Background: There are 296 school districts in Washington and a substantial number of school employees for which the state provides benefits at about \$315 per full-time employee, per month. While some districts purchase benefits through the State Health Care Authority, most administer them locally. State law limits state-funded benefits to these five: medical, dental, vision, group term life, and group long-term disability insurance coverage. A recent attorney general's opinion states that school districts must purchase all five benefits. This requirement reduces the amount of funds available for optional benefits through voluntary employee benefit arrangements (VEBAs).

Summary of Bill: School districts may limit the employee benefit package to one or more of the statutory benefits; however, all employee bargaining units must agree in districts where optional benefits are offered.

Appropriation: None.

Fiscal Note: Available.

Effective Date: Ninety days after adjournment of session in which bill is passed.

Testimony For: The bill provides greater choice to school employees.

Testimony Against: The bill will require school employees with families to pay more for their benefits.
