20 (b) The ratio of students to teachers and other personnel in 21 selected districts, buildings, and classrooms. To the extent data is 22 obtainable, this review shall include analysis of the use of 23 certificated and noncertificated classroom instructors and assistants, the education and experience of instructional staff, the composition of 24 25 students in classrooms by status including students who qualify for special education, learning assistance, bilingual education, gifted 26 education, free and reduced-cost lunch and other characteristics, 27 including educational outcomes relevant to understanding the nature of 28 class-size and the nature of students and teachers in those classes. 29

30 (2) An interim briefing shall be presented to the fiscal committees
31 of the legislature for review and comment before a final report is
32 presented by June 30, 1999.

Any salary increases authorized under this subsection (2)(c) 10 shall not be included in an institution's salary base. It is the intent of the legislature that general fund--state support for an 11 12 institution shall not increase during the current or any future biennium as a result of any salary increases authorized under this 13 subsection (2)(c). 14

(d) Specific salary increases authorized in sections 603 through

29	fund are subject to the allotment procedure under chapter 43.88 RCW,
30	but an appropriation is not required for expenditures. The department
31	of information services shall, in consultation with entities connected
32	to the network under RCW 28D.02.070 and subject to the review and
33	approval of the office (( <del>[of]</del> )) <u>of</u> financial management, establish and
34	implement a billing structure to assure that all network users pay an
35	equitable share of the costs in relation to their usage of the network.

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(3) For the 1997-99 biennium, the education technology revolving 1 fund may be used for the allowable purposes set forth in subsection (1) 2 3 of this section and for network operations, transport, maintenance, and 4 depreciation of on-site data and shared infrastructure. During the 1997-99 biennium, the fund shall not be used for local 5 telecommunications infrastructure or the maintenance and depreciation 6 7 of local network services or other uses prohibited in subsection (1) of 8 this section. All federal moneys received for these services established by 47 U.S.C. Sec. 245(h) shall be deposited in this account 9 10 to be used for eligible services as provided by federal law and federal communications commission rules. 11

12 **Sec. 903.** RCW 43.88.030 and 1997 c 168 s 5 and 1997 c 96 s 4 are 13 each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

14 (1) The director of financial management shall provide all agencies 15 with a complete set of instructions for submitting biennial budget 16 requests to the director at least three months before agency budget documents are due into the office of financial management. 17 The 18 director shall provide agencies that are required under RCW 44.40.070 19 to develop comprehensive six-year program and financial plans with a complete set of instructions for submitting these program and financial 20 plans at the same time that instructions for submitting other budget 21 requests are provided. The budget document or documents shall consist 22 23 of the governor's budget message which shall be explanatory of the 24 budget and shall contain an outline of the proposed financial policies 25 of the state for the ensuing fiscal period, as well as an outline of 26 the proposed six-year financial policies where applicable, and shall 27 describe in connection therewith the important features of the budget. The message shall set forth the reasons for salient changes from the 28 29 previous fiscal period in expenditure and revenue items and shall 30 explain any major changes in financial policy. Attached to the budget message shall be such supporting schedules, exhibits and other 31 explanatory material in respect to both current operations and capital 32 33 improvements as the governor shall deem to be useful to the legislature. The budget document or documents shall set forth a 34 proposal for expenditures in the ensuing fiscal period, or six-year 35 36 period where applicable, based upon the estimated revenues and 37 caseloads as approved by the economic and revenue forecast council and 38 caseload forecast council or upon the estimated revenues and caseloads

of the office of financial management for those funds, accounts, 1 sources, and programs for which the forecast councils do not prepare an 2 3 official forecast, including those revenues anticipated to support the 4 six-year programs and financial plans under RCW 44.40.070. In estimating revenues to support financial plans under RCW 44.40.070, the 5 office of financial management shall rely on information and advice 6 7 from the interagency revenue task force. Revenues shall be estimated 8 for such fiscal period from the source and at the rates existing by law 9 at the time of submission of the budget document, including the supplemental budgets submitted in the even-numbered years of a 10 biennium. However, the estimated revenues and caseloads for use in the 11 governor's budget document may be adjusted to reflect budgetary revenue 12 transfers and revenue and caseload estimates dependent upon budgetary 13 14 assumptions of enrollments, workloads, and caseloads. All adjustments 15 to the approved estimated revenues and caseloads must be set forth in the budget document. The governor may additionally submit, as an 16 appendix to each supplemental, biennial, or six-year agency budget or 17 to the budget document or documents, a proposal for expenditures in the 18 19 ensuing fiscal period from revenue sources derived from proposed changes in existing statutes. 20

