1 AN ACT Relating to campaign finance reform; amending RCW 42.17.640,
2 42.17.690, 42.17.020, 42.17.040, 42.17.100, 42.17.510, 42.17.680,
3 42.17.390, and 42.17.395; adding new sections to chapter 42.17 RCW;
4 adding a new section to chapter 29.80 RCW; and prescribing penalties.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** A new section is added to chapter 42.17 RCW
7 to read as follows:

8 (1) This section applies to contributions to a candidate, state
9 official, or political committee who has failed to file a statement of
10 acceptance of voluntary expenditure limits set forth in section 3 of
11 this act.

12 (2) A candidate for a state office may not accept from any person
13 contributions that in the aggregate exceed fifty percent of the
14 contribution limits as provided for in section 2 of this act.

15 (3) A state official against whom recall charges have been filed,
16 and a political committee having the expectation of making expenditures
17 in support of the recall of the state official, may not accept from any
18 person contributions that in the aggregate exceed fifty percent of the
19 contribution limits otherwise provided for in this chapter.

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 42.17 RCW
2 to read as follows:

3 (1) This section applies to contributions to a candidate, state
4 official, or political committee who has filed a statement of
5 acceptance of voluntary expenditure limits set forth in section 3 of
6 this act.

7 (2) A candidate for a state legislative office may not accept, from
8 any person other than a bona fide political party or caucus political
9 committee, contributions that in the aggregate exceed five hundred
10 fifty dollars, and a candidate for a state office other than a state
11 legislative office may not accept, from any person other than a bona
12 fide political party or caucus political committee, contributions that
13 in the aggregate exceed one thousand one hundred dollars, for each
14 election in which the candidate is on the ballot or appears as a write-
15 in candidate. Contributions made with respect to a primary may not be
16 accepted after the date of the primary. Contributions made with
17 respect to a general election may not be accepted after the final day
18 of the applicable election cycle.

19 (3) A state official against whom recall charges have been filed,
20 and a political committee having the expectation of making expenditures
21 in support of the recall of the state official, may not accept, from
22 any person other than a bona fide political party or caucus political
23 committee, contributions during a recall campaign that in the aggregate
24 exceed five hundred fifty dollars if the official is a state legislator
25 or one thousand one hundred dollars if the official holds a state
26 office other than state legislator.

27 (4)(a) Notwithstanding subsection (2) of this section, a candidate
28 during an election cycle may not accept contributions from a bona fide
29 political party that in the aggregate exceed: (i) Fifty cents
30 multiplied by the number of registered voters in the jurisdiction from
31 which the candidate is seeking election if the contributor is the state
32 governing body of a political party; or (ii) twenty-five cents
33 multiplied by the number of registered voters in the jurisdiction from
34 which the candidate is seeking election if the contributor is a county
35 central committee or a legislative district committee.

36 (b) A candidate may not accept contributions from a county central
37 committee or a legislative district committee during an election cycle
38 that, when combined with contributions from other county central
39 committees or legislative district committees, would in the aggregate

1 exceed twenty-five cents times the number of registered voters in the
2 jurisdiction from which the candidate is elected.

3 (c) A candidate for a state legislative office may not accept from
4 a caucus political committee, contributions that in the aggregate
5 exceed fifty cents per registered voter in the jurisdiction from which
6 the candidate seeks election.

7 (5)(a) Notwithstanding subsection (3) of this section, a state
8 official against whom recall charges have been filed, and a political
9 committee having the expectation of making expenditures in support of
10 the state official, may not accept contributions from a bona fide
11 political party during a recall campaign that in the aggregate exceed:

12 (i) Fifty cents multiplied by the number of eligible registered voters
13 in the jurisdiction entitled to recall the state official if the
14 contributor is the state governing body of a political party; or (ii)
15 twenty-five cents multiplied by the number of registered voters in the
16 jurisdiction from which the candidate is seeking election if the
17 contributor is a county central committee or a legislative district
18 committee.

19 (b) A state official against whom recall charges have been filed,
20 an authorized committee of the official, and a political committee
21 having the expectation of making expenditures in support of the recall
22 of a state official, may not accept contributions from a county central
23 committee or a legislative district committee during an election cycle
24 that when combined with contributions from other county central
25 committees or legislative district committees would in the aggregate
26 exceed twenty-five cents multiplied by the number of registered voters
27 in the jurisdiction from which the official is elected.

