# HOUSE BILL ANALYSIS SSJR 8200

**Brief Description:** Requiring superior court judges to be admitted to the practice of law for a minimum of five years.

**Sponsors:** Senate Committee on Judiciary (originally sponsored by Senators McCaslin and Roach).

# **Brief Summary of Bill**

 Requires at least five years' membership in the state bar before a person is eligible to become a superior court judge.

# **Background:**

The state constitution provides that in order to be eligible to be a judge of the supreme court or the superior court, a person must have been admitted to the practice of law. There is no requirement that the person have any particular amount of experience as a lawyer before he or she may become a judge.

#### **Summary of Bill:**

The constitution is amended to require that a person must have been admitted to the practice of law for at least five years before he or she is eligible to become a superior court judge.

**Fiscal Note:** Not requested.

Effective Date: Upon voter approval at the next general election.
