15 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 101. A new section is added to chapter 84.04 16 RCW to read as follows:

17 "Appraised value of property" means the aggregate true and fair 18 value of the property as last determined by the county assessor

according to the revaluation program approved under chapter 84.41 RCW,
 including revaluations based on statistical data between physical
 inspections.

4 **Sec. 102.** RCW 84.04.030 and 1961 c 15 s 84.04.030 are each amended 5 to read as follows:

6 "Assessed value of property" shall be held and construed to mean 7 the aggregate valuation of the property subject to taxation by any 8 taxing district as <u>determined under section 105 of this act, reduced by</u> 9 <u>the value of any applicable exemptions under RCW 84.36.381 or other</u> 10 <u>law, and</u> placed on the last completed and balanced tax rolls of the 11 county preceding the date of any tax levy.

12 Sec. 103. RCW 84.40.020 and 1973 c 69 s 1 are each amended to read 13 as follows:

14 All real property in this state subject to taxation shall be listed 15 and assessed every year, with reference to its appraised and assessed values on the first day of January of the year in which it is assessed. 16 17 Such listing and all supporting documents and records shall be open to 18 public inspection during the regular office hours of the assessor's PROVIDED, That confidential income data is exempted from 19 office: public inspection pursuant to RCW 42.17.310. All personal property in 20 this state subject to taxation shall be listed and assessed every year, 21 22 with reference to its value and ownership on the first day of January 23 of the year in which it is assessed: PROVIDED, That if the stock of 24 goods, wares, merchandise or material, whether in a raw or finished state or in process of manufacture, owned or held by any taxpayer on 25 January 1 of any year does not fairly represent the average stock 26 27 carried by such taxpayer, such stock shall be listed and assessed upon 28 the basis of the monthly average of stock owned or held by such 29 taxpayer during the preceding calendar year or during such portion 30 thereof as the taxpayer was engaged in business.

31 **Sec. 104.** RCW 84.40.030 and 1994 c 124 s 20 are each amended to 32 read as follows:

All <u>personal</u> property shall be valued at one hundred percent of its true and fair value in money and assessed on the same basis unless specifically provided otherwise by law.

All real property shall be appraised at one hundred percent of its
 true and fair value in money and assessed as provided in section 105 of
 this act unless specifically provided otherwise by law.

Taxable leasehold estates shall be valued at such price as they would bring at a fair, voluntary sale for cash without any deductions for any indebtedness owed including rentals to be paid.

7 The true and fair value of real property for taxation purposes 8 (including property upon which there is a coal or other mine, or stone 9 or other quarry) shall be based upon the following criteria:

10 (1) Any sales of the property being appraised or similar properties with respect to sales made within the past five years. 11 The appraisal shall be consistent with the comprehensive land use plan, development 12 13 requlations under chapter 36.70A RCW, zoning, and any other governmental policies or practices in effect at the time of appraisal 14 15 that affect the use of property, as well as physical and environmental 16 The appraisal shall also take into account: (a) In the influences. 17 use of sales by real estate contract as similar sales, the extent, if any, to which the stated selling price has been increased by reason of 18 19 the down payment, interest rate, or other financing terms; and (b) the 20 extent to which the sale of a similar property actually represents the general effective market demand for property of such type, in the 21 geographical area in which such property is located. Sales involving 22 23 deed releases or similar seller-developer financing arrangements shall 24 not be used as sales of similar property.

25 (2) In addition to sales as defined in subsection (1) of this 26 section, consideration may be given to cost, cost less depreciation, 27 reconstruction cost less depreciation, or capitalization of income that would be derived from prudent use of the property. In the case of 28 property of a complex nature, or being used under terms of a franchise 29 30 from a public agency, or operating as a public utility, or property not having a record of sale within five years and not having a significant 31 number of sales of similar property in the general area, the provisions 32 33 of this subsection (2) shall be the dominant factors in valuation. 34 When provisions of this subsection (2) are relied upon for establishing 35 values the property owner shall be advised upon request of the factors used in arriving at such value. 36

(3) In valuing any tract or parcel of real property, the <u>true and</u>
<u>fair</u> value of the land, exclusive of structures thereon shall be
determined; also the <u>true and fair</u> value of structures thereon, but the

1 <u>appraised</u> valuation shall not exceed the <u>true and fair</u> value of the 2 total property as it exists. In valuing agricultural land, growing 3 crops shall be excluded.

