## SENATE BILL 5194

State of Washington 54th Legislature 1995 Regular Session

**By** Senators Fraser, Winsley, Kohl, Sheldon, Snyder, Franklin, Gaspard, Heavey, C. Anderson and Haugen; by request of Governor Lowry

Read first time 01/13/95. Referred to Committee on Ecology & Parks.

AN ACT Relating to the reauthorization of the Puget Sound water quality authority; amending RCW 90.70.011, 90.70.025, 90.70.055, and 90.70.065; repealing RCW 90.70.035, 90.70.045, 90.70.902, 43.131.369, and 43.131.370; providing an effective date; and declaring an emergency.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

7 Sec. 1. RCW 90.70.011 and 1990 c 115 s 2 are each amended to read 8 as follows:

(1) There is established the Puget Sound water quality authority 9 10 composed of eleven members. Nine members shall be appointed by the governor and confirmed by the senate. In addition, the commissioner of 11 12 public lands or the commissioner's designee and the director of ecology 13 or the director's designee shall serve as ex officio members. Three of 14 the members shall include a representative from the counties, a 15 representative from the cities, and a tribal representative. The director of ecology shall be chair of the authority. In making these 16 17 appointments, the governor shall seek to include representation of the 18 variety of interested parties concerned about Puget Sound water quality. ((Of the appointed members, at least one shall be selected 19

from each of the six congressional districts surrounding Puget Sound.)) 1 Appointments to the authority shall reflect geographical balance and 2 the diversity of population within the Puget Sound basin. 3 Members 4 shall serve four-year terms. Of the initial members appointed to the authority, two shall serve for two years, two shall serve for three 5 years, and two shall serve for four years. Thereafter members shall be 6 7 appointed to four-year terms. Members representing cities, counties, and the tribes shall also serve four-year staggered terms, 8 as 9 determined by the governor. Vacancies shall be filled by appointment 10 for the remainder of the unexpired term of the position being vacated. ((The executive director of the authority shall be selected by the 11 governor and shall serve at the pleasure of the governor. The 12 executive director shall not be a member of the authority. 13

14 (2)) Members shall be compensated as provided in RCW 43.03.250.
 15 Members shall be reimbursed for travel expenses as provided in RCW
 16 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.

17 (2) The executive director of the authority shall be selected by
 18 the governor and shall serve at the pleasure of the governor. The
 19 executive director shall not be a member of the authority.

(3) The executive director of the authority shall be a full-time employee responsible for the administration of all functions of the authority, including hiring and terminating staff, <u>budget preparation</u>, contracting, coordinating with the governor, the legislature, and other state and local entities, and the delegation of responsibilities as deemed appropriate. The salary of the executive director shall be fixed by the governor, subject to RCW 43.03.040.

(4) ((The authority shall prepare a budget and a work plan.
 (5))) Not more than four employees of the authority may be exempt
 from the provisions of chapter 41.06 RCW.

30 (((<del>6)</del>)) <u>(5)</u> The executive director and staff of the authority shall 31 be located in the Olympia area((<del>, as space becomes available</del>)). The 32 department of general administration shall house the authority within 33 the department of ecology.

34 **Sec. 2.** RCW 90.70.025 and 1985 c 451 s 5 are each amended to read 35 as follows:

In order to carry out its responsibilities under this chapter, the authority may:

(1) ((Develop interim proposals and recommendations, before the
 plan is adopted, concerning the elements identified in RCW 90.70.060;
 (2))) Enter into, amend, and terminate contracts with individuals,

4 corporations, or research institutions for the purposes of this
5 chapter;

6 (((3))) (2) Receive such gifts, grants, and endowments, in trust or
7 otherwise, for the use and benefit of the purposes of the authority.
8 The authority may expend the same or any income therefrom according to
9 the terms of the gifts, grants, or endowments;

10 ((+4+))) (3) Conduct studies and research relating to Puget Sound 11 water quality;

12 (((5))) (4) Obtain information relating to Puget Sound from other 13 state and local agencies;

14 (((+6))) (5) Conduct appropriate public hearings and otherwise seek
15 to broadly disseminate information concerning Puget Sound;

16 (((7))) (6) Receive and expend funding from other public agencies; 17 (7) Establish priorities for funding the implementation of the 18 plan;

19 (8) ((Prepare a biennial budget request for consideration by the 20 governor and the legislature; and

21 (9)) Adopt rules under chapter 34.05 RCW as it deems necessary for 22 the purposes of this chapter; and

(9) Appoint ad hoc advisory committees as necessary to facilitate
 plan revision, plan implementation, coordination of the ambient
 monitoring program, and the conduct of other duties under this chapter.

26 **Sec. 3.** RCW 90.70.055 and 1990 c 115 s 4 are each amended to read 27 as follows:

28 The authority shall:

29 (1) Prepare ((and)), adopt, and revise a comprehensive Puget Sound water quality management plan and a strategy for implementing the plan, 30 as defined in RCW 90.70.060. In preparing the plan and any substantial 31 32 revisions to the plan, the authority shall consult with its advisory ((committee or)) committees ((and)); appropriate federal, state, and 33 34 local agencies; tribal governments; and private interests. The authority shall also solicit extensive participation by the public by 35 36 whatever means it finds appropriate, including public hearings 37 throughout communities bordering or near Puget Sound, dissemination of

information through the news media, public notices, and mailing lists,
 and the organization of workshops, conferences, and seminars;

3 (2) ((During the plan's initial development and any subsequent 4 revisions, submit annual progress reports on plan revisions and 5 implementation to the governor and the legislature.