28 (c) A state official against whom recall charges have been filed,
29 an authorized committee of the official, and a political committee
30 having the expectation of making expenditures in support of the recall
31 of a state official, may not accept from a caucus political committee,
32 contributions that in the aggregate exceed fifty cents per registered
33 voter in the jurisdiction from which the official is elected if the
34 official is a state legislator.

35 (6) The contributions allowed under subsection (3) of this section
36 are in addition to those allowed under subsection (2) of this section.
37 The contributions allowed under subsection (5) of this section are in
38 addition to those allowed under subsection (4) of this section.

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 3.** A new section is added to chapter 42.17 RCW
2 to read as follows:

3 When a person becomes a candidate or files for state office, he or
4 she shall sign and file with the commission a statement of acceptance
5 or rejection of the voluntary expenditure limits in section 4 of this
6 act. A state official whose recall is demanded or a political
7 committee having the expectation of making expenditures in support of
8 a recall shall sign and file with the commission a statement of
9 acceptance or rejection of the voluntary expenditure limits in section
10 4 of this act. The commission shall provide the form of the statement
11 and agreement by rule. The commission shall index and make available
12 for public inspection and copying a list of the statements of
13 acceptance or rejection filed by candidates.

14 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 4.** A new section is added to chapter 42.17 RCW
15 to read as follows:

16 (1) In accordance with RCW 42.17.690, the commission shall revise
17 expenditure limits applicable in an election cycle for a candidate who
18 files a statement of acceptance under section 3 of this act.

19 (2) The initial expenditure limits shall be as follows for the
20 following offices and classes of offices:

21 (a) Governor: One million dollars;

22 (b) All other state executive offices: Two hundred fifty thousand
23 dollars;

24 (c) State senator: Eighty thousand dollars; and

25 (d) State representative: Fifty thousand dollars.

26 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 5.** A new section is added to chapter 42.17 RCW
27 to read as follows:

28 (1) It is a violation of this chapter for a person to make a
29 contribution or expenditure in support of or opposition to a candidate
30 other than one within the limits in this chapter or an independent
31 expenditure as defined in RCW 42.17.020.

32 (2) If a candidate has agreed to expenditure limits under section
33 3 of this act and: (a) Knowingly accepts a contribution in excess of
34 the amounts allowed; or (b) has encouraged, approved, or collaborated
35 in the making of an unlawful expenditure by another in connection with
36 his or her campaign, the expenditure limit must be reduced by the
37 amount of the unlawful contribution or expenditure.

1 (3) If a candidate has agreed to expenditure limits under section
2 3 of this act and knowingly exceeds those limits, the candidate must
3 refund that portion of any contribution received that was in excess of
4 the amount allowed under section 1 of this act.

5 (4) Payments of candidate filing fees, fees or assessments relating
6 to the primary or general election candidates' pamphlet, or costs
7 incurred in the course of defending against a challenge of a person's
8 eligibility to become a candidate or a motion for injunction under RCW
9 42.17.390, do not constitute expenditures for the purpose of
10 determining whether a candidate has exceeded an expenditure limit.

11 **Sec. 6.** RCW 42.17.640 and 1995 c 397 s 20 are each amended to read
12 as follows:

13 (1) ~~((No person, other than a bona fide political party or a caucus
14 political committee, may make contributions to a candidate for a state
15 legislative office that in the aggregate exceed five hundred dollars or
16 to a candidate for a state office other than a state legislative office
17 that in the aggregate exceed one thousand dollars for each election in
18 which the candidate is on the ballot or appears as a write-in
19 candidate. Contributions made with respect to a primary may not be
20 made after the date of the primary. Contributions made with respect to
21 a general election may not be made after the final day of the
22 applicable election cycle.~~

23 (2) ~~No person, other than a bona fide political party or a caucus
24 political committee, may make contributions to a state official against
25 whom recall charges have been filed, or to a political committee having
26 the expectation of making expenditures in support of the recall of the
27 state official, during a recall campaign that in the aggregate exceed
28 five hundred dollars if for a state legislative office or one thousand
29 dollars if for a state office other than a state legislative office.~~

30 (3)(a) ~~Notwithstanding subsection (1) of this section, no bona fide
31 political party or caucus political committee may make contributions to
32 a candidate during an election cycle that in the aggregate exceed (i)
33 fifty cents multiplied by the number of eligible registered voters in
34 the jurisdiction from which the candidate is elected if the contributor
35 is a caucus political committee or the governing body of a state
36 organization, or (ii) twenty five cents multiplied by the number of
37 registered voters in the jurisdiction from which the candidate is~~

