(g) For each nonhigh school district having an enrollment of more than seventy annual average full-time equivalent students and less than one hundred eighty students, operating a grades K-8 program or a grades 1-8 program, an additional one-half of a certificated instructional staff unit; and

(h) For each nonhigh school district having an enrollment of more
 than fifty annual average full-time equivalent students and less than
 one hundred eighty students, operating a grades K-6 program or a grades
 1-6 program, an additional one-half of a certificated instructional
 staff unit.

Moneys in the account may also be 20 used for administrative activities required to respond to new and 21 unforeseen conditions that impact the uniform medical plan, but only 22 when the authority and the office of financial management jointly agree 23 that such activities must be initiated prior to the next legislative 24 session.

25 (2) Receipts from amounts due from or on behalf of uniform medical 26 plan enrollees for expenditures related to benefits administration, including moneys disbursed from the public employees' and retirees' 27 28 insurance account, shall be deposited into the account. (3) The uniform dental plan benefits administration account is 1 created in the custody of the state treasurer. Moneys in the account 2 shall be used exclusively for contracted expenditures related to 3 4 benefits administration for the uniform dental plan as established under RCW 41.05.140. Receipts from amounts due from or on behalf of 5 uniform dental plan enrollees for expenditures related to benefits 6 7 administration, including moneys disbursed from the public employees' 8 and retirees' insurance account, shall be deposited into the account. 9 The account is subject to allotment procedures under chapter 43.88 RCW, 10 but no appropriation is required for expenditures.

(x) A public participation program, including regional citizen
 advisory committees;
