State of Washington 56th Legislature 1999 Regular Session

1 AN ACT Relating to improving the community and technical colleges' 2 contributions to economic development in the state of Washington; 3 amending RCW 28B.15.100; creating new sections; and providing an 4 expiration date.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature recognizes that a well-7 trained and educated work force is a key factor in the economic development of the state of Washington. A community and technical 8 college system designed to be responsive to the needs of new or 9 10 expanding business is a strong incentive for new businesses to locate The legislature also recognizes that out-of-state tuition is a 11 here. 12 disincentive for firms that are required to locate key employees here 13 because it represents a high cost to their continued training and 14 The legislature further recognizes that students are development. 15 better served when they are able to integrate work and training. 16 Short-term, modular training is more easily integrated in the 17 workplace, and is far more responsive to the changes in welfare, the cycle of continued dislocation, and limited resources than full-time 18 training. It is the intent of the legislature to eliminate impediments 19

to the ability of the community and technical colleges to maximize
their responsiveness to meet the growing needs of economic development
in this state.

4 Sec. 2. RCW 28B.15.100 and 1998 c 75 s 1 are each amended to read 5 as follows:

(1) The governing boards of the state universities, the regional 6 7 universities, The Evergreen State College, and the community colleges shall charge to and collect from each of the students registering at 8 9 the particular institution for any quarter or semester such tuition fees and services and activities fees, and other fees as such board 10 shall in its discretion determine. The total of all fees shall be 11 rounded to the nearest whole dollar amount: PROVIDED, That such 12 tuition fees for other than the summer term shall be in the amounts for 13 14 the respective institutions as otherwise set forth in RCW 28B.15.067. 15 (2) Part-time students shall be charged tuition and services and 16 activities fees proportionate to full-time student rates established for residents and nonresidents: PROVIDED, ((That students registered 17 18 for fewer than two credit hours shall be charged tuition and services and activities fees at the rate established for two credit hours: 19 **PROVIDED FURTHER**,)) That, subject to the limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, 20 residents of Idaho or Oregon who are enrolled in community college 21 district number twenty for six or fewer credits during any quarter or 22 23 semester may be exempted from payment of all or a portion of the 24 nonresident tuition fees differential upon a declaration by the higher 25 education coordinating board that it finds Washington residents from the community college district are afforded substantially equivalent 26 treatment by such other states. 27

(3) Full-time students registered for more than eighteen credit 28 29 hours shall be charged an additional operating fee for each credit hour 30 in excess of eighteen hours at the applicable established per credit hour tuition fee rate for part-time students: PROVIDED, That, subject 31 32 to the limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, the governing boards of the state universities and the community colleges may exempt all or a portion of 33 34 the additional charge, for students who are registered exclusively in first professional programs in medicine, dental medicine, veterinary 35 36 medicine, doctor of pharmacy, or law, or who are registered exclusively in required courses in vocational preparatory programs. 37

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<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. 10 (1) A committee shall be appointed to examine residency requirements for out-of-state tuition at public institutions of higher 11 education. The committee shall consist of: Representatives from the 12 state board for community and technical colleges, the office of 13 financial management, the higher education coordinating board, and the 14 15 four-year institutions of higher education; and one staff member each 16 from the senate and house of representatives committees on higher 17 education.

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(2) The study shall include, but not be limited to:

(a) The impact the state's rules for in-state and out-of-statetuition setting has on economic development within the state; and

(b) How the state's residency requirements should be applied toenrollment in distance learning courses.

(3) The study committee shall provide a final report to the senate
and house of representatives committees on higher education by December
1, 1999.