4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 105.** A new section is added to chapter 84.40 5 RCW to read as follows:

(1) As used in this section:

7 (a) "Previous assessed value" means the assessed value for the year
8 immediately preceding the year for which a calculation is being made
9 under this section.

10 (b) "Current appraised value" means the appraised value for the 11 year for which a calculation is being made under this section.

(c) "Total value increase" means the current appraised value minus
the previous assessed value. Total value increase can never be less
than zero.

(d) "Improvement increase" means the portion of the total value increase attributable to any physical improvements made to the property since the previous assessment, other than improvements exempt under RCW 84.36.400 for the year for which a calculation is being made under this section. Improvement increase can never be less than zero.

20 (e) "Market increase" means the total value increase minus the 21 improvement increase. Market increase can never be less than zero.

(2) The assessed value of property is equal to the lesser of the
current appraised value or a limited value determined under this
section. The limited value is equal to the greater of:

(a) The improvement increase plus one hundred fifteen percent ofthe previous assessed value; or

27 (b) The sum of:

28 (i) The previous assessed value;

29 (ii) The improvement increase; and

30 (iii) Twenty-five percent of the market increase.

(3) Upon loss of preferential tax treatment for property that qualifies for preferential tax treatment under chapter 84.14, 84.26, 84.33, 84.34, or 84.36 RCW, the previous assessed value shall be the assessed value the property would have had without the preferential tax treatment.

36 **Sec. 106.** RCW 84.40.040 and 1988 c 222 s 15 are each amended to 37 read as follows:

The assessor shall begin the preliminary work for each assessment not later than the first day of December of each year in all counties in the state. The assessor shall also complete the duties of listing and placing valuations on all property by May 31st of each year, except that the listing and valuation of construction <u>and mobile homes</u> under RCW ((36.21.040 through)) 36.21.080 <u>and 36.21.090</u> shall be completed by August 31st of each year, and in the following manner, to wit:

8 The assessor shall actually determine as nearly as practicable the 9 true and fair value of each tract or lot of land listed for taxation 10 and of each improvement located thereon and shall enter as the appraised value one hundred percent of the true and fair value of such 11 land and of the total true and fair value of such improvements, 12 13 together with the total of such one hundred percent valuations, opposite each description of property on the assessment list and tax 14 15 roll.

16 The assessor shall determine the assessed value, under section 105 17 of this act, for each tract or lot of land listed for taxation, 18 including improvements located thereon, and shall also enter this value 19 opposite each description of property on the assessment list and tax 20 roll.

The assessor shall make an alphabetical list of the names of all 21 persons in the county liable to assessment of personal property, and 22 require each person to make a correct list and statement of such 23 24 property according to the standard form prescribed by the department of 25 revenue, which statement and list shall include, if required by the 26 form, the year of acquisition and total original cost of personal 27 property in each category of the prescribed form, and shall be signed and verified under penalty of perjury by the person listing the 28 29 property: PROVIDED, That the assessor may list and value improvements 30 on publicly owned land in the same manner as real property is listed 31 and valued, including conformance with the revaluation program required under chapter 84.41 RCW. Such list and statement shall be filed on or 32 before the last day of April. The assessor shall on or before the 1st 33 day of January of each year mail a notice to all such persons at their 34 35 last known address that such statement and list is required, such notice to be accompanied by the form on which the statement or list is 36 37 to be made: PROVIDED, That the notice mailed by the assessor to each taxpayer each year shall, if practicable, include the statement and 38 39 list of personal property of the taxpayer for the preceding year. Upon

receipt of such statement and list the assessor shall thereupon 1 determine the true and fair value of the property included in such 2 statement and enter one hundred percent of the same on the assessment 3 4 roll opposite the name of the party assessed; and in making such entry in the assessment list, the assessor shall give the name and post 5 office address of the party listing the property, and if the party 6 resides in a city the assessor shall give the street and number or 7 8 other brief description of the party's residence or place of business. 9 The assessor may, after giving written notice of the action to the 10 person to be assessed, add to the assessment list any taxable property which should be included in such list. 11

12 Sec. 107. RCW 84.40.045 and 1994 c 301 s 36 are each amended to 13 read as follows:

The assessor shall give notice of any change in the ((true and fair)) assessed value of real property for the tract or lot of land and any improvements thereon no later than thirty days after appraisal: PROVIDED, That no such notice shall be mailed during the period from January 15 to February 15 of each year: PROVIDED FURTHER, That no notice need be sent with respect to changes in valuation of forest land made pursuant to chapter 84.33 RCW.

