**Title:** An act relating to communications between state employees and legislators.

**Background:** State employees are sometimes told that all communications with legislators must be reported to their superior, the agency head, or other similar person.

**Summary of Bill:** Any state employee may communicate with a legislator without reporting the communication to a superior, agency head, or otherwise.

**Appropriation:** None.

**Fiscal Note:** Not requested.

**Effective Date:** Ninety days after adjournment of session in which bill is passed.

**Testimony For:** Supervisors can make veiled threats. This infringes on the right of people to talk to their elected officials and prevents legislators from obtaining valuable information. Open communication should be encouraged.

**Testimony Against:** None.
