1 AN ACT Relating to accountability and collaboration in higher
2 education and K-12 education; adding new sections to chapter 28B.10
3 RCW; and creating a new section.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** A new section is added to chapter 28B.10 RCW
6 to read as follows:

7 The legislature finds that some college students who have recently
8 graduated from high school must immediately enroll in one or more
9 precollege classes before they can proceed successfully through
10 college. The legislature also finds that these students should have
11 received basic skills in English, reading, spelling, grammar, and
12 mathematics before graduating from high school. It is the intent of
13 the legislature that colleges and universities provide information to
14 school districts about recent graduates who enroll in precollege
15 classes. It is also the intent of the legislature to encourage
16 institutions of higher education and the common schools to work
17 together to solve problems of common concern.

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2.** By June 30, 1996, in consultation with the
2 commission on student learning, the superintendent of public
3 instruction, the state board of education, faculty, teachers from
4 institutions of higher education and high schools, and others as
5 appropriate, the higher education coordinating board shall adopt common
6 definitions of remedial and precollege material and course work. The
7 definitions adopted by the board shall be rigorous, challenging
8 students to come to college well prepared to engage in college and
9 university work, and shall be adopted by each institution of higher
10 education as defined in RCW 28B.10.016.

11 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 3.** A new section is added to chapter 28B.10 RCW
12 to read as follows:

13 Beginning in 1997, by September 30th of each year, each state
14 university, regional university, state college, and, for community
15 colleges and technical colleges, the state board for community and
16 technical colleges shall provide a report to the office of the
17 superintendent of public instruction, the state board of education, and
18 the commission on student learning under RCW 28A.630.885. The report
19 shall contain the following information on students who, within three
20 years of graduating from a Washington high school, enrolled the prior
21 year in a state-supported precollege level class at the institution:
22 (1) The number of such students enrolled in a precollege level class in
23 mathematics, reading, grammar, spelling, writing, or English; (2) the
24 types of precollege classes in which each student was enrolled; and (3)
25 the name of the Washington high school from which each student
26 graduated.

27 For students who enrolled in a precollege class within three years
28 of graduating from a Washington high school, each institution of higher
29 education shall also report to the Washington high school from which
30 the student graduated. The annual report shall include information on
31 the number of students from that high school enrolled in precollege
32 classes, and the types of classes taken by the students.

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