1 ~~elected if the contributor is a county central committee or a~~
2 ~~legislative district committee.~~

3 ~~(b) No candidate may accept contributions from a county central~~
4 ~~committee or a legislative district committee during an election cycle~~

34 ~~(6) Notwithstanding subsections (1) through (4) of this section, no~~
35 ~~person other than an individual, bona fide political party, or))~~
36 ~~Notwithstanding sections 1 and 2 of this act, a caucus political~~
37 ~~committee may ((make)) not accept contributions reportable under this~~
38 ~~chapter ((to)) from any person other than a bona fide political party~~
39 ~~or a caucus political committee that in the aggregate exceed five~~

1 hundred dollars in a calendar year (~~or to~~). A bona fide political
2 party may not accept contributions reportable under this chapter from
3 any person other than a bona fide political party or a caucus political
4 committee that in the aggregate exceed two thousand five hundred
5 dollars in a calendar year. This subsection does not apply to loans
6 made in the ordinary course of business.

7 ~~((7))~~ (2) For the purposes of ~~((RCW 42.17.640 through 42.17.790))~~
8 this chapter, a contribution to the authorized political committee of
9 a candidate, or of a state official against whom recall charges have
10 been filed, is considered to be a contribution to the candidate or
11 state official.

12 ~~((8))~~ (3) A contribution received within the twelve-month period
13 after a recall election concerning a state office is considered to be
14 a contribution during that recall campaign if the contribution is used
15 to pay a debt or obligation incurred to influence the outcome of that
16 recall campaign.

17 ~~((9) The contributions allowed by subsection (2) of this section~~
18 ~~are in addition to those allowed by subsection (1) of this section, and~~
19 ~~the contributions allowed by subsection (4) of this section are in~~
20 ~~addition to those allowed by subsection (3) of this section.~~

21 ~~((10) RCW 42.17.640 through 42.17.790 apply))~~ (4) This chapter
22 applies to a special election conducted to fill a vacancy in a state
23 office. However, the contributions made to a candidate or received by
24 a candidate for a primary or special election conducted to fill such a
25 vacancy shall not be counted toward any of the limitations that apply
26 to the candidate or to contributions made to the candidate for any
27 other primary or election.

28 ~~((11) Notwithstanding the other subsections of this section, no))~~
29 (5) A candidate, state official against whom recall charges have been
30 filed, or political committee having the expectation of making
31 expenditures in support of the recall of the official may not accept
32 contributions reportable under this chapter from a corporation or
33 business entity not doing business in Washington state, ((no)) labor
34 union with fewer than ten members who reside in Washington state, ((and
35 no)) or political committee that has not received contributions of ten
36 dollars or more from at least ten persons registered to vote in
37 Washington state during the preceding one hundred eighty days ((may
38 make contributions reportable under this chapter to a candidate, to a
39 state official against whom recall charges have been filed, or to a

1 political committee having the expectation of making expenditures in
2 support of the recall of the official)). This subsection does not
3 apply to loans made in the ordinary course of business.

4 ~~((12) Notwithstanding the other subsections of this section, no
5 county central committee or legislative district committee may make
6 contributions reportable under this chapter to)) (6) A candidate, state
7 official against whom recall charges have been filed, or political
8 committee having the expectation of making expenditures in support of
9 the recall of a state official may not accept contributions reportable
10 under this chapter from a county central committee or legislative
11 district committee if the county central committee or legislative
12 district committee is outside ((of)) the jurisdiction entitled to elect
13 the candidate or recall the state official.~~

14 ~~((13) No person may accept contributions that exceed the
15 contribution limitations provided in this section.~~

16 ~~(14))~~ (7) The following contributions are exempt from the
17 contribution limits of this section:

18 (a) An expenditure or contribution earmarked for voter
19 registration, for absentee ballot information, for precinct caucuses,
20 for get-out-the-vote campaigns, for precinct judges or inspectors, for
21 sample ballots, or for ballot counting, all without promotion of or
22 political advertising for individual candidates; or

23 (b) An expenditure by a political committee for its own internal
24 organization or fund raising without direct association with individual
25 candidates.