Supplemental and biennial documents shall reflect a six-year expenditure plan consistent with estimated revenues from existing sources and at existing rates for those agencies required to submit six-year program and financial plans under RCW 44.40.070. Any additional revenue resulting from proposed changes to existing statutes shall be separately identified within the document as well as related expenditures for the six-year period.

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The budget document or documents shall also contain:

(a) Revenues classified by fund and source for the immediately past fiscal period, those received or anticipated for the current fiscal period, those anticipated for the ensuing biennium, and those anticipated for the ensuing six-year period to support the six-year programs and financial plans required under RCW 44.40.070;

(b) The undesignated fund balance or deficit, by fund;

35 (c) Such additional information dealing with expenditures, 36 revenues, workload, performance, and personnel as the legislature may 37 direct by law or concurrent resolution;

(d) Such additional information dealing with revenues 1 and 2 expenditures as the governor shall deem pertinent and useful to the 3 legislature;

4 (e) Tabulations showing expenditures classified by fund, function, 5 activity, and ((object)) agency;

(f) A delineation of each agency's activities, including those б 7 activities funded from nonbudgeted, nonappropriated sources, including 8 funds maintained outside the state treasury;

9 (g) Identification of all proposed direct expenditures to implement 10 the Puget Sound water quality plan under chapter 90.71 RCW, shown by agency and in total; and 11

12 (h) Tabulations showing each postretirement adjustment by 13 retirement system established after fiscal year 1991, to include, but not be limited to, estimated total payments made to the end of the 14 15 previous biennial period, estimated payments for the present biennium, and estimated payments for the ensuing biennium. 16

17 (2) The budget document or documents shall include detailed estimates of all anticipated revenues applicable to proposed operating 18 19 or capital expenditures and shall also include all proposed operating 20 or capital expenditures. The total of beginning undesignated fund balance and estimated revenues less working capital and other reserves 21 shall equal or exceed the total of proposed applicable expenditures. 22 23 The budget document or documents shall further include:

24 (a) Interest, amortization and redemption charges on the state 25 debt;

26

(b) Payments of all reliefs, judgments and claims;

27 (c) Other statutory expenditures;

(d) Expenditures incident to the operation for each agency; 28

(e) Revenues derived from agency operations; 29

30 (f) Expenditures and revenues shall be given in comparative form 31 showing those incurred or received for the immediately past fiscal period and those anticipated for the current biennium and next ensuing 32 33 biennium, as well as those required to support the six-year programs and financial plans required under RCW 44.40.070; 34

35 (g) A showing and explanation of amounts of general fund and other funds obligations for debt service and any transfers of moneys that 36 37 otherwise would have been available for appropriation;

(h) Common school expenditures on a fiscal-year basis; 38

(i) A showing, by agency, of the value and purpose of financing
 contracts for the lease/purchase or acquisition of personal or real
 property for the current and ensuing fiscal periods; and

4 (j) A showing and explanation of anticipated amounts of general 5 fund and other funds required to amortize the unfunded actuarial 6 accrued liability of the retirement system specified under chapter 7 41.45 RCW, and the contributions to meet such amortization, stated in 8 total dollars and as a level percentage of total compensation.

