Majority Report: The substitute bill be substituted therefor and the substitute bill do pass. Signed by 7 members: Representatives D. Schmidt, Chairman; D. Sommers, Vice Chairman; Dunn; Reams; Smith; Wensman and Wolfe.

Minority Report: Do not pass. Signed by 6 members: Representatives Scott, Ranking Minority Member; Gardner, Assistant Ranking Minority Member; Doumit; Dunshee; Murray and L. Thomas.

Background: Birth certificates are filed with local registrars. Local registrars transmit the original birth certificates to the Department of Health.

Summary of Bill: The Department of Health is to adopt rules providing for the release of electronic copies of birth certificates with standards for security and confidentiality. All certified copies of birth certificates shall be in a format and paper with security features to deter alteration without ready detection.

Government agencies may be provided with copies of birth certificates if they will be used for their official duties and they pay the appropriate fee. The Department of

Health may enter into agreements with offices of vital statistics outside of the state for the transmission of birth certificates.

The department may disclose information which may identify a person named in a birth certificate for certain research purposes.

Appropriation: None.

Fiscal Note: Not requested.

Effective Date: Ninety days after adjournment of session in which bill is passed.

Testimony For: There is a need for security. People obtain birth certificates and use them to obtain false identification.

Testimony Against: The original bill has problems; it could jeopardize the ability to get certified copies, and increase costs.
