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## HOUSE BILL 1528

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State of Washington 56th Legislature 1999 Regular Session

By Representatives Kenney, Carlson and Lantz; by request of Governor Locke

Read first time 01/27/1999. Referred to Committee on Higher Education.

- 1 AN ACT Relating to tuition setting authority and the use of tuition
- 2 in higher education; amending RCW 28B.15.031, 28B.15.065, 28B.15.066,
- 3 28B.15.067, 28B.15.070, 28B.15.100, 28B.20.130, 28B.30.150, 28B.35.120,
- 4 28B.40.120, and 28B.50.090; creating a new section; and repealing RCW
- 5 28B.15.110.
- 6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 7 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. It is the intent of the legislature to
- 8 establish a permanent tuition policy for the state's public higher
- 9 education system. This policy should maintain affordable tuition
- 10 levels and predictable tuition rates so students and their families can
- 11 plan and pay for access to public higher education. This policy should
- 12 also extend limited tuition setting authority to institutions of higher
- 13 education and the state board for community and technical colleges so
- 14 they can price their services to increase productivity and market
- 15 responsiveness. The legislature further intends that tuition revenue
- 16 be used by each entity to support the state goal of improving student
- 17 access to quality learning opportunities.

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1 **Sec. 2.** RCW 28B.15.031 and 1996 c 142 s 2 are each amended to read 2 as follows:

3 The term "operating fees" as used in this chapter shall include the 4 fees, other than building fees, charged all students registering at the 5 state's colleges and universities but shall not include fees for short courses, self-supporting degree credit programs and courses, marine 6 7 station work, experimental station work, correspondence or extension 8 courses, and individual instruction and student deposits or rentals, 9 disciplinary and library fines, which colleges and universities shall 10 have the right to impose, laboratory, gymnasium, health, technology and student activity fees, or fees, charges, rentals, and other income 11 12 derived from any or all revenue producing lands, buildings and facilities of the colleges or universities heretofore or hereafter 13 acquired, constructed or installed, including but not limited to income 14 15 from rooms, dormitories, dining rooms, hospitals, infirmaries, housing 16 or student activity buildings, vehicular parking facilities, land, or 17 the appurtenances thereon, or such other special fees as may be established by any college or university board of trustees or regents 18 19 from time to time. All moneys received as operating fees at any 20 institution of higher education shall be deposited in a local account containing only operating fees revenue and related interest: PROVIDED, 21 That a minimum of three and one-half percent of operating fees shall be 22 retained by the institutions((, except the technical colleges,)) for 23 24 the purposes of RCW 28B.15.820. Local operating fee accounts shall not 25 be subject to appropriation by the legislature or allotment procedures 26 under chapter 43.88 RCW.

27 **Sec. 3.** RCW 28B.15.065 and 1977 ex.s. c 322 s 6 are each amended 28 to read as follows:

It is the intent of the legislature that ((needy students not be deprived of access to higher education due to increases in educational costs or consequent increases in tuition and fees. It is the sense of the legislature that state appropriations for student financial aid be adjusted in an amount which together with funds estimated to be available in the form of basic educational opportunity grants as authorized under Section 411 of the federal Higher Education Act of 1965 as now or hereafter amended will equal twenty four percent of any change in revenue estimated to occur as a result of revisions in tuition and fee levels under the provisions of this 1977 amendatory

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act.)) students receiving state need grants are not deprived of access 1 to higher education due to increases in tuition rates. The legislature 2 3 shall retain the responsibility to allocate appropriated funds to the 4 state need grant program to support changes in the overall program eligibility levels and changes resulting from increased enrollments. 5 Beginning in academic year 2000, institutions of higher education must 6 7 dedicate a portion of net revenues received from increases in 8 undergraduate resident tuition to support state need grants to need 9 grant recipients. At a minimum, each institution of higher education 10 shall dedicate sufficient tuition revenues to need grants sufficient to maintain the ratio of total state need grant awards to students at that 11 institution of higher education to total tuition charged those students 12 13 receiving state need grants at that institution of higher education for the prior three academic years. Tuition revenues dedicated for 14 15 institutional support of state need grant recipients shall be retained by each institution of higher education for support of students 16 enrolled at that institution of higher education. 25 **Sec. 4.** RCW 28B.15.066 and 1995 1st sp.s. c 9 s 3 are each amended 26 to read as follows:

27 It is the intent of the legislature that:

In making appropriations from the state's general fund to institutions of higher education, each appropriation shall conform to the following:

- 31 (1) The appropriation shall not be reduced by the amount of 32 operating fees revenue estimated to be collected from students enrolled 33 at the state-funded enrollment level specified in the omnibus biennial 34 operating appropriations act;

- 9 (2) ((Academic year tuition for full-time students at the state's institutions of higher education for the 1997-98 academic year, other than the summer term, shall be as provided in this subsection.
- 12 (a) At the University of Washington and Washington State

- (i) For resident undergraduate students and other resident students

- (((4))) (3) For the ((1997-98 and)) 1998-99 academic year ((s)), the 18 19 University of Washington shall use at least ten percent of the revenue 20 received from the difference between a four percent increase in tuition fees and the actual increase charged to law students to assist needy 21 low and middle-income resident law students. For the ((1997-98 and)) 22 1998-99 academic year((s)), the University of Washington shall use at 23 24 least ten percent of the revenue received from the difference between 25 a four percent increase in tuition fees and the actual increase charged 26 to nonresident undergraduate students and all other nonresident 27 students not in graduate, law, or first professional programs to assist needy low and middle-income resident undergraduate students and all 28 29 other resident students not enrolled in graduate, law, or first 30 professional programs. - 3 (5) The tuition fees established under this chapter shall not apply
- 4 to high school students enrolling in participating institutions of
- 5 higher education under RCW 28A.600.300 through 28A.600.395.
- 6 **Sec. 6.** RCW 28B.15.070 and 1995 1st sp.s. c 9 s 7 are each amended 7 to read as follows:
- 8 (1) The higher education coordinating board, in consultation with
- 9 the house of representatives and senate committees responsible for
- 10 higher education, the respective fiscal committees of the house of
- 11 representatives and senate, the office of financial management, and the
- 12 state institutions of higher education, shall develop by December of
- 13 every fourth year beginning in 1989, definitions, criteria, and
- 14 procedures for determining the undergraduate and graduate educational
- 15 costs for the state universities, regional universities, and community
- 16 colleges.
- 17 (2) Every four years, the state institutions of higher education in
- 18 cooperation with the higher education coordinating board shall perform
- 19 an educational cost study pursuant to subsection (1) of this section.

- 34 **Sec. 7.** RCW 28B.15.100 and 1998 c 75 s 1 are each amended to read
- 35 as follows:
- 36 (1) The governing boards of the state universities, the regional
- 37 universities, The Evergreen State College, and the community colleges

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shall charge to and collect from each of the students registering at the particular institution for any quarter or semester such tuition fees and services and activities fees, and other fees as such board shall in its discretion determine. The total of all fees shall be rounded to the nearest whole dollar amount((: PROVIDED, That such tuition fees for other than the summer term shall be in the amounts for the respective institutions as otherwise set forth in RCW 28B.15.067)).

- (2) Part-time students shall be charged tuition and services and activities fees proportionate to full-time student rates established for residents and nonresidents: PROVIDED, That students registered at baccalaureate institutions for fewer than two credit hours shall be charged tuition and services and activities fees at the rate established for two credit hours: PROVIDED FURTHER, That, subject to the limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, residents of Idaho or Oregon who are enrolled in community college district number twenty for six or fewer credits during any quarter or semester may be exempted from payment of all or a portion of the nonresident tuition fees differential upon a declaration by the higher education coordinating board that it finds Washington residents from the community college district are afforded substantially equivalent treatment by such other states.

- 31 **Sec. 8.** RCW 28B.20.130 and 1998 c 245 s 16 are each amended to 32 read as follows:
- 33 General powers and duties of the board of regents are as follows:
- 34 (1) To have full control of the university and its property of various kinds, except as otherwise provided by law.
- 36 (2) To employ the president of the university, his or her 37 assistants, members of the faculty, and employees of the institution,

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who except as otherwise provided by law, shall hold their positions during the pleasure of said board of regents.

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- 3 (3) Establish entrance requirements for students seeking admission 4 to the university which meet or exceed the standards specified under 5 RCW 28B.80.350(2). Completion of examinations satisfactory to the 6 university may be a prerequisite for entrance by any applicant at the 7 university's discretion. - 10 (4) Establish such colleges, schools, or departments necessary to carry out the purpose of the university and not otherwise proscribed by law.

