Background: The Legislature created the Washington State Investment Board in 1981 to administer public trust and retirement funds. Washington law requires that the State Investment Board (SIB) establish investment policies and procedures that are designed to maximize return at a prudent level of risk. The statutory standard of care required of the SIB traditionally is referred to as the prudent <u>person</u> standard.

Summary of Bill: The standard of care for State Investment Board investments is modified. The SIB must make investment decisions based on what a prudent <u>investor</u> reasonably would do in a similar situation. The investment decision is looked at in terms of the whole portfolio. The SIB should diversify the investments of its funds unless

special circumstances exist which reasonably make the fund better served without diversifying.

Appropriation: None.

Fiscal Note: Not requested.

Effective Date: Ninety days after adjournment of session in which bill is passed.

Testimony For: This modernizes the current statute as recommended by the State Auditor. This clarifies state law to conform to the board's current practices. The prudent investor standard is more appropriate for large funds than is the older prudent person standard.