26 **Sec. 7.** RCW 42.17.690 and 1993 c 2 s 9 are each amended to read as
27 follows:

28 ~~((At the beginning of each even numbered calendar year, the
29 commission shall increase or decrease all dollar amounts in this
30 chapter based on changes in economic conditions as reflected in the
31 inflationary index used by the commission under RCW 42.17.370.)) The
32 commission shall, by January 1, 1998, and by January 1st of each even-
33 numbered year thereafter, adopt revisions in the existing contribution
34 and expenditure limits. Revisions must be for the purpose of
35 recognizing: (1) Changes in the number of registered voters state-
36 wide; and (2) economic changes as reflected by an inflationary index
37 recommended by the office of financial management. The revisions must
38 be guided by the change in the index for the two-year period before the~~

1 date the revision is to be adopted. The new dollar amounts established
2 by the commission under this section shall be rounded off by the
3 commission to amounts as judged most convenient for public
4 understanding and so as to be within ten percent of the target amount
5 equal to the base amount provided in this chapter multiplied by the
6 increase in the inflationary index since December 3, 1992.

7 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 8.** A new section is added to chapter 29.80 RCW
8 to read as follows:

9 The secretary of state shall add to each candidates' pamphlet a
10 list of the campaign spending limits recommended by the public
11 disclosure commission for each of the state offices for which the
12 statements of candidates appear in the pamphlet and a brief explanation
13 of the effect of a promise filed with the commission under section 3 of
14 this act.

15 In preparing the candidates' pamphlet for publication, the
16 secretary of state shall secure from the public disclosure commission
17 its most current list of candidates who have promised to limit
18 spending, in accordance with section 3 of this act. Using this list,
19 the secretary of state shall print a notice, explaining the voluntary
20 campaign limits or referring to the location in the pamphlet of the
21 explanation required by this section, on each page of the pamphlet
22 containing the statements and photographs of candidates. The secretary
23 of state shall develop distinctive symbols or logos that will identify
24 whether a particular candidate has or has not accepted the voluntary
25 spending limits for that campaign. Based on the information supplied
26 by the public disclosure commission under this section immediately
27 before publication of the pamphlet, the secretary of state shall print
28 the appropriate symbol or logo in conjunction with the statement of
29 each candidate to indicate whether or not the candidate has accepted
30 the voluntary spending limits for that campaign.

31 **Sec. 9.** RCW 42.17.020 and 1995 c 397 s 1 are each amended to read
32 as follows:

33 (1) "Agency" includes all state agencies and all local agencies.
34 "State agency" includes every state office, department, division,
35 bureau, board, commission, or other state agency. "Local agency"
36 includes every county, city, town, municipal corporation, quasi-
37 municipal corporation, or special purpose district, or any office,

1 department, division, bureau, board, commission, or agency thereof, or
2 other local public agency.

3 (2) "Authorized committee" means the political committee authorized
4 by a candidate, or by the public official against whom recall charges
5 have been filed, to accept contributions or make expenditures on behalf
6 of the candidate or public official.

7 (3) "Ballot proposition" means any "measure" as defined by RCW
8 29.01.110, or any initiative, recall, or referendum proposition
9 proposed to be submitted to the voters of the state or any municipal
10 corporation, political subdivision, or other voting constituency from
11 and after the time when the proposition has been initially filed with
12 the appropriate election officer of that constituency prior to its
13 circulation for signatures.

14 (4) "Benefit" means a commercial, proprietary, financial, economic,
15 or monetary advantage, or the avoidance of a commercial, proprietary,
16 financial, economic, or monetary disadvantage.

17 (5) "Bona fide political party" means:

18 (a) An organization that has filed a valid certificate of
19 nomination with the secretary of state under chapter 29.24 RCW;

20 (b) The governing body of the state organization of a major
21 political party, as defined in RCW 29.01.090, that is the body
22 authorized by the charter or bylaws of the party to exercise authority
23 on behalf of the state party; or

24 (c) The county central committee or legislative district committee
25 of a major political party. There may be only one legislative district
26 committee for each party in each legislative district.

27 (6) "Depository" means a bank designated by a candidate or
28 political committee pursuant to RCW 42.17.050.

29 (7) "Treasurer" and "deputy treasurer" mean the individuals
30 appointed by a candidate or political committee, pursuant to RCW
31 42.17.050, to perform the duties specified in that section.

32 (8) "Candidate" means any individual who seeks nomination for
33 election or election to public office. An individual seeks nomination
34 or election when he or she first:

35 (a) Receives contributions or makes expenditures or reserves space
36 or facilities with intent to promote his or her candidacy for office;

37 (b) Announces publicly or files for office;

38 (c) Purchases commercial advertising space or broadcast time to
39 promote his or her candidacy; or

1 (d) Gives his or her consent to another person to take on behalf of
2 the individual any of the actions in (a) or (c) of this subsection.