The notice shall contain a statement of both the prior and the new ((true and fair)) appraised and assessed values ((and the ratio of the assessed value to the true and fair value on which the assessment of the property is based)), stating separately land and improvement appraised values, and a brief statement of the procedure for appeal to the board of equalization and the time, date, and place of the meetings of the board.

28 The notice shall be mailed by the assessor to the taxpayer.

29 If any taxpayer, as shown by the tax rolls, holds solely a security 30 interest in the real property which is the subject of the notice, pursuant to a mortgage, contract of sale, or deed of trust, such 31 32 taxpayer shall, upon written request of the assessor, supply, within thirty days of receipt of such request, to the assessor the name and 33 34 address of the person making payments pursuant to the mortgage, contract of sale, or deed of trust, and thereafter such person shall 35 36 also receive a copy of the notice provided for in this section. Willful failure to comply with such request within the time limitation 37 provided for herein shall make such taxpayer subject to a maximum civil 38

р. б

1 penalty of five thousand dollars. The penalties provided for herein 2 shall be recoverable in an action by the county prosecutor, and when 3 recovered shall be deposited in the county current expense fund. The 4 assessor shall make the request provided for by this section during the 5 month of January.

6 **Sec. 108.** RCW 84.41.041 and 1987 c 319 s 4 are each amended to 7 read as follows:

8 Each county assessor shall cause taxable real property to be 9 physically inspected and valued at least once every six years in accordance with RCW 84.41.030, and in accordance with a plan filed with 10 and approved by the department of revenue. Such revaluation plan shall 11 12 provide that a reasonable portion of all taxable real property within a county shall be revalued and these newly-determined values placed on 13 14 the assessment rolls each year. The department may approve a plan that provides that all property in the county be revalued every two years. 15 If the revaluation plan provides for physical inspection at least once 16 each four years, during the intervals between each physical inspection 17 18 of real property, the <u>appraised</u> valuation of such property may be 19 adjusted to its current true and fair value, such adjustments to be based upon appropriate statistical data. If the revaluation plan 20 21 provides for physical inspection less frequently than once each four 22 years, during the intervals between each physical inspection of real property, the <u>appraised</u> valuation of such property shall be adjusted to 23 24 its current true and fair value, such adjustments to be made once each 25 year and to be based upon appropriate statistical data. If the appraised valuation is changed, the assessed value shall be 26 recalculated under section 105 of this act. 27

The assessor may require property owners to submit pertinent data respecting taxable property in their control including data respecting any sale or purchase of said property within the past five years, the cost and characteristics of any improvement on the property and other facts necessary for appraisal of the property.

33 **Sec. 109.** RCW 84.48.010 and 1988 c 222 s 20 are each amended to 34 read as follows:

Prior to July 15th, the county legislative authority shall form a board for the equalization of the assessment of the property of the county. The members of said board shall receive a per diem amount as

set by the county legislative authority for each day of actual 1 2 attendance of the meeting of the board of equalization to be paid out of the current expense fund of the county: PROVIDED, That when the 3 4 county legislative authority constitute the board they shall only receive their compensation as members of the county legislative 5 The board of equalization shall meet in open session for 6 authority. 7 this purpose annually on the 15th day of July and, having each taken an oath fairly and impartially to perform their duties as members of such 8 board, they shall examine and compare the returns of the assessment of 9 10 the property of the county and proceed to equalize the same, so that 11 the appraised value of each tract or lot of real property and each article or class of personal property shall be entered on the 12 assessment list at its true and fair value, according to the measure of 13 value used by the county assessor in such assessment year, ((which is 14 15 presumed to be correct pursuant to RCW 84.40.0301)) and so that the 16 assessed value of each tract or lot of real property is entered on the assessment list at its correct amount, and subject to the following 17 rules: 18

First. They shall raise the <u>appraised</u> valuation of each tract or lot or item of real property which is returned below its true and fair value to such price or sum as to be the true and fair value thereof, <u>and raise the assessed valuation of each tract or lot or item of real</u> <u>property which is returned below its correct amount to the correct</u> <u>amount after at least five days' notice shall have been given in</u> writing to the owner or agent.

Second. They shall reduce the <u>appraised</u> valuation of each tract or lot or item which is returned above its true and fair value to such price or sum as to be the true and fair value thereof <u>and reduce the</u> <u>assessed valuation of each tract or lot or item of real property which</u> is returned above its correct amount to the correct amount.

