## HOUSE BILL 2808

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State of Washington 56th Legislature 2000 Regular Session

- 1 AN ACT Relating to the educational needs of children and youth in
- 2 foster care; creating new sections; making an appropriation; and
- 3 providing an expiration date.

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- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** The legislature finds that many children
  - miss between weeks and months of school when they are placed in foster
- 7 care and when they change foster families. The legislature also finds
- 8 that these educational disruptions can have a profoundly negative
- 9 impact on student learning and educational persistence, with almost
- 10 seventy percent of children in foster care becoming high school
- 11 dropouts. The legislature further finds that a study of the
- 12 educational circumstances of children in foster care is needed to
- 13 determine the barriers to academic achievement these children face.
- 14 The legislature intends to commission a study to examine the
- 15 educational experiences and achievement levels of children in the
- 16 state's foster care system.
- 17 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** (1) The office of the superintendent of
- 18 public instruction, in cooperation with the department of social and

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- 1 health services, shall conduct a study that examines the educational
- 2 experiences and achievement levels of students who have spent at least
- 3 ninety days in the state's foster care system. The study may include
- 4 either all or a statistically valid subset of students in the system.
- 5 The study shall include, but need not be limited to an examination of:
- 6 (a) The number of students who change schools due to transportation 7 logistics, safety concerns, and other issues;
- 8 (b) The case management time needed to keep a student in his or her
- 9 original school and the time needed to enroll a student into a new
- 10 school, including the time required to meet the record and data needs
- 11 of the new school;
- 12 (c) The estimated transportation costs, not covered by a school 13 district, for keeping a student in the student's original school;
- (d) The number and percentage of students who, during the period of examination, are expelled or suspended, or who drop out of school;
- 16 (e) The number and percentage of high school age students who 17 graduate from high school;
- 18 (f) The achievement levels of students on required nationally 19 normed tests and on the Washington assessment of student learning, to
- 20 the extent such information is available;
- 21 (g) The number of students receiving special education services, by 22 area of special education eligibility;
- 23 (h) The average length of time between foster home placement and 24 school enrollment; and
- 25 (i) Access to school records by a new school from the student's 26 prior school or schools, and by foster parents and caseworkers 27 assisting the child.
- 28 (2) The study should include a student specific comparison of 29 discipline issues and special education services experiences prior to 30 and during placement in foster care.
- 31 (3) The office may convene an advisory committee to assist it in
- 32 its design and implementation of the study. The committee may include,
- 33 but need not be limited to educators, caseworkers, representatives of
- 34 organizations providing services to foster children, and other
- 35 interested persons.
- 36 (4) The office may contract with one or more outside entities to assist in the design and implementation of the study.
- 38 (5) By December 1, 2000, the office shall provide a preliminary 39 report on its progress to the governor and appropriate committees of

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- 1 the house of representatives and the senate. By July 1, 2001, the
- 2 office shall provide a final report on the results of the study to the
- 3 governor and appropriate legislative committees. The report may
- 4 include recommendations for improving the educational experience,
- 5 graduation rates, and achievement levels of students in foster care.
- 6 (5) This section expires September 1, 2001.
- 7 NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. The sum of one hundred thousand dollars, or
- 8 as much thereof as may be necessary, is appropriated for the fiscal
- 9 year ending June 30, 2001, from the general fund to the office of the
- 10 superintendent of public instruction for the study in section 2 of this
- 11 act.

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