3 (9) "Caucus political committee" means a political committee
4 organized and maintained by the members of a major political party in
5 the state senate or state house of representatives.

6 (10) "Commercial advertiser" means any person who sells the service
7 of communicating messages or producing printed material for broadcast
8 or distribution to the general public or segments of the general public
9 whether through the use of newspapers, magazines, television and radio
10 stations, billboard companies, direct mail advertising companies,
11 printing companies, or otherwise.

12 (11) "Commission" means the agency established under RCW 42.17.350.

13 (12) "Compensation" unless the context requires a narrower meaning,
14 includes payment in any form for real or personal property or services
15 of any kind: PROVIDED, That for the purpose of compliance with RCW
16 42.17.241, the term "compensation" shall not include per diem
17 allowances or other payments made by a governmental entity to reimburse
18 a public official for expenses incurred while the official is engaged
19 in the official business of the governmental entity.

20 (13) "Continuing political committee" means a political committee
21 that is an organization of continuing existence not established in
22 anticipation of any particular election campaign.

23 (14)(a) "Contribution" includes:

24 (i) A loan, gift, deposit, subscription, forgiveness of
25 indebtedness, donation, advance, pledge, payment, transfer of funds
26 between political committees, or anything of value, including personal
27 and professional services for less than full consideration;

28 (ii) An expenditure made by a person in cooperation, consultation,
29 or concert with, or at the request or suggestion of, a candidate, a
30 political committee, or their agents;

31 (iii) The financing by a person of the dissemination, distribution,
32 or republication, in whole or in part, of broadcast, written, graphic,
33 or other form of political advertising prepared by a candidate, a
34 political committee, or its authorized agent;

35 (iv) Sums paid for tickets to fund-raising events such as dinners
36 and parties, except for the actual cost of the consumables furnished at
37 the event.

38 (b) "Contribution" does not include:

1 (i) Standard interest on money deposited in a political committee's
2 account;

3 (ii) Ordinary home hospitality;

4 (iii) A contribution received by a candidate or political committee
5 that is returned to the contributor within five business days of the
6 date on which it is received by the candidate or political committee;

7 (iv) A news item, feature, commentary, or editorial in a regularly
8 scheduled news medium that is of primary interest to the general
9 public, that is in a news medium controlled by a person whose business
10 is that news medium, and that is not controlled by a candidate or a
11 political committee;

12 (v) An internal political communication primarily limited to the
13 members of or contributors to a political party organization or
14 political committee, or to the officers, management staff, or
15 stockholders of a corporation or similar enterprise, or to the members
16 of a labor organization or other membership organization;

17 (vi) The rendering of personal services of the sort commonly
18 performed by volunteer campaign workers, or incidental expenses
19 personally incurred by volunteer campaign workers not in excess of
20 fifty dollars personally paid for by the worker. "Volunteer services,"
21 for the purposes of this section, means services or labor for which the
22 individual is not compensated by any person;

23 (vii) Messages in the form of reader boards, banners, or yard or
24 window signs displayed on a person's own property or property occupied
25 by a person. However, a facility used for such political advertising
26 for which a rental charge is normally made must be reported as an in-
27 kind contribution and counts towards any applicable contribution limit
28 of the person providing the facility;

29 (viii) Legal or accounting services rendered to or on behalf of:

30 (A) A political party or caucus political committee if the person
31 paying for the services is the regular employer of the person rendering
32 such services; or

33 (B) A candidate or an authorized committee if the person paying for
34 the services is the regular employer of the individual rendering the
35 services and if the services are solely for the purpose of ensuring
36 compliance with state election or public disclosure laws.

37 (c) Contributions other than money or its equivalent are deemed to
38 have a monetary value equivalent to the fair market value of the
39 contribution. Services or property or rights furnished at less than

1 their fair market value for the purpose of assisting any candidate or
2 political committee are deemed a contribution. Such a contribution
3 must be reported as an in-kind contribution at its fair market value
4 and counts towards any applicable contribution limit of the provider.

5 (15) "Elected official" means any person elected at a general or
6 special election to any public office, and any person appointed to fill
7 a vacancy in any such office.

8 (16) "Election" includes any primary, general, or special election
9 for public office and any election in which a ballot proposition is
10 submitted to the voters: PROVIDED, That an election in which the
11 qualifications for voting include other than those requirements set
12 forth in Article VI, section 1 (Amendment 63) of the Constitution of
13 the state of Washington shall not be considered an election for
14 purposes of this chapter.

