As a management tool to reduce costs and 4 make more effective use of resources, while improving employee 5 productivity and morale, agencies shall offer voluntary separation and/or downshifting incentives and options according to procedures and б 7 guidelines established by the department of personnel and the 8 department of retirement systems, in consultation with the office of 9 financial management. The options may include, but are not limited to, 10 financial incentives for: Voluntary resignation and retirement, voluntary leave-without-pay, voluntary workweek or work hour reduction, 11 12 voluntary downward movement, and temporary separation for development 13 purposes.

Agency plans and offers shall be reviewed and monitored jointly by the department of personnel, office of financial management, and the department of retirement systems.

17 NEW SECTION. sec. 502. It is the intent of the legislature that 18 agencies may implement a voluntary retirement incentive program that is 19 cost neutral or results in cost savings provided that such program is 20 approved by the director of financial management. Agencies 21 participating in this authorization are required to submit a report by 22 June 30, 2001, to the legislature and the office of financial 23 management on the outcome of their approved retirement incentive program. The report should include information on the details of the 24 25 including resulting service delivery changes, program agency 26 efficiencies, the cost of the retirement incentive per participant, the total cost to the state and the projected or actual net dollar and 27 28 staff savings over the 1999-2001 biennium.

29 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 503. INFORMATION SYSTEMS PROJECTS. Agencies 30 shall comply with the following requirements regarding information 31 systems projects when specifically directed to do so by this act.

 "Information technology portfolio" means a strategic management

1 approach in which the relationships between agency missions and 2 information technology investments can be seen and understood, such 3 that: Technology efforts are linked to agency objectives and business 4 plans; the impact of new investments on existing infrastructure and 5 business functions are assessed and understood before implementation; 6 and agency activities are consistent with the development of an 7 integrated, nonduplicative state-wide infrastructure.

8 (2) Agencies shall use their information technology portfolios in 9 making decisions on matters related to the following:

(a) System refurbishment, acquisitions, and development efforts;

(b) Setting goals and objectives for using information technologyin meeting legislatively-mandated missions and business needs;

13 (c) Assessment of overall information processing performance,14 resources, and capabilities;

(d) Ensuring appropriate transfer of technological expertise for the operation of any new systems developed using external resources; and

18 (e) Progress toward enabling electronic access to public 19 information.

20 (3) The agency shall produce a feasibility study for information technology projects at the direction of the information services board 21 and in accordance with published department of information services 22 policies and guidelines. At a minimum, such studies shall include a 23 24 statement of: (a) The purpose or impetus for change; (b) the business 25 value to the agency, including an examination and evaluation of 26 benefits, advantages, and cost; (c) a comprehensive risk assessment based on the proposed project's impact on both citizens and state 27 operations, its visibility, and the consequences of doing nothing; (d) 28 29 the impact on agency and state-wide information infrastructure; and (e) 30 the impact of the proposed enhancements to an agency's information 31 technology capabilities on meeting service delivery demands.

(4) The agency shall produce a comprehensive management plan for 32 33 each project. The plan or plans shall address all factors critical to 34 successful completion of each project. The plan(s) shall include, but 35 is not limited to, the following elements: A description of the problem or opportunity that the information technology project is 36 37 intended to address; a statement of project objectives and assumptions; a definition and schedule of phases, tasks, and activities to be 38 39 accomplished; and the estimated cost of each phase. The planning for

1 the phased approach shall be such that the business case justification 2 for a project needs to demonstrate how the project recovers cost or 3 adds measurable value or positive cost benefit to the agency's business 4 functions within each development cycle.

5 (5) The agency shall produce quality assurance plans for information technology projects. Consistent with the direction of the 6 7 information services board and the published policies and guidelines of 8 the department of information services, the quality assurance plan 9 shall address all factors critical to successful completion of the 10 project and successful integration with the agency and state information technology infrastructure. At a minimum, quality assurance 11 12 plans shall provide time and budget benchmarks against which project 13 progress can be measured, a specification of quality assurance responsibilities, and a statement of reporting requirements. 14 The 15 quality assurance plans shall set out the functionality requirements for each phase of a project. 16

17 (6) A copy of each feasibility study, project management plan, and quality assurance plan shall be provided to the department of 18 19 information services, the office of financial management, and legislative fiscal committees. The plans and studies shall demonstrate 20 a sound business case that justifies the investment of taxpayer funds 21 22 on any new project, an assessment of the impact of the proposed system 23 on the existing information technology infrastructure, the disciplined 24 use of preventative measures to mitigate risk, and the leveraging of 25 private-sector expertise as needed. Authority to expend any funds for 26 individual information systems projects is conditioned on the approval 27 of the relevant feasibility study, project management plan, and quality assurance plan by the department of information services and the office 28 29 of financial management.

30 (7) Quality assurance status reports shall be submitted to the 31 department of information services, the office of financial management, 32 and legislative fiscal committees at intervals specified in the 33 project's quality assurance plan.

34 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 504. If any provision of this act or its 35 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the 36 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other 37 persons or circumstances is not affected.

1 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 505. This act is necessary for the immediate 2 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the 3 state government and its existing public institutions, and takes effect 4 immediately.
