AN ACT Relating to the Washington award for vocational excellence; amending RCW 28C.04.520, 28C.04.525, 28C.04.530, 28C.04.535, 28C.04.540, 28C.04.545, and 28B.15.545; adding a new section to chapter 28C.04 RCW; providing an effective date; and declaring an emergency.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** A new section is added to chapter 28C.04 RCW 7 to read as follows:

8 Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the definitions in 9 this section apply throughout RCW 28C.04.520 through 28C.04.550 and 10 28B.15.545.

(1) "Independent college or university" means a private, nonprofit 11 educational institution, the main campus of which is permanently 12 situated in the state, open to residents of the state, providing 13 programs of education beyond the high school level leading at least to 14 15 the baccalaureate degree, and accredited by the Northwest association of schools and colleges as of June 9, 1988, and other institutions as 16 may be developed that are approved by the higher education coordinating 17 board as meeting equivalent standards as those accredited institutions 18 19 qualifying under this section.

(2) "Licensed" means fulfilling the requirements specified in RCW
 28C.10.060.

3 (3) "Private vocational school" means any location where an entity 4 is offering postsecondary education in any form or manner for the 5 purpose of instructing, training, or preparing persons for any vocation 6 or profession as defined in RCW 28C.10.020.

7 **Sec. 2.** RCW 28C.04.520 and 1984 c 267 s 1 are each amended to read 8 as follows:

9 Every year community colleges, ((vocational technical institutes)) 10 <u>technical colleges</u>, and high schools graduate students who have 11 distinguished themselves by their outstanding performance in their 12 occupational training programs. The legislature intends to recognize 13 and honor these students by establishing a Washington award for 14 vocational excellence.

15 Sec. 3. RCW 28C.04.525 and 1987 c 231 s 3 are each amended to read 16 as follows:

17 The Washington award for vocational excellence program is 18 established. The purposes of this annual program are to:

19 (1) Maximize public awareness of the achievements, leadership 20 ability, and community contributions of the state's public 21 ((vocational-technical)) technical college students;

22 (2) Emphasize the dignity of work in our society;

(3) Instill respect for those who become skilled in crafts andtechnology;

25 (4) Recognize the value of vocational education and its 26 contribution to the economy of this state;

27 (5) Foster business, labor, and community involvement in 28 vocational-technical training programs and in this award program; and 29 (6) Recognize the outstanding achievements of up to three vocational or technical students, at least two of whom should be 30 graduating high school students, in each legislative district. 31 32 Students who have completed at least one year of a vocational-technical 33 program in a community college or public ((vocational-technical institute)) technical college may also be recognized. 34

35 **Sec. 4.** RCW 28C.04.530 and 1987 c 231 s 2 are each amended to read 36 as follows:

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The ((commission for vocational education or a successor 1 (1)agency)) work force training and education coordinating board shall 2 have the responsibility for the development and administration of the 3 4 Washington award for vocational excellence program. The ((commission or successor agency)) work force training and education coordinating 5 board shall develop the program in consultation with other state 6 7 agencies and private organizations having interest and responsibility 8 in vocational education, including but not limited to: The state board 9 for community and technical colleges ((education)), the office of the 10 superintendent of public instruction, a voluntary professional 11 association of vocational educators, and representatives from business, 12 labor, and industry.

13 (2) The ((commission or successor agency)) work force training and 14 education coordinating board shall establish a planning committee to 15 develop the criteria for screening and selecting the students who will 16 receive the award. This criteria shall include but not be limited to 17 the following characteristics: Proficiency in their chosen fields, 18 attendance, attitude, character, leadership, and civic contributions.

19 **Sec. 5.** RCW 28C.04.535 and 1984 c 267 s 4 are each amended to read 20 as follows:

The Washington award for vocational excellence shall be granted 21 The ((commission)) work force training and education 22 annually. 23 coordinating board shall notify the students receiving the award, their 24 vocational instructors, local chambers of commerce, the legislators of 25 their respective districts, and the governor, after final selections have been made. The ((commission)) work force training and education 26 coordinating board, in conjunction with the governor's office, shall 27 prepare appropriate certificates to be presented to the selected 28 29 students. Awards shall be presented in public ceremonies at times and places determined by the ((commission)) work force training and 30 education coordinating board in cooperation with the office of the 31 32 governor.

33 **Sec. 6.** RCW 28C.04.540 and 1984 c 267 s 5 are each amended to read 34 as follows:

The ((commission)) work force training and education coordinating board may accept any and all donations, grants, bequests, and devices, conditional or otherwise, or money, property, service, or other things

of value which may be received from any federal, state, or local 1 agency, any institution, person, firm, or corporation, public and 2 private, to be held, used, or applied for the purposes of the 3 4 Washington award for vocational excellence program. The ((commission)) work force training and education coordinating board shall encourage 5 maximum participation from business, labor, and community groups. The б ((commission)) work force training and education coordinating board 7 8 shall also coordinate, where feasible, the contribution activities of 9 the various participants.