They shall raise the valuation of each class of personal 31 Third. property which is returned below its true and fair value to such price 32 or sum as to be the true and fair value thereof, and they shall raise 33 34 the aggregate value of the personal property of each individual 35 whenever the aggregate value is less than the true valuation of the taxable personal property possessed by such individual, to such sum or 36 37 amount as to be the true value thereof, after at least five days' notice shall have been given in writing to the owner or agent thereof. 38

Fourth. They shall reduce the valuation of each class of personal property enumerated on the detail and assessment list of the current year, which is returned above its true and fair value, to such price or sum as to be the true and fair value thereof; and they shall reduce the aggregate valuation of the personal property of such individual who has been assessed at too large a sum to such sum or amount as was the true and fair value of the personal property.

8 Fifth. The board may review all claims for either real or personal 9 property tax exemption as determined by the county assessor, and shall 10 consider any taxpayer appeals from the decision of the assessor thereon 11 to determine (1) if the taxpayer is entitled to an exemption, and (2) 12 if so, the amount thereof.

13 The clerk of the board shall keep an accurate journal or record of the proceedings and orders of said board showing the facts and evidence 14 15 upon which their action is based, and the said record shall be 16 published the same as other proceedings of county legislative authority, and shall make a true record of the changes of the 17 descriptions and ((assessed)) appraised values ordered by the county 18 19 board of equalization. The assessor shall recalculate assessed values 20 and correct the real and personal assessment rolls in accordance with the changes made by the said county board of equalization, and the 21 assessor shall make duplicate abstracts of such corrected values, one 22 copy of which shall be retained in the office, and one copy forwarded 23 24 to the department of revenue on or before the eighteenth day of August 25 next following the meeting of the county board of equalization.

The county board of equalization shall meet on the 15th day of July and may continue in session and adjourn from time to time during a period not to exceed four weeks, but shall remain in session not less than three days: PROVIDED, That the county board of equalization with the approval of the county legislative authority may convene at any time when petitions filed exceed twenty-five, or ten percent of the number of appeals filed in the preceding year, whichever is greater.

33 No taxes, except special taxes, shall be extended upon the tax 34 rolls until the property valuations are equalized by the department of 35 revenue for the purpose of raising the state revenue.

County legislative authorities as such shall at no time have any authority to change the valuation of the property of any person or to release or commute in whole or in part the taxes due on the property of any person.

1 **Sec. 110.** RCW 84.48.065 and 1996 c 296 s 1 are each amended to 2 read as follows:

3 (1) The county assessor or treasurer may cancel or correct 4 assessments on the assessment or tax rolls which are erroneous due to manifest errors in description, double assessments, clerical errors in 5 extending the rolls, clerical errors in calculating the assessed value 6 7 under section 105 of this act, and such manifest errors in the listing 8 of the property which do not involve a revaluation of property, except 9 in the case that a taxpayer produces proof that an authorized land use 10 authority has made a definitive change in the property's land use designation. In such a case, correction of the assessment or tax rolls 11 may be made notwithstanding the fact that the action involves a 12 13 revaluation of property. Manifest errors that do not involve a revaluation of property include the assessment of property exempted by 14 law from taxation or the failure to deduct the exemption allowed by law 15 16 to the head of a family. When the county assessor cancels or corrects 17 an assessment, the assessor shall send a notice to the taxpayer in accordance with RCW 84.40.045, advising the taxpayer that the action 18 19 has been taken and notifying the taxpayer of the right to appeal the 20 cancellation or correction to the county board of equalization, in accordance with RCW 84.40.038. When the county assessor or treasurer 21 cancels or corrects an assessment, a record of such action shall be 22 prepared, setting forth therein the facts relating to the error. 23 The 24 record shall also set forth by legal description all property belonging 25 exclusively to the state, any county, or any municipal corporation 26 whose property is exempt from taxation, upon which there remains, according to the tax roll, any unpaid taxes. 27 No manifest error cancellation or correction, including a cancellation or correction made 28 due to a definitive change of land use designation, shall be made for 29 30 any period more than three years preceding the year in which the error is discovered. 31

(2)(a) In the case of a definitive change of land use designation,
 an assessor shall make corrections that involve a revaluation of
 property to the assessment roll when:

(i) The assessor and taxpayer have signed an agreement as to the true and fair value of the taxpayer's property setting forth in the agreement the valuation information upon which the agreement is based; and

1 (ii) The assessment roll has previously been certified in 2 accordance with RCW 84.40.320.

