8 (1)\$288,000 is provided solely for the legislative budget 9 committee to conduct a performance audit of the office of the superintendent of public instruction and report its finding to the 10 appropriate committees of the legislature by December 31, 1995. 11 In 12 addition to the standard items reviewed in a performance audit, the committee is directed to provide the following: (a) A determination of 13 methods to maximize the amount of federal funds received by the state; 14 15 (b) the identification of potential cost savings from any office programs which could be eliminated or transferred to the private 16 17 sector; (c) an analysis of gaps and overlaps in office programs; and (d) an evaluation of the efficiency with which the office of the 18 19 superintendent of public instruction operates the programs under its 20 jurisdiction and fulfills the duties assigned to it by law. In conducting the performance audit, the legislative budget committee is 21 22 also directed to use performance measures or standards used by other 23 states or other large education organizations in developing its findings. 24

(2) The general fund appropriation contains sufficient funds for
 the legislative budget committee to perform the study required in
 Second Substitute Senate Bill No. 5574 regarding the transfer of forest
 board lands to the counties.

(3) \$10,000 is provided for a study to determine if a category for 29 rear engine transit-style school buses should be added to the 30 competitive price quote process under RCW 28A.160.195. The study shall 31 32 compare identically equipped front engine and rear engine transit-style school buses of the same model year and the same capacity to determine 33 34 if there is a definitive advantage in either type of bus in performance 35 for transporting students to and from school and if there are documented savings in operating costs. The study shall include 36 37 information from other states and national data regarding the use of front engine and rear engine transit-style school buses. The study 38 shall also include information from private contractors' fleets as well 39

1 as publicly owned and operated fleets. In addition, the study shall 2 identify the cost differences, as provided by the manufacturer of the 3 school buses, of identically equipped front engine and rear engine 4 transit-style school buses of the same capacity. The study shall be 5 submitted to the fiscal committees of the legislature and the 6 superintendent of public instruction by August 1, 1996.

7 <u>(4) The legislative budget committee shall conduct a study of the</u> 8 <u>use, in the state's public schools, of school nurses and other health</u> 9 <u>workers and the sources of funding therefor. The study shall be</u> 10 <u>conducted during the 1996-97 school year and shall be reported to the</u> 11 <u>appropriate committees of the legislature by December 1, 1997.</u>

Evergreen Legal Services 1 2 will promptly investigate any alleged violations of the outreach guidelines and inform the complaining party of the result. 3 If the 4 resolution of the investigation is not satisfactory to the complainant, 5 the matter shall be placed on the Task Force agenda for discussion at the next scheduled meeting. Employers who believe that Evergreen Legal 6 7 Services staff members have trespassed should immediately contact local 8 law enforcement authorities.
