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## SUBSTITUTE HOUSE BILL 2877

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State of Washington 54th Legislature 1996 Regular Session

- 1 AN ACT Relating to integrated pest management; and adding a new
- 2 chapter to Title 17 RCW.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 4 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature declares that it is the
- 5 policy of the state of Washington to require all state agencies that
- 6 have pest control responsibilities to follow the principles of
- 7 integrated pest management.
- 8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** The definitions in this section apply
- 9 throughout this chapter unless the context clearly requires otherwise:
- 10 (1) "Integrated pest management" means a coordinated decision-
- 11 making and action process that uses the most appropriate pest control
- 12 methods and strategy in an environmentally and economically sound
- 13 manner to meet agency pest management objectives. The elements of
- 14 integrated pest management include:
- 15 (a) Preventing pest problems;
- (b) Monitoring for the presence of pests and pest damage;
- 17 (c) Establishing the density of the pest population, that may be
- 18 set at zero, that can be tolerated or correlated with a damage level

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- sufficient to warrant treatment of the problem based on health, public safety, economic, or aesthetic thresholds;
- 3 (d) Treating pest problems to reduce populations below those levels 4 established by damage thresholds using strategies that may include 5 biological, cultural, mechanical, and chemical control methods and that 6 must consider human health, ecological impact, feasibility, and cost-7 effectiveness; and
- 8 (e) Evaluating the effects and efficacy of pest treatments.
- 9 (2) "Pest" means a vertebrate or invertebrate animal, pathogen, 10 parasitic plant, weed, or similar or allied organism that can cause 11 disease or damage to crops, trees, shrubs, grasses, or other plants, 12 humans, animals, or property.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. By one year after the effective date of this section, each of the following state agencies or institutions shall implement integrated pest management practices when carrying out the agency's or institution's duties related to pest control:
- 17 (1) The department of agriculture;
- 18 (2) The state noxious weed control board;
- 19 (3) The department of ecology;
- 20 (4) The department of fish and wildlife;
- 21 (5) The department of transportation;
- 22 (6) The parks and recreation commission;
- 23 (7) The department of natural resources;
- 24 (8) The department of corrections;
- 25 (9) The department of general administration; and
- 26 (10) Each state institution of higher education, for the 27 institution's own building and grounds maintenance.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 4. (1) A state agency or institution listed in section 3 of this act shall provide integrated pest management training for employees responsible for pest management. The training programs shall be developed in cooperation with the interagency integrated pest management coordinating committee created under section 5 of this act.
- 33 (2) A state agency or institution listed in section 3 of this act 34 shall designate an integrated pest management coordinator. The 35 integrated pest management coordinator shall:
- 36 (a) Manage the integrated pest management program of the agency or 37 institution; and

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- 1 (b) Report at least annually to the interagency integrated pest 2 management coordinating committee about the implementation of the 3 agency or institution program. The report must:
- 4 (i) Identify pest problems within the purview or potential purview 5 of the program that have occurred during the previous twelve months;
- 6 (ii) Describe the integrated pest management program implemented to address the problems;
- 8 (iii) Address the effectiveness of the integrated pest management 9 program used in dealing with each problem and any significant impacts 10 that may have occurred through action or lack of action by the agency 11 or institution involved; and
- 12 (iv) Identify additional pests that are anticipated to become a 13 problem during the next year and describe the integrated pest 14 management program to be considered in response to the problem.
- 15 NEW SECTION. Sec. 5. (1)The interagency integrated pest management coordinating committee is created. The committee is 16 composed of the integrated pest management coordinator from each agency 17 18 or institution listed under section 3 of this act. The coordinator 19 from the department of agriculture shall serve as chair of the committee. 20
- 21 (2) The interagency integrated pest management coordinating 22 committee shall advise the state agencies and institutions and 23 facilitate interagency coordination. The committee shall review each 24 state agency's or institution's integrated pest management program and 25 provide comments on the adherence of the program to integrated pest 26 management as defined in section 2 of this act.
  - (3) The interagency integrated pest management coordinating committee shall meet four times a year. All meetings of the committee must be open to the public. The committee shall give public notice of each meeting.

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(4) By September 30th of each even-numbered year, the department of agriculture, with the advice of the interagency integrated pest management coordinating committee, shall report on the integrated pest management programs, with comments on their adherence to integrated pest management as defined in section 2 of this act, to the president of the senate, the speaker of the house of representatives, and the appropriate legislative committees.

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- 1 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 6.** Sections 1 through 5 of this act shall
- 2 constitute a new chapter in Title 17 RCW.

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