3 (b) In all other cases, an assessor shall make corrections that 4 involve a revaluation of property to the assessment roll when:

5 (i) The assessor and taxpayer have signed an agreement as to the 6 true and fair value of the taxpayer's property setting forth in the 7 agreement the valuation information upon which the agreement is based; 8 and

9 (ii) The following conditions are met:

(A) The assessment roll has previously been certified in accordancewith RCW 84.40.320;

(B) The taxpayer has timely filed a petition with the county board
of equalization pursuant to RCW 84.40.038 for the current assessment
year;

(C) The county board of equalization has not yet held a hearing onthe merits of the taxpayer's petition.

17 (3) The assessor shall issue a supplementary roll or rolls 18 including such cancellations and corrections, and the assessment and 19 levy shall have the same force and effect as if made in the first 20 instance, and the county treasurer shall proceed to collect the taxes 21 due on the rolls as modified.

22 **Sec. 111.** RCW 84.48.075 and 1988 c 222 s 23 are each amended to 23 read as follows:

24 (1) The department of revenue shall annually, prior to the first 25 Monday in September, determine and submit to each assessor a preliminary indicated ratio for each county: PROVIDED, That the 26 department shall establish rules and regulations pertinent to the 27 determination of the indicated ratio, the indicated real property ratio 28 29 and the indicated personal property ratio: PROVIDED FURTHER, That 30 these rules and regulations may provide that data, as is necessary for said determination, which is available from the county assessor of any 31 county and which has been audited as to its validity by the department, 32 shall be utilized by the department in determining the indicated ratio. 33 34 (2) To such extent as is reasonable, the department may define use classes of property for the purposes of determination of the indicated 35

36 ratio. Such use classes may be defined with respect to property use 37 and may include agricultural, open space, timber and forest lands.

(3) The department shall review each county's preliminary ratio 1 2 with the assessor, a landowner, or an owner of an intercounty public utility or private car company of that county, if requested by the 3 4 assessor, a landowner, or an owner of an intercounty public utility or 5 private car company of that county, respectively, between the first and third Mondays of September. Prior to equalization of assessments 6 7 pursuant to RCW 84.48.080 and after the third Monday of September, the 8 department shall certify to each county assessor the real and personal 9 property ratio for that county.

10 (4) The department of revenue shall also examine procedures used by 11 the assessor to assess real and personal property in the county, including calculations, use of prescribed value schedules, and efforts 12 13 to locate all taxable property in the county. If any examination by the department discloses other than market value is being listed as 14 15 appraised value on the county assessment rolls of the county by the 16 assessor and, after due notification by the department, is not 17 corrected, the department of revenue shall, in accordance with rules adopted by the department, adjust the ratio of that type of property, 18 19 which adjustment shall be used for determining the county's indicated 20 ratio.

21 **Sec. 112.** RCW 84.48.080 and 1995 2nd sp.s. c 13 s 3 are each 22 amended to read as follows:

23 (1) Annually during the months of September and October, the 24 department of revenue shall examine and compare the returns of the 25 assessment of the property in the several counties of the state, and the assessment of the property of railroad and other companies assessed 26 by the department, and proceed to equalize the same, so that each 27 county in the state shall pay its due and just proportion of the taxes 28 29 for state purposes for such assessment year, according to the ratio the assessed valuation of the property in each county bears to the correct 30 total <u>assessed</u> valuation of all property in the state. 31

First. The department shall classify all property, real and personal, and shall raise and lower the <u>assessed</u> valuation of any class of property in any county to a value that shall be equal, so far as possible, to the ((true and fair)) <u>correct assessed</u> value of such class as of January 1st of the current year, <u>after determining the correct</u> <u>appraised value</u>, <u>and any adjustment applicable under section 105 of</u> <u>this act for the property</u>, for the purpose of ascertaining the just

amount of tax due from each county for state purposes. In equalizing 1 2 personal property as of January 1st of the current year, the department shall use the assessment level of the preceding year. 3 Such 4 classification may be on the basis of types of property, geographical 5 areas, or both. For purposes of this section, for each county that has not provided the department with an assessment return by December 1st, 6 7 the department shall proceed, using facts and information and in a 8 manner it deems appropriate, to estimate the value of each class of 9 property in the county.

10 Second. The department shall keep a full record of its proceedings 11 and the same shall be published annually by the department.