- (6) Grant to students such certificates or degrees as recommended for such students by the faculty. The board, upon recommendation of the faculty, may also confer honorary degrees upon persons other than graduates of this university in recognition of their learning or devotion to literature, art, or science: PROVIDED, That no degree shall ever be conferred in consideration of the payment of money or the giving of property of whatsoever kind.
  - (7) Accept such gifts, grants, conveyances, bequests, and devises, whether real or personal property, or both, in trust or otherwise, for the use or benefit of the university, its colleges, schools, departments, or agencies; and sell, lease or exchange, invest or expend the same or the proceeds, rents, profits, and income thereof except as limited by the terms of said gifts, grants, conveyances, bequests, and devises. The board shall adopt proper rules to govern and protect the receipt and expenditure of the proceeds of all fees, and the proceeds, rents, profits, and income of all gifts, grants, conveyances, bequests, and devises ((above-mentioned)) in this subsection.
- 33 (8) Except as otherwise provided by law, to enter into such 34 contracts as the regents deem essential to university purposes.
- 35 (9) To submit upon request such reports as will be helpful to the 36 governor and to the legislature in providing for the institution.
- 37 (10) Subject to the approval of the higher education coordinating 38 board pursuant to RCW 28B.80.340, offer new degree programs, offer off-39 campus programs, participate in consortia or centers, contract for off-

- 3 (11) Establish operating fees tuition rates according to RCW

- 8 **Sec. 9.** RCW 28B.30.150 and 1998 c 245 s 19 are each amended to 9 read as follows:
- The regents of Washington State University, in addition to other duties prescribed by law, shall:
- 12 (1) Have full control of the university and its property of various 13 kinds, except as otherwise provided by law.
- (2) Employ the president of the university, his or her assistants, members of the faculty, and employees of the university, who, except as otherwise provided by law, shall hold their positions during the pleasure of said board of regents.
- (3) Establish entrance requirements for students seeking admission to the university which meet or exceed the standards specified under RCW 28B.80.350(2). Completion of examinations satisfactory to the university may be a prerequisite for entrance by any applicant, at the university's discretion. Evidence of completion of public high schools and other educational institutions whose courses of study meet the approval of the university may be acceptable for entrance.
- 25 (4) Establish such colleges, schools, or departments necessary to 26 carry out the purpose of the university and not otherwise proscribed by 27 law.
- (5) Subject to the approval of the higher education coordinating board pursuant to RCW 28B.80.340, offer new degree programs, offer off-campus programs, participate in consortia or centers, contract for off-campus educational programs, and purchase or lease major off-campus facilities.
- 33 (6) With the assistance of the faculty of the university, prescribe 34 the courses of instruction in the various colleges, schools, and 35 departments of the institution and publish the necessary catalogues 36 thereof.

- 1 (7) Collect such information as the board deems desirable as to the 2 schemes of technical instruction adopted in other parts of the United 3 States and foreign countries.
- 4 (8) Provide for holding agricultural institutes including farm 5 marketing forums.

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- (9) Provide that instruction given in the university, as far as practicable, be conveyed by means of laboratory work and provide in connection with the university one or more physical, chemical, and biological laboratories, and suitably furnish and equip the same.
- 10 (10) Provide training in military tactics for those students 11 electing to participate therein.
- (11) Establish a department of elementary science and in connection therewith provide instruction in elementary mathematics, including elementary trigonometry, elementary mechanics, elementary and mechanical drawing, and land surveying.
- 16 (12) Establish a department of agriculture and in connection 17 therewith provide instruction in physics with special application of its principles to agriculture, chemistry with special application of 18 19 its principles to agriculture, morphology and physiology of plants with 20 special reference to common grown crops and fungus enemies, morphology and physiology of the lower forms of animal life, with special 21 reference to insect pests, morphology and physiology of the higher 22 forms of animal life and in particular of the horse, cow, sheep, and 23 24 swine, agriculture with special reference to the breeding and feeding 25 of livestock and the best mode of cultivation of farm produce, and 26 mining and metallurgy, appointing demonstrators in each of these 27 subjects to superintend the equipment of a laboratory and to give practical instruction therein. 28
- (13) Establish agricultural experiment stations in connection with the department of agriculture, including at least one in the western portion of the state, and appoint the officers and prescribe regulations for their management.
- 33 (14) Grant to students such certificates or degrees, as recommended 34 for such students by the faculty.
- 35 (15) Confer honorary degrees upon persons other than graduates of 36 the university in recognition of their learning or devotion to 37 literature, art, or science when recommended thereto by the faculty: 38 PROVIDED, That no degree shall ever be conferred in consideration of 39 the payment of money or the giving of property of whatsoever kind.

