5 Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the 6 following:

7 "<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. The sum of four million dollars, or as much 8 thereof as may be necessary, is appropriated from the general fund to 9 the superintendent of public instruction for the biennium ending June 10 30, 2001, for:

(1) Alternative school start-up grants which are in addition to the grants funded in the two million dollars alternative school start-up appropriation contained in section 501(2)(1), chapter 309, Laws of 14 1999, and these grants shall be awarded in the same manner and for the same purposes;

16 (2) School safety programs for prevention and intervention. School districts may apply for and administer these grants independently or 17 jointly with other school districts or educational service districts. 18 19 The funds may be expended for proven-effective programs to improve 20 safety in schools, including: Security assessments of school facilities; violence prevention and reporting training for staff as 21 appropriate to the particular duties and responsibilities of the 22 23 specific staff, including administrators; nonviolence and leadership 24 training for staff and students; and school safety plans. The 25 educational service districts and school districts may contract for any services under this subsection. 26

(3) The superintendent of public instruction shall report to the
education committees of the house of representatives and senate on the
number and types of programs administered through these grants by
February 15, 2001, and February 15th of every two years thereafter.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. For the fiscal biennium ending June 30, 2001, the sum of three million dollars, or as much thereof as may be necessary, is appropriated from the general fund--state to the superintendent of public instruction for matching grants to enhance security in schools. This appropriation is a supplement to the five

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1 million nine hundred twenty-three thousand dollar appropriation for 2 school security contained in section 501(2)(e), chapter 309, Laws of 3 1999, and shall be expended in the same manner and for the same 4 purposes.

5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. The biennial appropriations in sections 1 6 and 2 of this act shall be allotted by the office of financial 7 management evenly between fiscal year 2000 and fiscal year 2001.

5 The appropriations in this section are subject to the following conditions and limitations: 6

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(1) \$2,434,000 of the health professions account appropriation is 8 provided solely for the development and implementation of a licensing 9 and disciplinary management system. Expenditures are conditioned upon compliance with section 902 of this act. These funds shall not be 10 expended without appropriate project approval by the department of 11 12 information systems.

13 (2) The department or any successor agency is authorized to raise 14 existing fees charged to the nursing assistants, podiatrists, and 15 osteopaths; for certificate of need; for temporary worker housing; for 16 state institution inspection; for residential care facilities and for 17 transient accommodations, in excess of the fiscal growth factor established by Initiative Measure No. 601, if necessary, to meet the 18 19 actual costs of conducting business and the appropriation levels in 20 this section.

21 (3) \$339,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal 22 year 2000, \$339,000 of the general fund--state appropriation for fiscal 23 year 2001, and \$678,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation are provided solely for technical assistance to local governments and 24 25 special districts on water conservation and reuse. \$339,000 of the general fund--federal amount may be expended in each fiscal year of the 26 27 biennium, only if the state receives greater than \$25,000,000 from the federal government for salmon recovery activities in that fiscal year. 28 29 Funds authorized for expenditure in fiscal year 2000 may be expended in fiscal year 2001. 30

\$1,685,000 of the general fund--state fiscal year 31 (4) 2000 32 appropriation and \$1,686,000 of the general fund--state fiscal year 2001 appropriation are provided solely for the implementation of the 33 Puget Sound water work plan and agency action items, DOH-01, DOH-02, 34 DOH-03, and DOH-04. 35

36 (5) ((\$4,645,000 of the general fund--state fiscal year 2000 37 appropriation and \$4,645,000 of the general fund--state fiscal year 38 2001 appropriation are provided solely for distribution to local health 39 departments.

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(6))) The department of health shall not initiate any services that 1 2 will require expenditure of state general fund moneys unless expressly authorized in this act or other law. The department may seek, receive, 3 4 and spend, under RCW 43.79.260 through 43.79.282, federal moneys not 5 anticipated in this act as long as the federal funding does not require expenditure of state moneys for the program in excess of amounts 6 7 anticipated in this act. If the department receives unanticipated 8 unrestricted federal moneys, those moneys shall be spent for services 9 authorized in this act or in any other legislation that provides 10 appropriation authority, and an equal amount of appropriated state moneys shall lapse. Upon the lapsing of any moneys under this 11 subsection, the office of financial management shall notify the 12 13 legislative fiscal committees. As used in this subsection, 14 "unrestricted federal moneys" includes block grants and other funds that federal law does not require to be spent on specifically defined 15 16 projects or matched on a formula basis by state funds.

17 (((7))) (6) \$620,000 of the tobacco prevention and control account appropriation and \$209,000 of the general fund--federal appropriation 18 19 are provided solely for implementation of Engrossed Substitute Senate 20 Bill No. 5516 or, if the bill is not enacted, for the development of a sustainable, long-term, comprehensive tobacco control program. 21 The plan shall identify a specific set of outcome measures that shall be 22 23 used to track long range progress in reducing the use of tobacco. 24 Nationally accepted measures that can be used to compare progress with 25 other states shall be included. The plan shall emphasize programs that 26 have demonstrated effectiveness in achieving progress towards the specified outcome measures. Components of the plan that do not have a 27 record of success may be included, provided that the plan also includes 28 the means of evaluating those components. The plan shall also include 29 30 an inventory of existing publically funded programs that seek to prevent the use of tobacco, alcohol, or other drugs by children and 31 youth and recommendations to coordinate and consolidate these programs 32 33 in order to achieve greatest positive outcomes within total available 34 resources. A preliminary plan shall be submitted to the appropriate 35 committees of the legislature by December 1, 1999, with the final plan submitted by September 1, 2000. 36

37 (((<del>8)</del>)) <u>(7)</u> \$2,075,000 of fiscal year 2000 general fund--state 38 appropriation and \$2,075,000 of fiscal year 2001 general fund--state 39 appropriation are provided for the Washington poison center. The

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department shall require the center to develop a long range financing plan that identifies options for diversifying funding for center operations, including, but not limited to, federal grants, private sector grants and sponsorships, and multistate or regional operating agreements. The plan shall be submitted to the appropriate committees of the legislature by December 1, 2000.

7 ((<del>(9)</del>)) <u>(8)</u> \$50,000 of fiscal year 2000 general fund--state 8 appropriation and \$50,000 of fiscal year 2001 general fund--state 9 appropriation are provided solely for fund raising and other activities 10 for the development of early hearing loss clinics. The development 11 plan for these clinics shall not assume ongoing general fund--state 12 appropriations.

13 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 5. This act is necessary for the immediate 14 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the 15 state government and its existing public institutions, and takes effect 16 July 1, 1999."