(2) The department shall levy the state taxes authorized by law. 12 13 The amount levied in any one year for general state purposes shall not 14 exceed the lawful dollar rate on the dollar of the assessed value of 15 the property of the entire state((, which assessed value shall be one 16 hundred percent of the true and fair value of such property in money)) 17 as equalized under this section. The department shall apportion the amount of tax for state purposes levied by the department, among the 18 19 several counties, in proportion to the assessed valuation of the 20 taxable property of the county for the year as equalized by the PROVIDED, That for purposes of this apportionment, the 21 department: 22 shall recompute the previous year's levy department and the apportionment thereof to correct for changes and errors in taxable 23 24 values reported to the department after October 1 of the preceding year 25 and shall adjust the apportioned amount of the current year's state 26 levy for each county by the difference between the apportioned amounts established by the original and revised levy computations for the 27 previous year. For purposes of this section, changes in taxable values 28 29 mean a final adjustment made by a county board of equalization, the 30 state board of tax appeals, or a court of competent jurisdiction and 31 shall include additions of omitted property, other additions or deletions from the assessment or tax rolls, any assessment return 32 33 provided by a county to the department subsequent to December 1st, or 34 a change in the indicated ratio of a county. Errors in taxable values 35 mean errors corrected by a final reviewing body.

In addition to computing a levy under this subsection that is reduced under RCW 84.55.012, the department shall compute a hypothetical levy without regard to the reduction under RCW 84.55.012. This hypothetical levy shall also be apportioned among the several

1 counties in proportion to the valuation of the taxable property of the 2 county for the year, as equalized by the department, in the same manner 3 as the actual levy and shall be used by the county assessors for the 4 purpose of recomputing and establishing a consolidated levy under RCW 5 84.52.010.

6 (3) The department shall have authority to adopt rules and 7 regulations to enforce obedience to its orders in all matters in 8 relation to the returns of county assessments, the equalization of 9 values, and the apportionment of the state levy by the department.

26 **Sec. 205.** RCW 35.61.210 and 1990 c 234 s 3 are each amended to 27 read as follows:

28 The board of park commissioners may levy or cause to be levied a 29 general tax on all the property located in said park district each year not to exceed fifty cents per thousand dollars of assessed value of the 30 property in such park district. In addition, the board of park 31 32 commissioners may levy or cause to be levied a general tax on all 33 property located in said park district each year not to exceed twentyfive cents per thousand dollars of assessed valuation. Although park 34 35 districts are authorized to impose two separate regular property tax levies, the levies shall be considered to be a single levy for purposes 36

1 of the ((one hundred six percent)) limitation provided for in chapter

The board is hereby authorized to levy a general tax in excess of 3 4 its regular property tax levy or levies when authorized so to do at a 5 special election conducted in accordance with and subject to all the requirements of the Constitution and laws of the state now in force or 6 7 hereafter enacted governing the limitation of tax levies. The board is 8 hereby authorized to call a special election for the purpose of 9 submitting to the qualified voters of the park district a proposition 10 to levy a tax in excess of the seventy-five cents per thousand dollars of assessed value herein specifically authorized. 11 The manner of submitting any such proposition, of certifying the same, and of giving 12 13 or publishing notice thereof, shall be as provided by law for the submission of propositions by cities or towns. 14

15 The board shall include in its general tax levy for each year a 16 sufficient sum to pay the interest on all outstanding bonds and may 17 include a sufficient amount to create a sinking fund for the redemption of all outstanding bonds. All public hospital districts organized under the provisions of this chapter shall have power:

(1) To make a survey of existing hospital and other health carefacilities within and without such district.

29 (2) To construct, condemn and purchase, purchase, acquire, lease, 30 add to, maintain, operate, develop and regulate, sell and convey all lands, property, property rights, equipment, hospital and other health 31 care facilities and systems for the maintenance of hospitals, 32 buildings, structures, and any and all other facilities, and to 33 34 exercise the right of eminent domain to effectuate the foregoing purposes or for the acquisition and damaging of the same or property of 35 36 any kind appurtenant thereto, and such right of eminent domain shall be exercised and instituted pursuant to a resolution of the commission and 37 conducted in the same manner and by the same procedure as in or may be 38

1 provided by law for the exercise of the power of eminent domain by 2 incorporated cities and towns of the state of Washington in the 3 acquisition of property rights: PROVIDED, That no public hospital 4 district shall have the right of eminent domain and the power of 5 condemnation against any health care facility.