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- (16) Adopt plans and specifications for university buildings and 1 2 facilities or improvements thereto and employ skilled architects and 3 engineers to prepare such plans and specifications and supervise the 4 construction of buildings or facilities which the board is authorized to erect, and fix the compensation for such services. The board shall 5 enter into contracts with one or more contractors for such suitable 6 7 buildings, facilities, or improvements as the available funds will 8 warrant, upon the most advantageous terms offered at a public 9 competitive letting, pursuant to public notice under rules established 10 by the board. The board shall require of all persons with whom they contract for construction and improvements a good and sufficient bond 11 for the faithful performance of the work and full protection against 12 all liens. 13
- 14 (17) Except as otherwise provided by law, direct the disposition of all money appropriated to or belonging to the state university.
- 16 (18) Receive and expend the money appropriated under the act of congress approved May 8, 1914, entitled "An Act to provide for 17 cooperative agricultural extension work between the agricultural 18 19 colleges in the several States receiving the benefits of the Act of Congress approved July 2, 1862, and Acts supplemental thereto and the 20 United States Department of Agriculture" and organize and conduct 21 agricultural extension work in connection with the state university in 22 accordance with the terms and conditions expressed in the acts of 23 24 congress.
- 25 (19) Except as otherwise provided by law, to enter into such 26 contracts as the regents deem essential to university purposes.
- 27 (20) Acquire by lease, gift, or otherwise, lands necessary to 28 further the work of the university or for experimental or 29 demonstrational purposes.
- 30 (21) Establish and maintain at least one agricultural experiment station in an irrigation district to conduct investigational work upon 31 the principles and practices of irrigational agriculture including the 32 33 utilization of water and its relation to soil types, crops, climatic 34 conditions, ditch and drain construction, fertility investigations, 35 plant disease, insect pests, marketing, farm management, utilization of fruit byproducts, and general development of agriculture under 36 37 irrigation conditions.
- 38 (22) Supervise and control the agricultural experiment station at 39 Puyallup.

3 principles and practices of orchard culture, spraying, fertilization, 4 pollenization, new fruit varieties, fruit diseases and pests, byproducts, marketing, management, and general horticultural problems. 5 6 (24) Accept such gifts, grants, conveyances, devises, and bequests, 7 whether real or personal property, in trust or otherwise, for the use 8 or benefit of the university, its colleges, schools, or departments; 9 and sell, lease or exchange, invest or expend the same or the proceeds, 10 rents, profits, and income thereof except as limited by the terms of said gifts, grants, conveyances, bequests, and devises; and adopt 11 12 proper rules to govern and protect the receipt and expenditure of the 13 proceeds of all fees, and the proceeds, rents, profits, and income of all gifts, grants, conveyances, bequests, and devises. 14

(23) Establish and maintain at Wenatchee an agricultural experiment

- 33 (28) Establish salary and wage compensation levels for all 34 employees of the university except as otherwise provided by state law 35 or collective bargaining agreements.
- 36 **Sec. 10.** RCW 28B.35.120 and 1985 c 370 s 94 are each amended to 37 read as follows:

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- In addition to any other powers and duties prescribed by law, each board of trustees of the respective regional universities:
- 3 (1) Shall have full control of the regional university and its 4 property of various kinds, except as otherwise provided by law.
- 5 (2) Shall employ the president of the regional university, his 6 assistants, members of the faculty, and other employees of the 7 institution, who, except as otherwise provided by law, shall hold their 8 positions, until discharged therefrom by the board for good and lawful 9 reason.
- (3) With the assistance of the faculty of the regional university, shall prescribe the course of study in the various schools and departments thereof and publish such catalogues thereof as the board deems necessary: PROVIDED, That the state board of education shall determine the requisites for and give program approval of all courses leading to teacher certification by such board.

The college board shall have general supervision and control over the state system of community and technical colleges. The directors of the vocational-technical institutes on March 9 1, 1991, shall be designated as the presidents of the new technical 10 colleges<u>;</u>