10 The ((commission)) work force training and education coordinating 11 <u>board</u> shall not make expenditures from funds collected under this 12 section until February 15, 1985.

13 Sec. 7. RCW 28C.04.545 and 1987 c 231 s 4 are each amended to read 14 as follows:

15 The respective governing boards of the ((public vocationaltechnical institutes shall provide fee waivers for a maximum of two 16 17 years for recipients of the Washington award for vocational excellence 18 established under RCW 28C.04.520 through 28C.04.540. To qualify for the waiver, recipients shall enter the public vocational-technical 19 institute within three years of receiving the award. An above average 20 rating at the vocational-technical institute in the first year shall be 21 required to qualify for the second-year waiver)) institutions of higher 22 23 education as defined in RCW 28B.10.016 shall waive tuition and services and activities fees for a maximum of two years for recipients named 24 before June 30, 1994, of the Washington award for vocational excellence 25 established under RCW 28C.04.520 through 28C.04.550. 26

(1) To qualify for the waiver, recipients shall enter the institution of higher education within three years of receiving the award. A minimum grade point average at the college or university equivalent to 3.00, or an above average rating at a technical college, is required in the first year to qualify for the second-year waiver. The tuition waiver shall be granted for undergraduate studies only.

33 (2) Students named as recipients of the award after June 30, 1994,
 34 shall be eligible to receive a grant for undergraduate coursework as
 35 authorized under this section.

36 <u>(3) Recipients of the Washington award for vocational excellence</u> 37 <u>named after June 30, 1994, who choose to attend a licensed private</u>

1 vocational school or independent college or university in this state
2 may receive grant moneys under this section.

3 (4) The work force training and education coordinating board shall
4 distribute grants to eligible students under this section from moneys
5 appropriated for this purpose. The individual grants shall not exceed,
6 on a yearly basis, the yearly full-time resident undergraduate tuition
7 and services and activities fees in effect at the state-funded research
8 universities.

9 (5) To qualify for the grant, recipients shall enter the in-state 10 private vocational school, independent college, or institution of 11 higher education within three years of high school graduation. A 12 minimum grade point average at the college or university equivalent to 13 3.00, or an above average rating at a technical college, is required in 14 the first year to qualify for the second-year grant.

15 Sec. 8. RCW 28B.15.545 and 1993 sp.s. c 18 s 20 are each amended 16 to read as follows:

17 Subject to the limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, the governing boards 18 of the state universities, the regional universities, The Evergreen State College, and the community colleges shall waive tuition and 19 services and activities fees for a maximum of two years for those 20 recipients of the Washington award for vocational excellence 21 22 established under RCW 28C.04.520 through 28C.04.540 who received their 23 awards before June 30, 1994. ((The governing boards may waive all or 24 a portion of tuition and services and activities fees for those 25 recipients of the Washington award for vocational excellence who received their awards after June 30, 1994. Each recipient shall not 26 receive a waiver for more than six quarters or four semesters. To 27 28 qualify for the waiver, recipients shall enter the college or 29 university within three years of receiving the award. A minimum grade 30 point average at the college or university equivalent to 3.00, or an above-average rating at a technical college, shall be required in the 31 first year to qualify for the second-year waiver. The tuition waiver 32 33 shall be granted for undergraduate studies only.))

34 (1) To qualify for the waiver, recipients shall enter the 35 institution of higher education as defined in RCW 28B.10.016 within 36 three years of receiving the award. A minimum grade point average at 37 the college or university equivalent to 3.00, or an above average 38 rating at a technical college, is required in the first year to qualify 1 for the second-year waiver. The tuition waiver shall be granted for 2 undergraduate studies only.

3 (2) Students named as recipients of the award after June 30, 1994,
4 shall be eligible to receive a grant for undergraduate coursework as
5 authorized under this section.

6 <u>(3) Recipients of the Washington award for vocational excellence</u> 7 <u>named after June 30, 1994, who choose to attend a licensed private</u> 8 <u>vocational school or independent college or university in this state</u> 9 <u>may receive grant moneys under this section.</u>

10 (4) The work force training and education coordinating board shall 11 distribute grants to eligible students under this section from moneys 12 appropriated for this purpose. The individual grants shall not exceed, 13 on a yearly basis, the yearly full-time resident undergraduate tuition 14 and services and activities fees in effect at the state-funded research 15 universities.

16 (5) To qualify for the grant under this section, recipients shall 17 enter the in-state private vocational school, independent college, or 18 institution of higher education within three years of high school 19 graduation. A minimum grade point average at the college or university 20 equivalent to 3.00, or an above average rating at a technical college, 21 is required in the first year to qualify for the second-year grant.

22 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 9. If any provision of this act or its 23 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the 24 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other 25 persons or circumstances is not affected.

26 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 10. This act is necessary for the immediate 27 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the 28 state government and its existing public institutions, and shall take 29 effect July 1, 1995.

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