9 (3) A separate capital budget document or schedule shall be 10 submitted that will contain the following:

(a) A statement setting forth a long-range facilities plan for the state that identifies and includes the highest priority needs within affordable spending levels;

(b) A capital program consisting of proposed capital projects for 14 15 the next biennium and the two biennia succeeding the next biennium 16 consistent with the long-range facilities plan. Insomuch as is 17 practical, and recognizing emergent needs, the capital program shall reflect the priorities, projects, and spending levels proposed in 18 19 previously submitted capital budget documents in order to provide a 20 reliable long-range planning tool for the legislature and state agencies; 21

(c) A capital plan consisting of proposed capital spending for atleast four biennia succeeding the next biennium;

24 (d) A strategic plan for reducing backlogs of maintenance and 25 repair projects. The plan shall include a prioritized list of specific 26 facility deficiencies and capital projects to address the deficiencies 27 for each agency, cost estimates for each project, a schedule for completing projects over a reasonable period 28 of time, and 29 identification of normal maintenance activities to reduce future 30 backlogs;

31 (e) A statement of the reason or purpose for a project;

32 (f) Verification that a project is consistent with the provisions33 set forth in chapter 36.70A RCW;

34 (g) A statement about the proposed site, size, and estimated life 35 of the project, if applicable;

36 (h) Estimated total project cost;

(i) For major projects valued over five million dollars, estimated
 costs for the following project components: Acquisition, consultant
 services, construction, equipment, project management, and other costs

1 included as part of the project. Project component costs shall be 2 displayed in a standard format defined by the office of financial 3 management to allow comparisons between projects;

4 (j) Estimated total project cost for each phase of the project as 5 defined by the office of financial management;

6 (k) Estimated ensuing biennium costs;

7

7 (1) Estimated costs beyond the ensuing biennium;

8

9 (n) Source and type of funds proposed;

(o) Estimated ongoing operating budget costs or savings resultingfrom the project, including staffing and maintenance costs;

(m) Estimated construction start and completion dates;

12 (p) For any capital appropriation requested for a state agency for 13 the acquisition of land or the capital improvement of land in which the primary purpose of the acquisition or improvement is recreation or 14 15 wildlife habitat conservation, the capital budget document, or an 16 omnibus list of recreation and habitat acquisitions provided with the 17 governor's budget document, shall identify the projected costs of operation and maintenance for at least the two biennia succeeding the 18 19 next biennium. Omnibus lists of habitat and recreation land acquisitions shall include individual project cost estimates for 20 operation and maintenance as well as a total for all state projects 21 included in the list. The document shall identify the source of funds 22 23 from which the operation and maintenance costs are proposed to be 24 funded;

25 (q) Such other information bearing upon capital projects as the 26 governor deems to be useful;

(r) Standard terms, including a standard and uniform definition ofnormal maintenance, for all capital projects;

(s) Such other information as the legislature may direct by law orconcurrent resolution.

31 For purposes of this subsection (3), the term "capital project" the 32 shall be defined subsequent to analysis, findings, and 33 recommendations of a joint committee comprised of representatives from 34 the house capital appropriations committee, senate ways and means 35 committee, legislative transportation committee, legislative evaluation and accountability program committee, and office of financial 36 37 management.

38 (4) No change affecting the comparability of agency or program39 information relating to expenditures, revenues, workload, performance

and personnel shall be made in the format of any budget document or 1 report presented to the legislature under this section or RCW 2 43.88.160(1) relative to the format of the budget document or report 3 which was presented to the previous regular session of the legislature 4 during an odd-numbered year without prior legislative concurrence. 5 Prior legislative concurrence shall consist of (a) a favorable majority б vote on the proposal by the standing committees on ways and means of 7 8 both houses if the legislature is in session or (b) a favorable 9 majority vote on the proposal by members of the legislative evaluation 10 and accountability program committee if the legislature is not in 11 session.

12 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 904. This act shall not be construed as 13 affecting any right or cause of action asserted in *Washington State* 14 *Legislature v. State of Washington* (Thurston county superior court 15 cause no. 98-2-00105-1).

16 **Sec. 905.** If any provision of this act or its application to any 17 person or circumstance is held invalid, the remainder of the act or the 18 application of the provision to other persons or circumstances is not 19 affected.

**Sec. 906.** This act is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the state government and its existing public institutions, and takes effect immediately.