6 (3) Submit the plan to the governor and the legislature no later
7 than January 1, 1987. The authority shall)) Review the plan at least
8 every ((four)) six years and revise the plan, as deemed appropriate((7
9 and shall submit the plan by July 1, 1994)). A revised plan shall be
10 submitted to the governor and the legislature by July 1, 2000, and
11 every ((four)) six years thereafter;

(((4))) (3) Prepare a biennial "state of the Sound" report and 12 submit such report to the governor, the legislature, and the state 13 agencies and local governments identified in the plan. Copies of the 14 15 report shall be made available to the public. The report shall 16 describe the current condition of water quality and related resources in Puget Sound and ((shall)) include an assessment of the extent to 17 which implementation of the plan has occurred and resulted in progress 18 19 toward improving and protecting water quality in Puget Sound. The assessment shall be based upon an evaluation of performance measures 20 required by subsection (5) of this section. The report may also 21 include, but not be limited to: 22

(a) The status and condition of the resources of Puget Sound,
 including the results of ecological monitoring, including an assessment
 of the economic value of Puget Sound;

(b) Current and foreseeable trends in water quality of Puget Soundand the management of its resources;

(c) Review of significant public and private activities affecting
Puget Sound and an assessment of whether such activities are consistent
with the plan; and

(d) Recommendations to the governor, the legislature, and appropriate state and local agencies for actions needed to remedy any deficiencies in current policies, plans, programs, or activities relating to the water quality of Puget Sound, and recommendations concerning changes necessary to protect and improve Puget Sound water quality; ((and)

37 (5))) (4) Review the ((Puget Sound related budgets and regulatory 38 and enforcement activities)) status of plan implementation efforts of

1 state agencies with responsibilities for water quality and related 2 resources in Puget Sound;

3 (5) In consultation with state agencies, develop and track 4 quantifiable performance measures that can be used by the governor and the legislature to assess the effectiveness over time of programs and 5 actions initiated under the plan to improve and protect Puget Sound 6 water quality and biological resources. The performance measures shall 7 be developed by June 30, 1996. State agencies shall assist the 8 9 authority in the development and tracking of these performance measures. The performance measures may be limited to selected 10 11 <u>geographic areas;</u>

12 (6) Emphasize plan implementation by providing state and local 13 agencies with direct technical assistance, research, education, 14 coordination, and other services that are necessary to implement the 15 plan in a timely and efficient manner; and

(7) To reduce costs and improve efficiency, review by December 1, 16 1995, all requirements for reports and documentation from state 17 18 agencies and local governments specified in the plan and in this 19 chapter. Based on this review, the authority shall, if appropriate, eliminate and consolidate reports, modify reporting schedules to 20 correspond to publication of the state of the Sound report, and modify 21 reporting requirements to support evaluation of performance measures 22 required by subsection (5) of this section. 23

24 **Sec. 4.** RCW 90.70.065 and 1994 c 264 s 98 are each amended to read 25 as follows:

(1) In addition to other powers and duties specified in this
chapter, the authority shall ensure implementation and coordination of
the Puget Sound ambient monitoring program established in the plan
under RCW 90.70.060(12). The program shall:

30 (a) Develop a baseline and examine differences among areas of Puget 31 Sound, for environmental conditions, natural resources, and 32 contaminants in ((seafood)) sediments and marine life, against which 33 future changes can be measured;

34 (b) Take measurements relating to specific program elements35 identified in the plan;

36 (c) Measure the progress of the ambient monitoring programs 37 implemented under the plan;

(d) Provide a permanent record of significant natural and human-1 caused changes in key environmental indicators in Puget Sound; and 2 3

(e) Help support research on Puget Sound.

4 (2) ((To ensure proper coordination of the ambient monitoring program, the authority may establish an interagency coordinating 5 committee consisting of representatives from the departments of 6 7 ecology, fish and wildlife, natural resources, and health, and such 8 federal, local, tribal, and other organizations as are necessary to 9 implement the program.

10 (3)) Each state agency with responsibilities for implementing the 11 Puget Sound ambient monitoring program((, as specified in the plan,)) shall participate in the program, as specified in the plan. 12

13 NEW SECTION. Sec. 5. The following acts or parts of acts are each 14 repealed: (1) RCW 90.70.035 and 1985 c 451 s 6; 15 (2) RCW 90.70.045 and 1994 c 264 s 97, 1990 c 115 s 3, 1988 c 36 s 16 72, & 1985 c 451 s 7; 17 18 (3) RCW 90.70.902 and 1990 c 115 s 13; (4) RCW 43.131.369 and 1990 c 115 s 11; and 19 (5) RCW 43.131.370 and 1990 c 115 s 12. 20

This act is necessary for the immediate 21 NEW SECTION. Sec. 6. 22 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the 23 state government and its existing public institutions, and shall take 24 effect June 30, 1995.

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