б (3) To lease existing hospital and other health care facilities and 7 equipment and/or other property used in connection therewith, including 8 ambulances, and to pay such rental therefor as the commissioners shall 9 deem proper; to provide hospital and other health care services for 10 residents of said district by facilities located outside the boundaries of said district, by contract or in any other manner said commissioners 11 may deem expedient or necessary under the existing conditions; and said 12 13 hospital district shall have the power to contract with other communities, corporations, or individuals for the services provided by 14 15 said hospital district; and they may further receive in said hospitals 16 and other health care facilities and furnish proper and adequate 17 services to all persons not residents of said district at such reasonable and fair compensation as may be considered proper: 18 19 PROVIDED, That it must at all times make adequate provision for the needs of the district and residents of said district shall have prior 20 rights to the available hospital and other health care facilities of 21 said district, at rates set by the district commissioners. 22

23 (4) For the purpose aforesaid, it shall be lawful for any district 24 so organized to take, condemn and purchase, lease, or acquire, any and 25 all property, and property rights, including state and county lands, 26 for any of the purposes aforesaid, and any and all other facilities necessary or convenient, and in connection with the construction, 27 maintenance, and operation of any such hospitals and other health care 28 facilities, subject, however, to the applicable limitations provided in 29 30 subsection (2) of this section.

31 (5) To contract indebtedness or borrow money for corporate purposes on the credit of the corporation or the revenues of the hospitals 32 thereof, and the revenues of any other facilities or services that the 33 34 district is or hereafter may be authorized by law to provide, and to 35 issue and sell: (a) Revenue bonds, revenue warrants, or other revenue obligations therefor payable solely out of a special fund or funds into 36 37 which the district may pledge such amount of the revenues of the hospitals thereof, and the revenues of any other facilities or services 38 39 that the district is or hereafter may be authorized by law to provide,

to pay the same as the commissioners of the district may determine, 1 such revenue bonds, warrants, or other obligations to be issued and 2 sold in the same manner and subject to the same provisions as provided 3 4 for the issuance of revenue bonds, warrants, or other obligations by 5 cities or towns under the Municipal Revenue Bond Act, chapter 35.41 RCW, as may hereafter be amended; (b) general obligation bonds therefor 6 7 in the manner and form as provided in RCW 70.44.110 and 70.44.130, as 8 may hereafter be amended; or (c) interest-bearing warrants to be drawn 9 on a fund pending deposit in such fund of money sufficient to redeem 10 such warrants and to be issued and paid in such manner and upon such terms and conditions as the board of commissioners may deem to be in 11 the best interest of the district; and to assign or sell hospital 12 accounts receivable, and accounts receivable for the use of other 13 facilities or services that the district is or hereafter may be 14 15 authorized by law to provide, for collection with or without recourse. 16 General obligation bonds shall be issued and sold in accordance with 17 chapter 39.46 RCW. Revenue bonds, revenue warrants, or other revenue obligations may be issued and sold in accordance with chapter 39.46 18 19 RCW.

20 (6) To raise revenue by the levy of an annual tax on all taxable property within such public hospital district not to exceed fifty cents 21 per thousand dollars of assessed value, and an additional annual tax on 22 23 all taxable property within such public hospital district not to exceed 24 twenty-five cents per thousand dollars of assessed value, or such 25 further amount as has been or shall be authorized by a vote of the 26 people. Although public hospital districts are authorized to impose two separate regular property tax levies, the levies shall be 27 considered to be a single levy for purposes of the ((one hundred six 28 29 percent)) limitation provided for in chapter 84.55 RCW. Public 30 hospital districts are authorized to levy such a general tax in excess of their regular property taxes when authorized so to do at a special 31 election conducted in accordance with and subject to all of the 32 requirements of the Constitution and the laws of the state of 33 34 Washington now in force or hereafter enacted governing the limitation of tax levies. The said board of district commissioners is authorized 35 and empowered to call a special election for the purpose of submitting 36 37 to the qualified voters of the hospital district a proposition or propositions to levy taxes in excess of its regular property taxes. 38 39 The superintendent shall prepare a proposed budget of the contemplated

financial transactions for the ensuing year and file the same in the 1 records of the commission on or before the first Monday in September. 2 Notice of the filing of said proposed budget and the date and place of 3 4 hearing on the same shall be published for at least two consecutive 5 weeks in a newspaper printed and of general circulation in said county. On the first Monday in October the commission shall hold a public 6 hearing on said proposed budget at which any taxpayer may appear and be 7 8 heard against the whole or any part of the proposed budget. Upon the 9 conclusion of said hearing, the commission shall, by resolution, adopt 10 the budget as finally determined and fix the final amount of expenditures for the ensuing year. Taxes levied by the commission 11 shall be certified to and collected by the proper county officer of the 12 county in which such public hospital district is located in the same 13 manner as is or may be provided by law for the certification and 14 15 collection of port district taxes. The commission is authorized, prior 16 to the receipt of taxes raised by levy, to borrow money or issue 17 warrants of the district in anticipation of the revenue to be derived by such district from the levy of taxes for the purpose of such 18 19 district, and such warrants shall be redeemed from the first money 20 available from such taxes when collected, and such warrants shall not exceed the anticipated revenues of one year, and shall bear interest at 21 a rate or rates as authorized by the commission. 22

(7) To enter into any contract with the United States government or any state, municipality, or other hospital district, or any department of those governing bodies, for carrying out any of the powers authorized by this chapter.

