take 16 effect July 1, 1995.