15 (17) "Election campaign" means any campaign in support of or in
16 opposition to a candidate for election to public office and any
17 campaign in support of, or in opposition to, a ballot proposition.

18 (18) "Election cycle" means the period beginning on the first day
19 of December after the date of the last previous general election for
20 the office that the candidate seeks and ending on November 30th after
21 the next election for the office. In the case of a special election to
22 fill a vacancy in an office, "election cycle" means the period
23 beginning on the day the vacancy occurs and ending on November 30th
24 after the special election.

25 (19) "Expenditure" includes a payment, contribution, subscription,
26 distribution, loan, advance, deposit, or gift of money or anything of
27 value, and includes a contract, promise, or agreement, whether or not
28 legally enforceable, to make an expenditure. The term "expenditure"

36 local governmental entity or agency however constituted, candidate,

1 (~~(31)~~) (32) "Person in interest" means the person who is the
2 subject of a record or any representative designated by that person,
3 except that if that person is under a legal disability, the term

7 displays, newspaper ads, billboards, signs, brochures, articles,

12 who violates RCW 42.17.640 may be ordered to return any contribution
13 illegally accepted and may be subject to a civil penalty of (~~ten~~)
14 forty thousand dollars or three times the amount of the contribution
15 illegally made or accepted, whichever is greater.

16 (4) Any person who fails to file a properly completed statement or
17 report within the time required by this chapter may be subject to a
18 civil penalty of ten dollars per day for each day each such delinquency
19 continues.

20 (5) Any person who fails to report a contribution or expenditure
21 may be subject to a civil penalty equivalent to the amount he failed to
22 report.

23 (6) If a candidate or officer of a political committee is found to
24 have intentionally violated this chapter, he or she may be ordered to
25 pay any civil penalty imposed from personal funds.

26 (7) The court may enjoin any person to prevent the doing of any act
27 herein prohibited, or to compel the performance of any act required
28 herein.

29 **Sec. 18.** RCW 42.17.395 and 1989 c 175 s 91 are each amended to
30 read as follows:

31 (1) The commission may (a) determine whether an actual violation of
32 this chapter has occurred; and (b) issue and enforce an appropriate
33 order following such determination.

34 (2) The commission, in cases where it chooses to determine whether
35 an actual violation of this chapter has occurred, shall hold a hearing
36 pursuant to the Administrative Procedure Act, chapter 34.05 RCW, to
37 make such determination. Any order that the commission issues under
38 this section shall be pursuant to such hearing.

1 (3) In lieu of holding a hearing or issuing an order under this
2 section, the commission may refer the matter to the attorney general or
3 other enforcement agency as provided in RCW 42.17.360.

4 (4) The person against whom an order is directed under this section
5 shall be designated as the respondent. The order may require the
6 respondent to cease and desist from the activity that constitutes a
7 violation and in addition, or alternatively, may impose one or more of
8 the remedies provided in RCW 42.17.390(~~((1) (b), (c), (d), or (e))~~)
9 (2), (3), (4), and (5): PROVIDED, That no individual penalty assessed
10 by the commission may exceed (~~(one)~~) four thousand dollars, and in any
11 case where multiple violations are involved in a single complaint or
12 hearing, the maximum aggregate penalty may not exceed (~~(two)~~) ten
13 thousand (~~(five hundred)~~) dollars.

14 (5) An order issued by the commission under this section shall be
15 subject to judicial review under the Administrative Procedure Act,
16 chapter 34.05 RCW. If the commission's order is not satisfied and no
17 petition for review is filed within thirty days as provided in RCW
18 34.05.542, the commission may petition a court of competent
19 jurisdiction of any county in which a petition for review could be
20 filed under that section, for an order of enforcement. Proceedings in
21 connection with the commission's petition shall be in accordance with
22 RCW 42.17.397.

23 (6) A candidate or officer who or political committee that has not
24 paid a civil penalty imposed under RCW 42.17.390 or this section, or
25 has not complied with an order to cease and desist from the activity
26 that constitutes a violation, may not solicit or accept contributions,
27 or make expenditures, until the candidate, officer, or political
28 committee has paid the penalty and complied with the order.

29 (7) A lobbyist or sponsor of a grass roots lobbying campaign that
30 has not paid a civil penalty imposed under RCW 42.17.390 or this
31 section, or has not complied with an order to cease and desist from the
32 activity that constitutes a violation, may not lobby, receive
33 compensation, or make expenditures for lobbying, until the lobbyist or
34 sponsor has paid the penalty and complied with the order.