(8) To sue and be sued in any court of competent jurisdiction: 27 PROVIDED, That all suits against the public hospital district shall be 28 brought in the county in which the public hospital district is located. 29 30 (9) To pay actual necessary travel expenses and living expenses 31 incurred while in travel status for (a) qualified physicians who are candidates for medical staff positions, and (b) other qualified persons 32 33 who are candidates for superintendent or other managerial and technical positions, when the district finds that hospitals or other health care 34 35 facilities owned and operated by it are not adequately staffed and determines that personal interviews with said candidates to be held in 36 37 the district are necessary or desirable for the adequate staffing of said facilities. 38

1 (10) To make contracts, employ superintendents, attorneys, and 2 other technical or professional assistants and all other employees; to 3 make contracts with private or public institutions for employee 4 retirement programs; to print and publish information or literature; 5 and to do all other things necessary to carry out the provisions of 6 this chapter.

7 **Sec. 207.** RCW 84.08.115 and 1991 c 218 s 2 are each amended to 8 read as follows:

9 (1) The department shall prepare a clear and succinct explanation 10 of the property tax system, including but not limited to:

11 (a) The standard of true and fair value as the basis of the 12 property tax.

13 (b) How the assessed value for particular parcels is determined.

14 (c) The procedures and timing of the assessment process.

(d) How district levy rates are determined, including the ((one hundred six percent)) limit under chapter 84.55 RCW.

17 (e) How the composite tax rate is determined.

18 (f) How the amount of tax is calculated.

19 (g) How a taxpayer may appeal an assessment, and what issues are 20 appropriate as a basis of appeal.

(h) A summary of tax exemption and relief programs, along with theeligibility standards and application processes.

(2) Each county assessor shall provide copies of the explanation to
 taxpayers on request, free of charge. Each revaluation notice shall
 include information regarding the availability of the explanation.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 208. It is the intent of sections 201 through 27 207 of this act to lower the one hundred six percent limit while still 28 allowing taxing districts to raise revenues in excess of the limit if 29 approved by a majority of the voters as provided in RCW 84.55.050.

30 **Sec. 209.** RCW 84.55.120 and 1995 c 251 s 1 are each amended to 31 read as follows:

A taxing district, other than the state, that collects regular levies shall hold a public hearing on revenue sources for the district's following year's current expense budget. The hearing must include consideration of possible increases in property tax revenues and shall be held prior to the time the taxing district levies the

taxes or makes the request to have the taxes levied. The county 1 legislative authority, or the taxing district's governing body if the 2 district is a city, town, or other type of district, shall hold the 3 4 hearing. For purposes of this section, "current expense budget" means 5 that budget which is primarily funded by taxes and charges and reflects the provision of ongoing services. It does not mean the capital, 6 7 enterprise, or special assessment budgets of cities, towns, counties, 8 or special purpose districts.

9 If the taxing district is otherwise required to hold a public 10 hearing on its proposed regular tax levy, a single public hearing may 11 be held on this matter.

<u>No increase in property tax revenue, other than that resulting from</u> 12 13 the addition of new construction and improvements to property and any 14 increase in the value of state-assessed property, may be authorized by a taxing district, other than the state, except by adoption of a 15 separate ordinance or resolution, pursuant to notice, specifically 16 authorizing the increase in terms of both dollars and percentage. The 17 ordinance or resolution may cover a period of up to two years, but the 18 19 ordinance shall specifically state for each year the dollar increase and percentage change in the levy from the previous year. 20

23 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 301. (1) Sections 101 through 126 of this act 24 apply to taxes levied for collection in 1999 and thereafter.

(2) Sections 201 through 207 of this act apply to taxes levied forcollection in 1998 and thereafter.

27 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 302. If any provision of this act or its 28 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the 29 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other 30 persons or circumstances is not affected.

31 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **sec. 303.** Part headings used in this act are not any 32 part of the law.
